The meeting was called to order at 7:05p by President Kendall Rawls.

Agenda: There was a motion to approve the agenda. The motion was properly

seconded and unanimously approved.

Minutes: There was a motion to approve the minutes from September's meeting. The motion was properly seconded. The motion unanimously was approved.

Treasurer's report: We have not yet borrowed against savings for *Chomp* and hope we will not have to. The door in the community center needs fixing that will cost about \$800. We will reach out to somebody.

Chomp and Stomp: The Volunteer Chair spot has been filled! There will be four welcome centers. Each center needs a chair and training for the captains on the POS There will be T-shirts, tokens, and spoons sold and that's where ID's will be checked for wristbands.

For sponsors, we need to send the logos directly so they get up on the website and applied to other marketing material ASAP. There was discussion regarding social media and the need for a liquor chair. *Home Grown* is not participating this year. *97 Estoria* has not been in communication. We will run the normal numbers for the newspaper this year (700 copies).

There was discussion regarding logistics of welcome centers, social media, and other final aspects of Chomp. The next meeting will be Sunday at 6p at 606 Pickett's Alley and following that on October 21st. The Board of Directors will meet October 29th instead of November 5th so we can discuss final details and logistics of Chomp.

Governance: Ashley spoke with Jack Bedford regarding Board of Directors (BOD) training. We will shoot for early December but, understanding scheduling difficulties in December, maybe January will be better. Ashley has spoken with the city representative regarding the MOU. The BOD is tabling that discussion for the meeting after Chomp. The MOU does not expire until February and the city did not indicate they had any issue with renewing it.

Parks: There have been \$2,300 in donations so far regarding Paul's memorial. The BOD discussed making good use of the donations. That committee walked with *Brightview* to determine the status of work, plants, mulch, etc. The committee spent \$400 for watering the plant beds and \$120 for gutters at the community center. They

are identifying budget issues for 2019. Andrew Kohr is going to lead the community center redevelopment committee.

Community garden: No updates.

EPL Fund: Discussion regarding future and vision.

CI Mission: Still in discussion.

2019 budget: BOD is thinking ahead of time and wants neighbor input. There was a discussion regarding the public address system for the Brookshire stage.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:28p

Hooray for Cabbagewood, oh wait, that's not how the song goes is it? It's just with Georgia's new "Hollywood of the south" title, I was thinking there should be a song about Hollywood south.

I know that your asking why should it be a song about Cabbagetown? With the exception of Burt Reynolds and a few others, Georgia was overlooked by location scouts. Everyone knows that

the recent success Georgia has had in film production started only in the past years. So I guess you could say that I'm talking about the prequel!

That's right. Before the current boom in film and television Cabbagetown was the Hollywood of the south. From the first

Hulk Hogan WWE, B-movie No holds barred, movies to the critically acclaimed "A Simple Twist of Fate", starring Steve Martin.

As teenager going to a performing arts high school it was heaven. I learned so much - from how they made fake snow to actually helping make frost in a windshield of a car. Which by the way is made by mixing epsom salt and beer.

During this time we even had a quite respected film made right on Carroll street.

Ruth Leitman is not only an amazing director, she also was one of the early members of CNIA. For the most part, the movies and tv shows filmed in Cabbagetown were a boom for our neighborhood. The crews of most productions would frequent Leon's (that's what we called Little's back then).

I remember seeing the limo carrying Hulk Hogan barreling out of Pickett's Alley onto Carroll Street. And the TV show "I'll Fly Away" filming an old 1950's bus, stopping at the corner of Carroll and Reinhardt Street. I even remember that the I'll Fly Away folks loved my mom's flowers so much that they paid her for them and used them in the show.

In true Hollywood fashion there was a twist coming. While I'll Fly Away chose Cabbagetown because of the community and neighborhood, the director and producer chose to film here because it reminded them of the small town south during the 1950's civil rights era. Other productions were so beneficial to the community or for that matter, the Mill.

Robocop 3 and **Freejack** weren't interested it the quaint little small town that is Cabbagetown. All they were interested in was the fact that they could set off explosives in the Mill.

You heard me right. Not only did it keep residents up till all hours, it was starting to damage the structure of the Mill. This is what pushed CNIA to re-double their efforts to get the Mill

away from CSX.

This newfound fame drew a new resident to the community: a real Hollywood type character, reminiscent of today's reality TV stars. Someone full of such potential both good and bad. A character who's motive was not easy to discern.

He appeared in Cabbagetown like any good antagonist does in a good Hollywood film -

Amazon HQ2 Ships Out! Norfolk Southern Rolls In?

As you probably know, Amazon did NOT select Atlanta as the location of it's coveted second headquarters (HQ2.) New York and Virginia were the big winners. But there is much conversation (mostly from cities that lost), around that notion that losing is actually winning.

Why? good question. I will give you one quick example. The State of New York gave away upwards of \$3 BILLION in tax incentives. If Atlanta were to compete, EVERY soul, regardless of age, in our fair city, would have written a check in the amount of \$6,155 and sent it off to Jeff Bezos.

Oddly enough, that's the same amount of money Atlanta plans on spending to upgrade it's transportation system over the next 40 years. Which would you rather have?

\$3 BILLION is enough money to give 900,000 scholarships to Georgia students at Georgia public universities.

Only time will tell if HQ2 is a blessing or a curse, but I am okay with the fact that Atlanta did not give our public tax payer dollars to one of the richest men, and companies in the world. Oddly enough, Amazon also chose Virginia – a state that is preparing to loose *Norfolk Southern* to – yup, you guessed it, Atlanta.

According to *Atlanta Business Chronicle*, Norfolk Southern will build a new tower at 650 West Peachtree Street that includes 1.3 million square feet of office space and about 12,000 square feet for ground floor retail space.

Invest Atlanta says the tower will cost \$575 million, bring 850 new jobs, and add \$811 million to our local economy. To accomplish this, Invest Atlanta will dedicate \$600 million through a lease purchase bond. The lease purchase bond (technically) means no added debt for the City.

The bond would support about \$23.6 million in tax savings for Norfolk Southern over the next ten years. While Atlanta should see \$62 million in property tax revenues over the same 10-year period. Not bad considering that property is currently only generating \$114,500 annually.

So while many of us sometimes bemoan the leadership and direction of our fair City, it seems that perhaps in this one case, we actually got it right. *Good job Hancock! Good job.*





Transforming Cabbagetown: Back in the Day



Between 1976 and 1984, a small group of people trickled into Cabbagetown, and bought single family homes where they could be "urban pioneers."

They were not speculators. They were people who intended to live there and make it their home. Among them were gay men and women, or couples. They became the single biggest factor in helping solidify the efforts to move the community in a positive direction. While

their presence was often a source of conflict and distrust among the older residents, it offered one of the few opportunities for realizing the future viability of the neighborhood.

Two events in 1984 highlighted the passing of the old community, and set the stage for the decades-long struggle to rise above the challenges that so urgently needed to be addressed.

On August 1, 1984, David Samples – a 16-year-old resident – high on alcohol and drugs, was shot and killed by the APD after he attacked an Officer at 3a. The ensuing controversy had a huge impact on greater Atlanta, as charges of excessive force were leveled against the Police. One positive thing resulted from David's death: Mayor Andrew Young created a Citizens Advisory Board (still in existence) to investigate incidents involving Police.

For nearly a decade, David's death was marked with solemn vigils at the spot of the tragedy – the corner of Boulevard & Memorial Drive. The years rolled on; the crowds grew smaller, the vigils shorter. In time, the tragedy passed into history, and few, if any members of the "old Cabbagetown" still remember that horrible event. His tragic loss was a low point, and sounded a death knell for "the old guard."

At the same time, *CSX* proposed the "Piggyback" Facility, and was eventually granted a Special Use Permit. Having been an isolated, close-knit community for so many years, old-time residents were faced with the inevitable choice: adapt or perish. Outside forces beyond their control were effecting them, like it or not. Trucks began to rumble in and out of the rail yard. Lights, diesel fumes, and the wall on Wylie Street became the new face of Cabbagetown.

The Real Estate Market remained in a state of paralysis due to lack of bank financing and the overlay of restrictive ordinances that sought to keep the historic nature of the neighborhood intact. Many lost hope and money as despair and poverty took its toll. Various groups attempted to form a vision for the future that was equitable and economically feasible. Before the formation of CNIA, they all failed due to one critical factor – the crumbling remnants of the Old Mill Buildings.

By 1990, it was obvious to many of us that none of our efforts to eradicate the gripping poverty around us would be successful until the factory buildings were renovated.

The "Save The Mill" movement was born, lasting almost five years. It was a difficult, often quixotic struggle, but through sheer grit and perseverance, we prevailed. Many individuals made great sacrifices toward that end, and in coming columns, I hope to mention a few of them.

Visit *The Patchworks Art & History Center*, where an exhibit that details the "lost history" of the neighborhood as seen through newspaper and magazine articles between 1975 and 1997, is under development. While you're there, be sure to volunteer, donate money, or artifacts that you may have from Cabbagetown's early days. Jake and Nina Elsas' vision is worthy of your support as they meticulously document the history of this wonderful and unique community. Having a knowledge of the community's past is vital in planning for the its future.

Remaining Vigilant



The election for Georgia governor is over, and despite her best efforts, Stacey Abrams was unable to triumph in the race. I won't go into all the reasons why the election integrity was questionable, but what I will do is ring the alarm bell one last time in 2018 regarding the potential for massive backlash if our governor-elect pushes a radical conservative agenda in 2019.

I've written throughout the year of the threatened retreat of the Film and TV

industry that has been a huge boon to the Georgia economy, including right here in Cabbagetown. Let's stop there for a moment and consider how this industry affects our community. Here are a few examples:

- 1. People (myself included) who rent their homes out to TV and Film production personnel, actors, etc. have that money to spend on other things, help pay the mortgage, etc. I can speak from firsthand experience here it's a major boost!
- 2. Those same personnel, actors, etc. spend money in the community. Have you ever been at a restaurant or bar in the neighborhood and recognized an actor or actress from a movie or TV show? Ask around, and I'm sure you'll hear plenty of stories. Those restaurant and bar owners (and their staff) are directly benefiting from this industry.
- 3. Filming fees can be substantial when a major production wants to film in our community. This can be in the form of direct payments to homeowners or HOAs, parking fees, and a whole host of other direct and indirect compensation. It's nothing to sneeze at.
- **4. Many jobs in the production industry are local jobs** that put people in our community to work. Again, if you ask around, you probably know someone who knows someone who works in this industry.

When Kemp was announced as the victor, several notable actors began to immediately call for boycotts of Georgia by the film industry. That begs the question: why? Why do they care who won the governor's race? Well, if you rewind back to the beginning of the year when the GOP primary was in full swing, both major candidates, including Kemp, vowed to sign a so-called 'religious liberty' bill that many perceive as discriminatory legislation. It comes back like a zombie every time the General Assembly is in session. It just doesn't ever die.

If you're in an industry with a notably progressive, diverse, and outspoken workforce, you're going to have a harder time conducting business in a state that is hostile to that workforce. Regardless of the state tax incentives that have lured this industry our way, one bad move from the incoming administration and the entire industry is in jeopardy.

Not comfortable with that situation? I'm certainly not. I'll be doing everything I can to send the signal that this type of backsliding is unacceptable. Georgia must not become emblematic of intolerance and fear; certainly not in light of our history of overcoming many of these attitudes. We are better than that, and we deserve better leadership in the State Capitol and Governor's Mansion. Make some noise before it's too late. Now would be ideal.

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Is it Potato Soup or Vichyssoise?

Today, a stroll or bike ride down the southernmost leg of the Beltline's Eastside Trail presents a drastically different landscape than just years – even months – ago.

Granted, that segment of the path opened only about a year ago, but the area surrounding the former train tracks is evolving – and fast.

The project will replace the circa-1960s *Jenkins Metal and Supply Company* buildings which Thrive Homes has already razed.

After half a century in business, the family metalworking shop closed its Krog Street operations in 2016. At the time, a representative told *Curbed Atlanta* a deal involving Atlanta

Hawks players had been in the works for the properties but ultimately fell through.

The site is currently undergoing prep work, and vertical construction of *Emerson on Krog* has not yet launched.

Those 16 units are expected to deliver around the end of fall 2019, after which a second phase of the project is anticipated to bring an additional six townhomes abutting Edgewood Avenue.

Construction of the *Alexan* apartments on Krog Street wrapped in 2015; *Edge*, a 350-unit mixed-use residential community straddling the Eastside Trail, is slated to welcome its first residents next month; and the *Residences at Studioplex*, a million-dollar townhome complex by *Thrive Homes* fronting the Beltline, is undergoing construction with many units already under contract.

Now, as Beltline officials prepare to open another short stretch of the multi-use path – from Edgewood to DeKalb avenues – a neighboring property is being primed for the construction of yet another residential project.

Also developed by Thrive Homes, Emerson on Krog is planned to bring an initial phase of 16 townhomes, priced at \$1 million and up, to a site at the corner of Edgewood Avenue and Krog Street, just south of the Krog Street Market food hall.

On November 14th, numerous building permit applications were filed by Thrive Homes officials.

Although project details are scant, permit applications, as well as a developer's rendering, show that the townhome community will be split between two buildings housing eight units each.

Additionally, each unit will feature a garage and rooftop terrace.


