

Gone too Soon?

If your commute takes you through the Boulevard Tunnel, you might have noticed the fluorescent teal c-store at the corner of Boulevard and Gartrell Street was razed earlier this month. The Triple Food Store makes way for a new 125-room hotel called Waldo – part of a \$80 million mixed used project involving Hilton Worldwide Holdings, Atlanta developer Lucror Resources and capital partner Sixty West Funds.

The project includes more than 100,000 sq. ft. of office space, 10 residences and 13,000 sq. ft. of food & beverage space including a restaurant and speakeasy. The office building will be heavy timber construction, with exposed wood, and natural lighting.

Office space should open at the end of 2020 and the hotel is projected to open in early 2021.

Farewell from a Neighbor

In the fall of 2013, I had just sold a house in Candler Park when my agent asked me if I was looking to move. Still owning a condo in Atlantic Station thanks to the real estate debacle of the mid-2000s, I told him I'd only move if it was to buy my dream house – a stand-alone, open loft, brick building with vaulted ceilings in a walkable part of Atlanta. Needless to say, I presumed this unicorn didn't exist. Two months later, he sent me a listing for 230 Carroll Street and my jaw dropped. Could this place be real? I seized the moment and made one of the best decisions of my life.

As with any new Cabbagehead, Ronnie was the first neighbor I met. Immediately, I knew something was different about this place. It didn't take long for me to understand Cabbagetown wasn't just a neighborhood or a collection of cool, historic buildings – it was a community. A community of people who wanted to know and help each other. Two weeks in, during my twentieth visit to *Carroll Street Cafe*, I was greeted with the warm words of, "Good morning Marshall, will you be having your usual?" The "usual" is something I'd only seen in movies up to that point, and it made me feel like I was part of something special. A tiny, eclectic corner of Atlanta not everyone understood.

My six years in Cabbagetown shaped who I am today. While I still have my reclusive, introverted moments, the neighborhood magnetically pulled me into engaging with the community in ways I never anticipated. In particular, it inspired me to create The 230 Carroll Concert Series. A couple years ago, a gig I had booked at Venkman's was cancelled, and I was left with a date and no venue. So I did what any good musician would do... I bought giant theater curtains, Bose speakers, and turned my living room into a concert venue. Nearly a hundred people came to my show that night, and the 230 Carroll Concert Series was born. 230 Carroll wasn't just my home, it was a part of me. Every detail a peak into my values and personality.

Now it's time for me to start a new chapter of life as my relationship and career in entertainment pull me out West. Closing any chapter in life is hard, but selling this magical loft has been one of the most emotionally challenging things I've ever done. I'm not just selling a house, I'm selling a part of myself and my place in the community.

Thankfully, I had the help of my friend and neighbor Rich Mudafort to navigate these murky waters. He went above and beyond in making sure 230 Carroll looked its best and passed to the hands of the right buyers. Turns out, the sweet couple buying my loft have been looking for a place just like it for over ten years! It reminded me of my own story. So just like life, the cycle begins again.

Thank you Cabbagetown, and everyone in it, for making my time here so special. *I can't wait to come back and visit*.

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Next Up for Hulsey Yard



It's a wrap. The Master Plan that the neighborhoods worked on together over the past five months is complete and delivered. It's an impressive document that shows what is possible when communities come together to work toward a common vision.

So, now what?

As much work as it was to coordinate the feedback of over 1,000 people and synthesize it into a cohesive roadmap for

the site, the real work starts now. Having the plan is a huge step in the right direction. Now we need to take the steps required to get buy-in for our shared goals. The stakes are high and getting higher

with each passing month.

Some of the key themes embraced by the community at large include hot-button issues such as affordability, connectivity, and transit. You don't have to go very far to understand why these issues rose to the top. A five-minute walk from just about anywhere in C-town will have you bump up against some major shifts in how the city is developing. Memorial Drive,

anyone? Or how about the \$1MM+ townhomes on Krog and Edgewood? Mind boggling!

Just imagine for a moment that present trends continue and more and more expensive car-centric real estate comes online in the next few years. Who is going to be able to afford to live in these places? Are they mostly going to rely on cars to get around? How is that going to work in our already traffic choked community? These are serious questions that cannot be ignored.

Of course, there are solutions to these concerns, and they require thoughtful design and the will to stand up to moneyed interests whose motivations are not necessarily in line with the neighborhoods in which they build.

In my humble opinion, the most urgent piece of the puzzle for Hulsey is fast-tracking Beltline transit and its connection to MARTA on the site. We simply must offer alternatives to cars to move people around, connect them to employment, and simply use the city. If you're not saddled with the expense of owning, maintaining, and insuring a vehicle simply out of necessity,

the experience of living in Atlanta can be guite different. This has major impacts on affordability, which is currently crushing people who cannot keep up.

If you've been paying attention to MARTA's plans for the transit sales tax we passed three years ago (and pay every time we make a purchase in the city), you'll note that Beltline transit south of Irwin isn't even scheduled for planning and design until after 2025, ultimately coming online sometime after 2040. We can't wait that long, period.

Ask yourself this: while we dither and struggle to become a worldclass city, how will we move about as the population around us explodes? Think about it. It's a ticking time bomb and if we don't sort it out soon, it's going to blow up in our collective faces.

The process of sharing the vision of Hulsey Yard has just begun. I urge everyone to be ready to roll up your sleeves and get to work. It's going to take sustained pressure on leadership throughout the city to get this done. Are you ready?

The Ballad of the Cabbagetown Chronicles



In spite of its small geographical size,
Cabbagetown has produced some
exceptional musical acts throughout
its history, including Fiddlin' John
Carson, who is credited with recording
the first official country song in 1923,
well respected folksinger/activist Joyce
Brookshire, 60's pop star Tommy Roe, who
lived in Cabbagetown for the first several
years of his life, and many contemporary
alternative bands that have contributed

to the "Cabbagetown Sound" over the last three decades.

The success of the *Cabbagetown Concert Series* spurred discussions about our music heritage, and over time myself, John Dirga, and Steve Seachrist somehow decided we wanted to memorialize that heritage in

some physical form. We found a grant application from *The Georgia Music Foundation* online, and lo and behold, we got it.

We set out to create a CD of songs performed by musicians whose roots and lives were in Cabbagetown, such as Carson, Brookshire, Roe, *The Jody Grind*, and the *Opal Foxx Quartet/ Smoke*, to name a few.

We figured we should also include contemporary acts, so we structured the CD accordingly. First, an original recording by one of the seminal Cabbagetown artists, then a current local act doing a cover song by the original artist, followed with a new song written and performed by the current act.

This was structured in a manner

that explored and celebrated the history of the community, and directly linked the community's musical traditions to the contemporary artists who have lived and worked in the area, many of those who still do.

Starting in January, we held meetings and discussions to plot out the development of the project. Recruiting *W8ing4UFOs* members Bill Taft and Brian Halloran into the team was one of the best moves we made, as these two fine fellows brought a ton of great ideas and available music from their personal archives. No surprise there, as they has both been integral players in the Cabbagetown scene since the late 80's.

As the list of potential artists grew, we realized we had to make good choices that would reflect the essence and diversity of the music, and thinning out the featured artists to seven was a difficult process. So we settled on the obvious, and tried to make space for

others by including some of them as the "cover artists".

The CD features original music from Fiddlin' John Carson, Tommy Roe, Joyce Brookshire, Smoke, Kick Me (survivors of the Jody Grind), the Rock*A*Teens, and Cat Power. We also included The Eastside Pentecostal Church Choir doing a gospel song, to represent the many churches scattered throughout the community. Our "cover bands" included The Carroll Street Troubadours, K. Michelle DuBois, Slim Chance & the Convicts, T.T. Mahony, the Chumblers, Anna Kramer and the Lost Cause, and W8ing4UFOs.

Each of these acts has a direct connection to Cabbagetown, and brought their "A" game to the recording sessions. Most of the cover tunes were done in Steve's home studio, however a few field recordings were used.

The Troubadours did their two songs in the living room on Powell where Carson's family lived, and he practiced. The Eastside Choir was

recorded in their sanctuary on Kirkwood. Many of the "cover acts" submitted their own original recordings for the project. Tommy Roe actually rewrote and recorded a song originally called "Birmingham" and changed it to "Cabbagetown", just for this project.

Compiling original historical tracks was a challenge, as we had to secure the rights and permission to use them. This took months. Fortunately every artist or representative bought into the concept, and either donated tracks or granted license for the nominal standard fees. The support was incredible and made it easier than it could have been.

The goal was to capture the essence of the Cabbagetown music experience, including historical and contemporary examples of the vast talent in the community. We did it, but only scratched the surface of the deep musical roots in our community. That's why we called it "Volume 1". The CD will be available hopefully at Chomp, with the intent of sharing the legacy of Cabbagetown music with the world. It will also be on sale at *Patch Works Art and History Center*, and a few other locations.

We made 1000 copies and will sell them for \$10, all of which goes to support Patch Works as they continue their mission to preserve, sustain, and maintain the historical identity, relevance, and integrity of Cabbagetown through exhibits of history and local art, and community-based public programs and musical events. *We hope you enjoy it!*

Explosive Growth on Memorial



This article first appeared in Curbed Atlanta. Since embattled arts nonprofit WonderRoot abruptly shuttered in August, folks might be wondering what will become of the organization's quaint former home on Memorial Drive.

Renderings have now surfaced for what could be the colorful building's replacement: A nearly 200-unit apartment complex proposed by Urban Realty Partners and Prestwick

Development Company, which would add to explosive growth along Memorial.

Smith Dalia Architects recently published images depicting the latest vision for a project identified only as 982 Memorial – WonderRoot's former address.

Although not much is known about the proposed development, Smith Dalia's website suggests it's "soon to begin construction."

Smith Dalia representatives told *Curbed Atlanta* that info paired with the renderings was accurate and up-to-date, although they declined to provide further information, deferring to the developers, who could not be reached as of press time.

The architecture firm cites plans for 192 residences within "four-, five-, and six-story multifamily construction that maintains its highest density along Memorial and gently steps down as it approaches the single-family houses" in Reynoldstown.

"The development will include a precast parking deck and multifamily amenities such as a business center, fitness room, clubhouse,

and leasing office," per the website. The project would stand on Memorial Drive between Gibson and Stovall streets, neighboring the celebrated *Home Grown* restaurant.

It would also be catty-corner from the under-construction *Madison Yards* mixed-use development and a stone's throw from the *Beltline's Eastside Trail*.

WonderRoot leaders had previously planned to embark on a multi-million-dollar renovation of the Tech High/Hubert Elementary School building situated across Memorial Drive from their shabby bungalow. Those plans, like the 15-year-old organization, faltered, but not before WonderRoot led a tour for a 2016 photo essay on the historic campus.

A Quantum Leap By Google

A Google quantum computer solved one of the world's toughest mathematical problems in 200 seconds. If you're thinking "That doesn't sound like a big deal", consider this: it would take the world's next fastest supercomputer 10,000 years to solve the same mathematical problem.

How'd they do it? Good question. As we all know, computers use binary code (ones and zeros) to perform their wizardry. The quantum computer allows "ones" to be both ones AND zeroes. And "zeroes" to be both zeroes AND ones. This obviously opens up mind-boggling potential.

In the not-to-distant future, quantum computers could perform important work like creating new materials, designing new drugs at the molecular level, optimizing financial investments and speeding up delivery of packages.

But it's not the beginning of the end for classical computers.

Quantum computers have to run in an extremely controlled environment. They're very VERY sensitive machines. They need to run in an environment chilled to just above absolute zero. So don't expect to find a quantum computer in your backpack any time soon. Instead, quantum computers will probably function as accelerators for traditional computers.

Quantum computing researcher Scott Aaronson likened the step to landing on the moon in terms of momentousness. And in a tweet Wednesday, *Google* Chief Executive Sundar Pichai called it a "big breakthrough." Exemplifying how hard the work is, though, the quantum supremacy paper has seventy-seven authors.

IBM is a major quantum computing fan, but it questioned Google's claims. "We argue that an ideal simulation of the same task can be performed on a classical system in two and a half days and with far greater fidelity."



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
