7:06p: Meeting Called to Order

1. Welcome and Announcements:

a. Atlanta Police Department Inspector Hines with Zone Six: Neighborhood Watch, re-activating our group to be recognized by city, further education and signage. Sargent Hester, Community Crime Rep: help identify issues around neighborhood to help reduce crime.

b. Natlayn Archibong - Recognition of Nicki Braxley for all of her dedication and vision towards transforming the Boulevard Tunnel, The Northeast corner of the tunnel has a recognition note with Nicki's name and a thanks from all of us. Two photos were presented to Nicki. The keys to the city were given to Nicki by Archibong. Lyn Deardorff shared a special story of her perseverance in this project. At next council meeting at 1p on July 21st, a city proclamation will recognize this project.

Nicki gave an update: Camera is coming within 2 weeks. Need another person to take over the end of this project to keep camera rolling, working with living walls, clean up days, etc. Keith Flemming was a huge help to her helping getting all the appropriate connections to make this project happen.

c. Major Tim P, Zone Six commander: APD is looking at trends. Doing 6% better than last year but they don't like the amount of evening burglaries. Look out for neighbors and keep lights on at night. Waiting on evidence to find some suspects. Glad for our involvement, initiating extra patrols. No Edgewood progress yet.

According to Barb, when alarms go off, the alarm company says they HAVE to call police. Barb wants to know if there is a way to wave the false alarm fees? Bryan Brunson wants to know if you can report a seven-day-old crime. Example: His car break-in that he isn't making an insurance claim on. Major recommends to still call 911 to make the police report.

Resident asks about a RF Key generator? Going around hood getting into peoples cars. Seven cars were entered on Powell. Berean car burglary not resolved. Don't confront an offender if you come up on them: Call the police. Do we have any security cameras? No, it is possible to lease a camera for \$375/mo. Wall camera does not give full coverage on tunnel, Bryan asks if fakes can be put in place for deterrent, liability may not make it worth it.


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Happy Endings

The Atlanta Police Department is proud to announce the graduation of Class #235 was held in the City Hall Council Chambers on Tuesday, July 22nd, 2014 at 7p. Also graduated was the Citizens Police Academy #22 consisting of Atlanta residents and business owners.

Class 235 consists of 27 men and two women. In this class there are 14 college graduates and nine graduates with military experience. The valedictorian of the class is Officer John Suazo. The graduation ceremony concludes 22 weeks of rigorous training at the Atlanta Police Academy, along with 12 weeks of field training with veteran officers. 

Cabbagetown: Old School

It ain't toothpaste! You might have walked past a fairly large and rather plain building at the intersection of Pearl Street and Fulton Terrace and noticed the sign on it: COLGATE. And you might have wondered: "What the hell is that?" Well, here's the answer: It's Cabbagetown's largest factory. In fact, it's Cabbagetown's only factory. It's the home of Colgate Mattress Atlanta Corporation. Yep, they make mattresses right here in little old C-town; children's crib mattresses to be specific.

So how come it's called Colgate? Well, the company was founded by Sol and Anne Wolkin in New York – on Colgate Avenue in the Bronx. Hence the name. Sol and Anne moved the company to Atlanta in

1955. Their first factory was on Ponce De Leon right near the old Atlanta Crackers ball park (just a stone's throw from the present-day *Home Depot*).

Through hard work and dedication Sol and Anne's little crib mattress company grew and prospered. Their children and grandchildren have continued to run the company.

By the early 1990s, Colgate had outgrown their space on Ponce. In 1993, Alan Wolkin, (Sol and Anne's eldest son), and his brother Richard

moved the company to its present 60,000 square foot facility in Cabbagetown. It is still a family-owned company with several third generation Wolkins running it.

Dennis Wolkin is Sol and Anne's grandson and National Sales Manager. We spent some time together recently and he told me a little bit about the move to Cabbagetown. In 1993, our neighborhood was a rough place. There were gangs and crime. It wasn't considered a wise thing to walk the streets. But Dennis' dad, Alan, thought it was a good place for their operation. It was on the *MARTA* line, which made it more convenient for their employees to get to work. Alan had some smart ideas. First of all,

he hired a bunch of local kids. He figured if the gang members were working there, they wouldn't be as likely to vandalize the place. He was right. Then he did an amazing thing: Every day at the end of the shift, they locked up the tools and then left the dock doors open. The only things available to steal were crib mattresses. As Dennis puts it; "it's pretty hard to fence a crib mattress".

Alan and his brother, Richard, also partnered with the Atlanta Police Department by offering the roof of the building as a lookout post. It didn't take long for the APD to spot and shut down a number of not-so-legal retailers (we're talking crack houses here).

Colgate has been a good corporate citizen of C-town. They have provided employment for a number of neighborhood folks. They always make their parking lot available during *Chomp 'n' Stomp*. And they make a nice contribution to the tax base. Says Alan: "*We*

love this community and try to quietly do our part to continue to make it better".

Colgate makes crib mattresses (and pads)! That's all. They haven't branched out. They haven't outsourced to China. But that's not to say Colgate hasn't kept up with the times. They recently introduced a new kind of crib mattress called Nuzzle Snuze which features a proprietary material called AirWeave, a recyclable matrix of fibers that provides the ideal microclimate for the perfect night's sleep. Many celebrities have purchased Colgate crib mattresses for their new additions.

The company's philosophy reflects the values of Sol and Anne Wolkin. To quote from their website (*colgatekids.com*): "After 60 years in the business, we are the unquestionable category patriarch and we take that role very seriously. 

Hey Cabbagetown! We just wanted to drop a letter to let you know what is going on, and right now it is Chomp and Stomp prep time. Mark those calendars for Saturday, November 1st

First let's get business out of the way. We are attempting another small expansion to our growing festival this year! We will be at the August CNIA meeting with all the details. Basically we will extend the party down Tennelle Street to Carroll Street to provide some much needed space to alleviate crowding. We are required to inform you exactly which streets will be closed and when, so here we go. Write this down, share with your friends and family.

Street closures for the 2014 Chomp & Stomp festival:

Estoria, Short, Tennelle, and Tye street closure start on Friday because of tent construction.

Please move your cars by 10a. We will post the lovely orange no parking signs required by the city starting a couple days out to warn you. The rest of the streets are for the Saturday festival only.

Friday October 31st 10a to November 1st

- Estoria Street from Wylie Street to Gaskill Street (No Parking, this is where we put up tents)
- Short Street (No Parking, this is where we put up tents)
- Tennelle Street (No Parking, this is where we put up tents)
- Tye Street from Wylie Street to Gaskill Street (No Parking, this is where we put up tents)

Saturday, November 1st

- Wylie Street from Estoria Street to Tennelle Street
- Powell Street from Tennelle Street to Gaskill Street
- Kirkwood Avenue from Pearl Street to Powell Street
- Carroll Street from Gaskill to Tennelle Street
- Berean Avenue from Gaskill Street to Tennelle Street
- Savannah Street from Tennelle Street to Picket (reverse traffic for neighbors exiting will be allowed)
- Mollie Street (No Saturday Parking, bands load in and out all day)

Cabbagetown Beginnings: Now back to the fun part. We have some new folks in the hood so let's educate you about Chomp & Stomp. Cabbagetown exists as it is today because of the Appalachian folks who came down out of the mountains for jobs with Fulton Bag and the Cotton Mill (what we know today as the Stacks and Cotton Mill Lofts).

They were a close knit group that kept to their porches where they shared their stories and folk music. Unfortunately things changed with the closing of the mill in 1978. Our little Milltown began to show signs of poverty and crime in the late the 70 early 80s. But you can't keep a good 'hood down. There was an abundance of housing with affordable rent which attracted both artist and musician alike. They appreciated Cabbagetown for its cheap rent, quiet streets, and simple shot gun homes. They revived this community

and kept alive a bit of that Appalachian culture by sticking to their porches for entertainment and building a tight knit neighborhood.

Why we have Chomp and Stomp: In the process of growing Cabbagetown, a few good souls built a beautiful park for our neighborhood. In honor of the Mill workers culture, the artist's vision, musicians talent, and to raise funds to maintain our park and community, Cabbagetown now throws a picnic every year. We have a Romp (5k run), Chomp (Chili cook-off), Stomp (best folk music that John Dirga can buy), and an ever expanding Artist Market.

- 9:15-10:30a: Load-in for our chili cooks, vendors, artist and restaurants. Avoid the streets of Cabbagetown, Dekalb, and Krog tunnel! Just sit in the park and watch the fun. It is sure to entertain. Or you can volunteer and be part of the action. It really is a blast.
- 11a: The Festival officially begins with Music, Food Vendors, Artist Market, and Beer.
- 12:30p Chili tasting begins ... be there or be hungry.
- 6p: We shoo you guys out of the park so we can go to bed!
