CRSP March Madness Membership Drive

In less than two years, the Cabbagetown-Reynoldstown Security Patrol has gained the support of two neighborhoods, over 130 households, and 13 businesses. As membership has increased, CRSP has seen substantially fewer crimes and some notable arrests by its officers. But in recent years, some of the most troublesome intown crime has occurred in the summer – When school is out, days are longer, and there are more people on the streets.

You can make C-town and R-town safer this summer by becoming a member, or encouraging a neighbor to join Cabbagetown-Reynoldstown Security Patrol.

Thanks to \$1,400 in additional donations from current members, for every new member that joins between now and April 15th, the matching committee will donate at least \$140 in matching funds.

All funds from new memberships and matching funds will be used to increase coverage this summer. CRSP's goal is to gain 10 new members by April 15th. This would mean about 110 hours of additional coverage this summer - about 9 extra hours per week.

Meeting called to order at 7:07p

- 1. Valencia Hudson, City of Atlanta Liaison for Natalyn Archibong
- She is here to take care of lights, potholes, garbage cans, and anything public safety, email her at *narchibong@atlanta.gov*. Edgewood and J Wesley Dobbs have fenced in the sidewalk during construction creating difficulty walking safely in that area she will look into it. Neighbor curious about a "do not enter" sign at Powell requested last month; she reported it is in the works. Neighbor suggested a yield to oncoming cars sign for Carroll Street, she will see if that is a possibility. Berean has wrong way traffic from Pickett, would like a do not enter sign there as well.
- 2. Monica and Katherine Horticulturalists that are taking over the garden lot at Berean and Pickett. Will raise chickens and have a garden. They plan to clean up and maintain the lot. - 4. Treasurers report Lyn for Karin, the wonderful food is from 97 Estoria, thanks Luis! After check for printing and receiving ad revenue, \$6,155.15 ending balance in the bank.
- 5. APD Report Sgt. Thomas was present to speak with the community. Neighbor asked about suspicious activity he saw in one of the stairwells at BLVD tunnel, is there a number to call? If you see something call 911.
- 6. Historic Preservation Jared Serwer HP can't make it tonight. Lyn was at the HP meeting and the owner and architect are here to speak to us tonight. HP approved the new roof subject to any additional UDC staff recommendations. Property is a Savannah Street house from 1904, and the owner has lived there since 1997. He will be making an addition to expand the home to a 3/2. House is one story with a steep roof; plan is to build out the attic space. Staff report conditions is clarify the setbacks for other houses and adding a deck on the side and rail shouldn't rise above the fence. What is the benefit to us if we don't own the building? City wants to get rid of the building it isn't unlikely they will sell it at the end of our lease. If you want to be involved, talk to Lynne. It will be an informal email group.
- 10. BLVD TUNNEL Ben updated us on the Living Walls plan. The painting will take place in April, and The Stacks will allow the party to come through to Carroll Street. Artist is NY based Momo. City council has the proposed artist sketches for approval. Part of the mural preparation is the city pressure washing, LW will prime the walls. LW is looking for volunteers for cleanup and asking for local businesses to help out for the street event. All the money raised will go towards security cameras in the Tunnel. See BLVDTUNL.com
- 11. NPU-N John Neighborhood planning unit meetings are the third Thursday and open to the public. March 17th is fix a leak week. People over 65 can get a discount on city waste services. Lauren Clayton is our legal contact to speak to about vacant property and code enforcement. Don't forget to register your alarm at crywolf.us/oss/atlantaga. New 12k sq ft project was approved behind Druid Hills Church. It will be 8k sq ft of retail and 4k sq ft of restaurant space. Project important because parking is disappearing for businesses that had an offsite parking lease. They approved Candler Park movie nights and the Spring Festival on Ponce. Traffic calming proposed around Lake and Elizabeth was approved, there will be a public hearing March 18th.

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
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Letting go

What is a community, anyway?

I'm not a native of this city. I'm a transplant. I came to Atlanta from elsewhere in the southeast to go to school. I ended up staying because I couldn't get out of college, I couldn't manage to graduate yet. I got a couple of awful jobs in town to pay for part time enrollment, and when it was over I just didn't quit that last job. And then I had a job that I did like. So I stayed, long after those college friends had gone.

I'm not a native of this community. I've been kicking around all over Atlanta for years, mostly finding places I don't like. I lived in campus dorm rooms. I lived in a rundown "luxury apartment" complex over by where the big *Wal-Mart* complex is now on Howell Mill. I lived up in Sandy Springs in a similar joint. I'm a bit out of place where I live, too. I've come in late. I'm not a native of my floor in H building, I mean. Some of my neighbors have been here for ages.

And we all inhabit the space left by an older community, a community that ours grew up inside and alongside of as it aged away. Not all of it has been let go, but soon enough it will be. And then ours will slowly be let go in the long run, too, in one way or another.

Even to be here, transplants like myself - like most of the folks in our little neighborhood - had to let something else go. I've left some bit of space open for someone else back in Mississippi, and I don't know - maybe somebody will pick it up for me someday. They can have it, too.

And I mean no disrespect by that, because it's not mine anymore. If somebody out there is tired of the neighbors knowing who they are, tired of not having enough space, tired of having to deal with the hell that can be living with other people, if they'd like some peace and quiet and hard-earned solitude, then they should go right on ahead. There is a cozy spot that I have left for them.

As I write this, it's past midnight. The neighbors are being a little louder than I might prefer. I know who they are, and I do not plan on complaining. That does not necessarily make me a good neighbor, but it does make me this: A neighbor who does not complain. And just think: I could move elsewhere in the city, or even back home, and revert to being nobody at all.

Restaurant review BTI update

Agave has been a major pillar of Cabbagetown for 14 years, and they continue to serve up delicious Southwestern cuisine and mouthwatering margaritas seven nights a week.

Aside from being a great neighbor that supports our community over and over again, Agave actually serves up some of the city's most unique culinary creations. Much of their food is based on flavor profiles from New Mexico, where founder

and Executive Chef, Jack Sobel, was raised. In particular, the Hatch Green Chile plays a starring role in many of their dishes.

14 years after opening, several of the original entrees are still on the menu; a testament to their cult following amongst loyal customers who can't get enough. Starters like the Guajillo Mussels, the Chicken Poblano Soup, Chile & Lime Fish Tacos, Smoked Chicken & Hatch Green Chile Quesadillas, and the Ceviche Martini are favorites.

Dinner entrees like their famous Cayenne Fried Chicken, Chile Seared Jumbo Diver Sea Scallops, New Mexican Rack of Lamb, and Tenderloin Medallions are hard to resist. And on a cold winter night, the Southwestern Burrito & Stew is an excellent combination to fill you up while warming you up at the same time.

Don't forget to finish things off with one of the decadent desserts. Personal favorites include the Belgian Chocolate Mousse and the Spicy Peanut Butter Mousse Pie, but the Banana Dark Chocolate Ganache Cheesecake is pretty darned good, too.

A few things you might not know:

- 1. Agave has a dedicated vegetarian menu! But you have to ask for it. Check out the veggie burrito, enchiladas, or guesadillas as standby options, but be sure you try the Rigatoni Green Chile Vodka Pasta to spice things up a little.
- 2. The teguila selection is one of the most extensive you'll find, anywhere. If you're unfamiliar with the nuances of tequila, belly up to the bar when Lisa is bartending and let her guide you through the menu. To get the full effect, sip on a good Anejo (tequila that's been aged) as an after-dinner treat.
- 3. All seafood is brought in fresh daily. There are no freezers (or microwaves) on the property, so you can be sure you're getting the freshest food possible.
- 4. The Hatch Green Chile & Red Chile found in most of Agave's food is shipped in directly from New Mexico each week.
- 5. A few times a year, Agave hosts pre-fixe teguila dinners, which are not to be missed, seriously.
- 6. Appetizers are 2-for-1 at the bar nightly from 5-7p! Stop in to see what Zagat, Sunday Paper, Creative Loafing, Jezebel and many others have been raving about for over a decade. But be sure to call ahead for a reservation - the word is definitely out!


We've been gathering funds from here and there for the \$10,500 camera that will offer 24-hour surveillance over about threeguarters of both stairwells. It is linked directly to the Atlanta Police Department and offers infrared vision at night to compensate for the lack of lighting.

I have presented CNIA with a proposal that covers all of these items but want to make sure it does what the community needs so please send me any input you may have. I believe I have created a very concise and easy to use website.

The Cabbagtown Pet Registry would have the following:
Online registration form
Searchable databases dog/cat
Violet Alert – Email Blast for lost pets
Local Resources
Pet Classifieds
Adoption Center

The registries are arranged by large, small and mixed breeds for dogs and by color/markings for cats. So if you find a lost animal you simply go to the appropriate registry and begin searching by size/breed.

Each breed has a photo and description of what a typical animal of that breed would look like and the number of registrations of that breed in our registry. When you find the pets registration you will be provided with the owners contact information, a picture of the pet, as well as all the specific information pertaining to that animal.

The "Violet Alert" is like an "Amber Alert" but for pets. If your pet decides to go off on an adventure you go onto the website and click the "Activate Violet Alert" tab and your registration is automatically emailed to every person in our database so that the entire neighborhood can help you locate your best friend. No more calling 20 different people to say Rover ran away again!

Community resources, events and a classified section with pet specific services will also be available on the website. In addition, a local rescue group will be providing a number of adoptable dogs and cats if you are looking to increase your family.

The costs are rather small considering the benefits, the site would cost \$4.99 a month, and there would be a one-time charge for the website itself. A small registration fee would offset the costs of the project.



Krog update

Construction activity in Inman Park next to the Beltline is for a new parking deck that will serve future apartments, the Stove Works office complex and *Krog Street Market*, an official confirmed Monday.

Krog Street Market developers Paces Properties are building the deck to absorb of an influx of traffic when the much-anticipated project opens, which is now expected to happen in late July, spokeswoman Tara Murphy told Curbed Atlanta.

Paces sold an adjacent three-acre lot where they'd planned to build a Beltline-connected multifamily project. Trammel Crow Residential will now build the 222-unit "Alexan Krog Street" apartments, which will wrap the parking deck and nearly conceal it from view, Murphy said. Until then, the deck will serve office workers, Rathbun's, Krog Bar and will house overflow parking from the 30,000 square-foot marketplace at night.

One selling point, Tramwell Crow officials hope, will be the apartment project's hundreds of feet of Beltline frontage. Beltline officials are working with the developer on a suitable link between the projects. Otherwise, Beltline patrons will be able to access the Eastside Trail via ramps at the rebuilt Edgewood Avenue bridge, pending its completion.

A Trammel Crow press release describes Alexan Krog Street as "a mix of one bedroom and two bedroom units with high-end finishes, including: stainless steel appliances, full size side-by-side refrigerators, granite countertops, 42" cabinets, washer/dryers in every unit, and hardwood flooring.

"The on-site amenities look like they'll meet the status quo for Atlanta's new apartment wave — and that means necessities like a dog wash, bike repair shop, large clubhouse and resort-style pool. Some other added perks sound pretty cool: an outdoor rooftop patio, bocce court and ... wait for it ... outdoor hammock garden.

Sean Fahie's in the middle of a serious decision that will impact our forthcoming tour of Cabbagetown and Reynoldstown. "Should I bring the bottle, too, or just the flask?" he asks.

The visual artist, designer, writer, and Cabbagetown resident doesn't like to trek the terrain of his neighborhood without infusing his bloodstream with good spirits. Today's drink of choice is the Kraken rum. It's a gorgeous day and we're heading out of Fahie's crib near the intersection of Boulevard and Reinhardt Street. On foot, we have two specific missions: walk to Speakerfoxxx's house in Reynoldstown and find the area's unofficial mayor, *Mr. Grumpy*.

While the journey starts on narrow Carroll Street, home to the popular cafe of the same name, *Village Pizza*, a recently Kickstarted *Little's Food Store*, *Milltown Tavern*, *Memorial Tattoo*, *Agave*, and more, Sean is quick to point out that it's the people who make this 'hood.

"I love Cabbagetown because of its community," says Fahie, a resident going back four years to his days of living around the corner from the late Ria Pell's digs on Tye Street. "The people make the neighborhood."

And it seems as though those people are always out in droves, beautiful weather permitting. We run into photographer Vek Neal, who lives above *Graveside Tattoo* and is readying for a bike ride that will include other local artists such as Ruby Velle (sans her band *The Soulphonics*) and muralist Brandon Sadler.

The cast of Cabbagetown characters isn't complete without a mention of Mr. Grumpy, a resident for more than twenty-five years. To the Cabbagetown outsider, little is known about the man who drives around in a golf cart. His backyard parties in the spring and summer are the stuff of legend, Fahie says.

A few Kraken swigs, and a mile or so later, we're in front of Mr. Grumpy's house on Powell Street when we hear the voice. "Free books!" In a white pickup truck near his driveway littered with folk art and guarded by two giant Great Danes, Mr. Grumpy motions to the cardboard boxes full of paperbacks.

"Do you mind if we get a photo of you?" Fahie asks.

"No nudes," Mr. Grumpy tells us. "Maybe this will help me find a new boyfriend."

Fair enough.

Mr. Grumpy mentions that members of *Black Lips* live nearby, and that Bertha, the lady with the "Coca-Cola house" (she's become famous for her extensive memorabilia collection), lives around the corner on Berean Avenue.

"Cabbagetown is the best neighborhood — hands down. There isn't an artist here I don't know," he says.

A few blocks away in Reynoldstown, we find Speakerfoxxx at home. In one of the rare moments of her week when she's not spinning records or doing hair, the Dope Girl is in her yard, patching up her old Toyota.

She tells us to hop in her car, where Shawty Lo's "Atlanta, GA" is the background music for a quick ride before we stop for hot toddies at ParkGrounds coffee shop.

Speakerfoxxx remembers first discovering Reynoldstown at 17 when she came to see Pell. Now she calls the area home and is still in love with the early 20th century shotgun houses interspersed with newly built, more modern homes.

"Reynoldstown doesn't fit in with the rest of the surrounding neighborhoods, it's a little broken down, a little forgotten," she says. "That's why I like it."




