# DISNEY BUYS HULSEY Deal Reported Worth \$56 Million

According to a source close to the deal, Disney is close to finalizing the purchase of upwards of fifty-six acres of land known as Husley Yard, from CSX Railroad.

Mr. Sloof Lirpa has informed The Cabbagetown Neighbor that The Walt Disney Company has been quietly inquiring about the property since April 1st of 2015.

The major stumbling points over the course of the preceding three years of negotiations have been price, footprint, and zoning concerns.

While the deal is not yet set in stone, Mr Lirpa says the price is in the vicinity of \$56 million for fifty-six acres of land.

When asked what Disney plans to do with the land, Mr. Lirpa said "Disney has no firm plans yet, but they are considering up to three options: a fantasy sports park featuring upwards of five sports facilities, a theme park centering on Marvel super heroes, or a theme park geared towards a more mature audience."

### Mr. Lirpa noted that plans are still in their infancy and are subject to change.

When asked why Disney coveted this plot of land, Lirpa said "Atlanta is a booming metropolis and is home to a fertile audience for Disney offerings. We think metro Atlanta will be home to upwards of six million within a couple decades. The climate is prime as is the proximity to mass transit and mass transit build-out."

"Disney is a world renowned hospitality company. We place a premium on hospitality and our research shows that few neighborhoods in North America offer the kind of genuine hospitality found in Cabbaqetown" said Lirpa.

According to another source, Ms. Tallie Day, the deal could bring upwards of 6,000 jobs to our area. Disney is looking for zone variances to build homes, and house their work force in and around the 30312 zip code.

Disney is also reportly looking at building an elevated monorail that would surround the park, the immediate neighborhoods and branch out to an undisclosed distance. They are reported also look at "leading-edge transportation options inspired by zip lines and skyliner gondolas."

If Disney opts for the super hero park, Ms. Day says the centerpeice is reported to be a Stark Tower attraction (fictional skyscraper built by Tony Stark, a.k.a. Iron Man), but it's proposed height of 500 feet tall has been a sticking point.

According to Day, an idea gaining traction within Disney involves the creation of a theme park (based on the highly profitable Star Wars franchise) which would require the vertical footprint of the park to exceed 300 feet. That plan also calls for interstellar themed restaurants dotted around the Cabbagetown area.

Day says "Disney is committed to minimally impacting the character and integrity of historic Cabbagetown. Our goal is to not change Cabbagetown one bit. We'll make sure that all the brands and businesses we bring in are compatible with the one-of-a-kind nature of Cabbagetown."

If all goes as planned, construction crews could begin breaking ground as early as 2021. Which is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Disney Parks.

CSX could not be reached for comment.

# If You Build It... Ten Years Ago

A unique Memorial Drive condominium offering at the edge of Cabbagetown could soon move toward construction, as half of the units have been claimed.

The project, 764 Memorial, is proposed for a long-scraggly site across the street from under-construction Atlanta Dairies. Now, the project's website reports that fifty percent of the building has been sold.

Announced last year, 764 Memorial will be built where a similar project was planned to rise before the recession. ITP Development has plans for a five-story, brick-and-stone building to feature 11 one-bedroom units and 13 two-bedroom options.

As units have sold out, three more floorplans have become available—with two including large rooftop terraces. All units feature balconies facing Memorial Drive.

#### Prices start in the \$200,000s and range up into the \$300,000s.

Additionally, five live-work townhomes are planned, bringing the total number of units to twenty-nine. Plans also call for office and retail space at the base of the building fronting Memorial Drive.

Permit filings from this week indicate that work could soon get underway on the site, and the project website states delivery could come this fall.

With the reuse of existing foundation walls on site, developers have said construction of the wood-framed building could move quickly.

## Don't Wait



Back in November, I spent 10 days in Alaska. It was my second trip there and the experiences I had in 2016 were fresh on my mind as I flew in over the stunning Chugach Mountains.

My cousin and I compared maps and books as we planned our first hike. Falls Creek stood out as the trail to do among the many choices. Something about the level of physical challenge really spoke to us. One book described the ability to

continue past the official trail and summit nearby South Suicide peak. We were hooked.

The hike started off beautifully and only got more mesmerizing with each step. We had a stunning view of Turnagain Arm (the icy waterway outside Anchorage) the entire hike. It was always visible, nestled between two snow covered mountains behind us. The late Fall sun gazed upon a ragged peak ahead of us, beckoning us forward. We proceeded through increasingly deep snow, while the peak ahead served as a beacon for us on our ascent.

As we rose up the side of the mountain, which turned out to *NOT* be South Suicide peak after all, and the effort increased significantly, we had to check our resolve to reach the top. We had moved beyond snowy hiking into steep, icy mountaineering that was well outside of what we were prepared for. Yet, the spectacular beauty and seeming perfect harmony with our surroundings kept us moving. Daylight was burning with each icy step, and when we were perhaps 100 feet from the top, we had to decide: do we keep going in conditions that were already well outside of what was safe, or do we turn back and spend what light we had left getting down from our precarious position. We turned back.

When we turned to descend on the steep, icy slope we were perched on, I lost my balance and began to wobble. There was nothing to grab. No way to stabilize myself. When I fell to the ice and began to slide, I realized I was in serious trouble. There was no way to stop on the solid ice sheet; I was going over. I knew in that moment that it was possible my life would end on that mountain.

As fate would have it, I went airborne over a ledge and landed in a deep snow field, skidding toward a second rocky ledge, but I was able to stop before going over a second time. It was the most intense experience of my life, yet one in which I felt a sense of calm that is hard to put into words.

Surviving this experience put things in perspective for me. The main takeaway that I wanted to share in this very brief account is that I no longer wait to live until some magical perfect future. I'm living now. I encourage everyone reading to do the same.

**Don't wait. Tomorrow may be too late.** Take the trip. Make the phone call. Pursue the dream you've always fantasized about. All we have is now. I hope you join me in making it count.

# Two More Murder Arrests Made

The Atlanta Police Department announced two more arrests in the Barcelona Wine Bar robbery and murder from November 2017.

Terry Jones, DOB 3/29/98, was taken into custody on Wednesday, February 28th by the APD Fugitive Unit. Jones had just landed at

Hartsfield- Jackson Atlanta International Airport in the early morning when he was met at the gate by Fugitive Unit investigators and taken into custody. Jones was charged with felony murder and transported to the Fulton County jail.

Soon thereafter, they announced that they have now made a fourth arrest in the November 19<sup>th</sup> murder of Chelsea Beller, a manager at the Barcelona Wine Bar in northwest Atlanta. Ira Troy Williams, DOB 4/20/98, was taken

into custody on February 28<sup>th</sup> at approximately 2:00p by the APD Fugitive Unit at 56 Rockbridge Road in Stone Mountain. Williams was charged with Felony Murder and was transported to the Fulton County Jail. This is the fourth and final suspect linked to this case.




Chelsea Beller

Beller was shot during a robbery while the restaurant, located at 1084 Howell Mill Road in northwest Atlanta, was closing around 2:30a on November19th.

Three black males entered the restaurant, tied up employees and forced Beller to open a safe.

During the robbery, one of the suspects shot Beller. She was transported to Grady Hospital, where she was pronounced dead. This is the final suspect to be arrested for Beller's murder.



# Movie review: Super Troopers

Vermont state troopers, Thorny (Chandrasekhar), Farva (Heffernan), Mac (Lemme), Foster (Soter), and Rabbit (Stolhanske) are a wacky group of guys who don't take much seriously.

Between playing pranks on one another, playing games that confuse motorists, and getting under the skin of the local Spurbury police, these guys fully enjoy their shenanigans. That is, until their Captain, (Cox) lets them know that their precinct is in danger of closing. They need to get down to business and up their numbers if they want to keep their jobs.





April 27th Paul Thorn, Blind Boys of Alabama, and the McCrary Sisters at Variety Playhouse: Even though Paul Thorn has a reputation as a notably acerbic singer-songwriter, he has recently been exploring his faith through a more gospel

# An East Gate at Oakland Cemetery

Oakland Cemetery and Cabbagetown have been historically connected since the 1880s when Jacob Elsas built the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill and the ensuing mill village, Cabbagetown. Elsas was interred at Oakland in the family mausoleum when he passed in 1931. Although his mausoleum proudly overlooks Memorial Drive and the new Grant Park Market, what many don't realize is that Elsas had a window placed in the back of the Mausoleum (facing North) so that even in death he could overlook the Mill and the community that he devoted much of his adult life to.

We're proud of our historic connection to Cabbagetown. But the connections are not just historic. The Historic Oakland Foundation supports Cabbagetown businesses by sending our visitors in their direction and by providing opportunities at our many events for those businesses to showcase the best they have to offer.

But we don't imagine our connections ending there. A much discussed "East Gate," is now a part of our new master plan to make Oakland more accessible to all the residents, visitors, and business owners of the Cabbagetown community and beyond.

How wonderful would it be if walkers, runners, and Oakland Cemetery visitors from Cabbagetown had the option to enter from the eastern side of the Cemetery rather than walk half way along the Cemetery on Memorial Drive? In a bustling city (and neighborhood) that is rapidly changing, Oakland remains a beautiful and tranquil 48-acre sanctuary. Being able to expand access to our east side neighbors is a priority for The Foundation as we strive to fulfil our mission to preserve, restore, enhance, and share Oakland with the public.

This idea has been circulating at Oakland for a number of years but for me, who is relatively new to the Foundation, this was

reinforced recently when I sat on the roof of *Six Feet Under* enjoying a post-work happy hour. Down Memorial Drive came a group of fifty runners on that narrow sidewalk next to Oakland's southern wall. How much more enjoyable would their run have been had it instead traversed Oakland's beautiful forty-eight acres? How much more convenient would it be for everyone living in Cabbagetown and the neighborhoods to the east of Oakland to have a new access point from which to enjoy this one-of-a-kind city park?

So what's the latest? A project of this size and impact has required a period of due diligence to ensure that as many of our stakeholders as possible have had a say in this project. Now we're transitioning into the active planning stage; working with architects to render drawings, and skilled metal workers to work on designs which will incorporate the cemetery's existing historic fabric. This project will take money to accomplish, so we are also putting together a funding strategy to raise the necessary capital.

Located at the corner of Memorial Drive and Boulevard, this pedestrian gate will provide easier access for our friends on the east side and a faster way to enjoy the irreplaceable forty-eight acres of green space and history. We hope that you are as excited as we are!

In 2018 a series of six live music performances will be held in the Brookshire Amphitheater in Cabbagetown Park, four in the Spring and two in the Fall. Funded in part by both The CI and CNIA, the City of Atlanta Parks and Recreation Department has approved the events, and city permits have been submitted. Ms. Archibong will be in attendance to speak, and folk singer Elise Witt will lead the audience in singing Joyce's song "Cabbagetown Ballad" to christen the stage. The first event also features performances by Cabbagetown bands – The Chumblers, and Slim Chance & the Convicts, starting at 7p.

Given Joyce's rich and productive history of wonderful music and dedication to empowering and promoting the welfare of Cabbagetown residents, she is remembered as an effective and positive force whose work was critical in shaping the current neighborhood environment, and creating a sense of pride in our community. While other musical performers have roots in Cabbagetown, Joyce's efforts have had the most lasting and positive impact, and dedicating a stage to her in Cabbagetown Park would be a fitting tribute to both her music and her support of the community.

Cabbagetown Initiative is happy to announce 2018 Forward Warrior! (~250 people, Class E Permit), an arts & culture awareness event, taking place on Saturday, June 16<sup>th</sup> 11a - 8p, on the block face across from Esther Peachy Lefevre Park, Wylie Street at Powell Street.

This low impact event will feature a small art market, two neighborhood DJ's spinning downtempo, and a modest beer station for adult refreshments.

There will be three food trucks, happy cans, water stations, and recycling. *Patchworks Cabbagetown Art & History Museum* will also be unveiling a travelling exhibit about Esther Peachy Lefever, whose historic series of ceramic murals in 1987 with artist Steve Seaberg are still visible along the *CSX* Wall.
