Meeting called to order by Chelsea for Katie at 7:05p Motion to approve July minutes. Second. Unanimously approved.

Atlanta Police Department – Lt Crowder, Zone 6, Evening Watch Commander: djcrowder@atlantaga.gov. Package and bike thefts are #1 problem in our area. If you have video of theft, submit to investigating detective. Neighbor asked about several car break-in's on Berean last week. Another asked about getting increased patrol in/around parking area behind the houses on Carroll St. Lt Crowder had no specific info on those events, but encouraged people to email him for follow up.

City of Atlanta – Valencia Hudson – Marta Meeting tomorrow: flyer distributed. Gaskill street repairs halted because cars need to be moved. They are coming again tomorrow so please let neighbors on/near Gaskill/Berean to have cars cleared. A neighbor reminded Valencia that street parking is the only parking for many people in our neighborhood. Pearl Street sidewalk repairs on the Reynoldstown side, but also planning to rip up the bricks on the Cabbagetown side and replace with concrete while they are there. If you object, email narchibong@atlantaga.gov ASAP.

Other comments included missing/broken sewer covers and trash missed or partially emptied for weeks in a row. She said that only "angry" complaints to 311 are logged. If you're polite/rational, they aren't counted as complaints. She asked us to send an email with the addresses of missed trash pick up to her. Katie is compiling.

Neighbor asked about code violation enforcement for house that has been vacant and has overgrowth. Referred to 311.

Treasurer – Saundra Rueppel – budget copies available at meeting. We are in the black, but really need to see an increase in ad sales in the newspaper.

Creative Solar presented the plans for 220 Berean. 12 solar panels will be installed. Creative Solar is the installer for the Solarize

Atlanta Program. Motion to support. Seconded. Unanimously in favor.

CI – Paul Freeman – Need *Chomp & Stomp* committee HELP. The following positions are of particular need: Volunteer Coordinator, Liquor Chair, Individual Chili, and Communications. Reach out to Nathan and Whitney Bolster on Pickett ASAP.

Atlanta City Council Update

Shareable Dockless Mobility Devices Legislation

The Atlanta City Council is considering an ordinance that would regulate the bike and scooter and moped-sharing services that are emerging weekly in Atlanta, the newest being *LimeBike*.

Since July 2014, Atlanta has had laws regulating bike share programs, but the city code does not address dockless models or operation of other shareable mobility devices. If ratified, the legislation would:

- Require the companies running vehicle-sharing services to pay a permit fee to the city's Office of Mobility Planning, which would yield them a year-long license to operate in Atlanta.
- Operators would be required to maintain liability insurance with the City of Atlanta with a minimum \$3,000,000 aggregate.
- No more than 10 shareable dockless mobility devices may be parked per block citywide, among all operators, and no more than 200 shareable dockless mobility devices may be parked per square mile citywide, among all operators; a move that would maintain a free flow of traffic on public right of ways. Please share your concerns and input regarding the Dockless legislation with Councilmember Archibong at narchibong@atlantaga.gov.

MARTA

Atlanta City Councilmembers Natalyn Archibong, Carla Smith, Amir Farokhi, and Jennifer Ide hosted a More MARTA community forum on August 15th at Virginia Highland Church where the community learned about the expansion, asked questions and gave input on the proposed project list.

MARTA will have its final vote on October 4th, for a ^s2.5 billion plan that will decide which transit projects are funded in Atlanta over the next 40 years. Officially known as *The More MARTA Program*, the initial list proposes 17 projects.

The complete list of proposed projects can be found at: *itsmarta. com.* Changes to the proposed project list will happen now that public outreach has ended.

The goal of More MARTA is to serve 126 neighborhoods and is slated to increase access to jobs by 56%, improve transit services to communities with large minority or low-income populations by 61%, and provide access to more than 70 healthcare facilities and 83 grocery stores.

Free Rides to Vote

It is estimated that over 15 million people were registered but didn't vote in 2016 because of transportation issues. Lyft has committed to provide 50% off rides across the country, and free rides to underserved communities that face significant obstacles to transportation.

Across the country, Lyft will give away 50% off promo codes with partners that encourage voter turnout. Organizations such as,Vote.org, Nonprofit Vote, TurboVote and more will help distribute codes to those who need them. There will also be a product integration to help passengers find their polling location.

For underserved communities, free rides will be provided through nonpartisan, nonprofit partners, including Voto Latino, local Urban League affiliates, and the National Federation of the Blind.

Burnin' Down The House



This chapter is about a big problem that our community faced: dealing with our old and decaying houses. Most of you know where my dad and uncle live. For those who don't, they live on Gaskill Street, in one of the three houses built by Habitat for Humanity.

I want to start with an anecdote from dad and Marshal's time. There were originally four houses on the lots that the three Habitat houses are on now. Which meant,

that like most houses in Cabbagetown, they were extremely close.

I remember when I was growing up there, folks would joke that if one house caught fire, the entire neighborhood would burn down. From a story dad and Marshal always tell, it seems that *almost* happened. Turns out, the house closest to Berean caught

on fire. One by one the adjacent houses caught fire, until they reached the house that sat where my dad's house is now. Which coincidentally was the house owned by my dad's cousin.

What does that have to do with CNIA in the 90's? Well, the neighborhood was facing an overwhelming amount of derelict, abandoned houses. Some owned by old-timers that had

moved away or long since passed. These houses were horrible. Some of them were so dangerous that I would walk into the street instead of passing too close to them. Some of the houses actually had homeless and drug heads sleeping in them at night, some with fires burning to keep warm.

It's amazing that my fears of Cabbagetown burning down didn't come true. Most of the houses were owned by slumlords – folks that owned and rented several properties in the neighborhood. Early on – Dan, Larry Camp, Pam Ahern and my mom brought up the issue at a CNIA meeting. They proposed that the neighborhood group put pressure on the owners of the properties. The vote was almost unanimous – encourage

the owners to either renovate, demolish and rebuild, or sell to someone who would.

With the green light, they went full speed ahead. All the local news stations sent crews to investigate and show everyone just how bad things were. It also helped that the group had a close relationship with the police. One by one the houses were either demolished, or renovated. As i mentioned in previous articles, CNIA started gathering petition signatures to compel the City of Atlanta to sue *CSX* to do what they had managed to get the other slumlords to do – Renovate the mill or sell it to someone who would.

As I previously noted, my memory isn't what it used to be, so I did some online research for my articles. I was amazed at the things that were left out. For example, the five-alarm fire at the mill that made national headlines. It's true that the heroics of the firefighters that day were straight out of a big budget Hollywood

disaster flick. And while the spotlight was on the mill and the heroes in uniform that day, they missed another bigger story.

The story of how finally after years of work and sacrifice, the old-time and newbie residents banned together to keep my nightmare from coming true. The wind was horrible the day of the big fire. Embers were

floating through the air, almost like a constant dusting of ash and fire particles – some landing on the roofs of houses in the neighborhood. One by one, residents pulled out their garden hoses. They put out the embers before they caught fire, put out small fires and wet down everything to prevent the fire from spreading.

I couldn't help but tear up – finally after almost a decade, despite all our differences, neighbors showed that when it came down to it, we were all just people who were trying to survive in a wild and crazy world. And now you know why the classic *Talking Heads* tune comes to mind when I think of all of the housing issues we tackled back then. *Hold tight! The party's nowhere near over!*

Even with his accessible tunes getting commercial success, Scott has a catalog of deeper, darker, and more eloquent story-songs that will hold your attention for as long as he plays them. Good stuff here, seriously good.

Sun. Sept. 23 Tannahill Weavers @ Red Light Café – My Scottish roots are deep (Glasgow born),

and my love for the traditional music of the Highlands is bona fide. Authenticity is essential, and The Weavers perfectly capture the richness and diversity of the Scottish sound. From whirling instrumental reels to gothic murder/death ballads, the Scots knew how to craft a song, aye.

Fri. Sept 28th and Sat. Sept. 29th Drive By Truckers @ Variety Playhouse – If any band has redefined Southern Rock music in the 21st Century, it has to be the DBT's. Born out of their love for hard rockers like Judas Priest and Lynyrd Skynyrd, nurtured in the Muscle Shoals area of Alabama (where the quintessential swamp music sound was invented), and fueled by the travesties of American politics and popular culture, the DBT's are the voice of the generation, whether you like what they say or not.

Social Emotional Learning at Parkside

In its third year of implementing Social Emotional Learning (SEL), Parkside Elementary is intensifying its focus this year on making the SEL program as strong as possible, according to Clara Green, Parkside's SEL Coach.

All Parkside staff members start each day with a protected time in the schedule when, not only are homeroom teachers solely focused on SEL, but every teacher who does not have a homeroom – from PE coaches to paraprofessionals – joins an assigned class to also build community with students. "Teachers utilize both community gatherings and a specially designed curriculum to teach and build the SEL competencies of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making," explained Green.

In the spring, teachers will also teach a Child Protection Unit and Ms. Tracie Brown, Parkside's school counselor, will teach the Bullying Prevention Unit.

This year Parkside is also actively engaged with the SEL initiative in which all pre-K through second grade classrooms will receive "peace corner kits." A result of a grant secured by the school's GO Team, peace corners will be designated spaces within the classroom filled with sensory items that students can visit when they're experiencing strong emotions and want to practice self-regulation strategies. The GO Team also approved a budget that allowed for Parkside to hire its own part-time SEL coach, Ms. Green.

"We are very happy with how we've progressed," said Parkside Principal Foster. "Now the staff is working tirelessly to get families more involved with SEL. From sending home activities for students and adults to complete together, to facilitating trainings for parents, we hope to build the capacity of families to be SEL advocates, both at home and within the community."

In addition to Social Emotional Learning, Parkside Elementary is an International Baccalaureate (IB) candidate school offering Gifted and Talented, Special Education, and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), plus art, music, band and garden learning classes as part of its student-focused, core curriculum. A Title 1 school in the Jackson Cluster of Atlanta Public Schools, Parkside serves the Grant Park, Summerhill, Boulevard Heights, Ormewood Park, Woodland Hills, Glenwood Park and Cabbagetown neighborhoods.
