Our annual street mural festival got off to a wet start on Saturday, September 16th, but artists kicked it into high gear and made the most of a beautiful Sunday. Much more than a dozen new works of art now adorn the CSX wall along Tennelle and Wylie.

Among the artists, Nathan Tavel, 35, from Decatur (pictured here). Nathan's artwork bemoans the fact that many long-time Atlantans can no longer afford to live in the neighborhoods they grew up in.

Nathan uses bright, bold, poppy, colours and crisp lettering to deliver his message. Nathan says "With the lettering being clean and straight-forward, you're gonna read it whether you want to or not and if you don't get the message, then you probably didn't grow up here."

"Cabbagetown is the same as other neighborhoods in Atlanta. Things have shifted and it's hard to recognize the Atlanta I first got to know. It's a bummer for all the people that have been relocated or kicked out of the areas they grew up in. It would be nice if folks who grew up here and want to stay, could stay," says Nathan.

NPU-N Updates - John Dirga, Cabbagetown Representative

i. Clean Car Campaign, Fire Closed Door Campaign (please sleep with your bedroom door closed), Fulton DA office has been attending to give updates on downtown drama. ii. Yard trimming Sep 25th - it's a private contractor and they come every other week. iii. Code enforcement is really understaffed so it's complaint based - if you get one, it's from a neighbor. They aren't driving around looking for code violations. iv. Department of City Planning - short on planners and raising salaries. Comprehensive development

plan is in the works. We're trying to get involved. Planners look to the CDP for guidance with zoning and bike lanes and such. v. NPU University has really great classes about zoning and such. **NPUatlanta.org**. vi. Executive director for HPLA made a recommendation for upgrades for their park and got money to fix erosion - maybe watershed will fix our erosion? vii. **Park Pride** looks good for capital improvements to the amphitheater. viii. NPU has a grant - Little 5 Points received it and their business association and community center are doing artistic improvements. ix. New Mural in the 'hood. x. Reynoldstown is proud of the Holtsclaw Promontory - Watershed is letting the neighborhood use it as a park.

xi. **Forward Warrior!!** needs volunteers - please help bring ladders or give out water - check the website to sign-up. **Q:** How do you choose? **A:** People who have painted before will come and paint over their own mural. It's invitational. The stacks murals are application based. xii. NPU consists of 9 people who vote on things in the neighborhoods as a recommendation body. They send results to the city and the city does whatever. Do we want to change the bylaws to change how the NPU votes? Motion to keep the bylaws. Passed!

8. City of Atlanta Council Person - Council Person Liliana Bakhtiari

i. Pearl Street Traffic Calming Project Updates: Apologies to the 'hood with ALDOT. The neighborhood put money aside to support Pearl Street Traffic Calming but it was difficult to find where the money went. Four options for the blind hill on Pearl - Crosswalk and speedbumps on the hill but we decide what materials they will be made of. **Q:** Is one material better than the other and why? **A:** Granite might last the longest. **Q:** Can we fix the unpaved sidewalk on that street also? **A:** We will find a way to fund the sidewalk. **Q:** Does it need to be brick? **A:** We'll find out. **Q:** Will there be lights? **A:** There will be reflective lights in the sidewalk, lots of signs, and painted bits. **Q:** What about the brick sidewalk on Carroll with tree damage? It's dangerous - can we avoid making this sidewalk brick? **A:** We had the funds to do this years ago but ATLDOT dragged their feet. We want the most durable and safest option.

There's a crack on Pearl and we need to make sure it's not a water issue before it's repaved. But they want to repave it. Watershed is doing a report. Will work with **Colgate** to check on their traffic needs for future building. Motion to make speed bumps granite - motion passed! **Q:** Can we lower the hill? **A:** Digging might not be the best idea in the neighborhood.

Dekalb Ave Resurfacing Updates: Dekalb was repaved. Bike lane and lights should be completed by the end of the month. Requesting no left at Krog; we'll see. Krog tunnel part II - CSX needs to sign the permits. Waiting for them to finish signing the permits. Phase II will not affect any of the new work on Dekalb. **Q:** Where will the bike lane be on Dekalb? **A:** From Hurt street to Elmira Place and Clifton to Arizona.

Apologies regarding the Carroll Street closure: Liliana was hoping to have a solid plan before she approached the neighborhood. Marina will have another meeting with the businesses to try and figure something out. *Continued on page 7.*

Netflix's new "Hack My Home" uses engineering ingenuity to maximize space in homes all over Atlanta. A team of whimsical builders show up to tackle some living space problems and because this is tv, money is no object. *For one of the first eight episodes, "Hack My Home" chose our own Jen & Emily (and Mik) Chan.*

One of The Chan's favourite builds was an "Inspector Gadget" hidden appliance rack on the kitchen countertop that goes up and down with a push of a button. Emily said they don't actually place appliances in the space. *"We turned that into a speakeasy," Emily said. "It holds our wine and liquor."*

Their episode showed a cramped house where Jen & Emily barely cook in the kitchen and there was not enough space to entertain guests. The "Hack My Home" team created a cool pull-out table for eight that Jen said they now use regularly. *"I had my entire family over and that has never happened before, ever," she said.*

Emily noted that *"there were so many hacks they didn't even choose to air. Where our trashcan is, they have a drawer above it with a cutting board. You can cut and then the cutting board has an opening that you lift up and goes directly into the trash below it which is super cool!"*

You can stream all eight episodes on Netflix now. (Hint) Start with Episode number two. It's our favourite.

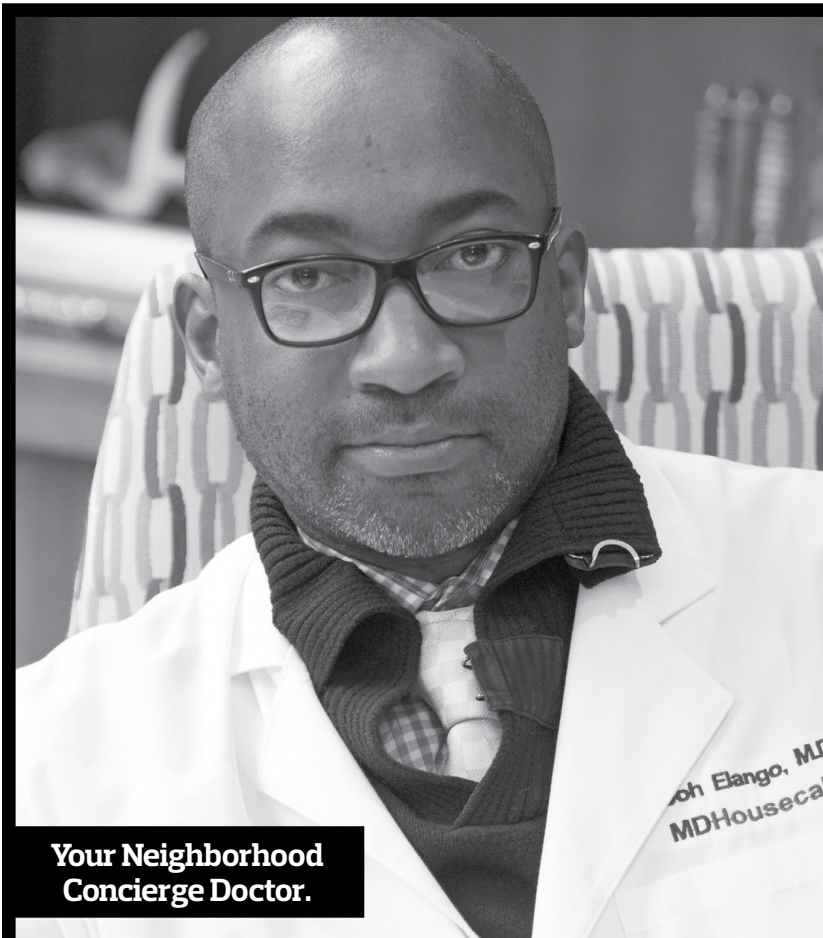


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C'town Chows Goes Across the Pond

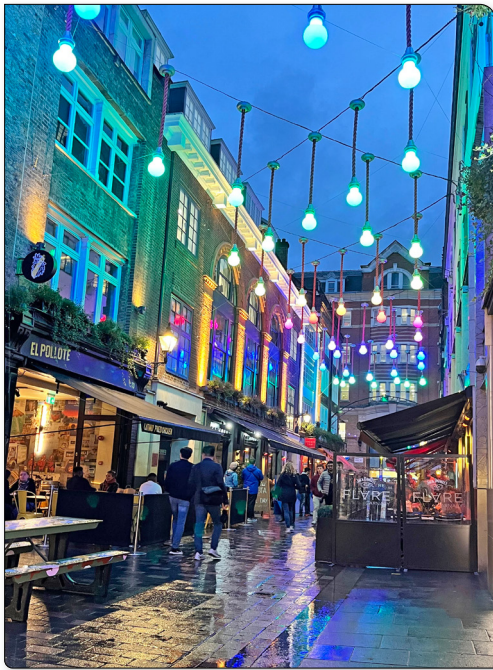


Having just returned from a week in London, England, we thought this month's article could be a two-fer; recs from London that have equally as lovely Atlanta equivalents to visit, and, in the event you happen to be visiting London in the coming months or years, you'll have a bit of a guide of our favorite spots. We're giving this all to you this month for free... you're welcome.

Fish n' Chips is a British staple, innit?

(Couldn't help myself). ***Poppie's Fish & Chips*** – Soho, London, is notorious for some of the best fish and chips in the city – and we'd highly recommend giving it a go. In Atlanta though, we also do it pretty well. So well, in fact, that the late great ***Anthony Bourdain*** included this dish in a list of his favorite restaurants in the A, over

at ***WH Stiles Fish Camp*** (675 Ponce De Leon Ave NE). They're serving up some of the best fish in the city, and if you're willing to brave the PCM crowd, you'll be happy you did. Crunchy, crispy, salty, tender fish, alongside perfectly seasoned potato fries... What else could you want? My only issue is the "Chips" vs. "Fries" discussion. They're fries, sorry mates.

London is not just known for the classic Brit dishes, but also for their plethora of Indian food, and some of the best Indian food in the world at that. With almost 1M Indian folks in the city of London, they're cooking up some of the most authentic Indian food you can get anywhere, and we had the privilege of visiting a couple local spots.

Dishoom, Covent Garden, London, is a spot that's extremely well regarded in the city, so much so, that their business has now grown to nine locations across the city. With dishes like Chicken Ruby, and Grilled Paneer Tikka, they're doing all the classics but with a modern twist. This was for sure one of the best meals we had in London – 10/10 would recommend.

Now, for an equally delectable authentic Indian dining experience here locally in Atlanta, you've got to head over to Decatur to ***Chai***

Pani (406 W Ponce de Leon Ave). Personal fave on their menu is Desi Paneer salad the Shredded cabbage, carrots, scallions, roasted cashews, toasted sesame seeds, tangy, bright cumin-lime dressing – all topped with the perfect chewy, cheesy, unctuous Grilled Paneer. It's one of those Atlanta spots with food you can't get just anywhere, and fortunately for us, it's just down the road.

Next stop for us was to ***The Palomar*** – an Israeli restaurant located in Chinatown, in London, England – mad innit? Promise I'm not just taking the piss (not to be confused with being pissed, both of which have different meanings across the pond...) Despite the unusual locale, this place is dishing up really legit Israeli food – Chicken Schnitzel, handmade pita and hummus, baba ganoush, all the goods that really get us Jews buzzin'.

Now to crack on to the Atlanta parallel, my gut is telling me I must recommend ***Rina*** (699 Ponce De Leon Ave NE). Rina has a fantastic vibe, and food to match. Favorite dishes include the Spiced Lamb Burger on their Challah Bun (you don't pronounce the 'C' gentiles..) and the Chicken Schwarma Pita. Whether you are just on an aimless walk down the Beltline, or driven straight there to satisfy your mezze fix, it's absolutely a must-visit.

A Final Goodbye

Seventeen years ago at age 47, I sold my home outside of Detroit and moved to the ATL. My first residence was in the D Building at the *Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts*, but I didn't really enjoy the soaring ceilings and the echoing hallways so I rented a cute two-story duplex on Reinhardt which I have always referred to as my first C'town address. Being from a very small farm town in South Dakota, I quickly recognized similar qualities that this little 'hood exhibited.

I didn't really know anyone but had met *Christina Kennedy-Farr* at *Carroll St.* and she introduced me to a few other folks. She also introduced me to *Judy Staples* who was like a sister to me until the day she died. I remained unknown to most of you until March 14th, 2008 when a rogue tornado ripped through Cabbagetown. It tore the roof off my apartment, but that was nothing compared to what a lot of our neighbors endured.

I quickly organized a fundraiser called "*I Got Twisted in Cabbagetown*" which we held behind the sisters on Carroll Street in the alley. We didn't raise a huge sum, but we helped one person – who didn't have homeowner's insurance – get some stuff repaired.

When I moved to Gaskill Street, I really began getting involved. I volunteered at *Chomp*, joined committees, designed the *White Party Prom* logo and worked in many gardens in many of your homes. I moved briefly to New York but came right back a couple years later which is when *Debbie Weeks* introduced me to a high school friend who was a floral designer and I began my new career as a *Wedding Floral Designer* with extraordinary success.

I have lived on *Estoria Street* for the last ten years. I took an overgrown property and created a beautiful garden and created *Angie's Acres* after a failed attempt to create a neighborhood dog park with my friends *Lisa Myers* and *Susan McCracken*. Here I sold pumpkins for the last six years and created holiday themed yard displays. One of which even made *Fox News*. This year I represented Cabbagetown at the *Tournament of Roses Parade*.

I have enjoyed our events and people for nearly two decades. I am sad to say I am leaving Cabbagetown for Michigan where I will under go treatment for Cancer. Unfortunately, I have been informed that I may not survive the treatment. By the time you read this I will have already moved, so just let me say thank you to those of you who trusted me to create beautiful gardens which I hope grow for many years. Thank you to those of you that came to my parties, and bought pumpkins or flowers from me. I have loved calling Cabbagetown my home and will always cherish the many friendships I have known here.

in their garden. *Butterflyweed*, *ironweed* and *Joe-pye-weed* are prime examples. These native flowers are both beautiful and well-behaved and should be a part of more home landscapes. And these plants are far superior to exotic, highly invasive, and trouble-making plants such as *tree of heaven*, *princess tree* and *sweet autumn clematis*. They are the worst kind of weed even though they have alluring names.

Perhaps you have wondered what qualifies a plant as a weed.

Well, it is strictly a judgment call. There is no DNA test that identifies a plant as a weed or that it has the genetic potential to become one. A weed is defined as a weed by how it relates to humans and what they want to accomplish.

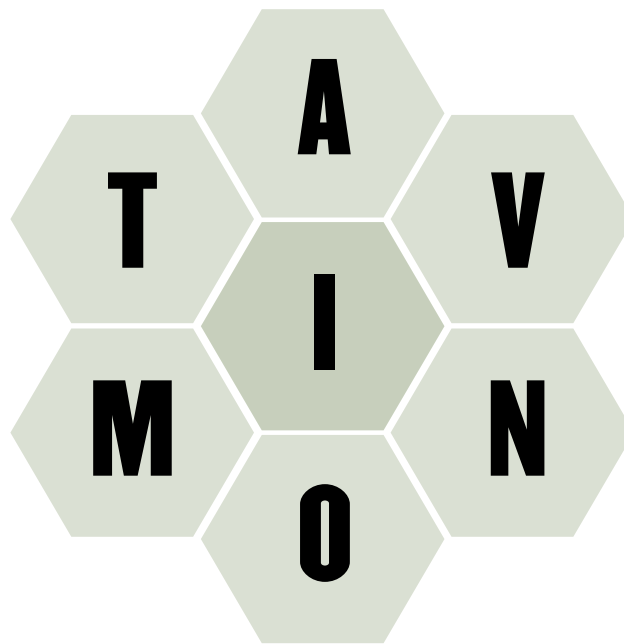
Emerson wrote “A weed is a plant whose virtues have yet to be discovered.” Maybe. But tomorrow if a scientist discovered a cure for cancer from an extract of kudzu it would still be a weed to me if it were engulfing my house. “A weed is a plant growing in the wrong place” is another definition, and is the best one. A tomato is not considered a weed unless, for example, it is growing in a farmer’s cotton field and interfering with the growth, cultivation, or harvest of the cotton. (And a truly noxious weed is one that not just happens to be in the wrong place but that intends to stay there and for thousands of its offspring to be there, too.)

The definition of a weed is relative – it’s all about your point of view. *Asters* growing by the roadside are beautiful wildflowers; those sprouting in a corn field are weeds. While I think *dandelions* make a lawn look like a flowery mead, a neighbor is ready to pluck out these offenders on sight. The rancher noticing *blackberry briars* encroaching into his pasture will attack them as weeds. A forager wanting to make a cobbler sees them as a resource, and the cottontail scooting for safety underneath them sees them as a refuge. And I suppose a plant may view any other plant competing for space, water, and light as a weed!

Katie: Are we big fans of toys?

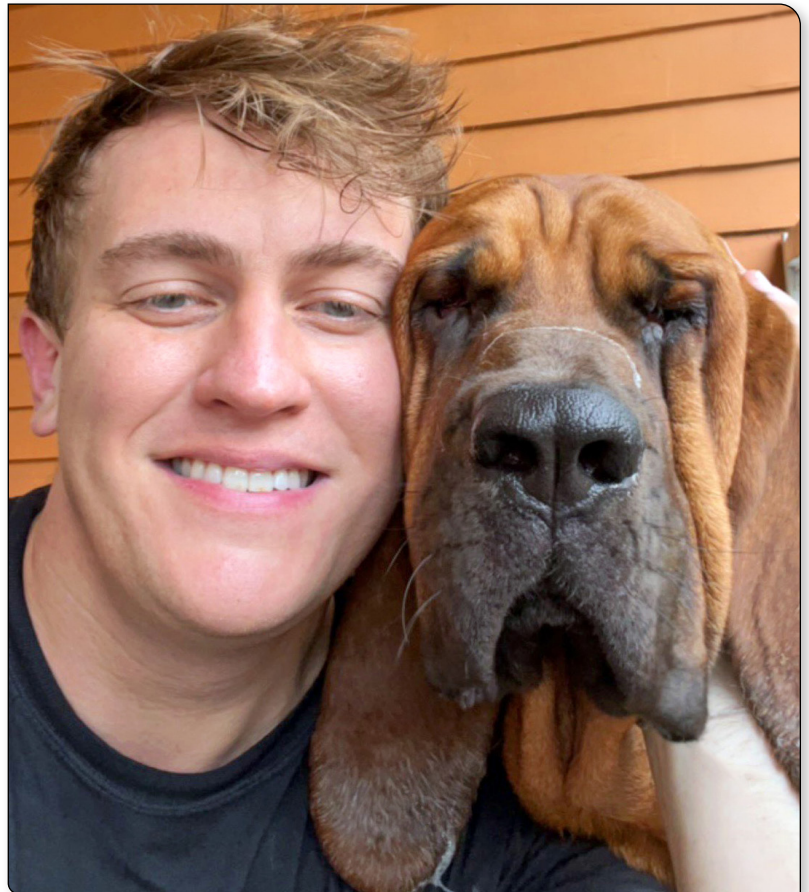
Sean: A BIG fan of toys, When he was a puppy, I would have

In a special edition of Cats of Cabbagetown, we met up with Teresa to discuss the ins and outs of indoor cats.

Teresa, please tell us about their names and how you came up with them. Prudence, who goes by Pru, is a five-year-old tortoiseshell gal with stout little legs, a barrel-shaped body, and one white whisker. She is named after the charioteer of the virtues, though she does not subscribe to any known religion. Prudence is the ability to govern and discipline oneself by the use of reason; she knows the right thing to do in each situation and acts upon that knowledge.



Eely-Mouth

Eely-Mouth, who goes by Eely, is nine months old and all-black with a super-long tail. He is named after a boss in the 2003 Nintendo GameCube game Super Mario Sunshine. Eely-Mouth is a giant eel whose cavities are poisoning the water in Noki Bay, damaging Mario and all else who dare swim in the bay. Both Eely and his namesake flaunt glowing yellow eyes.

Can you tell us their origin stories?

I first adopted Prudence in 2019 in New Orleans, where she was found pregnant and living on the streets. She was taken to the shelter – **Zeus' Place** – and dubbed Pumpnickel. Each kitten in her litter was quickly adopted, while Pru lived in the free-range cat room for six months before I met her. She was lounging in a cylinder of a cat tree but emerged when I reached in to pet her. She was pretty timid and scared for the first month after she was adopted and spent many nights walking around my apartment meowing loudly. She made the move from New Orleans to Atlanta with me in 2020 in the depths of the pandemic. She did not enjoy the car ride.

Eely was adopted in February 2023 after I decided Pru needed a cat friend to keep her company. He was three months old and one of three kittens at **Good Mews** in Marietta the day I went to pick one out. He was found with his two brothers in Buchanan,

GA. The shelter named him Rex; his brothers were Buzz and Woody. The day I met him he was rather scraggly, had an eye infection, and was recovering from a flea infestation. He spent a lot of time scratching his soon-to-be dad's shoes and ankles and eventually crawled inside his jacket. From day one, he was very eager to explore his new dwelling.

How did Pru react to Eely the newcomer?

I was like: Oh, she's going to love him, she's going to warm right up to him, she's going to be cuddling with him in no time. She's traumatized him with her growling. He still hasn't fully learned her boundaries, like, "*I don't want to play with you right now*"; so he will kind of mess with her. He does this silly thing where he almost acts like he doesn't have a choice. You can see him deliberating, like, "*OK, I guess I have to go bite Pru's ass now.*" But there are glimmers of self-awareness.

Do they ever go outside?

They have both been outside briefly in a harness, but otherwise no. I know Eely would love nothing more than to get outside and decimate the wild bird population of Atlanta, but he'll have to settle for watching cat TV and gazing out the screen door for now. Pru seems content indoors at this point in her life.

Nothing wrong with being an indoor kid.

You can see I left out some of their favorite implements. I like to call the living room "The Arena". Pru and Eely are master hunters in distinct disciplines. Pru excels in scouting, camouflage, and creating confusion. She has the self-control to wait for her prey to walk right into her trap. Eely is 11 pounds of pure power and chaos. His zoomies send him bounding to the top of any and all furniture within his reach. He knows that even if his prey sees him coming, it will not be able to escape his grasp.

We're sorry we won't be seeing them in the streets, but it sounds like it's for the greater good.

DAY OF THE DEAD FESTIVAL!

Historic Oakland Foundation invites you to attend the second-annual Day of the Dead festival at Oakland Cemetery on Sunday, November 5th from noon to 5p.

Visitors of all ages will learn about and experience a traditional Día de Muertos festival. Guests will enjoy traditional dancing, crafts, authentic Mexican food, and entertainment. They can also view a display of altars decorated with flowers, food, and beverages honoring lost family and friends.

Day of the Dead originated several thousand years ago with the Aztec, Toltec and other Nahua people who considered mourning the dead disrespectful. For these pre-Hispanic cultures, death was a natural phase in life's long continuum. The dead were still members of the community, kept alive in memory and spirit, and during Día de Muertos, they temporarily returned to earth.

Today's Día de Muertos celebration is a blend of pre-Hispanic religious rites and Christian feasts which takes place on November 1 and 2 – All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day on the Catholic calendar – around the time of the fall maize harvest. 20,000 "KIDS" WILL FIGHT CLIMATE CHANGE

Young climate activists have been lobbying for the creation of a climate corps, and it appears the White House is listening. President Biden intends to use executive authority to train and employ thousands of young people in jobs to fight global warming.

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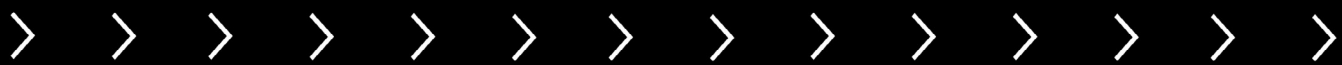
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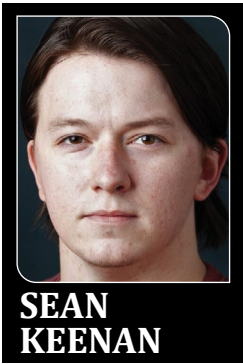
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REYNOLDSTOWN'S DISPUTED APARTMENTS FOR HOMELESS COULD BREAK GROUND IN DECEMBER



A controversial plan to build 42 apartments for people experiencing homelessness in Reynoldstown is advancing, despite pushback from neighborhood leaders.

Construction could kick off as soon as December, the developer told *Atlanta Civic Circle* this week.

But Stryant Investments' 111 Moreland Avenue project, which will replace an old, vacant single-family home where the bustling thoroughfare

intersects Kirkwood Avenue, has undergone a few tweaks since community members first voiced their disapproval, according to Joshua Humphries, Mayor Andre Dickens' chief housing advisor.

To address the Reynoldstown Civic Improvement League's concerns that the 42-unit apartment building would be too dense for the 0.38-acre site, the city of Atlanta worked with Stryant to increase the number of kitchens and the amount of communal space, "to make the project better for residents," Humphries said in an interview. (Future residents will rent rooms with kitchenettes, while sharing full kitchens, laundry facilities, and communal spaces.)

But reducing the unit count, as the neighborhood group recommended, was fiscally just not in the cards, he added: "In order for the project to be financially viable and to keep all the funding sources intact, it had to keep the unit count at 42."

Stryant co-founder Stan Sugarman said the affordable housing development will rely on construction loans and grants from the city's economic development agency, Invest Atlanta; its homeless services provider, Partners For Home; the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; and Federal Home Loan Banks.

Residents will benefit from government-backed rent vouchers provided by the city's housing authority, Atlanta Housing. That means the 42 intended tenants will only have to pay up to 30% of their monthly income – or nothing, if they don't make any money. Units will be earmarked for people earning no more than 30% of the area median income – or about \$20,250.

Sugarman said he expects Stryant to close on the project's financing in the next couple of months. After demolishing the dilapidated home on the property, the developer could break ground by the end of the year.

"We are excited to be neighbors in Reynoldstown," he told Atlanta Civic Circle.

Partners For Home will hand-pick residents for the 111 Moreland apartments and provide them with supportive services, according to the nonprofit's executive director, Cathryn Vassell.

"We are excited to be moving forward with this development, creating brand new, high quality, deeply affordable, safe, and dignified housing for our neighbors in need," she said.

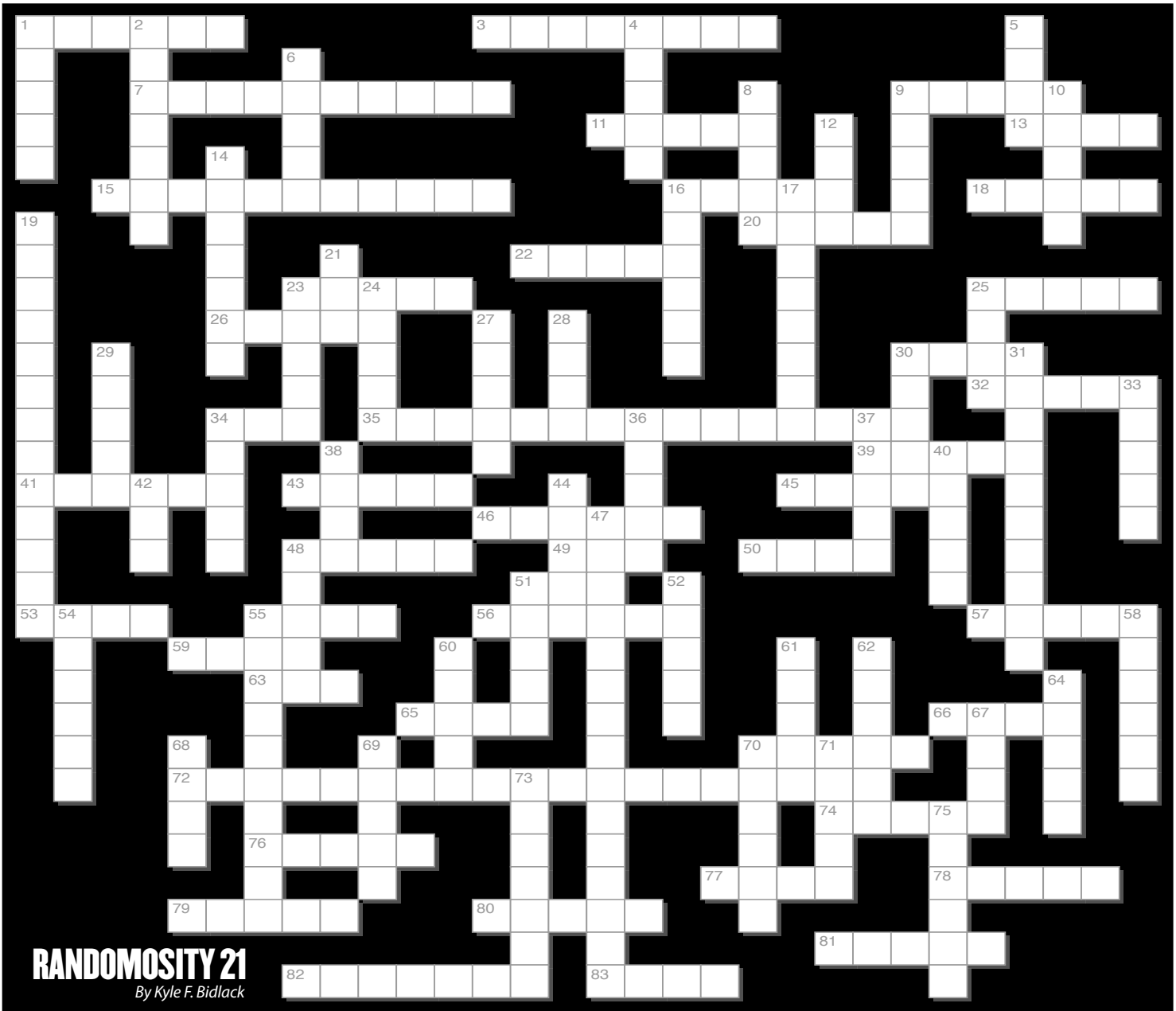


An early rendering of the 111 Moreland Avenue project. (Credit: Stryant Investments and the city of Atlanta)

Humphries, the mayor's advisor, said that adding 42 deeply affordable units at the currently vacant site is a win for metro housing affordability – but that there's still plenty of work to do to meet unhoused and lower-income Atlantans' needs.

"The city is growing rapidly, and we are not building enough housing total – and we don't have nearly enough affordable housing," he said. "So 42 units is not going to solve the problem overnight, but we need a lot of projects throughout the city that thoughtfully add affordable and market-rate housing, so we can address this crisis-level need."

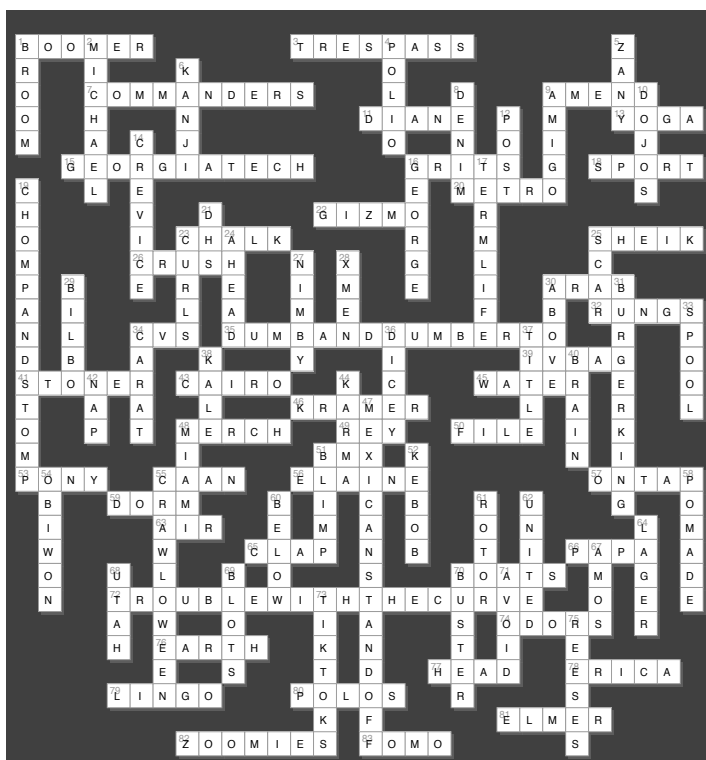
