b. Cabbagetown traffic calming and accessibility - there is new signage around the neighborhood. Project recommends contrabike lanes, lane narrowing, crosswalk murals, ADA accessibility, and reflective advisory at dangerous street ends

c. Pearl Street/Colgate CBA Traffic Calming: Project was already in the works - Signage and elements on Pearl St for slower traffic and addition of crosswalks. Project has taken so long to move forward, so prices have changed and budget may increase. Not feasible to get an exception on the brick sidewalk rule.

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C'town Chows: Big Wine at Little's



We eat a lot of food in this 'hood, and we have not-so-discreetly mentioned in some of our other columns, we drink a lot in this 'hood too... So, for this month's piece, we wanted to focus on the drink, specifically the wine.

In order to achieve this goal, we had the fantastic opportunity to sit down with *Little's* own Nina Cunard to talk about the wine selection they curate over there and to get some tips on what to look for when

you stop in to peruse their section of libatious grapes (just made up that word 'libatious', and now I love it).

Nina Cunard has been running Little's alongside husband Brad now for more than twelve years and has been in the neighborhood since 2005. These C-Town OGs know how to make an unbelievable burger, and it turns out they also know how to pick some fantastic wines to keep Cabbagetown well lubricated.

We asked Nina how they curated their offering of wine and beer. Turns out, they really lean on us neighborhood booze-hounds to help with that task and they use local distributors who know what sells well and focus on an offering that is affordable yet elevated.

Of course, when you step into Little's, you're most likely going to want one of their famous burgers, which you've most likely received delicious whiffs of while strolling up and down Carroll Street. We asked Nina what she recommends when it comes to pairing a vino with a burg. Nina has her own personal preferences when it comes regional origin. Her go-to's include any red from Spain, such as Cabernet Sauvignon (just Googled how to spell that), Tempranillo, Malbec, Garnacha and so on. She also recommends these varieties (is that the right term here?) for those who aren't as experienced with wine and don't know where to start. Clearly – while we do drink a lot of wine – we don't know too much. Luckily, Nina does.

Naturally, we wanted to know her tips for when you have one too many glasses (or bottles) of wine. Her hot tips include drinking a thirst quenching bottle of Gatorade, sparkling water or using an electrolyte packet – maybe even all three if desperate times call for desperate measures. And of course, stopping in Little's for a breakfast sandwich can help soak up last night's wine. Or, you can try to get your hands on the limited homemade biscuits that sell like hot cakes (in this case, hot biscuits). Her advice on how to get one before they're gone? Keep an eye on *Little's Facebook page* for real-time updates and get there within 15 minutes. Otherwise, ya snooze, ya lose (literally!).

If you find yourself looking for a good glass or two of wine while out and about in Atlanta, Nina enjoys the selection over at *Iberian Pig* (check out last month's article with our recommendations there!), and of course, *Carroll Street Café*.


As for what all you can expect from Little's these days aside from wine, they're focusing on their beer selection, specialty snacks and of


Nothing is sacred or serious except their passion. Headlining is the glorious *Lesibu*



An Intimate Evening of Songs Lily Dabbs and Smith + Calvert



One thing was clear from the dual concerts at the Cabbagetown Community Center on Saturday, May 20th – locals do not need to travel far to experience good music. Featuring Lily Dabbs and Smith & Calvert, the intimate evening showcased the power of storytelling through song, with Dabbs primarily on acoustic and Smith & Calvert incorporating a violin, mandolin, and electric guitar.

Originally from Atlanta, Dabbs relocated to Austin, TX six months ago. Her performance

evoked a sense of homecoming, revealing the Southern roots that echo through her music. "*Back Around,*" Dabbs's latest album, was released in April of this year.

During her set, she said with a bright smile that most of her songs were sad, reassuring the crowd that melancholy in music is not something to be afraid of. She discussed an article she read earlier that day about a study that found that humans prefer sorrow in songwriting. Anyone who listens to Dabbs's music will find that fact hard to argue.

She has a gift for intertwining the mundane with the profound. Her songs bring a soulful depth to everyday experiences. She explained how her day job as a city planner makes her think about the spaces we inhabit and how that train of thought impacts her writing. Whether it is a contemplation on her commute to work, an examination of marriage, or a song about a big life moment like moving, her music fits in all spaces, bringing light into the ordinary in a deeply moving way.

Following Dabbs was the duo Smith & Calvert, Michael Smith and Leah Calvert's new band. Born during the pandemic, Smith & Calvert began when the two *Dappled Grays* members recorded a series of podcast episodes critiquing wine and performing new songs. Like Dabbs, Smith & Calvert paint intricate portraits of life with their music.


Joined by *Nick Johnson* on electric guitar, their set was filled with songs that played out like theatrical vignettes. Their music told fantastical stories, like "*Straight Jacket Jesus,*" which conveyed the awakening of a cult member moments before being offered the Kool-Aide, to quieter songs like "*Build a Ship,*" one of Calvert's solo pieces, which imagined a world where Christopher Columbus set out to discover love instead of land.

Calvert's voice is powerful and her presence is magnetic. Her song *"Sleep,"* which chronicles the sleepless night of a new mother, stood out as a demonstration of her ability to transform a space with her music.

Towards the end of their set, the duo explained that they hope to plant roots in the Atlanta music scene with upcoming shows. They should be on any music lover's radar. Both Lily Dabbs and Smith & Calvert's work is available across all streaming platforms.

THIS FRINGE DESERVES TO BE MAINSTREAM



It's sometimes hard to agree on how to describe Chionanthus virginicus. It goes by several common names including fringe tree, old man's beard and grancy graybeard. The latter is a corruption of "grand sir graybeard" because the frilly flowers look like the beard of a distinguished old gentleman. (Think Santa Claus or Colonel Sanders.)

Despite the fringe tree label, it is sometimes more of a large shrub than a tree. And the

flowers don't look like typical flowers. They do indeed look like fringe, beard, white Spanish moss, confetti, fleece or cotton candy.

While some British garden writers consider the fringe tree one of the most beautiful of American woody plants, Elizabeth Lawrence, the renowned American garden writer was less impressed. She disparaged that the flowers reminded her of slaw and felt it was overplanted. Well, the petals are narrow with a shredded appearance and do start out pale green before turning white, but I think I'll have to disagree with Miss Lawrence's assessment.

To me, when the fringe tree is in bloom it looks like it has reached into the sky and captured a cloud in its branches. I saw a spectacular specimen on a rainy afternoon several years ago. It was if a bank of fog had rolled in and was caught in the tree. Linnaeus, the Swedish botanist and taxonomist, also had weather on his mind when he affixed the genus name. Chionanthus means "snow flower."


There is a Chinese fringe tree (Chionanthus retusus) with larger flowers that open later in the spring. It is a fine tree, but in my eyes does not measure up to our native species. Ours is distinctly different from other flowering trees and in bloom it has an air of mystery the Chinese species lacks.

Our native fringe tree is a good choice if you are looking for something other than the more common flowering trees. Adults appreciate its unique beauty and gentle fragrance. Children also think the flowers are pretty and enjoy using them to make pretend beards. It tolerates a wide range of conditions and is easy to grow. Like so many of our native plants, grancy graybeard/fringe tree/old man's beard, whatever you call it, deserves to be more widely planted.

I seriously talked to him about it, and I swear he understood every word. He hasn't gone after her since that day, and now he's like her little protector. Elvis (dang you Elvis!) likes to beat her up but if Uh-Uh (we have changed his name with permission from his former owner) is around, he will come flying and bowl Elvis over. We have it on video. It's kinda funny. Elvis is so nice to people, but he really hates Not and wants to claim our yard as his.

We put in the cat door two Christmases ago, and It took no time at all before Uh-Uh was using it. We showed Not how to use it, and not even five minutes later she showed Uh-Uh how to use it, and he has been coming and going ever since. I had to call his owner and let her know that if she hadn't seen him for a couple days, it was because he was at our house.

Do you know anything about his past? His original owner had to move to Alabama, but she knew Uh-Uh was too

much of a Cabbagehead to take to country life, so she left him here with her dad. Unfortunately, her dad's health has been failing, so I asked her if I could take Uh-Uh in permanently. As soon as he gets a little more adjusted, we are taking him to the vet to get his eyes looked at. His poor little eyes are infected but we will get that taken care of. Right now, I don't want to run him off so we are giving him time.

Anything else you'd like to tell us about him?

All you people who are able to pet him now, it's because of me and my hard work! He may lay on your porch, he may meow at you, and he may take your affection, but he's ours! He's a free spirit, so please be kind. He has a collar now, too, so if he's getting on your nerves, just call us and we'll come get him. And we promise to not steal anyone's cats. I swear it happens by accident!

Richard Danny "Pete" Waldrop, age 76, of Atlanta was born on June 1, 1946 and passed away on Thursday, March 23, 2023.

Later in life, he became king of karaoke, singing at local honkytonks like the *Crazy Horse*, and on cruise ships, or wherever someone would give him a microphone. He was always the life of the party!


He loved traveling, especially visiting his favorite destination, Yellowstone Park. He also enjoyed camping closer to home with his family, visiting nearby lakes in his RV, and spending time with his grandsons. He was so very proud of them. An excerpt by Brad Stulberg

A few years ago, when I lived in Northern California, I often hiked under old-growth redwoods. The roots of these mammoth trees, stretching some 200 feet into the air above us, run only six to 12 feet deep. Instead of growing down, they grow out, extending dozens of feet to each side, enmeshing themselves with the roots of their neighbors. This is why we never see a lone redwood: They can survive only in a grove, bound together in obligation.

Humans, too, need one another: We are stronger and more robust when enmeshed with others in community. But in our age of autonomy, efficiency, boundaries and self-care, we too often deprioritize, if not overlook altogether, the wellspring of strength and meaning that comes from obligation.

For people to really know us, we need to show up consistently. Over time, what starts out as obligation becomes less about something we have to do and more about something we want to do, something that we can't imagine living without. The spiritual teacher Ram Dass once wrote that "we're all just walking each other home." But that's only true if we don't constantly cancel our walking plans. 




