City legislation: Passed vote to allow water skiing within our NPU, voted against allowing ATVs, voted against rules related to music studios, nominated NPU officers to serve another term. There are openings to serve on Candler Park Conservancy and Olmstead Linear Park alliance.

Once the news got out, congratulatory notes were posted all over *Facebook* and *Next Door*. Here are a few comments:





Curbed Atlanta recently reported about a new proposal sent to the city's zoning review board. Developers hope for approval to convert nearly four acres of commercial space into a mixed-use development.

construct 320 residential units and 30,000 square feet of commercial space at the intersection of Memorial Drive and Pearl Street.

Nextran Truck Center property. The plans as submitted call for two commercial buildings fronting Memorial and a residential building with a 574-space parking deck located at the rear.

Does this all sound rather familiar? It should! *Atlanta Dairies* is being developed right across the street.

Curbed Atlanta says "the application is likely to be approved in January as it sits just two blocks from

the future Eastside Trail Beltline extension and conforms to longestablished plans for the area. According to the lodged application, "if approved, development will commence promptly following closing on the assemblage and issuance of permits."

So what's it all about? Good question. According to their website: "We are a neighborhood spot. The outside patio, garden area, and bar are designed to encourage different types of interaction. We envision the patio as an intimate location, the bar as place to meet and converse and the garden as a place of reflection."

More answers to good questions: "Quality does not need to be expensive or pretentious. Yes, our ingredients are fresh and not

frozen. Yes, we source from local suppliers and artisanal providers. Yes, our menu is not the standard fare. But our prices are mid-range and we have specials to make Petit Chou an affordable spot. The fare will be enticing."

Petit Chou intends to open early for breakfast & coffee, and stay open late. In between, they'll serve brunch, lunch, and dinner, and they'll do it all in an industrial chic locale offering coffee, beer, wine, and cocktails along with the full menu.

According to their website; "As the old

Eyedrum Gallery and associated buildings was being torn down, Ron asked the job foreman if he could have the 12 foot green wooden doors. The idea was to saw them in half and use them for the siding of the bar." Alas, the foreman said no. But Ron kept asking and eventually got a trailer load of wood and steel doors.

With the payment of two orders of *Fox Brother BBQ*, much of the interior material for *Petit Chou* was acquired.

Craftsmen Luke Mount, Mike Roberts and Shawn Frizzell (a.k.a. *Atlanta Quality Craftsman*) figured out how use the wood and beams to pay homage to Cabbagetown. The steel doors were cut up and used as bar siding and tables. The 20+ foot long laminate beams were used as the bar top, trim, and benches.

Atlanta Quality Craftsman then fabricated the copper drink well.

Bobby Messina found some green lights being discarded at a strip mall and Dave (The Electrician) converted them to LED. The Atlanta Quality Craftsman built out the brackets to house the lights on the porch.

The inside chairs and bar stools are a collaborative effort with Jon Quinn of *South of Urban*. The

outside tables and chairs were fabricated by Atlanta Quality Craftsman using the remaining steel doors and then refinishing the old laminate beams.

Directed by Marc Lawrence with performances by Hugh Grant, Marisa Tomei, JK Simmons, Allison Janney, and Chris Elliott.

Fifteen years after winning an Academy Award for his screenplay, *Paradise Misplaced*, Keith Michaels (Grant) takes a position teaching screenwriting at a small college in Binghamton, New York.

A traditional fish-out-of-water story follows, chock full of complications handled in a way that only Grant can bring to

screen. Imagine the bumbling adorability of Charles in *Four Weddings And A Funeral* combined with the pompousness of Daniel in *Bridget Jones's Diary* (two lovely films to add to your queue).

Jet lag combined with free flowing wine has been known to suppress any logic one has in conducting oneself in public. Unfortunately, Michaels has a poor first showing when he becomes embroiled in a lengthy debate on female empowerment, effectively turning the department head (Simmons) into a referee, and Bainbridge scholar, Professor Welding (Janney) against Michaels altogether.

After this debacle, Michaels is reduced to having one friend/colleague, Jim (Elliott), who can help him learn the ropes.

This leads to the expected second act confrontations and third act revelations that Michaels needs for character growth and finally his epiphany. I know I've used words like "traditional" and "expected", but I really enjoy the journey this character takes, and the reactions of those around him all throughout the film. Everyone gives wonderful performances. My one complaint would be that Allison Janney might have been under-used.
