7:02p: Meeting Begins

Welcome & Introductions - Marinangeles Gutierrez, CNIA President Atlanta Police Department Updates

Some vehicle crime but it's mostly outside of Ctown. Hoping that will go down as school goes back in session. Burglaries but not residential, mostly restaurants and bars. Large concentration of crimes is mostly in the memorial area – car thefts and car break-ins.

Review and Approval of July Minutes: Approved! Cabbagetown Initiative (CI) – Lauren Appel, CI Representative Seeking Volunteers/New Members - passion for parks? Please join!

Want to help with Chomp! Join!

Chomp & Stomp: Need volunteers - next meeting tomorrow. On track for artist applications and individual chili applications. If you have an interest in the planning side of things please join.

Park Pride Grant – applying to help fix up the amphitheater. Only outlet is in the mud pit - want to build up the area. The grant would help with flooding and erosion but is mostly capital improvement; just submitted the letter of improvement. Q: How much is it? A: it's a matching grant but we're hoping for \$100,000. It could be higher if we can raise funds. They'll match up to \$150,000.

City of Atlanta Council Person Liliana Bakhtiari's office: Parker Short

Q: Water fountains back on? A: We'll work on it!

CI meeting is on Thursday - please come!

No longer moving forward with Carroll street closure. Going to work on making it safer for pedestrians in some other way. On August 18th Liliana will be doing Coffee with the Council Member at 1p - come talk. Council unanimously approved Atlanta's FY 24 budget, and within it was able to secure wage increases for the City's Code Enforcement Officers as well as retention bonuses for E-911 operators. Continue city's abortion fund - continue to protect women's right to choose. Heat vulnerability survey has been made public. It will act as a road map for how to alleviate heat in the future. City affordable housing bill is fully funded. Working to end homelessness in the city of Atlanta Q: Old Fourth Ward, south on Boulevard crossing over Edgewood traffic light - right lane must turn right - traffic needs to be addressed. Few people turn right and if they didn't go straight from that lane traffic would worse. A: Reach out to Pat Husbands and DOT through email so he can address that. Q: Will the Carroll Street changes be insular with the city or will the community be involved? Businesses have a lot of great ideas. A: We don't know exactly what the process will look like. It's gone back

to DOT but we will try to get community engagement. Comment:

Would like to have feedback from the businesses. They did not feel engaged before. A: Will talk to staff and make a robust effort to

include y'all. Q: Are other neighborhoods trying street closures? A:

Not sure, but you can look up all of DOT's projects on their website.

Go to the DOT website for more information. Beltline is having a lot of meetings. Thursday they will have a meeting to finalize the last section by Bill Kennedy that will take you all the way to the West Side. Reynoldstown Farmers Market on Sundays. If you can make it it's 1-4p.

Carroll Street One-Week Closure: over the last month and a half we've had a lot of meetings and input and a working group section with the businesseses. There was a lot of discussion and information collected. There were a lot of specific questions about deliveries, sanitation, what happens next, will this solve the safety on the street? Marina collected the questions and presented them to the City Council office and they were unable to give responses. They realized more planning was required. Feedback asked for more intentionality but agreed that Carroll Street does not work as it is. We would like to be included with the city's discussion. Q: Can we still submit ideas? A: We haven't heard a final from them but they're going to consider and go back to the drawing board. Marina is willing to have these conversations with the community and invest the time. Q: Can we establish a deadline with the city to hear back? A: The next meeting we're trying to get them to come in-person. We may have to move the meeting to a Wednesday so they can come. (Tentatively September 13th)

NPU-N. NPU U - At NPUatlanta.org you can take courses and learn about Atlanta specific things like the Atlanta city design course. Full course listings on the website. Voted on liquor licenses - all were approved. Approved requests for festivals - Candler park festival, Little 5 Magic Carnival Festival, Spring festival on Ponce. Ponce is not engaging with their neighborhood and not cleaning up so we voted to not approve that festival. Forward Warrior!! and Chomp and Stomp approved. Looking for folks to support CNIA. Need president and vice president. Comms person with social media and calendar. Transportation committee needs someone. Meeting first Thursday of the month - very interesting stuff! Money to move around! There will be traffic calming in the 'hood and pothole filling. Working on bike lanes. Q: Do they have to live in the 'hood to join a committee? A: We will check the bylaws.

Financial Report - Jack Cunningham, Treasurer. No events to report Kaftans and Cocktails payments went through - it was very successful! Karen Kane is owed a reimbursement for last month's movie. Tour of Homes - payment link is live. We have slightly raised the price - purchase in advance to save money. Miss Bertha - community support. We've received the funds and are ready to write the check to the landscaper to help her. We received annual renewal for insurance - we approved the three year contract locking in our price. THE LIGHTS GO OUT ON THE INCANDESCENT LIGHT BULB

Thomas Edison patented the incandescent light bulb waaaay back in the late 1800s. It only took technology 130 years to render that invention obsolete. With little notice, shoppers in the United States are no longer able to purchase most incandescent bulbs. Taking their place are LED (light emitting diodes) lights, which – love them or hate them – have already transformed America's energy landscape.

They've driven down electricity demand in American homes, saving people money. LEDs have also helped lower the nation's emissions of greenhouse gases, which warm the planet and are a major cause of climate change.

"Going from an incandescent to an LED is like replacing a car that gets 25mpg with another one that gets 130mpg," said Lucas Davis, an energy economist at the University of California, Berkeley.

The cost savings will come as a boost particularly to lower-income households, which spend a larger proportion of their income on utilities. According to the Energy Department, over the next three decades, LEDs will cut carbon dioxide emissions by 222 million metric tons. LED light bulbs last up to 50 times longer than their incandescent counterparts. All this progress took over a decade of legislative work. Next up is compact fluorescent lights.



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C'town Chows: Reynoldstown Chows?



Cabbagetown's sister, Reynoldstown, has seen quite a few new restaurant openings this summer, so let's take a look at what they've got cooking up just a few blocks away.

Over on Wylie Street where the former Stein Steel building resided, you'll find **Breaker Breaker** – the new trucker-beachside-style establishment. From the owners of beloved burger joint **Grindhouse House Killer Burgers**, Breaker Breaker offers something unique and

nostalgic to the neighborhood. From a quaint diner look-and-feel interior to a welcoming outdoor patio that stretches down the beltline, this spot is perfect for a Friday night catch up with pals, a casual weekday lunch or just chatting over some drinks.

As we placed our order at the walk-up counter and waited for our food, we ordered some drinks around back at the bar. It was a humid 90-something degree Friday evening, so we really needed something cold to take the edge off. We ordered the Mucho Nada (White Claw mango vodka, mango puree, chamoy + tajin rim) and Vaya

con Dios (tanteo habanero tequila, passion fruit liqueur + lime juice). Both were super very tasty and surely hit the spot.

As for bites, we wanted to explore what the menu had to offer. For starters, we ordered *Dockside Poutine* (fries, cajun gravy, crab + cheese curds), *Cabbage and Crispy Rice Salad* (carrot, avocado, orange, mint, cilantro, basil, toasted pumpkin seeds + vinaigrette) and *Fried "Calamari"* (hearts of palm, enoki mushroom, onion, jalapeno, sweet chili sauce). The gravy on the poutine was perfectly seasoned, the crab was aplenty and the fries themselves were delectable and curved in shape – making them the perfect vehicle to scoop up all that goodness. The salad offered the ideal balance in flavor to the savory poutine as it was citrusy, herbaceous and refreshing. The vegetarian play on calamari was surprisingly just as satisfying as the real thing – love when that happens!

As for the main dish, we split up the *Shrimp Po-Boy* (shredded lettuce, tomato, pickles, tartar sauce, cocktail sauce). Usually, if we get a similar dish anywhere else in Atlanta (or even at the beach for that matter), the shrimp is tiny, the batter isn't flavorful


and the sandwich ends up being disappointing. Well, quite the opposite with this sandwich! The shrimp were quite large, the batter was well-seasoned and didn't fall off the shrimp, and the accounterments perfectly complemented each bite.

Needless to say, we were really impressed by this new joint and expect to see it packed out the rest of the summer and into the fall when the much-needed patio weather comes back. After we stuffed our faces, we wanted to check out another Reynoldstown newbie for a nightcap – *Whoopsies!* And yes, that's the name of this new spot, not us being embarrassed about getting more to drink after we were already full from a big meal.

Whoopsies is a quaint, intimate, cozy cocktail bar. They also serve up more than just cocktails with their elevated cafeteria-style plates – which we're looking forward to trying another time. I ordered a glass of Pinot Noir and Jake ordered the nightly special cocktail – but he can't remember what it was (sigh), although he does remember it being electric blue in color and quite boozy (enough said!). To top off the evening, we ordered a pecan pie with loads of homemade whipped cream, which was to die for.

Reynoldstown is surely churning out some cool new spots over there, and lucky for us Cabbageheads, we're just a hop and a skip away.



One of our most wonderful and thoughtful Cabbageheads is Violet Rebel Von Hanna. Violet – along with her mom – recently spoke passionately before the Atlanta City Council at City Hall, in defense of the Weelaunee Forest in southeast Atlanta.

Violet dreams of playing in the trees, cuddling with squirrels, and flying with birds. And she advocates for the preservation of forests. Now it seems the universe is more in tune with Violet.

Tiny Forests or Miyawaki Forests, are small scale densely planted native urban forests. These forests have been successfully grown on private properties in Japan and elsewhere for more than forty years. The rest of the world is catching on. Tiny forests have been planted across Europe, in Africa, throughout Asia and in South America, Russia, India, and the Middle East. And now, the United States is finally coming around... thanks in part to souls like Violet.

Tiny Forests can grow as quickly as ten times the speed of conventional tree plantations, enabling them to support more birds, animals, and insects, and they sequester more carbon, while requiring no weeding or watering after the first three years. They help lower temperatures in places where pavement, buildings, and concrete surfaces absorb and retain heat from the sun.

Keep doing what you're doing Violet Rebel. The universe is listening.

FLANT TO ENJOY THE CHARM OF GOLDFINCHES



Word lovers and bird lovers are aware of the charm of goldfinches. Bird lovers know how beautiful these small, yellow birds are. They may be amused at the acrobatics of them perching daintily of the heads of spiny thistles or hanging topsy-turvy feasting on the seeds of sunflowers. Word lovers know that a group of goldfinches isn't simply called a flock; it is called a "charm." There is no magic to attracting these charming birds to your garden, however. They readily come to feeders

or to plants offering tasty seeds.

The goldfinch found here is properly called the American goldfinch, to distinguish from other species of goldfinches. The male American goldfinch is bright yellow with a small, black cap. Its wings and tail are black and white. The female is a duller olive yellow and lacks the black cap. In winter the male resembles the female. The birds have a distinctive warbling call that sounds like they are joyously chattering to one another and an undulating flight pattern that may make you think they are simply flying for fun rather than to get from one place to the next.

If you have a bird feeder, you may already know how fond goldfinches are of thistle and sunflower seed, but you don't have to put up a feeder to attract these beauties; you can plant things for them to eat.

Annual sunflowers are a favorite. Choose the small-headed types instead of the ones with the mammoth heads. The small seeds are easier for the goldfinches to eat and the numerous flowers of the small-headed types make them more attractive. Sunflowers are easy to grow and need to be sown in the spring.

Mexican sunflowers (tithonia), cosmos, zinnias and marigolds are on the goldfinch's menu and are also sown in the spring. The sulfur cosmos with its gold and orange flowers has naturalized in parts of Cabbagetown and re-seeds itself every year. Be less stringent about removing the spent blossoms of all these annuals in late summer so there will be plenty of seed for the goldfinches to eat.


Purple coneflowers and coreopsis are two native perennials whose seed goldfinches feed on, especially the purple coneflower. These can be planted in the fall or in the spring. The regular Eastern purple coneflower (Echinacea purpurea) is preferable to the newer hybrids of various colors.

If you need an excuse to leave dandelions in your lawn, look no further. The seeds of dandelion are another goldfinch favorite. Our native red maple, tulip poplar, elms, river birch and sweet gum are a few of the trees goldfinches use as food sources. While these may be too big for some of our gardens we can encourage others to plant or preserve them instead of planting exotic trees.

Letter from GDOT received on August 4th - street diet for Memorial Drive to ease traffic. We can write a letter within 30 days to ask how it's going to affect traffic in our 'hood and how can we be invited to give input. Motion to write a letter - seconded. Supporting the APC (Atlanta Preservation Center) Inman Park lawsuit against the City. 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

CABBAGETOWN SPECIAL MEETING

4:35p meeting begins. Introductions - Marinangeles Gutierrez Atlanta Preservation Center wants to know if we're willing to sign on to the Amicus Brief. Draft letter has been expanded with more background information and presents arguments in a clear way

Synopsis - Jacob Elsas

In February UDC (Urban Design Commission) started construction on a very large development in Inman Park that overlooked established municipal codes and guidelines. (Number of floors, set backs, feet away from homes.) There are ramifications with this decision that could affect every historic neighborhood in Atlanta. UDC can rewrite code without going through procedures or neighborhood groups - they've given themselves extensive power. Inman Park is fighting back through legal action. Atlanta Preservation Center is hoping other neighborhoods will support them.

Will there be a long term effect or is this the only time they'll do this? Can we question UDC's action? UDC's guorum is set at 5 people since they have so few members. 3 people have a lot of power. Discussion before the vote:

Q: What have other districts done? A: In the email chain they've said they support but don't know if it's official. We've chosen to discuss within our neighborhood. Neighbors speak out in support of the amicus brief.

Q: Can you explain the downside of sitting on the sidelines? A: There's more power in numbers. If all the historic neighborhoods are unified it shows the city that we are concerned. If Cabbagetown continues to stay on the sidelines, perhaps people would look at us as the neighborhood that doesn't care. We are the first landmark district in the city: people see us as having very strong guidelines and we shouldn't take them for granted. If this thing in Inman Park is allowed it sets a bad precedent for future building in Cabbagetown.

Concern is voiced over backlash and creating an antagonizing relationship with the UDC. Are other people crossing this line with us? Perhaps we could send a follow up letter to UDC. Do we want to say we won't support until more neighborhoods are supporting so we can be a unified front?

Motion to support the amicus brief under the conditions that at least 50% of neighborhoods also support it and the HPLU will write a follow up letter to staff and commissioners.

Amendment: Do we want to change it to full support with no conditions? Motion withdrawn.

Motion to support Amicus Brief under the conditions that a follow-up letter is sent to UDC and there are at least two other neighborhoods supporting the brief. Eight in favor. Motion passed.

103,000 + SIGNATURES Cop City Petition Under Scrutiny


Organizers of the "Stop Cop City" petition now plan to submit the 103,000+ signatures on September 22nd. In response, City Hall will endeavor to make sure at least two-thirds of the signatures are valid by manually checking against the state voter registration rolls. The names must correspond to a uniquely qualified Atlanta voter and the signatures must match. That could include contacting signees with questionable signatures by mail or phone.

While this process, might be consistent with written city policy, few locals can recall a recent precedent that garnered such scrutiny. A coalition of more than two dozen activist groups called the city's process subjective and "shameful."

The city will have 50 days to confirm the list has enough qualifying signatures of registered voters and present the petition to the City Council. That timeline leaves little chance that the issue will appear on this November's ballot, even if enough signatures are confirmed. The next opportunity for a public vote would likely occur during next spring's primary election.

"Groups that want a vote on the police and firefighter facility should gather five times more signatures than they're supposed to need, and even then there would be no quarantee the petition would be approved by the city," says Bryan Sells, a voting rights attorney.
