To those who like to critique (complain) about volunteer efforts, I only ask them to offer good solutions along with their critique and get involved with the situations they speak of.

Historic Preservation and Land Use - Nicole Seekely

196 Berean: adding an addition by removing previous additions and replacing with a saddleback that is consistent with neighboring homes. Adds about 400 sqft to house. Voted to write letter of support.

Kirkwood and Pearl homes: revision to original drawings (Type II certificate of appropriateness), want to add dormer in order to fit a bathroom. Have already built a dormer but will move it 10 feet back so it can be as far back as possible (18 ft) from the street to not affect the right of way. Brought new plans to HP meeting, will be voted on by UDC tomorrow. Voted to write letter of support, 2 abstentions.

171 Savannah Street: new construction, variance for non-conforming roof design. Building plans had been approved in

2008. UDC requiring gable roof instead of a hip roof in order to be like the majority of the houses on the street. However, a gable roof will make the house taller and HP does not support this. Homeowner has talked to majority of Savannah Street residents and are ok with keeping hip roof. Voted to write letter not supporting variance.

Her current series of art pays tribute to those artists who are also afflicted with a mental illness. Mia water colors pages of books and then forms them into unique artworks.



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Just Keep Going



I've gotten back into running recently. I didn't think I would.

I had thought that I made myself run for a time out of fear, paranoid that I'd end up with the oversized diabetic body my family tends toward. I told myself that I never really enjoyed running, that I had tricked myself into it because I had no choice: Get in that cardio today, or die an early death tomorrow.

Going through life thinking you have no choices is not tolerable. I've only found one cure: Take the thing you feel forced to do, don't do it, and see what happens. And so I played a lot of table tennis, I ate a lot of ice cream, and I made my way to the kind of passable shape where I was still heavy enough to feel I needed to lose weight, but not heavy enough that anyone would sympathize.

And so it was that, while consciously plotting to see if I might improve my fitness by bumping up to real tennis, I unconsciously observed the walking trail along Ponce near Clifton and thought, "Hey, wasn't it nice running along that trail to Decatur and back?"

Now if I remember right, Decatur-and-back is at least ten miles the way I do it. And "wasn't that pleasant" wasn't how I would have described it, seeing as I usually ran to Decatur as part of marathon training. And if I might lightly touch on my psychology there, I'll just say that I don't think I ever personally proposed, "Let's all sign up for marathons. That would be delightful."

I even have this idea kicking around in my head: That other people who run distances even further than I run must be disordered somehow. As one example, I recently met someone who it turns out ran over 3000 miles in a single year. I can't remember the reason why they did it, because I immediately thought, "If they've run 3000 miles in a year and I haven't, I must be more well-adjusted than they are. Either that, or they're horribly privileged in a way that can only maladapt them to life."

I may also have forgotten their reason because I find reasons for things silly. Let's say I ran 3000 miles in a year, and I told everyone why I did it. What if I were refuted? Would that mean I didn't have a good reason anymore? Or would it mean my real reason wasn't actually what I had said? (It's also fun not to explain yourself).

Anyway, I'm running more and more. Recently I was inbound on the Beltline finishing my first five mile run when I was caught in an afternoon thunderstorm. I started worrying about lightning strikes, trying to remember the mental math on how much cover I'd need to be safe, wondering if I needed to take cover in Ponce City Market. But I'd never been caught in the rain like that before, so I just kept going.







Where ya been? Where ya going? Surrounded by Iquanas



Just about everybody in Cabbagetown knows or has heard of Slim Chance and the Convicts. It's that country band headed up by Kames Kelly. Very few of us know him as James Kelly PhD. It's Slim.

A while back Slim and his girlfriend, Claire, took off on one of those "bucket trips" that many of us dream about. They went to the Galapagos Islands. It's an archipelago of 18 islands only five of which are inhabited (by humans).

It's not real easy to get there. First, you have to fly some 2,700 miles to Quito, Ecuador. Then you take another flight (600 miles) to Isabela, the main island. Isabela makes up about 75% of the total land mass of the Galapagos.

Then you finally get to start your real adventure because you get on a boat where you'll be living for the next several days.

Slim and Claire went with a group arranged by a biology professor from Middle College of Georgia. They just about filled the little boat. Counting the crew, there were around twenty folks. "This was not a luxury cruise by any stretch," says Slim. "It was a bit primitive, but the crew made it really fun."

The Galapagos are the islands that inspired Charles Darwin's Theory of Natural Selection (evolution). Slim thought it would be cool to actually read Darwin's On The Origin Of Species before the trip. It gave him some real insight into the diversity of

animals, birds and plants they would encounter.

"It's a national park of Ecuador and they have done an amazing job of keeping it pristine," says Slim. "All visitors must be accompanied at all times by an authorized and trained guide. And that is a good thing. Our quide was so knowledgeable about the animals, both on land and in

the water. He made sure, in a gentle but firm way that we stayed on the paths and didn't harass the critters," he said. Because there has been such an effort to keep things natural, the animals on the five islands Slim and Claire visited showed absolutely no concern for the human visitors. "The animals just knew that we were no threat to them". However, one very large bull sea lion became rather protective of his harem and chased Slim off the beach. Wouldn't you love to have seen that?

Slim and Claire and their fellow travelers were amazed at the great diversity of animals. Of course, they got to see the giant tortoises that can live up to 200 years. The word "Galapagos" actually means

tortoise in Spanish.

But there was much more. They saw the aforementioned sea lions and penguins. "Who knew those animals would be living that near the equator?" But, perhaps the most fascinating of all were the thousands and thousands of marine iguanas. These not-sopretty cold blooded lizards feed on the bottom of the ocean and then haul out to warm up on the beach. Slim snapped a photo of Claire surrounded by at least one thousand of these "Jurassic" looking creatures.

As they traveled to five different islands, the group had the chance to do quite a bit of snorkeling. The sea life throughout the whole archipelago was diverse and fascinating. One night while at anchor, they heard a lot of thumping against the boat. One of the crew shone a light into the water to reveal a giant hammerhead shark investigating their craft. "It wasn't really frightening," says Slim. "Well, maybe a little...."

MOTION (Tom Deardorff): To approve the June 13th minutes. APPROVED (unanimously).

III. Treasurer's Report (Alexa Mosley)

The board raised no questions about the monthly financial reports. Alexa introduced a new procedure for check requests (attached). By consensus, the Board agreed to use this form going forward.

Alexa also presented a mission statement which the Financial Committee developed for its business (attached).

MOTION (Paul Freeman): To adopt statement as presented. APPROVED (unanimously).

For Chomp, a database of sponsors is being created. Paul asked for more information about soliciting sponsorships. Whitney will create and distribute a Google doc with more information.

IV. Committee Reports

a. Chomp & Stomp

Karin introduced Nathan and Whitney Bolster as candidates for new Chomp & Stomp co-chairs. Nathan has been working with the Chomp since 2003.

MOTION (Alexa Mosley): To appoint Nathan and Whitney Bolster as cochairs of the Chomp & Stomp Committee. APPROVED (unanimously).

Whitney reported that the two most urgent concerns are (1) developing a Chomp & Stomp budget (to submit to the Board at August meeting), and (2) obtaining sponsorships. The Chomp & Stomp Committee is introducing some new items for sponsors and is building a new website that can track impressions for sponsorship logo placements.

Nathan stated that the Chomp permit will be submitted by August 1. Letters of intent are needed to demonstrate contracts for staging, sanitation, and public safety; the Chomp & Stomp Committee will review contracts that have not been bid out in recent years.

Nathan said it would be helpful for the Board to provide checkpoints for the Committee. Alexa suggested that the Financial Committee should review all contracts before signing. Several people stated that Fiona has been very helpful with moving the contracting process along.

The Chomp & Stomp Committee still needs people to sign up for leadership roles. At a meeting on Sunday, July 10, the Committee discussed their hope for this year's Chomp & Stomp: "Keep it real, keep it fun, keep it Cabbagetown!" Katie expressed a desire to share some of the stories of the Chomp from over the years.

Board members expressed their gratitude to Whitney and Nathan for taking on this role.

b. EPL: Parks i. Pavilion

CICDC sent Joe Farr a legal separation letter on June 20th, 2016. The City of Atlanta recommended a contractor, Patrick Hand of Integrated Land Design. Heather contacted Patrick who estimated a cost of \$15,000 to complete the pavilion within four (4) weeks of start date. Hand was recommended by the UDC and has built other pavilions across Atlanta. As we do not have construction-ready drawings, Patrick has agreed to create these plans at no cost. Has sent us an agreement to review. CICDC originally budgeted this work at \$15,900.

Noteworthy is that Hand does not have a metal gutter or rain drain in the proposal, but he advised that the pavilion should not have one because it would deteriorate over time. Hand may have additional ideas to improve or augment the pavilion which would be presented to the board as they arise.

Alexa notes that the cost of completing the pavilion is not in the annual operating budget. CICDC has only reimbursed by Park Pride for the cost of the lighting (approx. §16,000). Budget has not been allocated for picnic table(s) and grill(s). Any overage would need to come from cash reserves (i.e., savings account). Katherine reminded the Board that the neighborhood voted for the pavilion twice.

Chris asked about grant eligibility with *Park Pride*. Alexa responded that CICDC should follow up with Allison (Park Pride) about eligibility and that we should not respond to Patrick until we have confirmation that Park Pride will still reimbursed CICDC for matching funds. The Board has much discussion about the need to remain in good standing with Park Pride.

MOTION (Todd Kane): To approve Patrick Hand's bid up to \$15,000 to complete the EPL pavilion, contingent upon ongoing eligibility with Park Pride to receive a reimbursement of approx. \$10,000 in matching funds. [Budget Line: Savings Account.] APPROVED (unanimously).

MOTION (Todd Kane): To approve up to \$3,000 to acquire one picnic table and one grill, contingent on ongoing eligibility with Park Pride. [Budget Line: Savings Account.] APPROVED (unanimously).

ii. Park Maintenance

Katie reported that the Parks Committee has responded to the Financial Committee's recommendations and presented a revised contract for Snake in the Grass, Inc., for July 15 - December 31, 2016. CICDC has paid *Snake in the Grass* through April 2016.

If approved, this contract would put us about \$10,000 over budget. Karin asked whether the Board could reduce spending on the parks in additional ways. Katie reported that Parks Committee has discussed ways of save money. *Continued on next page...*

One proposal is to eliminate EPL costs from the contract (about \$4,000) and shift responsibility to the City of Atlanta. Another option is eliminate Triangle Park costs from the contract.

Alexa asked what we might do to scale back levels of maintenance on the park. Tova responded that we are already doing the bare minimum. Katie said that from talking with leaders at other parks, the work that *Executive Turf Care* does is essential for the overall health of the turf.

Karin asked if anyone has talked with Executive Turf Care about reducing services. Tova responded that CICDC reduced Executive Turf Care services in 2015 due to budget limitations that the Board agreed to return to normal service in 2016. Tova also stated that, in her opinion, stopping maintenance at EPL Park is not good for the neighborhood but likely the best option since the neighborhood does not have an agreement with the City to maintain that park.

Katie discussed an idea that the Parks Committee comes up with benchmarks for the standards of park maintenance that the neighborhood wants, depending on budget availability.

MOTION (Heather Bradley): To submit a new contract to Snake in the Grass, Inc. that discontinues maintenance for EPL and Triangle parks through the 2016 budget cycle and renders payment for all services to the effective of the new contract. [Budget Line: Park & Greenspace Maintenance.] APPROVED (FOR: Karin, Heather, Katherine, Paul, Alexa, Chris, Tova, Whitney; AGAINST: Katie, Todd; ABSTAIN: Tom).

The Parks Committee will follow up with Snake in the Grass, Inc., and discuss other ways to minimize the budget. Additionally, the Parks Committee will contact the City of Atlanta to start services to EPL Park and get in touch with Executive Turf Care about reducing expenses.

c. Community Center Redevelopment

MOTION (Katherine Dirga): To budget \$110 in additional funds for community center topographic survey. [Budget Line: Savings Account.] APPROVED (FOR: Karin, Heather, Katherine, Paul, Alexa, Chris, Tova, Whitney, Katie, Todd, Tom; AGAINST: N/A; ABSTAIN: Paul).


MOTION (Tom Deardorff): To table all remaining business to the August meeting. APPROVED (unanimously).

Movie review: 30 Days of Night



30 Days Of Night (2007) R Directed by David Slade with Performances by: Josh Hartnett, Melissa George, Danny Huston, Ben Foster, Mark Rendall, Abbey-May Wakefield, and Manu Bennett.

Barrow, Alaska is the northernmost town in the United States. Every winter, Barrow experiences 30 days of night. This year, danger comes calling, and local law enforcement must protect those that have decided to weather the darkness.

Eben Oleson (Hartnett), his estranged wife,

Stella (George) and Billy Kitka (Bennett) are the law in Barrow. This year, on the last day of sun, Eben and Billy make sure everyone who is heading out gets out on the last plane, and then they change the population on the city welcome sign from 563 to 152, as is tradition, to usher in the darkness. As the sun sets, reports begin coming in: a pile of stolen and burnt cell phones found on the outskirts of town, a team of sled dogs hacked up, and a vandalized helicopter. Someone is trying to keep folks away from the outside world.

A stranger (Foster) arrives in town, causing a stir, making predictions that no one understands. Once detained, the stranger becomes oddly calm, waiting, but for what? The police station computers go down, followed directly by the phone lines. Eben's brother Jake

(Rendall) and his grandmother, Helen must hold down the fort at the station while Eben and Stella investigate the trouble.

The first clear shot of a vampire is over thirty minutes into the film. One would think that once the threat is visible it becomes less frightening. Danny Huston's portrayal of Marlow shuts down this theory. Marlowe leads a crew of vampires on a rampage through the streets of Barrow, leaving behind scattered splotches of blood across the otherwise black and white landscape.

Will Eben be able to keep his town safe for 30 Days Of Night? Should they fight? Should they hide? If they fight, they're outmatched and outnumbered. If they hide, they could succumb to the cold. Perhaps watching vampires in the snow is the perfect remedy for Cabbageheads battling summer temperatures in the triple digits.

30 Days Of Night features a variety of shots through windshields, windows, and peepholes, giving the viewer a deliciously horrifying sense of isolation and vulnerability. So Yummy!



Nothing Stays the Same

Madison Yards, a major residential-commercial makeover of the Leggett & Platt industrial site on the Atlanta Beltline in Reynoldstown, was scheduled to come before the City Council Zoning Committee on Wednesday, July 27th. As of press time, The Cabbagetown Neighbor was unable to uncover the outcome of the hearing.

Fugua Development is seeking rezoning of the 17.5-acre site at 905 Memorial Drive SE to allow 400 multi-family units, 200 senior units and 130,000 square feet of retail and restaurant space

anchored by a grocery store.

The Atlanta **Business** Chronicle reports that Publix is in talks to be Madison Yards' primary anchor, which would ostensibly pit the grocer in competition with the giant, barhaving **Kroger** that Fuqua just built across the interstate.

The project also will reportedly offer a theater, health club,

Point Railroad (now the Beltline) on Wylie Street. The streets nearest this area - Chester, Selman, Oliver (now Kenyon), and Wylie – were the very first ones to be settled and were known as Tin Cup Alley and later, "The Slide" because of the muddy conditions there. The area grew into a vibrant

Reynoldstown began to take shape in the 1860s, at the T-shaped

intersection of the Georgia Railroad (CSX) and the Atlanta & West

community around 1870 and became known by its present name: Reynoldstown.

parking in multiple on-site decks and retail space along the Beltline featuring two-sided glass storefronts, according to a Fugua website on the development. Fugua notes that 3,900 multi-family units are in development in the area.

It's only one of several redevelopments that's remaking the quickly changing corridor between Moreland Avenue and Downtown. Paces Properties has amassed land along Memorial Drive and is working on building Atlanta Dairies, an 11-acre development promising restaurants, offices, and apartments.

Reynoldstown was one of the first African-American neighborhoods to develop in Atlanta. Former slaves migrated there after the Civil War. The Georgia Railroad (now CSX), became an attractive source of employment for the many displaced, freed slaves who migrated to the city in search of work. There was also a sawmill and a ready supply of water and timber for the families who wished to build homes here.

Reynoldstown was named in honor of Madison Reynolds, a prominent and successful landowner in the area who for many years operated a store on Wylie St.

Members of the Reynoldstown Civic Improvement League voted to endorse a zoning change back in 2015. The Reynoldstown Civic Improvement League's board sent to developers

that the Leggett & Platt site should be broken down from its "superblock" status to best jibe with the neighborhood's goal of being, well... neighborly.

Specifically, they called for a small network of streets that would dice up the acreage – a new north-south connector stemming from Holtzclaw Street and an east-west link between Bill Kennedy Way and Gibson Street.

Said the Reynoldstown Civic Improvement League in 2015, "As with most intown neighborhoods, we've conducted numerous meetings to envision and plan for this eventual growth period and have ratified numbers of master plans. A common theme, from all the way back to 1999, is that they all emphasized people places, not car places, where all modes of transportation are seriously considered in design. This underlying idea of a healthy, efficient, mobile, inclusive urban form is paramount – we are fixated upon it."

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Travel Advisory: Wylie and the Beltline

The Atlanta BeltLine, Inc (ABI) has announced a travel advisory for Wylie Street lane closures between Krog Street (Just East of the Krog Tunnel) and Chester Avenue.

This advisory is in affect starting Monday, August 1st, 2016 for approximately six weeks from 9a until 4p on weekdays.

Atlanta BeltLine is constructing the southern extension of the Eastside Trail for one mile in between Irwin Street and Kirkwood Avenue. As part of construction, ABI will be relocating the existing water line under the northern side of Wylie Street to the southern side of the street. Moving the water line is necessary to allow for the Eastside Trail on the northern side of the street.

Single lane closures will occur in stretches of twenty to forty feet at a time. Flagmen will be present to direct traffic. The northern sidewalk along Wylie Street will be open during this time. Onstreet parking will be available outside the construction hours

of 9a to 4p, but will be unavailable where work is taking place during construction hours.

The Atlanta BeltLine is holding a community meeting on August 4th, 2016, to update residents on the lane closures and other Eastside Trail Extension updates. Details are the calendar at beltline.org/events.
