

Hulsey Yard is 70 acres of underutilized land adjacent to Cabbagetown that could be ripe for major development at any moment. What happens to this land will have a deep and lasting impact on our community.

In 2017 we came together proactively with nearby neighborhoods to build a vision of how we would like to see this

land used in the future. For this vision to be realized we will need the full support of an Atlanta city government that is attentive and responsive to our needs. We will also need CSX to indicate that it is ready to sell the lot – something that as of yet has not happened.

There is another, even larger, plot of land just a few miles to the south that is moving ahead rapidly with development right now – the Atlanta Public Safety Training Center – now universally known as "Cop City".

In 2021 the Mayor's office revealed the intent to build the enormous police facility in the middle of nearly 300 acres of public green space in the South River Forest. A variety of civic and environmental groups had already identified the area as key to a massive new public park and hoped to preserve the green space. Despite the vision that the community had worked so hard to articulate, the city rushed through a vote to lease the land to the private and corporate-backed Atlanta Police Foundation (for only \$10 a year) despite vocal opposition from residents.

A toothless review board was set up afterward to give the illusion of local support and oversight, but the only dissenting voice on the board was forced off. The situation surrounding Cop City has only deteriorated since.

This May 31st we witnessed an APD SWAT team raid a house in Edgewood – that housed a bail-bond nonprofit critical of Cop City – on charges so flimsy even the judge found them incredulous. This action was orchestrated by state and local officials working hand-in-hand, with the clear intention to intimidate and charge as "terrorists" those dissenting against their development plans for the forest. *Continued on page 8.*

CNIA: General Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, June 11th, 2023, 7p via Zoom. Meeting conducted by Marinangeles Gutierrez Rivera. Minutes by Lucy Perkins.

7:04p: Meeting begins. Welcome! - Marina Introductions and thank you to Amanda for Indian food. Atlanta Police Department Updates - Officer Davis

Very few incidents in the neighborhood (only six crimes). There is a ruckus on Edgewood on weekend nights. Will begin more enforcement this summer. *Question:* Has there been an uptick in break-ins? Officer Davis says only one from last month: a car theft. Come to the precinct for free steering wheel lock. You can take Hyundai's to a dealership. Will update your software to make them harder to steal. *Question:* How are you interacting with State Police regarding vehicle pursuits? There is a policy that APD cannot chase unless it involves a weapon. State police can always chase. APD doesn't get involved with those chases. *Question:* With regard to auto break-ins: In the last three weeks there have been at least three car break-ins and some property theft in the 'hood. Could there be more patrols from 2a to 6a? Yes. If you would like more patrols, contact Officer Davis at *jwdavis@atlantaga.gov*

3. Review and Approval of May Minutes. Approved! 4. Council Person Liliana Bakhtiari - Nic representing

District 5 budgeting is being approved but will take a moment. ^{\$}1M for park improvements - will be a meeting with grants and such. Working on new personnel for code enforcement. Crime report: we live in a really great place! Airport has been expanded. APD will be required to give reports to committees. City will approve more money for park maintenance. Support affordable housing opportunity budget. Cop City passed - Lilliana voted against - doing everything they can to make sure the development will be done as best as it can be. Carroll St Closure Proposal - there are things to be fleshed out. Before closure, there will be a sub-group to discuss potential pitfalls created by the closure. Will give month's notice before closure. Dekalb Ave repaving should be completed end of July. Small section will remain unpaved - Phase II will require more maintenance. Bike lanes are coming. Question: Park Pride allocation of dollars for Triangle Park? He will work on it! Question: on park budget: Is Park Pride matching ^{\$}1M for District 5? They are working it out.

5. Vice-President Report - Marinangeles Gutierrez

Traffic proposals: They are on the website and last month's minutes. *Question:* Speed tables on Wylie? Hoping for traffic calming but not speed tables. Carroll St Closure - City Council interested in a one week pilot. Closure might be after Gaskill all the way to The Stacks entrance. A committee will be formed to discuss and improve the pilot. We are encouraged during the time to use the space - mural anyone? What will people who live on Reinhardt do? The committee will work on details and might alter where the closing starts and ends. We will come through as a community to try and find the best way to make Carroll street a safe place. The gross repaved areas will be fixed. There has been a request to put a cell tower in the Hulsey yard area. There is a process because of the surrounding historic districts that allows us to make public comment. A cell tower would impact that future usage of Hulsey Yard. A neighbor pointed out the fall radius that would prevent building within a certain distance around it. Motion to write a letter stating we are against the cell tower. Approved. Thank you to Naomi who is moving - Anya will Co-chair HPLU with Jake. CNIA Membership Campaign: Open Positions include Communications Chair, Transportation Committee Chair, and other Member At-Large positions. Evan helped set up website and Mailchimp.

7. Financial Report - Jack Cunningham, Treasurer

Summer Movie Series: Traditionally it has been a grass roots effort but there is interest in covering the cost of 5 movies in the park going forward. We have now covered one. Proposal to add \$1000 line item in the budget to cover movies. Movies are typically the second Friday of the month. Budget would go towards paying for the non-profit person who sets up the movies and equipment. Will communicate with R'town to have complimentary movie nights? Stacks News will advertise Movie Night too. Motion to vote - approved!

C'town Chows: Summer Sips & Snacks



The air is thick, the heat is abundant, and the sweat drips easily. It's summer in Atlanta, and we're all looking for refreshing, light drinks & bites to keep us cool and satisfied. Luckily, we've had some fun spots recently pop up around town, along with some good ole' watering holes, and they're ready to welcome us Cabbageheads into their air conditioned establishments.

Kicking it off with an oldie but a goodie the formerly named Ration & Dram and

now named *Dead End Drinks* over in Kirkwood (130 Arizona Ave NE). This is the perfect, casual go-to for a simple, no frills Friday night drink & apps with pals or a quaint, no-pressure date night spot. While this place has some fabulous entree items, we go for the small plates and shareables, such as the Roasted Garlic (roasted garlic head, soft cheese, grilled bread + olive oil), seasonal items like the Watermelon Salad (whipped chevre, cantaloupe, watermelon, strawberry, + mint), or a unique menu find like the Snails & Bread (snails roasted in butter with garlic, herbs, + grilled bread). And for bevvies (Gen-Z slang for beverages), they offer a lovely selection of wine & beer and shake up some fun, spooky cocktails that fit right in with its permanent Halloween motif, such as the Royal Blood (chemist gin, pineapple, lemon, basil + bg reynolds orgeat) and the Espresso Martini (cathead vodka, amarula cream liqueur, creme de cacao + nitro coffee).

Just down the street from Dead End resides *Pullman Yards*, which just opened a new concept, *AlcoHall* (225 Rogers St NE). Similar to a food hall like *Krog Street Market* for example, this spot features seven different stalls offering a wide array of liquor and alcoholic beverage options, ranging from heavier choices like *Wicked Weed Brewing* and *Shortbarrel Bourbon* to lighter sips with *Don Papa Rum* and *House of Santory* Japanese liquors, among many others. While you're not perusing the stalls, you can take part in summer fun with lawn games out front, such as bocce ball and pickleball. Not to mention, there's a mechanical bull for when you've thrown back a few Japanese whiskeys. While there aren't food halls, you can grab a bite at neighboring establishments *Fishmonger* and *Dailies and Sides*, as well as enjoy local food trucks that pop up throughout the month.


A little closer to our neck of the woods in Inman Park right next to *Kitty Dare* is a newly opened coffee & breakfast shop, *The Daily* (100 Hurt St NE). If you're in the mood for a stroll down Edgewood Ave admiring all the Victorian style mansions that line the street, be sure to make it down to this coffee shop before you head back home. They bake fresh bread daily (hence the name) and churn out some really interesting coffee specialty drinks. I ordered the Mojito Cold Brew (mint syrup, Onyx cold brew coffee, ginger beer + fresh mint) and it was such a delightful, fun twist on my regular coffee order. I was quite hungry on this particular day, so I sprung for the Breakfast Burrito, which was perfectly griddled and mess-free (scrambled eggs, salsa verde, cheddar, pickled onions, cilantro, home

fries, flour tortilla). From tasty smoothies & freshly made pastries to hearty breakfast toasts & sandwiches to filling Mediterranean inspired bowls, this shop has something for everyone and is sure to make you feel nourished and fulfilled. The summer is only getting hotter, so be sure to stay hydrated, get your nutrients and keep Cabbagetown shitty (can we curse in here?!).

HULSEY'S FUTURE RUNS THROUGH COP CITY

We also saw the city reveal that the cost to the taxpayer of Cop City would be more than twice as much as initially reported by the Mayor's office – cost which was again rapidly pushed through City Council approval over hours of impassioned pleas from residents to vote "no" on budget approval. Councilmember Liliana Bakhtiari, thankfully, was one of the few who did oppose this funding.

The Cop City saga lays painfully bare how business is done at City Hall currently, and paints a dark picture of the type of process that could lie in store for other impactful development projects like Hulsey Yard. A process where powerful corporate and political interests make deals behind closed doors concerning what gets built and where your tax dollars go – and then aggressively tamps down any opposition.

Atlanta doesn't have to be run like this. We can and should push back in any way we can to make our town more transparent and democratic. One such opportunity takes the form of a petition – recently approved – to put the lease of the Cop City land up to a referendum vote in November. You can learn more about this effort at *www.copcityvote.com* (or stop by Park Avenue Baptist Church, 486 Park Avenue SE in Grant Park any day between 8a and 11p) If the petition is successful and the vote passes, the lease will be voided and a path will open up for more democratic engagement on how to best use our limited remaining urban forest land. In the process, we will have strengthened our democratic institutions that much more and forged a strong example for how to engage the city on future development projects – projects like Hulsey for example.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Shaun served as our Transportation Chair from 2016 to 2020. Anonymous, but reliable sources tell The Cabbagetown Neighbor that more than 10,000 signatures have been collected as of press time. 70,000 signatures are required to put the lease of the Cop City land up to a referendum vote.

Insult to Injury

Mark Dicara of Lake Barrington, Illinois, allegedly shot himself in the leg on June 12 while dreaming of a home invasion. Dicara grabbed his .357 Magnum and fired – which instantly brought him to consciousness. There was no intruder in the home. Police found him in bed with a *"significant amount of blood."* He was charged with possession of a firearm without a valid Firearm Owners Identification card and reckless discharge of a firearm.


When Martin Trimble, 30, tried to rob a convenience store in Durham, England, in May, the shop owner got the best of him: He lowered the store's steel shutter, trapping Trimble on his back, half in and half out. Once Trimble realized he was pinned to the ground, Fox News reported, he popped open one of the beers he'd tried to steal and drank it as he waited to be arrested. Trimble pleaded guilty on June 16 to attempted robbery and possession of a knife and was sentenced to three years in jail.

The town of Stuart, Iowa, needed a new water tower to handle its growing population, according to KCRG-TV. But when residents saw the name painted on one side, they cringed. Rather than STUART, the tower was painted with START. Mayor Dick Cook called the social media attention about the misspelling "hilarious," and the tower has been repainted.

Maybe the Dingo Ate Your Baby ...

On K'gari beach in Australia, a 10-year-old boy was bitten and dragged under the water by a dingo on June 16, The Guardian reported. Two weeks earlier, another dingo was euthanized after biting multiple tourists, including a French woman who was bitten on her posterior as she sunbathed. "These animals are capable of inflicting serious harm. Some are quite brazen and are not fleeing when yelled at or when someone brandishes a stick," said ranger Danielle Mansfield. "Children and teenagers must be within arm's reach of an adult at all times."

FOLLOW YOUR NOSE



One of the most frightening effects of Covid-19 was people losing their sense of smell. As smell and taste are linked, I feared not being able to enjoy my favorite foods. And there were health and safety concerns like recognizing spoiled food and gas leaks.

As a gardener, the thought of not being able to delight in the fragrance of flowers was heartbreaking. I am always sticking my nose in flowers and wanting to discover what they offer. That is why I always include fragrant

flowers in all the gardens I have planted. I am a firm believer that a garden should appeal to more than the eyes. Here are a few notable fragrant flowers you may want to consider.

As color printing became more affordable, the emphasis on roses in catalogs shifted from fragrance to looks. It remains true with online catalogs. That is a shame. If you see a rose listed as "lightly fragrant" keep looking; they are usually being generous. Select one described as "very fragrant." There are too many to list, and fragrance can vary from "old-fashioned rose" to spicy to fruity.

Our native *Carolina jessamine* has a unique fragrance that is strong but not overwhelming or syrupy. Unfortunately, there is another species, the swamp jessamine, on the market. It looks almost exactly like its cousin but has no fragrance. Smell before you buy. The fragrance of *sweet-bubby bush* aka *sweetshrub* can be a mix of apple, melon and strawberries. It is strongest on warm afternoons.

Among our fragrant native azaleas are *Alabama azalea* (Rhododendron alabamense), *Florida azalea* (R. austrinum), *Piedmont azalea* (R. canescens), and sweet azalea (R. arborescens). *Gardenia* has a heavy, heady and spicy fragrance, and thank God we can grow it here.

Fragrant daphne is finicky, but what a delight in early spring. *Edgeworthia* has silvery buds that open to yellow flowers releasing a citrusy fragrance. *Fragrant tea olive* releases an apricot fragrance across Cabbagetown in September. One of the best pinks aka dianthus for our area is 'Bath's Pink' with its spicy, face powder fragrance. *Tuberose* doesn't reliably bloom for me if left to overwinter in the ground. However, its perfume makes it worth digging in the fall or buying new bulbs in the spring.

Butterfly ginger looks tropical but is hardy. If you're lucky you will see a sphinx moth visit its white flowers in the evening. Common yellow daffodils have an understated fragrance. The jonquil group of daffodils have a stronger fragrance. The tazetta group of daffodils includes some of the most fragrant. 'Avalanche,' sometimes called "17 sisters," is one of the best tazettas. Paperwhite tazettas, often forced for indoor blooming, have a strong fragrance that can be cloying in a closed space. Since they are hardy here, grow paperwhites outside. The lateblooming twin sisters daffodil (Narcissus biflorus) will reward you with flowers and fragrance long after you thought daffodil season was over.

If you can find some old-fashioned *petunias* they will provide a delightful fragrance on summer evenings. *Nicotiana* aka flowering

tobacco, a relative of petunia, is most fragrant in the evening and is a magnet for sphinx moths. *Four o'clocks* don't really open at four, but in the early evening they start releasing a heavy fragrance.

Not all peonies do well here. 'Festiva Maxima' does okay and is worth seeking for its complex lemony fragrance with bitter undertones. *Chocolate flower* (Berlandiera lyrata) has yellow flowers that smell like cocoa.


Both the *Southern magnolia* and the *sweetbay magnolia* have sharp, lemony, citronella fragrances, but many consider the sweetbay magnolia the finer of the two. On a recent walk around Cabbagetown, with the fragrance from the ones in the park wafting into the streets, I tended to agree.

This is just scratching the surface. Many flowers are fragrant and the fragrances can vary greatly, and not everyone perceives fragrance the same. I enjoy smelling many flowers that aren't generally considered fragrant. Explore with your nose and discover what is out there and what you like.

Well, we do love a Sol sighting. Thanks, guys!



LOVE LETTER TO LITTLE'S

Brad and Nina Cunard want to keep Cabbagetown shitty. In



a good way. As developers contort the urban landscape surrounding the quaint, historic neighborhood just east of downtown Atlanta – building glassy condos, cookie-cutter apartments, and swanky dining halls – the owners of *Little's Food Store* feel compelled to preserve their community's legacy as a gritty, artsy, tattooed, tight-knit enclave. Gentrification has complicated that mission, but the Cunards are dug in.

Perhaps Atlanta's only bona fide bodega, Little's has been slinging burgers and dogs mostly uninterrupted since 1929, when Marvin Little – and later his son, Leon, who still owns the building – ran the pint-size Carroll Street shop, and when Cabbagetown was a rough-and-tumble mill village anchored by the *Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill*, a redbrick compound since transformed into pricy apartments and half-a-milliondollar condos. The Cunards have lived in Cabbagetown since the mid-2000s – before *the BeltLine* weaved its way through the neighborhood, before more patrons started showing up with pressed shirts and coiffed hair – and they expect from transplants the same manners they expect from loyal regulars.

When the Cunards took control of the iconic establishment in 2010, Brad said, "no one was taking pictures of themselves to post on Instagram that they were at a cool place – and we weren't trying to be the cool place. The more things changed around me, the more I wanted to hold on to what I had and keep it that way."

Little's is still anything but pretentious. It's a neighborhood mainstay that provided Cabbageheads with milk, eggs, and toilet paper in the throes of the Covid-19 pandemic; a reliable source of juicy community gossip; and a necessary stop before a picnic or house party or night on the town, its shelves lined with beer and wine, chips and charcuterie, condoms and bars of soap.

Little's has evolved a bit since the days of old. Customers could smoke inside until the mid-aughts; the store doesn't even sell cigarettes anymore. The cost of grub has risen: When the Cunards took over, sliders went for ^{\$}2; they're now more than ^{\$}4. But the old-school attitude survives, and the couple doesn't intend to get swept away by the forces of gentrification. Real estate speculators have come sniffing around, kicking Little's tires, a few times since the Cunards took over. They aren't going anywhere anytime soon. *"This place means so much to so many people,"* Nina said. *"The Littles served their community for so long, and we want to keep that going."*

"Keep Cabbagetown Shitty," a community credo coined by a longtime neighbor – and plastered on bumper stickers, T-shirts, and hats, courtesy of a former Little's employee – is something the Cunards want to embody. *Continued on page 17*

TAKING CHARGE OF ENERGY CONSUMPTION

The North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC) has announced that two-thirds of North America, including Georgia, are at risk of energy shortages during summer of 2023. This warning comes as a result of the convergence of two factors: the natural increase in energy consumption during the summer months, coupled with the potential impact of the El Niño climate pattern. This combination of factors means that Cabbagetown may

experience energy blackouts unless we take action.

When I was researching this topic, I found that many articles emphasize the importance of upgrading appliances, swapping light bulbs, and making home upgrades to reduce energy consumption. While this is effective, it can become quite costly. I grew up in a frugal household where my Dad was known as the "Power Dictator" for his extreme energy reducing, penny-pinching techniques. Inspired by his philosophy, I want to emphasize the significance of smaller and more affordable behavioral changes.

Thermostats: Your home doesn't need to be kept at a brisk 72 degrees when you're away. It only needs to be comfortable when you're home, and programming your thermostat can make it easy. While there are various theories on the most efficient plan for your thermostat, it's important to find what works for you through testing and monitoring. Factors like your house's specific thermal properties, your and your co-inhabitants needs, as well as the safety and wellbeing of any furry friends you might be leaving at home must be considered as well.

Maintenance: Let's face it, many of us in Cabbagetown pride ourselves on having historic homes. However, those same homes often come with old appliances and HVAC systems that may require regular servicing. For example, when my partner and I moved into *The Stacks*, we were shocked by our initial power bill. However, after having a technician perform some overdue maintenance on our HVAC system, our bill dropped by over 40%! While not the cheapest item on this list, prioritizing HVAC, washers, dryers, and water heaters can have the largest immediate impact.

Windows and blinds: Closing blinds on the sunny side of the house is a simple yet often overlooked step that can lead to significant energy savings. By closing the blinds before bed and opening them once the sun has passed, we noticed an immediate reduction in the runtime of our air conditioner.

On and off-peak hours: While humans may be unique as individuals, in aggregate, our power consumption follows surprisingly rigid, predictable patterns, often referred to as "peak hours." For example, peak consumption for any major city in America is at around 6p, not coincidentally when people get

home from work, turn the air down, cook dinner, and perhaps do a load of laundry. However, we can make a difference by taking advantage of "off-peak" hours. Shifting our loads to these periods, when energy-intensive activities are minimized, play a crucial role in balancing the load on the electrical grid. Off-peak hours change by season and can be identified by your power provider.

I understand that reducing energy consumption may require changes to our daily routines and habits. However, by making small adjustments like programming thermostats, prioritizing appliance maintenance, being mindful of window and blind usage, and utilizing off-peak hours, we can not only save on energy bills but also contribute to a more sustainable and energy-efficient C'town. Let's embrace these simple changes and make our "Power Dictator" proud while safeguarding our energy future.

You'll find it in the heart of Reynoldstown at the Lang Carson Recreation Center, which is located at 100 Flat Shoals Ave.



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We Miss You Lady



On a beautiful Spring morning, June 1, 2023, we said goodbye to one of the most amazing beings that I've ever had the privilege of walking alongside. Her name was Lady, a 16-year-old German Shepherd, and she touched me in ways I never saw coming.

Lady came into my life two and a half years ago when I started dating my former partner, Stevie. Stevie adopted Lady from a shelter in Iowa the year before. She was an anonymous drop off, so we know

nothing of her former life - only the joy she brought us.

When Stevie and Lady moved into the loft in August of 2021, the process of her capturing my heart was complete. My fixation with always having a spotless home with everything in perfect order necessarily yielded to the realities of having a senior dog that had trouble on slippery floors and shed hair constantly. Stevie has told me on multiple occasions that it was beautiful to watch as I fell in love with her during that time.

Lady exuded the sweetest, gentle, loving energy imaginable. She moved slow, which made walks with her much more deliberate. Slowing down is rarely a bad thing, after all. Whenever we walked up to my truck, she knew she was "going on an adventure," as we called it. We took her on many hikes around metro Atlanta and in the mountains, and she even did an overnight camping trip with us – all as she was in her 15th year on earth. She was remarkable that way.

The short time we lived on Estoria Street, Lady got the chance to meet lots of neighbors as they walked by as she held court on the front porch. It was the first time I had heard her bark consistently – it was as if a lost part of her personality was activated again. Some readers may remember hearing her saying hello in those days.

In her 16th year, the sweet Lady started having more trouble with her hind legs, and she eventually got to the point where she could barely stand up or walk. Stevie made the brave decision to set a date to allow her to transition in peace and with dignity at the loft. We organized a sendoff party and several neighbors came by to see her on her final night with us. It's hard to overstate how much that meant to Stevie and I, and hopefully to Lady as well. She seemed so happy that night getting to see all the friendly faces.

The next morning, as we prepared for the vet's arrival, we lied on the floor playing with her and shared some of her favorite treats. The atmosphere could not have been more perfect. The palo santo wafting through the air, the bright Spring sunlight reflecting off the mirror ball, and the heartstring-tugging music of **Novo Amor** emanating all around created the perfect backdrop for our final moments with this amazing being. Right at noon on June 1, Miss Lady took her final breath, with Stevie and I lying with her and loving on her.

Seeing people walking dogs around the neighborhood has always brought a smile to my face – even more so now. I often wonder about the stories behind the connections I see. For any Cabbageheads considering getting a pet, I highly encourage checking out the local shelters as part of your process of looking for the right fit. Both the *Fulton County Animal Shelter* and the *Atlanta Humane Society* have a backlog of furry friends looking for another chance to bring joy to a new home. You never know what beautiful stories might be waiting for you.

Had Stevie not taken the step of adopting a senior dog that day in the lowa shelter, it's possible her journey would have ended there. Thankfully, it had a few more chapters left, including the final chapter that was crafted with absolute perfection. She left this world in the most beautiful way possible. We miss you, Lady.



Continued from page 12. "It means that independent artisan spirit," Brad said. "Some of that's disappeared." But there are still plenty of weirdos in the community, he adds. "And I've watched people become Cabbagetown. You'll see them move in, with short hair and uptight clothing, and after a year or two, their hair is getting longer, and they're comfortable being not so done up as they go out."

Nina lamented the metamorphosis of other iconic Atlanta areas, like Ponce de Leon Avenue, where developers promise major transformation. *"Everything is changing so rapidly that it's nice to have some touchstone of what's always been here. This is one of the last spots that's genuine,"* she said. *"I really want Carroll Street to stay Carroll Street."*

After those were up, he added colors, painting a rainbow cape and pale pink and pale blue shoes on her feet, representing the trans colors.

Kelly feels like others paved the way for his generation, and this piece of artwork represents the next generation of kids who are continuing to lead the way. LGBTQ+ youth are having to put up with rhetoric, attitudes, and opinions of others, and having to navigate being a superhero for themselves and their community. It's no easy feat, and we support each and every one of them!

Art matters. Representation matters. This piece of artwork means so much to people living in our community and the LGBTQ+ community as a whole. We know the struggle is real. And you have allies!



One of our Cabbagetown

neighbors, Emily, burst into tears of happiness when she saw Kelly's artwork. Emily has a nonbinary child who has had a tough time with gender dysphoria, being bullied, changing schools, their pronouns and their name, and obtaining genderaffirming medical care.

Emily and I talked about how self-harm and suicide are a high risk for LGBTQ+ youth, and that getting gender-affirming care took her child out of those dark days and into a positive place as a young adult, who is now entering their senior year of college. As a mother who has been advocating for many years, seeing Kelly's art was a deeply meaningful affirmation for their family. Someone understands. There is hope. Emily's story is like many; doing what you need to do to love your child.

Thank you, Kelly, for sharing your gift and providing hope and love to the community!



June may be Pride Month, but pride at the Stacks Square keeps flying proudly!

Kelly Breedlove, a Georgia native, discovered this last round of Stacks Squares was open to people who have never done a mural before. He submitted a painting and was chosen! Due to the 2009 recession, Kelly's career in real estate drew to a slow crawl and he had too much time on his hands. He's always considered himself a creative person who loved art and thought, *"I can do that!"* So, during the recession he started taking art classes and was really drawn to encaustic painting which is a form of painting with heated wax. He also ventured into acrylics and incorporating vintage photos into his work. The photos he chooses for his artwork connects with him on a visceral level, usually family photos, as his artwork typically deals with loneliness, isolation, and family relationships. Most of Kelly's work comes from a place of sadness, but for his Stack Square, he wanted to do something hopeful and happy.

The image Kelly chose was a young girl in an astronaut costume which symbolizes bravery and adventure – another common theme in Kelly's work. And the buildings behind her reminded him of Cabbagetown. To create the mural, Kelly enlarged the photo, cut it into smaller pieces, and using the graffiti tradition of wheat pasting, pasted within the Stacks Square. It took a total of 100 paper squares to take up his full Stacks Square! *Continued on page 19.*
