CNIA: General Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, July 11th, 2023, 7p. Meeting conducted by Marinangeles Gutierrez Rivera. Minutes by Lucy Perkins. Location: Cabbagetown Art Center.

6:30 Social Happy 1/2 Hour - Food, Drinks, & Community

- 1. 7:03p Meeting Begins. Welcome! Amanda Bisgard & Nancy Morales. Thank you to the Arts Center for hosting! Nancy Morales from the Art Center: "This is a space that prioritizes and normalizes mental health. Art is a way to facilitate that. The Art Center offers individual and group therapy as well as art classes. It's a safe space to be creative. Come down anytime!"
- 2. Atlanta Police Department Updates Officer Davis. Crime is down over the last 30 days only four reported crimes. Only big crime was a purse snatching on Wylie. Clean car campaign don't leave anything valuable visible in your car. Connect Atlanta: link your security cameras to their system to help the police. You can compare crime stats on the ATLPD website. The summer Edgewood detail started last week 14 officers working on Edgewood from Boulevard to William Holmes Boarder Senior Dr. After the bars close they push the cars to the interstate directly.

3. Review and Approval of June Minutes. Approved!

4. Vice-President Report - Marinangeles Gutierrez. Updates from Council Member's Bahktiari's office: Carroll Street Closure - working with departments for smooth implementation. Dekalb Ave resurfacing - due to end by Q3 with bike lanes added. The council secured wage increases for code enforcement officers and retention bonuses for 911 operators. Worked to amend the City's Charter related to taxation to increase the millage rate associated with the Park Improvement Fund. Authorized the City to issue \$100M in revenue bonds to support the Housing Opportunity Program. Councilmembers Bahktiari, and Westmoreland were able to secure an additional \$3.5M for the Cities Affordable Housing Trust Fund. A resolution to adopt the recommendations of the "Explore South River Forest" report commissioned by the Atlanta Regional Commission and request that the Administration deliver an implementation plan to fulfill the \$100M transformation of the South River Forest by Dec. 1. Staffing up the Solicitor's Office's Safe Housing Program to increase capacity for the solicitor to enforce the Housing Code and improve housing conditions for residents living in substandard multifamily properties. The Office is working to deliver infrastructure and park improvements for the district. They engaged in participatory budgeting to allow communities to provide community input on upcoming projects. The DRIVE initiative is currently being priced out by the Atlanta Department of Transportation, progressing these improvements, and last Friday the Office met with various "Friends Of" groups, including Cabbagetown's to discuss how neighbors can apply for grants. Carroll St One-Week Closure - Working Groups: Seeking Volunteers. DOT did a walk through after the February accident and decided to do a pilot that will cover a one week period of closing Carroll St. The idea is we have a trial period to see what happens. They charged CNIA to facilitate troubleshooting (parking, deliveries, etc). We'll set up three working groups; one to talk to businesses on Carroll, second to talk to residents of the affected area with one representative from each street to discuss concerns, the last group is to decide how to make the best of the closure. This group will help facilitate the engagement portion and feedback from residents. Perhaps we can present the feedback to the DOT. Q: What do we want to track? A: Perhaps the committees can help with that. Q: Will the working groups have effect on decisions?

A: We've not heard from the DOT directly but the councilperson has acted as a liaison and will work with us. Q: Will we have signage earlier on roads to alert trucks to the closure? A: There will be signage and working traffic maps. Neighbor volunteered to talk to Edgewood (they just had a street closure). Q: Does it stop at Carroll St or go to Boulevard? A: We have only heard about Carroll, from the Stacks gate through to Gaskill. but we've submitted a proposal that asks for help with Boulevard intersection. Businesses are concerned and would like to be heard. Q: How will they get deliveries? What type of barriers will there be? Businesses are hesitant and don't know how this will work. A: The message from DOT is that they spoke to businesses. We're aiming to have the meetings next week to discuss these concerns. Q: Are there other options open like trying a one way? A: It will be a full week closure but perhaps we can approach them with solutions from neighbors. Q: DOT is not taking data from street closure? Will we be heard if they aren't collecting info? Could we collect data as residents? A: We're not clear at this time if any data will be collected that is not neighbor-facilitated. Q: There was a traffic study a long time ago; could we get that information? Q: Has Stacks management been contacted? Could we ask for their help with parking or cut through cars that don't follow the signage? A: Lilliana has contacted them. Q: Were we asked to form these committees or are we doing this to be heard? A: Lilliana's office asked us to form these committees. They may even attend the business meeting. Q: Are there resources allocated for this? A: They seem open to possibly working with us and to help us get resources we request. Sign up for a committee by email president@cabbagetown.com or info@cabbagetown.com



C'town Chows: The Sotto Sotto Secret Menu



OK – **do I have your attention?** Pretty catchy headline, right? Thank you, thank you, I really appreciate you saying that guys.

Secret menus are very 2010s, and I'll break the news to you now, early, in the article: it doesn't really exist for *Sotto Sotto*. HOWEVER, there is a bit of a menu hack that you may or might not know about, which, candidly, is a game changer. Sotto Sotto (313 North Highland Ave) in Inman Park is owned by the same folks and even shares the kitchen space with neighboring

Napolitano pizza joint, *Fritti* (309 North Highland Ave). As a result, there are some neighbor privileges afforded, which surely benefits us all.

Alright, so now lots of words into the article, and still no update on the secret menu. Here we go: You can order Sotto Sotto pastas even sitting next door at Fritti. For us, this is huge. Pizza and Pasta goes together like Peanut Butter & Jelly, Spaghetti & Meatball, Lamb & Tuna Fish (Adam Sandler fans WYA?). You need the pasta when you have the pizza, and vice versa. You simply cannot have bread covered in sauce and topped with cheese without also indulging in a separate form of carbohydrate covered in a separate sauce and similar type of cheese. Fortunately for us all, some of Atlanta's best carbohydrates can be found at these two establishments.

So, what do you order at Fritti? Well, there are a TON of pizzas, so really, any of those will do. Personal favorites include Regina Margherita (Mozzarella, basil, olive oil) and Quattro Formaggi (Four cheese – white pizza). I personally think pizza should be ordered and subsequently enjoyed simply; crust, sauce, cheese - but I know there are many out there that just need more, they crave more, and I get it, but get yourself a sandwich and not a pizza, OK?

Now, onto the pasta. Preface this by saying I apologize to the staff at Fritti should our thousands upon thousands of Ctown Chows readers flood your establishments ordering pasta from your Sotto kitchen and asking it to be delivered to their seats at Fritti but it's just too good a recommendation not to share. Favorite pastas include: Ravioli Nudi, Lasagnette alla Bolognese, and the Strozzapreti alla Salsiccia. The Ravioli Nudi are more of a rec for an appetizer to share with the group – ricotta, coated in butter and parmigiano, a great vegetarian option. The Lasagnette is essentially a slim lasagna – the best parts of the lasagna being the top crispy cheesy noodle, sitting atop their wonderful Bolognese. Finally, the best dish of them all, the Strozzapreti – a dish that our very own Stacey Abrams calls one of the most delicious things she's eaten. Strozzapreti loosely translates to "Priest Strangler." Sounds offensive, right? Not 100% sure, I'm not Catholic, but if a pasta was named "The Rabbi-Strangler" I might take issue...


Anyway, these are essentially short cut pasta twisted up in the shape as if you were wringing out a towel, leaving forth crevices on crevices to catch all of that unctuous sweet sausage ragu it accompanies. Final hack on Sotto is you can order appetizer portions of the pastas so you can try multiple, but they don't do that on the weekends anymore because SOMEONE ordered one of every pasta dish one Saturday night and backed up the entire kitchen (sorry y'all).



He held up Cop City as a warning flag, and cautioned that Cop City could foretell the future of Hulsey Yard.

Shaun caught the eye and ear of Rose Scott (and her intrepid team including Daniel Rayzel and LaShawn Hudson) at *WABE* radio (our *NPR* and *PBS* affiliate for Atlanta).

Rose invited Shaun to her studio on Monday, July 24th, for a brief discussion on the topic. Shaun accepted and they engaged in a thoughtful conversation on the topic.

With regard to Cop City, Shaun said "This project has kind of been steamrolled in a way that you don't see with a lot of projects. That's another thing that kind of prompted me to write this piece." Shaun wants to make sure Cabbagetown's wants and needs are not treated in a similar manner.

PLANTS ARE LIKE PEOPLE



Sometimes a plant grows on you. Not literally, of course.

For example, some years ago I purchased a 'Challenger' daylily because it was taller and would bloom later than my other daylilies.

When it bloomed the first time I was disappointed. The flowers weren't as intensely red as the photo in the catalog, and the petals were not as thin

and "spidery" as I had hoped. Though disappointed, I decided to keep it around longer rather than immediately casting it out of my little Eden.

I'm glad I did. 'Challenger' has proven its worth. It wasn't exactly what I expected, but now I am quite fond of it. Its height (reaching five feet or more) gives it a real presence, and it extended my daylily season by beginning to bloom weeks after my other ones. While the red was muddier and not as bright and intense as I was led to believe, it actually blended well with the other things that were blooming along with it or provided a nice contrast to them. And it is a vigorous grower that produces oodles of blooms, to boot.

I debated transplanting 'Salmon Sheen' daylily from my childhood home to Cabbagetown. Salmon is not my favorite color, and many other daylilies are showier and more flamboyant. I moved it here almost out of a sense of obligation. As it grew and bloomed here, I started appreciating it more. Its flowers were exquisitely shaped, sensuous even, with an understated beauty that many new daylilies lack. I see now why it received the Stout Silver Medal, the highest award a daylily can receive, back in 1959. I wish I had noticed its qualities earlier.

And I have turned up my nose at some common plants that are frequently planted. "Everyone plants that" should not be an excuse for ignoring a quality tree, shrub or flower.

Have you done this with plants as well, dismissing them without taking the time to learn their virtues? Unfortunately, I have also treated people that way. I'm trying to do a better job giving plants and people a fair chance.

His favorite thing is to lie on my chest an inch from my face while I'm giving him pets. I call him my soul sucker.



BOLD PREDICTION

The 2023 Hurricane Season



We are in the midst of the Atlantic hurricane season which runs from June 1st through November 30th.

First, the good news. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts a near-normal season with no more than 17 named storms. So far, there have been four, and only one reached hurricane status.

Additionally, After three hurricane seasons with La Niña present, we've transitioned into

El Niño this summer, which suppresses Atlantic hurricane activity.

What is El Niño? Good question. During El Niño, trade winds weaken and warm water is pushed back east, fundamentally keeping prime hurricane conditions away from the United States.

Now the bad news. Water temperatures in the Atlantic are historically high. Most reputable sources report temperatures between one and three degrees above normal. According to **CNN**, some waters around Manatee Bay, Florida have reached 100^F. That's the same temp as a Jacuzzi hot tub. According to **Rueters**, normal water temps for the area this time of year should be between 73^F and 88^F.

Here's where it gets a bit scary. According to Yale Climate Conditions, A one degree Fahrenheit rise in ocean temperature can increase a hurricane's wind speed by 15 to 20 miles per hour. Doesn't sound like much, right? But consider that a Category 1 hurricane – under normal ocean conditions – hits 95mph. With temps upwards of three degrees above normal, that Cat 1 hurricane can explode into a major Cat 4 with winds hitting more than 140mph and it would not take much for the same storm to blossom into a Cat 5 with winds hitting 157mph or higher. A hurricane's power increases exponentially from one category to the next as wind speed increases. A Category 5 hurricane, for example, is 500 times more powerful than a Category 1.

With water temps so warm in shallow waters, we might also see hurricanes gain tremendous strength just before making landfall.

So what does all this mean to Cabbagetown? As a storm moves inland, winds rapidly decrease, but hurricane force winds can be felt as far as 150 miles inland. The stronger and faster the storm is moving, the further inland hurricane force winds will be felt. All these factors mean the chances of severe tropical storms affecting us are much greater. More residents to our south will seek shelter to the north. It might be wise to prepare. If a storm approaches, stock up on food, water, fuel, and money. And maybe prepare for house guests from the south.

I've buried the lede a wee bit, but here's the bold prediction: this season (or during the next two), we will see an unprecedented monster hurricane, that will take more lives and cause more damage than ANY hurricane before. And it's all of our own making. Shame on us. We paved paradise...





You'll find it in the heart of Reynoldstown at the Lang Carson Recreation Center, which is located at 100 Flat Shoals Ave.





Road Repaying Begins at Oakland

With over \$2.4 million from the 2022 Move Atlanta Forward infrastructure bond, the City of Atlanta is repaving nearly two miles of roads at Oakland Cemetery, replacing failing water lines, installing irrigation for Oakland's gardens, improving drainage and soil stability, and repairing gutters. The repaving work will take place in three phases. Phase one started in late July and focuses on roads in the western half of the cemetery on Bell Tower Ridge. 
Families looking for fall activities need look no further than
