

Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

January 10, 2012 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center) By John Dirga

- 1. Meeting called to order by President Ashley McCartney at 7:05p.
- 2. Valencia Hudson reports no resident complaints during the month of December 2011.
- 3. Officer Trotter, APD, announced a home burglary in East Lake with (according to neighbor witnesses) suspects casing the house for 45 minutes but the police were not called.

Cabbagetown Beat 606 is the quietest part of the zone. Glenwood and Moreland Avenue (previously of Zone 3) were just added to the beat.

Three juvenile suspects (along with the vehicle & the firearm) were caught in a coffee shop robbery.

A lot of pedestrian robberies along Boulevard, from Dekalb to Ponce, especially leaving the MARTA station. Response time can be delayed as officers are stretched thin. According to Officer Trotter, CSX Stairwell is particulary unsafe.

A woman was robbed while using her cellphone, and could not identify the perp because she was engrossed in the phone call.

4. CNIA Board filled two committee chairs:

Newsletter: Skyler Waldrop Minter and Kyle F. Bidlack. Skyler and Kyle promised new energy, new design, more photos, more advertisement revenue, and more dynamic content.

Public Safety: Sam Gris. Sam started by pointing out one of the neighbors had parked in a handicap spot. He encouraged residents to file police reports whenever an incident occurs: that is how APD tracks major AND minor crime trends. Call 911 for ANY incident. Take cell phone photos of graffiti vandals, and forward to Graffiti Task Force.

6. Holiday Crawl Report: Gross \$1,355 Expenses \$359.34 Raised \$995.66 for CNIA.

- 5. No UDC cases.
- 7. CI: Treasurer Michael McPherson reported \$102,000 in treasury, including \$20k deposit from legal settlement. On February 27th, there is another court ordered deposit of \$25k.

69 families contributed. The event was deemed very successful!

8. CNIA Treasurer: \$8398 in treasury, \$475 in Newsletter revenue. \$922 net income, and \$209 loss for the year. There was a \$4,000 subsidy from CI.

- 9. NPU update: Small grant to provide street toppers. Current design is the letterhead from Historic District signs.
- 10. George Berry presented a plan for "3 Points Park", designing a triangle lot on Gaskill and Fulton Terrace. CI has been cutting the grass. There was a plan with a gazebo & brass plaque. It might need a sidewalk. UDC suggested a trolley waiting station.

The lot is 70'x60'. There was an argument about what would happen to donations if the plan changed. A neighbor went on the record that an old photograph of trolley stop may assist with the UDC. The discussion was deemed unproductive.

11. The meeting was adjourned at 7:42p.

Buckled up?

As I travel through the neighborhood, I see a lot of front porches with wooden floors that are buckled-up. This is caused by improper installation. Wood flooring is usually made with a groove cut in one edge and a matching projection sticking out the other edge called a tongue. Tongue & Groove for short, sometimes abbreviated as "T and G".

The error in installation happens when people forget that wood expands and contracts with changes in humidity. From kiln-dried to just existing in an environment with fifty percent relative humidity, wood can expand by a little more than one percent of it's width. This doesn't sound like much, but in an eight foot section, that adds up to one foot!



So if your front porch is 16 feet wide, all the floorboards could be two inches wider in humid weather than in dry weather. Since the boards are usually nailed at both outside edges or pinned in by walls, the boards have no place to go but up, hence the buckling. Adding to the predicament is the fact that some boards actually get wet when it rains. This just compounds the problem.

The way to prevent the wood floors from buckling is to put a penny on edge above the tongue at both ends and the middle of each board when it is installed, leaving about a sixteenth of an inch gap between each board so that each board can expand and contract without pushing on boards on either side of it.

Now that you are a better informed homeowner, you can be penny-wise and not pound-foolish.

Small business is not to be trifled with. President Barack Obama's announcement in January, of a proposal to elevate the Small Business Administration to Cabinet rank is a move in the right direction.

Launched this last Fall, *Preserving Now* is excited to offer jarred products such as Rustic Apple Butter, Cranberry Apple Chutney, Ginger Pear Butter and a host of other fruit-based items. Soon to be added are pickles, relishes and condiments.

Started by three Cabbagetown friends, Lyn Deardorff, Karin Kane, and Melody Trivisone, *Preserving Now* products can be found in *Little's Food Market*. Many of you had a chance to sample products at the *Chomp and Stomp* and *The Stacks Lofts+Artists Tour*.



Lyn tells us that *Preserving Now* products are different from many you'll find on shelves. Because they are made with organic and natural products as well as

low or alternative sugars, the foods are not only healthier but taste more authentic. Using agave syrup in some recipes, for example, allows a low glycemic index – good for children (no sugar spiking!) and adults who are smartly watching their sugar intake levels.

Recipes are developed to take advantage of the increased flavor profiles offered by using all natural products with no preservatives and no artificial anything, Lyn reports. Watch for these foods to appear at other locations and local green markets this year.

The good news for *Preserving Now* is 2012 started with a small but distinct economic uptick.

In December, the economy added 200,000 jobs, and the jobless rate fell to 8.5%. We've got a long way to go but a growing economy is a major ingredient for the success of small businesses just like *Preserving Now*.

She enjoys meeting and mingling with the people of Cabbagetown and looks forward to more of it. As our community grows, she wants to be an active part of it.


Karin is currently retired and feels like she has the time and energy to contribute to our humble community.

Cabbagetown Mardi Gras procession



Sponberg is working on a book, Cabbagetown Portraits, which will be self-published in this Spring. We'll keep you posted on this exciting artistic effort.

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
