My cousin was not immune to these temptations and pressure from friends. Drugs were much easier to find in the 80's.

When I was a kid I remember seeing random guys standing around on corners of most streets. They never bother my friends and I, never offered us anything. Talking to Marion, I learned that those guys weren't just hanging *Continued on page six*

While we all await word on Amazon's HQ2, United Parcel Service (UPS) is quietly expanding it's Atlanta footprint. This month, they announced they are in the midst of hiring up to 3,000 people for its sprawling new Atlanta SMART hub next to Fulton County's Charlie Brown Field airport. Of those positions, the company said 700 will

be full-time jobs such as mechanics, plant engineers and drivers. According to *Atlanta Business Chronicle*, the facility measures 1.2 million square feet – the equivalent of more than 19 football fields – and has the ability to process 100,000 packages per hour. Operations at the building are expected to begin August 6th.

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Time for Stacey

There is big risk involved with electing a 'politically incorrect conservative' that airs ads in which he discusses rounding up undocumented immigrants in his truck and points shotguns at teenage boys. These stunts may play wonderfully in rural Georgia, but they do not sit well in the Board rooms of major employers or the executive offices of big movie studios that are crucial to our economy. If we go down this road, we WILL pay for it. It's time we take a stand and reject the politics of intolerance, right now.

Stacey Abrams has a strong record of leadership in the Georgia House, where she served as Minority Leader for six years. She's well respected and has a bold vision for our future. She embodies inclusivity and respect for those less fortunate. She's a symbol of what's possible through hard work and determination.

out, they were selling drugs. It was a stark contrast to my teenage years in the 90's. If you wanted drugs then, you just went to one of the many drug houses. In the 80's it was right out on the street.

In my last article, I mentioned the two rules I had as kid. Be home before the street light came on and to stay away from Reynoldstown. A few folks have asked specifically asked about the Reynoldstown rule, as a kid I didn't get it either. I never recall anyone saying why, it was just one of those adult things often said to kids: "because, I said so".

I always just assumed it was too far away from the eyes of the other parents in the neighborhood. As with any child, especially boys, that reason only made me want to bend the rule even more. I did not break it until years later in the mid 90's - me and a friend, Larry Dean – used to love riding our bikes all over the neighborhood.

We eventually decided to venture into Reynoldstown. At first it was cool, just like Cabbagetown. A couple of streets into the neighborhood, we came upon a small group of kids on bikes. Back then, the two neighborhoods were extremely segregated. Cabbagetown predominantly white, Reynoldstown predominantly African-American.

The other kids told us to leave. After trying to explain we were just riding our bikes, we decided to leave. As were were leaving they started following us. Larry lead the way to his granny's house on Savannah street. The other group followed us right up to her yard.

It wasn't until she stepped out of her front door with her shotgun that they left. After talking with Marion, I began to understand that Reynoldstown in the 80's was a lot like Cabbagetown. They were having the same issue with drugs.

It was common in the 80's that if people from Cabbagetown went to Reynoldstown, or they to Cabbagetown, you could count on getting beat up. So no, Cabbagetown was not some idyllic innocent place in the 80's. Like I said though, it was not when the "artists" moved in and transformed it into the place it is now.

I will continue to explore the 90's next month, sharing the stories of the hero's from the 90's and the trials they faced. In closing I'm thinking a better title for these past two articles would have been A Tale of Two Cabbagetown's.

It strikes me however that there still are two Cabbagetown's. The Cabbagetown most folks see: an awesome, guirky, intown neighborhood where everyone is welcome. And the other Cabbagetown: a community with it's fair share of flawed people, working day-to-day to make it through the issues that face us throughout our lives, and trying their best to just live and get by.

I. Call to Order - the President called the

meeting to order at 7:11p.

II. Approval of the Agenda. Katie made a motion. Motion was properly seconded and unanimously approved.

III. Approval of the Minutes. Morgan made a motion to approve June 2018 minutes and table the April minutes until August 2018. The motion was properly seconded and approved unanimously.

IV. Officer's Report

a. President's Report – no report.

b. Treasurer's Report – Alexa provided an overview of the CI Budget, including expenditures to date (actuals) and projections for remainder of the year, including Chomp & Stomp. c. Report on Concert Series - tabled until August





Atlanta Wants Your Thoughts on Marta

Atlanta City Councilmembers are hosting a series of community forums in August to educate residents and city stakeholders about the More MARTA Atlanta program and receive feedback on the proposed project list. The first community forum will take place on Aug. 2nd from 6 to 8p at Fort McPherson, 178 Hardee Avenue S.W.

"We want to hear from our residents," said Councilmember Sheperd. "These forums will give the community an opportunity to join more in-depth discussions and get updates as we prepare to roll out Marta transit projects across the city. We're asking everyone to attend."

City of Atlanta residents passed the *More MARTA* Atlanta half-penny sales tax in 2016. The funds will generate nearly ^{\$}2.5 billion for transit expansion and enhancement projects over the next 40 years.

More MARTA Atlanta's original project list was developed with public input and included more than 70 projects with an estimated price tag of ^{\$}11.5 billion. Public feedback – along with evaluations conducted by program partners' City of Atlanta and MARTA – played a significant role in right-sizing the program to the current proposed project list. "We want to hear from our residents," said Councilmember Sheperd. "These forums will give the community an opportunity to join more in-depth discussions... as we prepare to roll out Marta transit projects across the city."

More MARTA Atlanta will serve 126 neighborhoods. The program's goal is to connect Atlanta communities, expand access to jobs, healthcare, educational opportunities, enhance independence for seniors and individuals living with disabilities, and improve the overall quality of life for Atlanta residents.

Crack houses, Krog Tunnel arrests, turtle rescues and Ben Stiller. This was all a part of our Cabbagetown history in the the month of August in years gone by. Here's a look back.

1925: A fire at *The Fulton Bag & Cotton Mill* cost the lives of six firemen. After the fire was put out, the building collapsed while the inspection and investigation was underway.

1993: Cabbagetown worked with our APD to shut down a "crack house" that was operating within our friendly confines. Neighbors gathered and cheered as APD entered and removed all occupants, piled them into the paddywagon and carted them off to be booked. CNIA had a total of ^{\$}65 to it's name. Kids were climbing atop the old **Boys & Girls Club** (now **The Carroll Street Lofts**) and throwing rocks down upon passers-by and cars.

1994: Ronnie Edwards, Sr. and Tom Houston were planning a youth festival, street party and tree planting event to be held in October of that year.

1996: Rumours were flying fast and free that **CSX** would abandon the **Husley Yard** and move operations to Fairburn. CNIA distributed free electric fans to neighbors in need of relief from the heat. They also helped some neighbors get low-flow toilets.

1997: During our Cabbagetown Reunion Festival, John Johnson demonstrated how an antique cotton gin worked and his daughter Rosemary, sheered a sheep. On a Carroll St. porch, a weaver showed how cotton was woven, and Appalachian cloggers taught us all how to clog dance. The day also witnessed a dog parade, a folklore tent, a children's activities tent and an elder's tent. To beat the heat, Cabbageheads were encouraged to put icy cans of soda in their armpits, freeze grapes and oranges for a tasty, cold snack, rub tiger balm on their temples, and eat spicy foods to generate cooling sweat.

2000: 249 Pearl Street sold for ^{\$}135,000 (*Zillow* lists it's current value at ^{\$}471,127). Six large bags of cocaine were found at the 600 block of Memorial. APD arrested a car thief who was found sleeping in the car he had stolen just a few hours prior.

2002: APD made arrests at the Krog Tunnel. The crime was graffiti. 597 Gaskill St. sold for ^{\$}158,900 (valued at ^{\$}416,719 today). *Agave* was voted as having the best magarita is town by *Creative Loafing* and *Atlanta Magazine*.

2003: 97 Estoria was hosting a neighborhood party with all proceeds going towards Cabbagetown Park. Two males were arrested on Pearl Street for sexual misconduct and suspicious activity. A hand gun was taken from one of the suspects.

2004: 230 Carroll Street sold for ^{\$}303,000 (valued at ^{\$}444,048 today). Cabbagetown mourned the passing of Naomi Brown, a

long-time resident on Savannah Street. Naomi loved Gypsy music, international travel, writing, teaching, philosophy, and friendship. She passed in her home, surrounded by family and friends.

2005: 251 Berean St. sold for \$166,668 (valued today at \$434,114).

2006: The good Reverend David DeChant and his wife Ann-Marie announced the arrival of Calliope Lysisrata DeChant. Tim Sullivan wrote a profile on *"Bug"* who used to work at *Village Pizza*. Bug was thrilled to be so popular but complained that kids now threw things at him and dogs chased him. Bug also noted that the folks on Tye Street were the best tippers.

2007: The city implemented it's automatic water meter reading program. *The Home Depot Foundation* donated ^{\$}10,000 towards the maintenance and up-keep of The Cabbagetown Community. Center. A Berean Street homeowner was cutting down trees on his property. When he put the chainsaw down, a white male stole it and fled in a green Mazda. David Thayer was rightly bemoaning the replacement of gorgeous and historic granite curbstones and old brick sidewalks throughout Cabbagetown.

2008: *Milltown Tavern* raised over ^{\$}1000 in an effort to help those severely affected by the tornado in March. 228 Powell Street sold for \$519,000 (valued today at ^{\$}695,775).

2009: Rodney Bowman rescued a box turtle on Powell Street. Turns out, the turtle had strayed from David Thayer's pond. The turtle was returned to his tranquil home. CNIA had ^{\$}2,595 in it's bank account. Angle and Steve Ferrin announced the birth of their beautiful daughter Flora Guess Ferrin.

2012: Eagle-eyed Cabbageheads spotted Ben Stiller playing ping-pong at *Sister Louisa's Church of the Living Room and Ping-Pong Emporium*. Stiller was in town shooting his then new movie *"Neighborhood Watch"* and he spoke about *"Church"* on *"Jimmy Kimmel Live"*.

2015: Our fair city embarked on another sidewalk repair project. We reported on the infamous fireworks fiasco of 2015 at Ester Peachy Park. Lisa Myers was getting ready to host a Roll Call party at her lovely house on Powell Street. Cabbageheads banded together to voice their concerns over *Krog Masquerade*.

2016: The average price of a home in Cabbagetown was ^{\$}351,145. Karen Anderson and her *Tiny Doors* movement was highlighted in *Money Magazine*! *Fuqua Development* announced *"Madison Yards"*, a major residential-commercial makeover of the *Leggett & Platt* industrial site.

2017: Cabbagetown mourned the passing of Joyce Brookshire. "Smooth" versus "textured" Hardie Plank was quite the issue. Our community garden had a bumper crop of HUGE cucumbers. Sir John Dirga was organising us for the upcoming *"Stacks Squares"* public street art effort. Crime was down 10[%] city-wide. The Atlanta Urban Design Commission approved a resolution nominating the century-old *Pratt-Pullman Yard* as a landmark district.

Mission Accomplished

Most of us first met Richard "Sarge" Thiede a handful of years ago. He made quite the first impression, right? When I met him, I thought to myself, *"this guy has got some good life secrets... and I wanted to steal them."*

Little did I know at the time, that I was both right and wrong. Sarge *did* have wonderful secrets. But grand theft was not necessary. Sarge was willing to give away his secrets whether we were willing to listen or not. I chose to listened.

Sarge and his beautiful wife Lasca lived in many wonderful places... California and Texas, among them. But they were searching. Sarge was searching. He was looking for a true home for Lasca, his daughter Tylar, his grandson Ryder, and his son-in-law Michael. A place that would cradle them when THIS time came.

Sarge saw in Cabbagetown what David Crowder once called "a magical

I said to Sarge, perhaps in too loud a voice, "Well Sarge, we gotta get you outta this bed and go see Clay and Joy in Monroe! You wanna get in the truck and go see 'em?"

And I kid you not, Sarge's eyebrows raised, his eyes opened, he focused... and he smiled.

I think Clay Caissie, and Jay Desai and David Crowder were very very special to Sarge. Forgive me for being somewhat sacreligious, but I think those three lads were kinda like his holy trinity. The father, the son, and the holy ghost. us for Sarge and his family. So of the many many things we need to remember, let us not forget what Jay marshaled us all to do.

And we *must* do it again. For those we love. Wherever we may go. Let's take this love with us. Let us love one another. Let us not only be the mouth and word of God – let us be the arm and muscle and love of God. Let us not only talk in the glory of God, but let us act in the glory of God too. Cabbagetown is not normal. But *we* can reteach others how abnormal is perfectly human and wonderful.
