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Boosting Your Home security

This month we'll share some tips for boosting home security, as well as detailed information about the best way to prevent door kick-ins, courtesy of Duncan Cottrell, *The Entry Enforcer*, 404.289.6960.

Kicking in doors is the main way burglars get into a house. The force typically shatters the wood of the door jamb, although sometimes the door itself breaks (especially if it's a fiberglass door), and less often the hinge side is kicked in.

There are three ways to prevent this:

1: Reinforce the door jamb, hinges, and door lock area with steel hardware. This is the least obtrusive way and is my specialty.

2: Install a security storm door (Larson & Anderson both make one of these special doors). This serves two purposes, though it's more expensive. As a handyman, I can do this.

3: Install a wrought iron "burglar bar door." I have installed several of these for clients, particularly on back doors where looks aren't as important. A double burglar bar door is available for double/French doors.

Although double doors are more difficult to secure, I reinforce them effectively by stabilizing the stationary door with forceresisting hardware top & bottom and installing a "jamb shield" on its edge to prevent wood breakage at the deadbolt & knob.

The reinforcement hardware are visible on my website: *entryenforcer.com.* I'm happy to offer a 10% discount if multiple doors are reinforced on the same day.

If folks also need other home repair or home improvement work, I'm a full service handyman, licensed and insured. Some of the other security measures I do for people include installing motion-activated floodlights, window security film on glass doors & windows, and installing bars on windows.

Historic Preservation/Land Use - Matt Wise

Memorial Drive Improvement – In attendance to give info. More approval in the future. Andrew Rutledge originally designed the project. Set dormant for past 5 years. Looking to build townhomes on property frontage. 1 parking space is required per unit. The developer will do 1 parking space per bedroom. 27 residential units and 5 townhomes on Estoria. Matt mentioned variances. Parking is the biggest issue. The developer moved the parking to the top of the building. Currently the building is within height variance with the exception of the elevator core. A citizen asked about reapplication for variance and mentioned that there are different requirements for parking for residential and commercial. Permits need to be taken out for parking count for the necessary requirements. All business parking would be on-street parking. A citizen asked about the dumpster and where the delivery access is. Andrew said the dumpster is not in the correct space on the drawing, it will be in the middle of the property. The retail is going to start in July. 

This was bad. An amends needed to be made, so I went over to Jess, apologized, and volunteered.





Old School: Ben Dewberry's Final Run

"Ben Dewberry was a brave engineer".

That's the first line in a song called "Ben Dewberry's final run." It was written in 1927 by Blind Andy Jenkins, a Methodist preacher.

Ben Dewberry was a locomotive engineer on the good ol' Southern Railroad. One fateful August day in 1908, Ben was at the throttle of old number 38 headed north out of Atlanta, pulling a string of passenger cars. Beside him was his fireman, Mayson Wadkins.

They were right on schedule as they rounded a slight curve just about a mile south of Buford. That's when the wheels of ol' number

38 struck something. Turned out it was a big bolt that had been intentionally placed on the track. That bolt tipped the engine and Ben and Mayson struggled to try to right her.

Both men stayed at the controls in order to keep the passenger cars on the track. And they succeeded. But they couldn't save the engine. It jumped the rails and tipped on over on its side with Ben and Mayson still in the cab.

The boiler split open and sprayed the two with scalding hot steam from head to foot. Both perished.

But they had managed to keep

all the cars upright and not a single passenger was injured. Ben managed to stay alive long enough for his wife, Effie, to get to the scene and give him a goodbye kiss.


Ben was one of the most popular of all the engineers on the line. He loved kids and the kids loved him. It was not unusual for dozens of

boys and girls to line the track when Ben came thundering by just to get a wave from him. Sometimes Ben would bring along a big sack of apples and toss them out the window to the kids.

The song I referred to was recorded by several well-known artists. The first was Jimmie Rodgers in the late 1920s. Johnny Cash and Hank Snow did later versions. This was a time when "train wreck songs" were very popular, the most notable being "The Wreck of Old 97."

Here's the final verse of the song:

The big locomotive leaped from the rail. Ben never lived to tell that awful tale. His life was ended and his work was done When Ben Dewberry made his final run.

An investigation found that a 12-year-old boy named Lewis Cooksie had placed that huge bolt on the track. He said he just wanted to see what a train wreck would look like. He was released because he was so young and was never punished for his crime despite having made a full confession.

If you enter *Oakland Cemetery* at the pedestrian gate directly across the street from *Six Feet Under* Restaurant, you'll find the Dewberry plot about forty yards down on the left.

Ben rests there with his first and second wives. Interestingly, Effie, his second wife

remarried after Ben's passing, but she stipulated that when her time came, she wanted to be buried next to Ben, her "real true love."

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The rear view mirror

Cabbageheads possess the useful ability to look and plan towards the future. But it is also to our advantage to look back on the past and see just how far we've come. Here is a look back on the month of April through the years...

1985

Cabbagetown had more than fifty (50) vacant homes. many of them in disrepair and nearing condemnation.

1994

APD chased some bad guys in a van down Pickett's Alley (next to *Carroll Street Café*). The van crashed into a telephone pole on Carroll St. The two bad guys bailed out and hid in the decrepit *Fulton Bag & Cotton Mill*. An 89 year old security guard (and his trusty dog) cornered them and held them at gunpoint till APD arrived.

1995

Cabbagetown was trying to work with the UDC to improve the old gas station property at 600 Memorial Drive. Twenty years later, not much has changed on the property.

1996

Car phones were the most frequently stolen items from cars in 1996. School truancy was a big issue that year. There were 961 truancy pick-ups in Zone Six that year.

1998

The Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts were welcoming it's first renters. Monthly rent ranged from \$552 to \$1,300. 730 Mollie Street sold for \$37,500 (Zillow estimates it's value today at \$214,511.)

1999

Jane Fonda visited *Cabbagetown Grill* (Little's) for a bite to eat. Cabbagehead Scott Montgomery lassoed a possum after his dog "Sampson" cornered it in an old tree stump. Mr. Montgomery took the possum to the area near the *Carter Center* and released it. 159 Savannah Street sold for \$60,000. Zillow estimates it's value today at \$269,549.

2000

Bertha Wise Jr., was reproducing the "Historic Cabbagetown" signs at a cost of \$35 per sign.

2001

Wilderness Works was celebrating it's second anniversary. Agave Restaurant recieved it's first review. It was a glowing report by Gretchen Dingler and Cherish Best, though they did feel the prices were abit high for Cabbagetown. Neighbors were complaining about kids riding go-karts in empty lots on Powell and Tye Street.

2002

After many years of struggle, the Atlanta Board of Education finally voted to sell The Grant School Property (Cabbagetown Park) to the

City of Atlanta. Inspired by Cabbagetown's tenacity and dedication, Natalyn Archibong stepped up and got then Mayor Shirley Franklin to throw her political weight behind the project. *The Crazy Horse Saloon* (formerly Bar One) was celebrating it's 12th anniversary with a free buffet, karaoke competition and pool tournament

2003

800 Fulton Terrace sold for \$110,000. Zillow estimates it's value today at \$185,115. *Oakland Cemetery* was seeking \$25 million for a major restoration project.

2005

The Cabbagetown Community Center got a television AND cable to access. We were working on getting a computer and internet access. Cabbagetown mourned the death of artist Mick O'Dowd. His house on Powell Street was referred to as "the mystical portal of Cabbagetown."

2007

They were considering the name "Lil' Cabbage" for their little bundle of joy. John Pinone bought a home on Savannah Street for \$1.2 million: The first million dollar home in Cabbagetown.

2008

A refrigerator and stove was stolen from a home on Powell Street. APD apprehended the bad guy and returned the property.

2010

Milltown Tavern played host for an art show displaying the works of Neil Carver. An ATM machine was stolen from *Savi Market* on Elizabeth Street. *Milltown Tavern* raised \$1,020 during an art show called the "Twisted Art Fest". The monies were earmarked for making *Chomp and Stomp* more environmentally concious.

2011

Loft H209 at *The Stacks* sold for \$94,000. Zillow estimates it's value today at \$172,300. *Sweat Cheats* added outdoor seating. Cabbagetown mourned the death of Jeremy Smith from The Stacks.

2013

Little's Food Store hosted a "Crawfish Fest" and Cabbageheads chowed down on over 100lbs of Crawfish. The Boulevard Tunnel Initiative organised it's first tunnel clean-up project. Ronnie Edwards was profiled in Creative Loafing.

2014

The Edgewood Bridge reopened after a one-year restoration project. The Stacks was the film site of a Vince Vaughn movie titled: "Term Life." Cabbagetown got a new street lamp at the corner of Tennelle and Carroll Street.


A Role Model

He doesn't call himself a hero. He calls himself a humble messenger in today's society.

His message is just as relevant today as it was more than 80 years ago. Henry Friedman, a survivor of the Holocaust during World War II, was honored on March 16th by City Councilmember Michael Julian Bond at Atlanta City Hall.

Mr. Friedman said he believes he survived the war for a reason. He said it is important for him to tell his story, regardless of how painful it is for him, so that the Holocaust and millions killed are not forgotten.



In 1944, when Henry Friedman was 21 year old, Nazi troops invaded his Hungarian town.
Shortly after, Henry was forcibly drafted into the Hungarian Army.
Before he left, his grandmother took him to an old man who wore a tallis, or prayer shawl, and blessed Friedman. He is convinced this blessing protected him throughout the war.

During World War II, Friedman with two other men were taken by Nazis to a cemetery and lined up in front of a firing squad. Friedman heard the rifles, then blacked out. When he regained consciousness, he was under the two other men. He was wounded but had survived the shot.

Friedman found a hiding place in a hospital coal room until the Soviet Army arrived. Henry surrendered to them. Two weeks later, he was marching under Russian guard on handmade crutches.

While marching, a girl informed Friedman he was headed for Siberia. Friedman left and was able to find a place to stay. Two day later, he made it home and had his legs treated immediately. Friedman soon learned that his brother, father, mother, sister, and grandmother had all died. He tried not to think about what had happened during the Holocaust and decided he needed to start a new life.

In 1947, Friedman moved to Milan and saw "Via Col Vento", or *Gone with the Wind*. He noticed many parallels between the movie and his own life. Friedman was sponsored by the Jewish Federation to come to Atlanta in 1950.

Mr. Friedman is featured in the documentary series entitled *"They Shall Be Remembered."* The title represents the survivors' promise to their families and the producers' promise to the Holocaust survivors, many of them living in metro Atlanta.

"Mr. Friedman is a great humanitarian for sharing his story of remembrance," Councilmember Bond said. "He is a role model to all that have the honor to meet him."

Only an estimated 500,000 Holocaust survivors remain alive today.
