## Affordable Housing?

Cabbageheads have noted a burst of activity on the unfinished gap at the Eastside Trail extension just south of the Edgewood Bridge.

Beltline officials recently announced this as the long-promised "affordable workforce housing" but as of press time, how affordable this housing will be, is still unknown. the land controlled by ABI "will be allocated towards affordable workforce housing."

During construction, Beltline users will be routed up the Edgewood Avenue bridge and down Krog Street to reach the trail's new leg in Cabbagetown and beyond – and vice versa. How disruptive this will be, remains unknown.

Atlanta Beltline Inc (ABI) sold the two acres of formerly contaminated land last used as an industrial laundry facility to developer North American Properties (NAP).

This plot of land links Inman Park and Cabbagetown to the Old Fourth Ward.

ABI bought the brownfield site from *Aramark* two years ago and embarked on remediation work aimed towards rehabilitating the land for affordable housing.

NAP plans to spend \$80 million on a walkable development that features residential, loft office, restaurant, and retail space. Officials said 20 percent of housing units built on

Development officials say the vision for the real estate was brought into focus during numerous meetings with local neighbors, NPUs in the area, and the Inman Park Neighborhood Association.

"We're thankful to our partners and neighbors for helping

us make this extraordinary public private partnership possible," Beltline CEO and President Paul Morris said in a statement.

"Through it we're able to bring a key segment of the Eastside Trail to life by uniting two historically divided railroads, restoring a contaminated industrial site, and realizing the promise of enhanced mobility, new jobs, recreation, and affordability for all." Said Morris.

What remains to be seen is just how "affordable" this development will be. Stay tuned.




Oh! We also hosted the new neighbor party last September, so many of you have been to our house on Pearl Street. You're all still welcome (as far as I can remember)...

I don't know where to start, except to say that I'm moving out of Cabbagetown at the end of April. Moving out of the Southeast, actually. Can you imagine that?

I can't yet. I've lived half my life in Atlanta, and the other half in Mississippi. I've explained many times how Atlanta isn't like outsiders' version of the South; I've explained just as many times how Atlanta is more like the rest of the South than

many Atlantans realize. I guess I like to explain things. And I guess I worry a lot about who I am.

Which is not uncommon for a lot of folks here. Atlanta is filled with transplants, many of them from the Southeast, and many of them like me: knowing the Baptist Hymnal by heart, but getting more and more uncomfortable with the vibe at our hometown church. I probably thought I was better, too, to be honest.

**But Atlanta's still the South.** It's been rebuilt to hell and back, and tries to forget, but even trying to forget and get away is a classic Southern attitude. It works well for a lot of folks.

But you are who you are, and I'm moving to California at the end of April, come good or ill. I resisted it, because Cabbagetown is my spot, and I didn't want to give it up. We do so much for being so small. We're the smallest hood I've ever seen with its own walkable main drag, and with a neighborhood newspaper filled with all original writing. I could explain how I think geography made that happen (I like to explain things), but geography is just a trick. Interesting people are what it's all about.

A few years back I went through a period of rediscovering all the things I was taking for granted in my life. I had seen lovely spots all over the country, but had grown envious of all the amazing places my friends were going.

It was around that time I ran into a guy from New Zealand. He told me that people where he lives come to the States if they want to see something pretty. We've got it all right here if we just look around.

So I'd think about that and look at the foliage, exploding with egalitarian zest over residential streets rich and poor. I'd listen to the thunderstorms, I'd walk outside and get my worn-out shoes soaked in the giant puddles. I'd sit in my loft depressed and watching TV through the cold(ish) winter. And sometimes I'd get to sit on a porch in the dank summer heat and hear that particular long, spooky cicada song I couldn't get out of my head after my papaw died. And now that I've done that, I guess I've got the faith to go anywhere.







## I-85 Bridge Fire and Collapse

Cabbagetown is no stranger to catastrophes, big fires, and things falling down. And we thank that heavens that no souls were lost. Investigators have questioned three people in connection with Thursday's fire that caused part of I-85 to collapse. Two of the individuals have been released but a third is still in custody.

The third person has been identified as Basil Eleby. Fire Investigators believe the fire was set maliciously. Investigators aren't releasing details on how the blaze was started. But it is believed that ignited PVC tubing was a major factor.

Nathan Deal has declared a state of emergency, and with the heavily used road is closed in both directions, drivers are being told to find other options – say hello to MARTA!

The shutdown affects a roughly three-mile portion of I-85, blocking a major artery that runs through the heart of Atlanta. Officials said repairs will likely take "several months."

The road normally carries some 250,000 northbound vehicles

jazz family, which includes sons Wynton and Branford. This show will benefit the Urban Residential Development Corporation and permenant housing for the homeless.



At \$75 I know we will sell all the tickets," says Kendrick (Bolster's partner), "but we need a few good-hearted sponsors who want to support our mission and the Marsalis family's musical contributions to the history of jazz. We are

bringing the arts to the housing cause."

"Rents don't pay all the bills of the Santa Fe," says Bolster, "so I am taking on the producer's risk, but with a partner who knows the music business and knows Ellis. Together we are bringing to Atlanta a jazz legend who only improves with age, to revive a program that gives people a place to call home."

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Cabbagetown Initiative CDC was called to order at 7:04 PM on March 13, 2017 at Cabbagetown Community Center by President Karin Kane.

### I. Approval of Agenda

The agenda for the meeting was unanimously approved.

#### II. Review of Previous Minutes

The minutes of the February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2017, meeting were distributed and unanimously approved.

### III. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Alexa Mosley included her report with the Finance Committee's presentation.

### IV. Reports a. EPL Fund Committee

Thanks to a grant from the EPL Fund, work was completed on a house on Tye St. A house on Berean St has not had electricity for a long period of time; the resident has not been living there due to health issues. The resident also has a significant outstanding tax bill.

MOTION [Paul]: To allocate up to \$2,000 to assist the resident on Berean St with back taxes and maintain the house during recuperation. If the resident decides to sell the house, the EPL funds will be paid back (APPROVED unanimously). [Budget Line: EPL Fund]

The board also discussed how to let more neighbors know about the opportunity to donate to the EPL Fund.

Additionally Jake Elsas proposed having the *Patch Works Art & History Center* become the primary sponsor of the annual Cabbagetown Reunion, this year to be held on June 3<sup>rd</sup>. The board considered the proposal but decided that CI will continue its oversight of the reunion this year.

### b. Finance Committee

The board received and reviewed the proposed budget for 2017. The board engaged in significant discussion about each line item in comparison to previous years' expenses. The board thanked Alexa and the Finance Committee for its hard work.

*MOTION [Paul]:* To approve the 2017 budget as proposed by the Finance Committee. (APPROVED unanimously).

### c. Chomp & Stomp Committee

Whitney reported on the Chomp & Stomp's plan for sponsorships this year. The Committee has revised the letter of agreement with *MixIt Marketing* that CI has used in previous years. The Committee will work with MixIt to secure a contract for this year.

Additionally the Committee has asked the board to commit to raising at least \$2,000 per board member. Each board member verbally agreed to raise this amount.

### d. Community Garden Committee

The leak has been resolved! Members of the Community Garden are working with the City of Atlanta to try to recoup some of the fees incurred as a result of the leak.

#### e. CNIA

**ToolBox No. 9** is setting up a meeting to discuss plans for the consolidated CNIA-CI website. Additionally, Katie Butler will be running for president of CNIA. Lastly, CNIA has budgeted funds for the permits for the Cabbagetown Reunion in June.

#### f. Parks Committee

Some lights in Cabbagetown Park need to be fixed. Tova is working to get bids to fix them.

MOTION [Paul]: To allocated \$530 to fix lights in the circle tree in Cabbagetown Park. (APPROVED unanimously). [Budget Line: Parks - Special Projects] In further conversation with BrightView to finalize the 2017 contract, some addenda were proposed. The board had significant discussion about whether and to what extent to prune the holly trees on Wylie Street.

*MOTION [Heather]:* To increase the parks budget by \$1,280 (APPROVED - FOR: Alexa, Chris, Heather, Karin, Katherine, Paul, Tom, Whitney; AGAINST: Tova) [Budget Line: Parks & Greenspace]

MOTION [Heather]: To approve \$1,095 to trim the holly trees (APPROVED - FOR: Heather, Karin, Katherine, Tom, Whitney; ABSTAIN: Alexa, Chris, Paul, Tova). [Budget Line: Parks - Special Projects]

### g. Governance Committee

Chris reported that the Merger Task Force has been consulting the city, local funders and other neighborhood associations about implications of possible merger. The task force wishes to reengage Terri Theisen, the nonprofit consultant who worked with the board on strategic planning. The task force will update the board again at its April meeting.

**MOTION** [Chris]: To approve up to \$550 to contact with Terri Theisen to identify and clarify the organizational structure for CI and CNIA (APPROVED unanimously). [Budget Line: General Operations] Chris also reminded the board that elections are coming up in May. Officers will need to be elected for the coming year.

### h. Fundraising Committee

Karin shared the Fundraising Committee's plans to host a neighborhood tour of homes as a fundraiser on or around the Cabbagetown Reunion. Some board members expressed concerns about hosting the event on the same day as the reunion. Several board members requested that the committee consider hosting the event at a later date, possibly in conjunction with Forward Warrior's painting of the CSX wall. Board members asked Karin to follow up with the Fundraising Committee and let the board how it planned to proceed.

That's not all, we can look forward to new street level lighting every ninety feet. In another year, things are going to look quite lovely.


The line of Crepe Myrtles take a break along Tennelle, but The Stacks kicked in and in a beautiful case of serendipity, planted a
