The Fierce Urgency of Now



Here we are at the dawn of a new decade, and I'm reminded of how the 2010s started out. Just over three months into the last decade, the world watched in horror as the worst maritime oil spill in history unfolded in the Gulf of Mexico. The BP oil spill continued for three long and arduous months, yet the impacts of the catastrophe would continue indefinitely.

At the time, I believed we might be at an inflection point regarding our energy

policy. I thought perhaps we would see the horror in front of our eyes and face the painful truth of our addiction to fossil fuels. How could we continue down such a dangerous path when the results were right in front of us?

Unfortunately, there was no such reckoning. We collectively kicked the can down the road yet again. Sure, there were some new regulations and procedures adopted in response (that have since been eliminated or weakened by the current administration), but no fundamental shift occurred, or was even contemplated in the collective consciousness. Apparently, we just weren't ready to deal with the magnitude of the existential predicament that the disaster illuminated.

I'm reminded of the speech that President Carter gave in 1979, in which he spoke to the 'crisis of confidence' that he correctly saw eroding the social fabric of the nation. We weren't ready to hear it yet, so we decided to 'turn the bull loose' instead. However, like an endlessly repeating loop, we're here facing the consequences of the bull running loose yet again as one disaster after another

degrades the integrity of our communities.

And now, in a heartbreaking turn of events, our beloved Congressman, John Lewis, has announced he has been diagnosed with stage 4 pancreatic cancer. To say that the Congressman has been an inspiration to multiple generations of humans around the world would be an understatement.

In 1963, a young John Lewis addressed the crowd at the March on Washington during the Civil Rights Movement. In his speech, he forcefully addressed the urgency of the moment:

"Those who have said be patient and wait – we must say we cannot be patient. We do not want our freedom gradually, but we want to be free now! "We must say wake up America – wake up! For we cannot stop, and we will not and cannot be patient."

We face an equally urgent moment now, as environmental justice, social justice, economic justice and climate change are all intersecting. The 2020s promise to be harder years for humanity as a result. Business as usual is being questioned at a global level, with more scrutiny being applied to economic policies that reward the pilfering of the resources required for the survival of all living beings on the planet.

How will we respond as a society? What role can we each play? Will we summon the courage that John Lewis, Dr. King and others in the 1960s brought to bear and demand action now?

If this seems dark, just remember that it's always darkest before the dawn. The light is on its way. Let's find the light together, Cabbagetown.

In addition to a milelong light display, Illumine will feature live music, craft cocktails, and an Oakland pop-up shop.

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
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Remembering a Pioneer



If you lived in Cabbagetown in the 1980s or early 1990s, you would have known – or at least known about – "Panorama" Ray Herbert. Love him or loathe him, you'd be hard pressed to ignore the legacy that he left upon both the community and the greater Atlanta area.

January marks the 23rd anniversary of his untimely death on January 6th, 1997 of a cardiac arrest, leaving a trove of artistic accomplishments and a host of mourners

with his passing. He was among a select few people in my life I've had the pleasure of calling a "true friend," and I will always miss him immensely.

I remember with fondness seeing him lumbering down Gaskill Street with his tripod and trusty Cirkut camera always looking for a different scene to document with his panoramic photo prints. He had a rancorous relationship with the old-time residents. who claimed to loathe him. But the younger crowd was always eager to show up wherever he was to pose for a photo or two – notwithstanding his sometimes caustic wit.

He was a pioneer in those desperate, dismal days.

He felt that he was destined to fame, and was eager to bring Cabbagetown along with him. An avid early supporter of Atlanta's bid to host the 1996 Olympic Games, he created many works of art and more than a panorama or two in his zeal to make it happen. He was one of the first and earliest artists to make his home in Cabbagetown on Carroll Street, and could be seen in action on any given day in his streetside studio or by his raggedy van on the way to a photo shoot to capture a moment in time on film.

He was the person who originally coined the term "Cabbagehead." He meant the term to be a somewhat condescending, yet endearing moniker for the neighborhood kids who befriended him at the peril of their elders' wrath. Most people who knew him had one of two reactions: they either intensely disliked him and his self-promoting ways, or they embraced his carny-style façade with an eagerness to be part of the action that was always swirling around him. It was hard to know Ray and remain ambivalent about him – that's for certain!

He was never personally involved in any of the structured neighborhood groups like the newly formed Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association (CNIA), but he supported our goals with his parallel efforts to draw a new image for the community both through his photos and artistic efforts, and with his weekly columns, which he named "The Cabbagetown Chronicles."

He and I would sit down and "roll us a fat one," and he'd dictate his latest installment to me to submit to a local in-town paper (whose name I cannot remember at the moment). They were fanciful portrayals of the day-to-day hijinks of the Cabbageheads, often prone to hyperbole and artistic excess. Area residents were almost always incensed to read his latest installment, but every week they seemed oddly eager to see what his next "outrage" would be! I maintained the columns, and we intended to publish them

as a book at some point, but it never happened. I moved away in December of 1994, and he died in January of 1997 before we could make it all come together. I managed to pull the text of much of what I had on outdated "floppy discs" a year or so back, and am surprised at how fresh and humorous his outlook was – even after all these years. Perhaps if I can reach his wife, whom he affectionately called "Peppermint Patty," I could arrange for their publication...

Some of his photo prints were recently donated to *The Patch Works Art and History Center*, ensuring that his early efforts in documenting the neighborhood have a fitting place for public display. They also have a bit of some of his folksy artwork as well. Rest in Peace, Ray! Thanks for the memories and thanks for sharing your short, but meaningful ride through time with the Cabbagetown community! I can't wait to see you again and compare notes! -30-
