#### 3. Review and Approval of September Minutes. Minutes approved! 4. Vice-President Report – Marinangeles Gutierrez

a. CNIA Membership Campaign: Open Positions include Comms Chair, Transportation Chair, and other Member At-Large positions. b. Transportation Committee Updates: GDoT project on Memorial to include bike lanes, road diet, and curb cutting - hopefully pedestrian crossing from here to TacoTown. *Propel* is pushing a campaign to support bike lane project - follow them for updates. We are proposing that we sign a letter of support for the bike lane project and to advocate for safer roads for pedestrians and cyclists. **Q**: Is the bike lane going to be protected? How will that affect the entrances into the 'hood? How will it affect Cabbagetown? A: Because it's not about historic preservation or going through the 'hood they didn't think they needed to ask us. We gave pushback about that and got a letter saying we've been added as a consulting party so we get to make public comments. Q: Any idea on timing? A: We don't know! They already moved with the 106 process so it's at least actually happening. We'll see some level of design soon. Pearl Street to Grant - passed Oakland. Q: Will they make Estoria and Memorial safer? Motion to send the letter? Seconded! New Neighbor? Get connected, cabbagetown.com/ membership

5. City of Atlanta Council Person Liliana Bakhtiari, Patrick representing a. Pearl Street Traffic Calming Project Updates – found the <sup>\$</sup>75k that was stashed away. We accepted a plan and there's no watershed issues so we're waiting on a bid for it to be done. Liliana is going through Cabbagetown Park with Watershed and Parks & Rec to look into flooding (Thank you, John Dirga). There's been a request for more woodchips for the playground. Mural tagging investigator is on the case. Council member working with higherups at APD. Q: When will we receive bids for Pearl Street? A: It depends on who wants to do it and if they can do it at the right place. Bids have come down later so we're not expecting too much of a delay. Q: Can we hear about the date when it's announced? A: They'll stay in touch as soon as they get info. Q: Can we hear about the bids? A: In the future we will be able to bundle bids but right now it's individual. Q: Will final construction plans be shared? A: Yes. Q: concerns on sidewalk connectivity - update? A: Not sure.



# TYLER NEAL FOR REAL by John Dirga

Are we digging deeper into our roots? Or blazing forward at breakneck speed, both feet stomping on the overdrive? Blues is the essential American art; the wellspring of jazz and rock, the refrain of hiphop's soul, and in our context, utterly foundational to bluegrass.

As we explore rural culture and past struggles streaming through Cabbagetown, one finds that old string band music we typically center at Chomp is nothing without the folk traditions, symbols, and language of African instruments, and spiritual songs yearning for freedom.

For guitarist Tyler Neal (5p, Cabbagetown Park Stage), the quest leads in both directions: a rich of discovery of America's past, plus a serendipitous search for potential and selfhood. By opening ourselves up, we allow those forms and sounds to enter us through a process of cosmic healing that feeds the spirit. If music is on the menu, we're about to eat a feast! Gospel, funk, southern blues rock, frenetic fusion. Equally comfortable on keys and drums, Neal is accomplished at reading the room and sailing the prevailing vibes. Most importantly, he's learned to understand space, and making room for the moments between notes.

*Immediately award the Chili Awards, we're gonna let his band turn up the heat and get down.* Chomp & Stomp acolytes might recognize Tyler from his 2017 appearance beside *Rev Jeff Mosier*, but he's more widely known for collaborations with the late *Col Bruce Hampton*, and mentor *Yonrico Scott*, both gentle giants of music. Lucky fans may have caught Neal's residencies at *Northside Tavern*, and *The Bitter End* (Greenwich Village). But the luckiest people are here right now: at the edge of Cabbagetown Park stage, circa sunset November 4<sup>th</sup> 2023, open to learning and loving, being no one going nowhere doing nothing.

# THE REARVIEW MIRROR

For the past twenty years, the month of November in Ctown has meant one thing and one thing only: Chomp & Stomp & Romp! But a quick peek in the rearview mirror shows us that other things were also going on, in years gone by....

### 2012

*The Good Rev David DeChant* was writing about his love for daytime TV and his distain for computers. We said goodbye to a longtime Cabbagehead; *Grady Gunn*. We were gearing up for a work day to spruce up *Three Points Park*. *Mayor Kasim Reed* took to a bike and christened the Beltline Eastside Trail.

### 2013

*Neil Carver* was commissioned to handcraft some beautiful, wrought iron benches along Tennelle. They're still there to this day. *Lady Ashley McCartney* was organizing us for The Christmas Crawl.

### 2014

Shirley Hughes Tubbs & Robert Tubbs were recognized for creating "Movies in the Park" in Cabbagetown Park. "Dumb & Dumber To" transformed the corner of Kirkwood and Pearl St into a Rhode Island streetscape. Jim Carrey and Jeff Daniels were spotted at Agave Restaurant and Little's Food Store in character as Lloyd and Harry. And they never broke character. Under Ed Lindahl's leadership, Ctown added lights to Esther Peachy Lefevre Park.

## 2015

Organizers for "Krog Masquerade" were facing mounting resistance from Ctown and local 'hoods. Despite opposition, the city approved their permit and allowed them to host a payto-enter party in the tunnel. *Michael McPherson* won a "Stein Hoisting Competition" at *Milltown Tavern*. He held a full stein of beer – perpendicular to his body – for a record 5min 8sec.

### 2016

Thanks to *Karin Kane, Melody Trivisone,* and *Barbara Keeney Harper*, Cabbagetown published "A Cabbagetown Cookbook", packed with over 100 recipes from the 'hood. *Dr. Paul Gross* set up shop on Carroll Street.

# 2017

*Jack Sobel* and *Black Swan Lane* were getting ready to release their seventh album, *under my fallen sky*.

## 2018

Jake Elsas spotted a production assistant wearing a Little's Food Store hat – while watching *Avengers: Infinity War* on Blu-Ray. *Mary Todd Hairdressing Co.* celebrated their 6<sup>th</sup> birthday.

### 2019

Ctown and surrounding 'hoods put the finishing touches on a *Master Plan for Hulsey Yard. JenChan's* was gearing up for their grand opening on Carroll Street.



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# C'town Chows: Chomp & Stomp Chows



With the weather cooling down, and Chomp & Stomp rapidly approaching, we are beginning to enter some of the favorite months of the year for many of us. Everyone loves a brisk fall morning walk or a chilly autumnal sunset, but that's not what I look forward to the most about fall. What I love most (and if you're thinking it might have something to do with food, you're right!) is the hearty eats that have become associated with the cooler weather, and one dish in particular

that our shitty little neighborhood is famous for: Chili!

As we gear up for the most famous Southeast Atlanta, fall scheduled, neighborhood hosted, Chili cook-off, and Bluegrass music festival (there's got to be at least like 5 others, right?) we wanted to recap some of the most highly regarded restaurant



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# **BUSINESS IS A BOOMIN'**

According to Jennifer Liu and CNBC, the home of megacorporations like Coca Cola and Delta Airlines is also the best place to start your own business, according to new LinkedIn data.

Atlanta was recognized as the No. 1 U.S. metro area with the fastest year-over-year growth, 92%, in people founding their own companies, per the job search site.

The Atlanta metro area is growing "at a breakneck pace" thanks to a strong job recovery since the pandemic, reports *Fox 5 Atlanta*. 

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# A ROSE IS A ROSE IS A ROSA...



Horticulturists are sometimes criticized for using botanical names. A common question is "Why don't you use common names everyone understands?"

There are some good reasons for using botanical names. Some common names can be confusing. For example, a Lenten rose is not a rose, and a flowering maple is not a maple. Several species of plants may be known by the same common name. On the other hand, some plants have so

many common names that it can be difficult figuring out which plant is being referred to even with someone speaking the same language you do.

That brings up another reason for botanical names – they are universal. *Centaura cyanus* is *Centaura cyanus* in Albania and Zimbabwe and Valdosta. Its common names will vary around the world, and it may have several common names in one language. In the United States it is called cornflower, bachelor buttons, raggedy sailors and ragged robin. A Scotsman told me that what they call bachelor buttons are what we in America usually call English daisy!

Having one botanical name simplifies matters by allowing gardeners everywhere to know exactly what plant is being referred to. And because botanical names are in Latin, a "dead" language, no modern language is given preference, and words do not take on new meanings the way they do in a living language.


Some botanical names may sound strange, but all of them are not as unfamiliar as you may think. Magnolia, phlox and rhododendron are three plants whose genus names also serve as their common names. (The genus name is the first part of the botanical name. The species name is the second part as in *Magnolia grandiflora*.) Others are not difficult to decipher. For example, the genus name of tobacco is *Nicotiana*, and *Rosa* is the genus name for rose.

I love common names of plants and try to learn all of them. The are a sort of folklore. Many are beautiful and poetic. Others are humorous or give insights into how the plant was once used. When I refer to a plant by one common name over another it is not to imply that one name is superior. It is simply not convenient to mention them all. When gardeners use botanical names it is to be clear and understood, not to be horticultural show-offs. Although I have to admit that **Oxydendron arboreum** does sound a little more high-brow than sourwood!

Spencer: Yes, aggressively friendly. Lucy: Which is not the best for us because we are not super social.




#### You really never know! We have learned so much about all the Cabbagetown cat colonies from doing this column. How have long have they/you been in Cabbagetown?



### It was the best of times...

According to Coworking Cafe, Atlanta has emerged as the best city for remote work due to our excellent infrastructure (seriously) for flexible work, earning high marks for our density of coworking spaces and public Wi-Fi hotspots. Following close behind Atlanta is Seattle, Arlington, San Fran, and Minneapolis.

In Coworking Cafe's grading system, we earned an impressive 72.3 points out of a possible 100 to secure the top spot. Our success stemmed from a thriving telecommuting culture with nearly 30% of our workforce working remotely. This achievement – along with a record-breaking 679 entertainment establishments per 100,000

residents – positions us as a prime destination not just for remote work, but also for a variety of leisure options.

Moreover, Atlanta boasts robust infrastructure support for flexible work with 22 coworking spaces per 100,000 residents – the highest density in the nation. Likewise, the city's abundance of public Wi-Fi hotspots (30 per 100,000 residents) further enhances our appeal, thereby fostering an environment that's conducive to efficient remote work and incentivizing companies to embrace decentralized workspaces. As a result, this balanced approach to remote work and a vibrant leisure scene catapulted Atlanta

### It was the worst of times...

So we do high-tech infrastructure very well, buuuuuuttttt, we don't do low-tech (things like roads and rail) infrastructure so great. As a matter of fact, of the fifty major metros in the United States, we rank forty-eighth. Only Chicago and Houston rank worse than we do. Fortunately we barely eeked out Los Angeles.

According to Josh Green, Urbanize Atlanta, and Clever (a Real Estate data company), Atlanta is a bottom-five finisher in terms of hellacious, expensive, time-consuming commutes - one spot worse than, gulp, Los Angeles.

Per the study, our average one-way commute is 12.8 miles. But those commutes take on average 32 minutes to tackle each way, equating to about 74 hours stuck in traffic annually. Put another way, that's longer than the equivalent of an entire three-day weekend stuck in cars around Atlanta each year.

The study also found that 81 percent of Atlanta workers commute by car - and just 2 percent use public transit.

Put all that together, and according to *Redfin*, you now need an annual income of <sup>\$</sup>107,731 to afford a median priced home in Atlanta.



*Feel like drowning your sorrows in a vat of tequila at Agave?* Well, here's a little perspective to make you feel better. Back when your mom and dad were trying to buy a home in 1981, the mortgage rate was a whopping 18.63%, and it stayed above 10% until the 1990s. If the mortgage rate were THAT high today, you'd need to make almost \$250,000 to buy a home.

*Want to feel even better?* Look at it this way, IF home prices continue their current trajectory, the median home sale price in Atlanta in 2034 will be <sup>5</sup>593,500. Sounds daunting right? But if you are able to buy in the next couple years, that same rise in home prices will mean a massive increase in your personal wealth. AND most reputable sources believe mortgage rates will be back around 3.5% by 2027, so theoretically, relief is on the way.

*Still not feeling so great?* Fair enough. Ok, consider this. At least we all aren't living in San Francisco. Why, you ask? Good question. In San Fran, you need to make over \$400,000 to buy a home that is 23<sup>%</sup> more expensive today than it was a year ago. Your monthly mortgage in San Fran would be over \$10,000 a month, because the median home sale price is \$1,482,500. Feel better now?

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
# CTOWN CRAWL-O-WEEN 2023


