Honouring Joyce

A proposal to honour the cherished legacy of Cabbagetown folksinger and community activist Joyce Brookshire by naming the Cabbagetown Park Amphitheater in her memory will be brought up for a vote at the next CNIA meeting on September 12th, 2017, 7p at 177 Estoria.

Cabbagetown residents are invited to discuss and vote on this proposal at the meeting. Given Joyce's rich and productive history of wonderful music and dedication to empowering and promoting the welfare of Cabbagetown residents, she is remembered as an effective and positive force whose work was critical in shaping the current neighborhood environment, and creating a sense of pride in our community.

While other musical performers have roots in Cabbagetown, Joyce's efforts have had the most lasting and positive impact, and dedicating a stage to her in Cabbagetown Park would be a fitting tribute to both her music and her support of the community.

Our Senator, Nan Orrock, recently made the following resoltuion: Senate Resolution 1333 By: Senator Nan Orrock of the 36th. A RESOLUTION: Recognizing and commending Joyce Brookshire; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, Joyce Brookshire's music is a portrait of her life and the life of her community,

the Cabbagetown Mill Village in the heart of downtown Atlanta, where she was born and raised; and

WHEREAS, in the 1880's folks from the North Georgia mountains moved to Atlanta and began to work at the *Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill*, and Joyce's family was among those who brought their rural way of life to build a new community in the city; and

WHEREAS, Joyce's musical influences were many, including her father, a truck driver, who played guitar and sang in a quartet at the family church; neighbor Grace Mote, who played Kitty Wells and Webb Pierce on one of the first record players in the neighborhood; and the rhythm and blues and rock and roll music of the 1950's; and

WHEREAS, Joyce began writing songs at age ten and hasn't quit since; and

WHEREAS, in the early 1970's Joyce went to work at *The Patch*, a drop-in center for kids in crisis in the Cabbagetown neighborhood, and it was there that she met Esther LeFever, who was to have a major impact on Joyce's life as she was a folk singer, political activist, ex-Mennonite, and friend to the poor and disadvantaged and greatly nurtured Joyce's talent as a songwriter and performer; and

WHEREAS, in the 1970's and 1980's Joyce toured with folk legend *Guy Carawan* and lived in the Knoxville, Tennessee, area for several years playing with her band the *Phantoms of the Opry* with *Phyllis Boyens*, who played *Loretta Lynn's* mother in the movie *Coal Miner's Daughter*; and

WHEREAS, Joyce has used her songs to express not only her own feelings, but to become a voice for the hungry, the homeless, and the poor; and

WHEREAS, along with the *Indigo Girls* and other noted Atlanta musicians, Joyce is featured on the infamous *Don't Eat Out of Dented Cans* album produced by *WRFG Radio*; and

WHEREAS, her music has been featured in the theatrical productions Cabbagetown: Three Women, Ponce de Leon, Blood on Blood, and Texas Two-Stepping with the Girls; and

WHEREAS, in 1987 she was nominated for a Georgia Emmy for outstanding achievement in original music; and

WHEREAS, her first solo album, *North Georgia Mountains*, was released in 1977 by *Foxfire Records*; and

WHEREAS, Joyce, known as the "Empress of Cabbagetown" and its best known advocate and celebrity, continues to tell her wonderful stories through her music.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body commend Joyce Brookshire's outstanding contributions as a talented and successful songwriter and performer and as a magical storyteller through song.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed to transmit an appropriate copy of this resolution to Joyce Brookshire.

Preserving Our Forests

The Atlanta City Council this week authorized the purchase of 6.2 acres of forested land located at 770 Shadowridge Drive.

In November 2016, the council approved legislation authorizing the city to procure privately-owned afforested property

containing eighty percent or more canopy cover, a minimum forestation standard of 1,000 DBH (Diameter at breast height) inches and/ or a minimum of fifty mature trees per acre.

"We have to do all that we can, not only to preserve,

but to also increase our existing tree canopy", said District Five Councilmember Natalyn Archibong.

Atlanta's tree canopy covers almost half of the city – 47.9 percent – according to an assessment released in 2014 by the *Atlanta Tree*

Conservation Commission and Georgia Tech.

The city will maintain the property as greenspace and make it available for public use. Recreational activities on the property will be restricted to those with minimal impact as determined by the city's

Parks and Recreation Dept.

The city and local environmentalists believe that an effective method of protecting and maintaining Atlanta's urban forest is to procure privately-owned property that is already forested and preserve its afforestation in perpetuity.

A major benefit of purchasing afforested property, in comparison

to purchasing and planting new trees, is that many trees on afforested property are mature, thus providing a benefit to the city's tree canopy that would not be provided by a new tree for many years.

Fulton County Tax Appeals

Fulton County Property Tax Appeals are due by Sept. 18th. Even if your assessment did not increase you should consider appealing. Fulton County will likely raise values in 2018. Appealing your current 2017 value and going before the Board of Equalization will ensure your value is frozen until 2020. Your value will probably increase in 2020; however, you'll have ample time to prepare for the increased financial burden. Do not appeal if you appealed and went before the board of equalization for 2015 or 2016 taxes because they can raise it.

Appeals can be filed online or by mail. If you mail your appeal, send it via a trackable method. Choose *uniformity* (neighbors are lower) or value (comps) as the grounds for your appeal. Next, fill out your opinion of the value and an explanation. Then you will be asked if you prefer to be billed at 85% or 100% of the value. To be on the safe side, select 100%. If you select 85% and they don't lower your value you'll be responsible for coming up with the difference.


Depending on the volume of appeals received it may take a while to receive a letter of determination. No matter what the letter says (even if they offer to lower your value), reject it. You MUST go to the Board of Equalization to have your assessment frozen for three years. You will at least get the offer that was in the letter when you go to the board, but you must physically go to the board hearing to have your assessment frozen.

Vision



The topic of vision and forward-thinking leadership has been on my mind lately, but it's even more prominent considering the tragedy still unfolding in Houston.

Hurricane Harvey reminds us that we are part of a tenuous system that's held together in some ways, by hope and prayer. The destruction wrought by this storm is tough to comprehend, but much like Hurricane Katrina and the *BP* oil spill of 2010, we shouldn't be surprised by the impacts. When

we roll the dice and engage in risky development and risky business, sometimes we lose the gamble, with terrible consequences.

Atlanta isn't a coastal city, so we don't live with the same concerns and fears that our counterparts along the Gulf do, but we are certainly not immune to the realities that a rapidly changing world can visit upon us at any time. I'd direct you to the drought of 2007-2008 as exhibit A.

Natural disasters notwithstanding, we're also perilously addicted to fossil fuel and oil-based transportation modes in our fair city. Some of us get around it if we don't venture too far, but for the lion's share of Metro Atlanta residents, burning fossil fuel is clearly a foundation of life. Availability of fresh water is also a huge deal, as we've had to face in the ongoing, and not yet resolved, water wars with our neighboring states.

Depressed yet? Don't be. All of this is solvable with bold vision and strong leadership. Some of the leadership we need is local. Some is statewide. Some is national, and indeed some is global. We need to cultivate and celebrate big thinking that is audacious and bold. We need to rise up and demand better from our leaders at every level.

I spend a lot of time lobbying for federal climate policy, and in that work, we have a saying: "Politicians don't create political will – they respond to it." We must generate the will to change course or it will never happen.

I recently had a sit-down with Liliana Bakhtiari, who is running for City Council for District 5, and I was impressed with her big-picture thinking and desire for bold action. Two weeks ago, Cathy Woolard came by and answered a litany of questions about the future potential of *Hulsey Yard, the BeltLine*, and how life in Cabbagetown may be affected. Both these women see much more than the immediate tactical issues that we face as a city. They strike me as leaders that have an ability to take the long view and recognize how decisions made today will impact the city in 10, 15, and 20 years from now.

The world watches as events unfold in Houston, and we all grieve for the losses therein. But let's not forget that our lives are connected to those events as well. The same warming climate that contributed to Harvey's intensity could easily throw our region back into a drought at any time. Let's be proactive and show the world that Atlanta intends to lead in bold thinking to tackle this global issue just like many notable Atlantans have done throughout history. With thoughtful leadership, we might just solve our oil addiction and water woes as well.





Grass Heroes

Summer's been busy and recently quite hot and dry, and your garden may be showing it. Want an easy, elegant solution to the August garden blahs? Try ornamental grasses, the unsung heroes of the late-summer landscape. Grasses have a special place in our hearts because they really kick into high gear when fairer-



weather plants start losing their cool in the hottest, driest parts of the summer. Versatile and tough, boasting a

wide range of color, texture, and bloom, grasses are adaptable to many growing conditions, spaces, and design styles.

Tips for gardening with grasses:

1) Select varieties that are appropriate for your site.

Grasses range from big and bodacious to petite and polite; from incredibly drought-tolerant to thirsty, wetland-dwellers and can tolerate a wide range of light conditions. Pick varieties that suit your space, keeping in mind that the conditions may be vastly different from one side of your garden to the other.

2) Plant them while it's still hot.

Grasses perennialize more effectively when they have a good spell of warm weather to put down roots before the cold sets in. Plant them no later than early October, keep them well-watered the first few weeks in the ground, and they'll be happily on their way.

3) Cut your grasses back in the late winter or early spring.

Dormant grass stems are hollow, and when they're cut, they'll collect water, leading to potentially fatal crown rot. Leaving the stems of your grasses standing tall through winter protects their crown areas from over-saturation. Plus, it provides valuable habitat for wildlife.

When it comes to timing your annual grass cutting, let nature be your guide. When you see tiny shoots of bright green new growth emerging from the crown, it's time to cut back the previous year's growth, but if you need to put an actual date on the calendar to remind yourself, aim for the last week in February.

Cut your grasses according to their mature heights. Grasses that grow 6' or taller should be cut to 6"-8" above the soil level. Grasses that grow to be 3'-5' tall may be cut to 4"-6". Shorter grasses should be cut down to about 3".

Some of the very best grasses for Atlanta gardens: Sun-lovers:

Panicum virgatum 'Northwind' (native switchgrass)
Panicum virgatum 'Shenandoah' (native switchgrass)
Schizachryum scoparium 'Prairie Blues' (native Little Bluestem)

Shade-dwellers:

Carex divulsa, (European meadow sedge) Carex flacca 'Blue Zinger', (Mediterranean sedge) Carex morrowii 'Ice Dance', (Japanese Sedge)
