1. Valencia Hudson, City of Atlanta Liaison

The pothole near *Agave* is scheduled to be repaired, resident reports that each time it floods it wipes out the asphalt. The pothole on Kirkwood has been repaired. If you report a pothole to the city, please pass along the incident number to Valencia so she can escalate it.

Resident inquired about a huge water bill she received recently. Valencia recommended calling 311 and telling them there is a problem with her city water meter and ask for it to be repaired.

2. Keith Lamar Jr., Assistant District Attorney

- Sam Gibbs case: Break-in at *Papi's Restaurant*, stole liquor only. He was caught on camera.
- Ramone Watley case: Broke into a resident's basement and tried to steal a bike. He got trapped inside. He received a twenty year sentence. He will serve five years.
- Anthony Davis case: scheduled for court in two weeks. He attempted a break-in of *Homegrown*, and was caught on camera. He had just been caught breaking into automobile in March.

3. Lt. Carter, Atlanta Police Department (Zone 6 Precinct)

Lt. Carter switched jobs with Lt. Floyd. So far, 2016 has seen a lower crime rate. Emphasized importance of clean cars - there have been several cases of guns or technology being stolen out of peoples' cars. Put your belongings in the truck or bring them into your home. Encouraged reporting to police of anything strange or out of place: see something, say something.

Caught one set of juveniles who were robbing valets at Krog Street. *Agave* valets were also robbed. Will look into the mugging at Wylie and Short after *Chomp & Stomp* and provide update.

GEM - Heather Bradley

The corner lot at Tye & Memorial (east of Tye) is being looked at by GEM. The lot is divided into three parcels. Small parcel was potentially going to be developed by *Enfold Properties*. An environmental assessment found coal ash in the soil. It is zoned

"industrial" now and developer is probably unable to build upon it unless it is zoned "residential/commercial." The developer's financing probably won't go through. They never got their plans approved so their variances were not approved.

The large parcel is owned by the Tilly family, they recently expressed that they are not interested in selling the property. Given this new information, GEM will be reevaluating the situation.

Historic Preservation and Land Use, Ed Lindahl 324 Carroll Street

House has been empty in many years, making very minor changes to exterior in order to be code compliant. There is a hole on the side, which they want to be a window. Want to make a back door, and repair roof damage. Repair of stairs, add columns that are very in keeping with the neighborhood. Voted on HP writing a letter of support conditional on Ed providing HP with a drawing of proposed changes. Vote passed unanimously.

Parking and Traffic Committee

An update will be provided in February.

6. New Business

CNIA elections will be in March. Some positions are opening up due to term limits: Vice President, Treasurer, NPU Chair, Historic Preservation and Land Use Chair. 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

Last summer, Claudia Ramos and Scott Goode took a walk in the woods; a 221 mile walk.

The couple hiked the John Muir Trail in California. It's part of the Pacific Crest Trail and is considered by many inveterate hikers to be the most beautiful, breathtaking, majestic, awe-inspiring trail in the United States; some say in the world. Claudia and Scott spent three weeks on this magnificent part of our beautiful country.

The John Muir Trail (JMT) is not for the faint of heart and these two Cabbageheads are anything but that. It had been on Scott's "bucket list" for quite a while and when he proposed the hike to Claudia, she was all in.

They started planning. That's the key to successfully walking this challenging trail. Well, planning and training. And they did plenty of both. They spent a full six months plotting out their daily mileage, acquiring the right gear, planning their menus, making travel arrangements, sending food and supplies to various drop points and ensuring they were in good physical shape.

On June 27th, they started south from Yosemite Valley with 40-50 pound packs on their backs. Mt. Whitney, 221 miles away was their ultimate destination. Right through the high Sierras. And on that very first day, there were some highs and lows – not just the terrain. They made more miles than they had planned on that first day, putting them a bit ahead of their schedule.



As he layed in a crumpled heap on the floor, all red-faced in embarrassment, Professor Rothstein stopped his lecture, and without skipping a beat, said "And THAT'S what happens when you lean too far to the left."

Hollywood discovers Atlanta

Not so long ago, if you wanted to be in the movies, or work in the industry, you had to go to Hollywood. Now, not so much. And Hollywood's loss is Atlanta's gain. Moviemakers.com recently recognised Atlanta as one of the top ten cities for movie-types to live and work.

Says Moviemaker.com, "Atlanta's doing everything right and then some to accommodate moviemaker locals and transplants, without having to endure a perma-celebrity culture."

Georgia has quietly become home to one of the biggest film industries in the nation, ranking third in production levels. Between support personnel, infrastructure and increasing workforce development, Atlanta has been steadily securing a stable and exciting future in the feature film world. The state's tax incentive program offers, effectively, 30 percent transferable credit (20 plus 10 if you use the state's logo in your credits) for qualifying productions, which contributed ⁵6 billion generated to the state last year.

So what's been filmed in Atlanta recently? Good question: Films and series such as Ant Man, The Divergent Series: Allegiant, Barbershop 3, Captain America: Civil War, X-Men: Apocalypse, My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2, The Walking Dead, Quantico and Furious 7. Moviemaker says Ant Man alone employed more than 3,500 Georgians, and the title

"Hollywood of the East Coast" feels thoroughly earned. Much of that traffic came out of *Pinewood Studios*, a full service film and entertainment complex comprised of 11 sound stages on 700 acres just south of Atlanta.

"It seems that the east and west are meeting here in Atlanta," says casting director Tiandra Gayle of Atlanta's NightinGayle Casting. "It's certainly much more cost-effective to shoot here!"

This city has a hip-hop scene that rivals New York and L.A. The restaurant culture is thriving. Housing is affordable – the average rent for an apartment in metro Atlanta is \$1,003 per month. There are four distinct seasons and 217 days of the year are pure sunshine.

You might not ever have – or want – to leave. With so many actors, writers, directors and producers in the city, you can schedule your next big meeting at one of Atlanta's 132 *Waffle House* locations instead of flying to some vaulted office thousands of miles away. Waffles, grits and a greenlight? Win-win-win.

Atlanta ranked first. Can you believe it? Rounding out the list was New York City, Austin, Los Angeles, Albuquerque, Chicago, Seattle, Boston, San Francisco, and Memphis.

In January we celebrated the life of one of the most important sons of Atlanta: Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. King was born, raised and later preached in Sweet Auburn. The area fell on hard times like most of urban America after the midpoint of last century. But times are a-changin' again. In a poignant new feature, CNN explores the demise and ongoing rise of Sweet Auburn.

Atlantans are flocking back to the city, seeking places to live. Millennials and empty-nesters alike are forgoing large homes on lush lots in the suburbs for a more urban lifestyle. The streets of Sweet Auburn are filled with a mix of storefronts, some gleaming with new businesses as others next door are derelict and vacant. A burgeoning population in the neighborhood highlights the area's growing attractiveness and the gentrification is taking hold. In some ways, it's a far cry from the neighborhood of Dr. King, though vestiges of the history remain.

The Atlanta Streetcar is the first step of a larger transit network and a means of bringing development. Some big projects are on the horizon: Big Bethel's \$130 million development and the under-construction 200 Edgewood student residences. As one local resident told CNN: "Progress didn't start with Dr. King, and it didn't end with him."

A Place for Guests to Stay

On a little chunk of land facing Irwin Street, and right next to Krog Street Market, A boutique hotel inspired by architecture near the High Line in New York City's Meatpacking District is set to move forward on "a very accelerated schedule" alongside the Beltline's Eastside Trail.

The 140-room hotel in the Old Fourth Ward would fea-

ture a rooftop bar, "European-style piazza" along the Beltline and two restaurants included in 4,000 square feet of retail space facing Irwin Street and the multi-use trail.

The project is expected to cost \$35 million. Christopher Plockelman of Beltway Investment International of Dublin, Ireland, says the project is predicted to launch this spring, with construction

completed by Labor Day 2017.

For Cabbageheads that want their guests to stay a little closer to home, this is an ideal spot and offers our surrounding neighborhoods a type of service not yet found. Not to mention more jobs.

Guests will have plenty of places to walk to, from next-door Studioplex, Old Fourth Ward Pizza, and Jake's to Piedmont Park and of course the restaurants, taverns and cafes of Cabbag-

etown and Reynoldstown. Will it add more traffic and congestion? Probably. But with the walkability of our friendly confines, hopefully guests will leave their cars where they park them.

bad break up. After dropping out of medical school, he has a dull job writing technical manuals. Chantry (Zoe Kazan) loves her job as an animator, and lives with her boyfriend, Ben (Rafe Spall).

Wallace and Chantry hit it off at a party, bonding over sarcasm and little known Elvis trivia. The elephant in the room is the possibility that they may have deeper feelings for one another. Neither wants to confront their own feelings, much less tread into the possibility that the other might feel the same. This delightfully quick-witted film explores the age-old question: Can men and women be just friends?

As the story unfolds, Chantry's friend Nicole (Mackenzie Davis) and Wallace's former roommate Allan (Adam Driver) question Wallace and Chantry's friendship. Throughout the course of the film, Nicole and Allan become a couple, and begin pushing Wallace and Chantry towards one another. To complicate things even further,

Ben takes an assignment in Ireland for six months. During that time, Chantry's sister Dalia (Megan Park) makes a pass at Wallace. This forces both Wallace and Chantry to consider their feelings.

Chantry and Wallace each drive the film, but it feels like it is told primarily from Wallace's point of view, as his being single allows him to be a bit more true to his heart. Allan constantly gives the worst unsolicited advice ever spoken. Allan's statements are hilarious yet somehow believably delivered, and that makes for some fantastic scene stealing moments for Driver.

The interstitials/montages feature a little animated butterfly that holds significance to Chantry. Usually, I'm not one for mixing animation with live action, but this is so delicately done, it doesn't pull focus from the plot of the film. And the animation pulls the audience back into the world in which these characters live. This, combined with Kazan's sweetness, keeps her from becoming the villain in a situation where she has to decide between two men.

What If balances romance and comedy, offsetting the daily minutiae of real life with hilarious, sometimes over-the-top events. February is coming up, and that means Cabbageheads can't go anywhere without reminders of love and smooches, so What If felt like the right choice for my first review. Warning: I'd rate this on the stronger side of PG-13 for language and adult content.

Favorite quote: Allan - "How much for the flying moose?" Trivia: Daniel Radcliffe previously worked with Rafe Spall's father, Timothy, who portrayed Peter Pettigrew in Harry Potter.

For those of you unfamiliar with Atlanta's NPU system, it was "established in 1974 to provide an opportunity for citizens to participate actively in the Comprehensive Development Plan, which is the city's vision for the next five, ten, and fifteen years.

It is also used as a way for citizens to receive information concerning all functions of city government. The system enables citizens to express ideas and comment on city plans and proposals while assisting the city in developing plans that best meet the needs of their communities" per the City's NPU website. Typically, the matters covered involve, but are not limited to: zoning, land use, business license issuance, parking, and special events.

NPU-N consists of seven neighborhoods stretching from Cabbagetown to Lake Claire and two business organizations within that footprint. Meetings are held the fourth Thursday of every month at the Little Five Points Center for Arts and Community and the Cabbagetown rep reports back on proceedings at the following month's CNIA meeting.

The Cabbagetown representative position also currently serves as NPU Secretary, so you'd be expected to take notes and draft up minutes to be presented back to the NPU in time for the subsequent month's meeting.

Nominations for the position are currently open. The opening will be discussed at the February CNIA meeting and elections will be held in March.

APD nabs six criminals

The Atlanta Police Department announced the apprehension of six individuals connected to the recent rash of smash and grab burglaries in the metro Atlanta area.

The smash and grab burglaries, which investigators believe are related to gang activity, occurred at multiple businesses throughout the city dating back to August 2015. Atlanta Police investigators were able to recover thousands of dollars in stolen merchandise.

Atlanta Police is partnering with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and multiple police jurisdictions to identifying other individuals who are believed to be involved in these burglaries. Atlanta Police have arrested and charged 4 men and 2 women:

Cordarrell Taylor, 29, is charged with Burglary Smash and Grab, Participation in Criminal Street Gang Activity, Probation Violation, and Criminal Damage to Property in the 2nd Degree.

Marquez Watson, 23, charged with Theft by Receiving Stolen property, and Participation in Criminal Street Gang Activity.

Freddrick Hammond, 26, charged with Possession with Intent to Distribute Marijuana, Participation in Criminal Street Gang Activity x2, and Burglary Smash and Grab.

Johntavis Bailey, 24, charged with Gambling, Probation Warrant-Possession of a Controlled Substance, Possession of a Firearm by Convicted Felon, Probation Warrant-Possession of Firearm During Commission of A Felony, Probation Warrant-Theft By Shoplifting, Burglary Smash and Grab Felony, Criminal Damage To Property – 2nd Degree, Possession of Firearm by Convicted Felon, and Participation in Criminal Street Gang Activity.

Uniqua Davis, 25, is charged with Theft By Receiving Stolen Property, and Possession with Intent To Distribute Marijuana.

Ashley Askew, 23, is charged with Theft by Receiving Stolen Property.


Heavy Industry: Past & Present

Pimped-Out Stacks Loft Shoots for the Stars

Buyers hell-bent on living in historic Cabbagetown have surely noticed that almost nothing is for sale beyond units at *The Stacks*, a pioneering, decade-old Atlanta loft conversion that's stood the test of time (and the wallop of a tornado).

Now, this airy, top-floor, two-bedroom pad at the former cotton mill appears to be trying to capitalize on that scarcity – and its own customized uniqueness. For 1,855 square feet, the asking price is \$470,000, plus another \$438 in monthly HOA fees. If our crack research is accurate, no *Stacks* loft has recently sold above the \$400,000 threshold besides a larger unit (2,100 square feet) that fetched \$430,000 back in May – which, granted, is eons ago in this market.

So it could come down to a buyer who appreciates the cash that was obviously spent on upgrades like zebra-wood cabinetry, a *Wolf* range and *Miele* convection oven, built-in wine cooler, overhauled master bathroom and what looks like a custom glass-railing staircase. The soaring ceilings and city views were probably there to being with.
