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Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

Tuesday June 11th, 2013 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center) Minutes by Recording Secretary, Whitney Cheesbro

Meeting called to order by President Lyn Deardorff at 7:03p.

1. City of Atlanta Liaison Public Safety, Valencia Hudson reports she is trying to get CSX to install extra lighting in the Krog Tunnel.

2. APD, Officer Shaver reported that crime statistics last week showed Cabbagetown crime went down. Along Boulevard and Memorial there were some cars that were broken into, APD caught the suspects.

3. Minutes of the last meeting approved.

4. Treasurers report, Karin Kane – May had an ending balance of ^s6072. Checks for various expenses like the printers and website. Collected ad revenue of ^s1,090 and had an ending balance of ^s5,741.

5. Hospitality – Karen Russian absent and Lyn welcomed new people to the community. She thanked Luis, the bar manager at *97 Estoria* for coming.

6. Lyn introduced Chris Appleton the Executive Director, WonderRoot. They have applied to sign a lease with Atlanta Public Schools to occupy the former Tech High School. After discussion, Lyn asked for a motion to approve a letter of support, approved unanimously.

7. Cl Connect – Lynn Splinter, explained that Cl looks to CNIA to provide community feedback and input. Treasurers report; Beginning balance of ^{\$}158,000 and ending of ^{\$}107,000. They paid ^{\$}12,000 for benches for *Peachy Park* and moved ^{\$}35,000 to savings.

Alicia Thompson is returning as chair for the *Chomp and Stomp*. Date is November 2nd and needs more volunteers. Chomp and Stomp will have the same street footprint as last year. The committee meets once a month on Sundays. Let Alicia know if you are interested in volunteering.

Barb discussed Peachy Park. There is a list of options to add to the park. Neighbors voted on their top three:

- 1. Fencing/shrubs along tall wall 5
 - 5. Safety lighting 16
 6. Pavilion 8

2. Landscaping the winding plot - 2
3. Small shrubs along 2 ft wall on Powell - 2
7. Picnic tables and grills - 10
4. Landscaping in large beds - 3

8. *Historic Preservation – Jared Serwer stated things are still fairly busy.* The committee is looking at updated regulations and engaging with the *Beltline* folks.

UDC cases – reviewed two applications based on projects that had already been built. Not having a building permit is against the law. In both cases, work was done, city inspector noticed the construction, and now they have to go through the UDC review process.

200 Estoria; they are redoing the garden in the back. Staff report from UDC asks applicant that the existing retaining wall and fence cannot exceed regulation height. Applicant must meet setback requirements. Staff recommended approval with the conditions and that they are met. Homeowner at 200 Estoria said they remodeled the backyard, but the retaining wall and fence have been there since 2006. This called into question the 50[%] coverage rule for the lot and the house. Rule in Cabbagetown is can't cover more than 50[%] of the lot, but the pavers being included is ambiguous. Motion to support with conditions of the UDC approved unanimously.

10. NPU – N - John Dirga went to the last meeting May 23rd at L5P Community Center. Discussed a variety of things happening nearby, see full minutes posted on the CNIA website. CNIA needs to approve the NPU – N bylaws, John will send out via listserv. **11.** *NW/Public safety* – Robert Tubbs will go through the Citizens Court Watch program with the District Attorney's Office and bring back the information to CNIA. Introduced Luis from *97 Estoria*. They will work together to reestablish the cameras there. Will see what it takes to get the camera system back up and running.

12. B71 – Ben Braxley – There will be several phases: clean it, mural it, and maintain it. The city has committed to replacing the railings. Target is to raise ^{\$}15,000 for the mural. They have interest from three groups that would like to do the mural. More info on Facebook and at *BLVDTUNL.com*

13. Old Business – Cabbagetown Reunion was successful. Thanks to Brad Cunard for reinvigorating the event. Yard sale – small but mighty committee, had 20-21 participants and raised about ⁵200. Cl elections still one opening. Michael McPherson is interested in being the next representative. Motion made and approved Michael unanimously.

14. Public input – 196 Savannah St. Church Women United – the Mission said there is a group coming from South Carolina to put on a new roof and take down the building in the back before it falls down. Group will be there Friday and Saturday to start and will work through Wednesday. Need neighbors to keep driveways clear.

15. Pastor of Greater Mount Herman Missionary Baptist Church spoke and invited the entire community to a get together on Saturday in Cabbagetown Park from 12pm – 3pm. Robert said he will help them create an event on Nextdoor to get the word out.

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Esther Peachy Lefevre Park ribbon cutting!

Phase One of the Esther Peachy Lefevre Park renovation project is now complete! Please join us on Thursday, July 11th, at 10:30a when the City of Atlanta's Department of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs will host a ribbon cutting ceremony for the renovated Esther Peachy Lefevre Park. Duriya Farooqui, the City's Chief Operating Officer, George Dusenbury, Commissioner of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs, Councilwoman Natalyn Archibong, and a representative from CI/CNIA will speak.

The long-term master plan for the park calls for the iron picket fence on top of the granite rubble wall along Wylie to enclose the park, the addition of a picnic pavilion, and updated lighting.

Phase One of this project was made possible by a Community Block Development Grant and grants from *Park Pride* and the *Waterfall Foundation*.

Esther Peachey Lefevre Park is named for the woman who was a tireless social justice activist in Cabbagetown in the 1960s and 1970s and established *The Patch*, a drop-in center for Cabbagetown kids in crisis. She was also a folk singer and played the autoharp. She worked on the *Southern Folk Culture Revival Project* in the 1960s. Esther also served on the Atlanta City Council. There is a dispute as to how her last name is spelled. It may have been Lefever, in which case the Park sign has it misspelled.

"I had the pleasure of knowing Esther when I lived in Decatur and was also a neighborhood activist. Many of us had common goals and found ourselves supporting each other in like causes when the need arose. Those were the good times and the hard times, watching the Atlanta area come alive with rebuilding neighborhoods, and a heightened sense of social justice.", Says Lyn Deardorff.

Park Pride is an Atlanta 501(c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to improve the city's parks and greenspaces through the provision of grant funding, programming, advocacy, and guidance to neighborhood groups such as CI and the Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association. 

All this rain has been great for plants, but it's also helped give a leg up to a number of summer pests and fungi. Never fear – we've got a whole new line-up of pest and disease control



options that just arrived yesterday! We have liquid copper which is a fantastic fungicide that keeps powdery mildew and other types of "funk" at bay.



A Cabbagetown dad and his land shark

Dave Dechant is a stay-at-home dad and husband. When the 43 year old with a degree in writing needed something to do as the kids went to school and his wife to work, he taught himself to sculpt.

This is not about clay and wood. Dechant purchased 30,000 lbs. of Georgia granite and has created, with his own hands, a 22-foot long shark with a man inside. The home project has taken him two years. The shark has now been paired down to 10,000 lbs.



Did we mention it sits in his front yard? We received a call from his neighbor George Berry. The retired sculpting teacher from Kennesaw State University told us his neighbor is astonishing and has done something that needed to be seen.

"One guy doesn't do stuff like this -- he didn't know it was impossible, so he did it," Berry said. The work is called "Man in a Shark." You can see the man's hand from the inside of the predator. "I discovered I could do this in my 40's. I have kids in school and while they're in school, this is the thing I do. I'm a stay-at-home dad primarily," Dechant said.

So the question begs -- why a shark in Atlanta? "I'll tell you what being landlocked does -- it increases your fear of sharks," Dechant said. "When 'Jaws' came out, I was sure one was going to find a way to swim upstream and make it into my bathtub."

In a strange way, Dechant is living his dream. *"I am not afraid of any land animals, I will wrestle a bear, I will outrun a cheetah if I have to, but I am terrified of sharks,"* he said.

The shark will be finished by July 4th. The Dechant family is planning a party on the 4th at 4 o'clock. There will be food and drinks but more are always welcome. Stop by186 Estoria Street for a celebration of the shark and a celebration of the USA.

Incidentally, "Man in the Shark" is for sale. The artist said he has this recurring nightmare that in 1,000 years, someone will find a clump of granite in the form of a shark in Cabbagetown and wonder what the heck that was all about.

On Thursday, June 27th Atlanta City Councilmember Natalyn Mosby Archibong was on hand for the grand opening of the Atlanta Bicycle Coalition's (ABC) new office. ABC has moved from their downtown headquarters to Council District Five's Cabbagetown community at 692 Kirkwood Avenue.

The Atlanta Bicycle Coalition's mission is to create a healthier, more sustainable Atlanta by making it safer, easier, and more attractive to bicycle for fun, fitness, and transportation. ABC advocates for



better conditions for bicycling and education for cyclists and drivers to share the road.

"The Atlanta Bicycle Coalition is an important and vital part of our city. Their work to raise awareness and improve conditions for bicyclists is excellent, and I am so proud to have them join District 5," said Councilmember Archibong.

The Atlanta Bicycle Coalitions sponsors programs such as tours of Atlanta by bike, bike safety courses and the popular bicycle valet services seen at many of the City's festivals. Crowder and Bono combat hunger

"From civil rights and women's suffrage to anti-apartheid and Live 8, protest songs have helped shape history. When people come together and raise their voices, extraordinary things can happen."

Last month, Bono (Lead singer of U2) and *The One Campaign* reached out to Cabbagetown resident David Crowder with a request. They asked David if he would consider recording a "protest song" to help put an end to extreme poverty by 2030.

This message spoke to David on a profound and personal level. Over the course of two days, David got together with his team led by Jay Desai and performed and recorded *"This Land Is Your Land"* (originally recorded by Woody Guthrie) in Woodruff Park.

They sent the video to the organisers of *The One Campaign* and *agit8*, who received a great many videos. Some of which were stunning. Some were less than stunning. But when they heard David's rendition, they were moved on a deep level. They immediately called David and asked him to come to London to perform his interpretation in London for a free, two-day pop-up concert at the *Tate Modern* in London on a stage at the foot of Tate's iconic chimney, with a gorgeous view of the river Thames out in front of them. David humbly accepted and traveled to London this past month to perform and share a stage with *Elvis Costello, Mumford & Sons, Macklemore, Green Day, Bruce Springsteen* and of course, U2.... among many others.

While the line-up and the performances were nothing less than volcanic in their immediate impact, the glacial effect in their potential long-term reverberations can be projected and measured when you weigh the power of these original songs and how they shaped the course of history from the early 1900's till today.

David speaks passionately about how extreme poverty has been halved over the course of recent decades. The vision he shares with his fellow performers (and his team), is that it can be halved again by the year 2030. *"Time has shown just how powerful music can be in the right hands, and in this turbulent century, the need for powerful music is greater than ever. Maybe with the support of such a large number of artists and the right anthems, we will actually see the extinction of poverty in our lifetimes."*

Esupetai: One year later

You might recall that in March 2012, Milltown Tavern took a global stand and decided to help a tiny village – over 8,400 miles away – realize the dream of clean, abundant water. Barb Keeney Harper and her sons, Chris and H.J. McGinness asked Cabbagetown to join in and help. And help you did. You raised over ^{\$}9,000 for the effort.

On June 26th 2012, Water was found at 61 meters. It was one of the most prolific wells ever dug in the region. This month we reached out to Sonkoi (now back home in Esupetai) and Ann Bassarab to get an upate on your efforts.

Sonkoi relays that "life in Esupetai changed immediately after the well went in. People had clean water to drink; they were able to bathe and get clean water without carrying heavy water carriers long distances." (prior to the establishment of the well, women were charged with collecting and carrying water over a distance of eight kilometers).

Sonkoi says sickness in his village has greatly diminished. Not as much dysentery and no babies have died recently so things have changed a lot.

I asked Sonkoi and Ann about their livestock which is their main source of income. They say that the livestock is not much better – yet. But the biggest difference is in the human condition.

They tell us that word of the well has spread far and wide. "Many more people are coming to the well than we expected. It is almost crowded. They come from as far away as Maji Moto – 20 km away." Esupetai shares their water with all that travel to their village. "Word of mouth has traveled quite a distance" says Ann.

Sonkoi, Ann and the entire Esupetai community appreciates very much what the good people of Cabbagetown have done for them. You have changed the course of human history in Esupetai.

Soon, Cabbageheads might need only stroll The Beltline to get their art supplies. Ponce City Market has landed a new retail tenant that could appeal to our prolific creative class. Binders Art Supplies & Frames has signed a lease for a new store at the more than ^{\$}200 million redevelopment of the former Sears building on Ponce de Leon Avenue into a hip hub of apartments, office space, restaurants and shops.

CSP: Hard work is paying off

If you walk the streets at night, you may have noticed a new presence: the Cabbagetown Security Patrol. CSP was created in September 2012 by proud Cabbagetown residents who felt their neighborhood should be as safe as it is cool. But CSP is cool too. In its first 10 months, CSP has:

- Seen its membership grow to 42 residents and 8 businesses
- Partnered with *Agave, Six Feet Under, Village Pizza, Milltown Tavern, 97 Estoria,* and *Sweet Cheats.*
- Received \$1500 from Natalyn Archibong, City Councilwoman
- Raised over \$16,000 overall
- Obtained a vehicle (affectionately named Brussel), generously donated by *Ride On Auto Repair*
- Provided over 500 hours of patrol.



These efforts are paying off. During spring 2013, crime was down in Cabbagetown compared with the same period last year. But there is still work to do. In Year Two, CSP seeks to:

- Analyze the Year One data from APD and our patrols to deter mine where and when our patrol hours are best allocated.
- Expand to Reynoldstown. Having additional patrols in R-town will help C-town, and vice versa.
- Innovate. In June, Sweet Cheats graciously hosted a pop-up



dinner at the Stacks. The proceeds of this fundraiser will go toward a special, high-tech project to improve security in the neighborhood. Stay tuned for details.

 Add members – especially in July! The majority of CSP funding comes from its members. An anonymous-and-highly-mysteri ous benefactor will donate ^{\$}100 for each new member that joins CSP in July.



Frequently asked questions about CSP:

What areas does CSP cover? CSP patrols all of the streets and parks in Cabbagetown. Although we have members on almost every street, CSP membership does not impact where CSP patrols.

Who provides patrol services for CSP? CSP patrols are provided by (1) off-duty APD officers, and (2) Eagle Eye, a private security firm operated by Officer Wright, a former police officer with over 10 years experience.

When does CSP patrol? While the schedule varies, CSP typically patrols 4-5 nights per week. In response to members, CSP has begun to include earlier evening hours on weekends.

What vehicles does CSP drive? Off-duty APD officers drive the aforementioned Brussel. Eagle-eye drives its own vehicle, which resembles a police car.

How can I join? Sign up at *www.cabbagetownsecuritypatrol.org*. Membership is ^{\$}200 per single-family house per year; ^{\$}50 for loft and condo-dwellers; and only ^{\$}12 for seniors. Businesses can join at various membership levels. If you join in July, an anonymous donor will add ^{\$}100!

Plans continue for Boulevard Tunnel

For most motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians who travel along DeKalb Avenue, the public art that decorates the nearby tunnels and underpasses is a beautiful thing.

But when it comes to the Boulevard tunnel, most pedestrians would prefer avoiding it altogether. That's why a group of Cabbagetown and Old Fourth Ward residents are now working to clean up and beautify the underpass.

The Boulevard Tunnel Initiative led by Cabbagetown resident Nicki Mlynski is attempting to make the route a safer and more walkable experience. *"It's become a hub for unsavory characters,"* the Grady Memorial Hospital emergency medicine physician says be needed for the paint, supplies, and artist fees. While they haven't yet chosen a painter, she says that muralists *Hense, Molly Rose Freeman*, and *Samuel Parker* have all expressed interest in the project.

The public art won't be created, however, until conditions under the bridge are safer and much more walkable. And the process to making that a reality has been more difficult than expected. Despite receiving initial support from a number of key figures, including Councilmembers Natalyn Archibong and Kwanza Hall, Mlynski has experienced a lot of red tape in figuring out who's ultimately responsible for the tunnel's upkeep.

about the tunnel's stairwells that lead up to DeKalb Avenue. "Honestly, I run into folks using drugs in the stairwell or just hanging out. They're nice and fine, but people leave piles of trash and they use it as a place to poop and urinate."

Many residents avoid walking in the tunnel because of the same safety and aesthetic concerns.

"It smells." Cyerra Crumrine, an Old Fourth Ward property owner, tells Creative Loafing. "It's not a pleasant experience walking through the tunnel."



"Everyone was excited, but no one could figure out who's responsible for the tunnel," she says. "Nobody knows."

The Department of Public Works committed early in the process to making some repairs, but since has been slow to respond and stalled the group's efforts. According to spokeswoman Valerie Bell-Smith, some minor repairs, graffiti removal, and pressure washing will occur in the coming weeks.

"We did not have the necessary resources in place at the onset of our discussions with the community earlier this year so our work was

But the group has started to change that through organized clean-up efforts including painting over unwanted graffiti, picking up trash, and pulling weeds. The tunnel still needs to have new guardrails installed, lighting replaced, and potholes fixed.

"It's a major thoroughfare," Mlynski says. "Despite tons of cars going through, there's really poor lighting. The pedestrian guardrails have disintegrated at their bases. There are sections that are completely missing and there's about a four-to-five foot drop into oncoming traffic."

Once the clean-up and repairs are complete, the Boulevard Tunnel Initiative will commission a muralist to paint a permanent piece spanning the entire underpass. Mlynski estimates that ^{\$}20,000 will temporarily delayed," Bell-Smith says.

Once the repairs happen, the Boulevard Tunnel Initiative will have to run the proposed public art past three different Neighborhood Planning Units and a slew of other city officials.

In addition, the group is also looking for donations and will soon have an online fundraising page created where people can offer support. Ultimately, Mlynski says, she hopes people will see the effort as a worthwhile investment in their own communities.

"It's impossible to guarantee that [a safer experience] will happen," she says. "But if we make the lights brighter, if we make the pedestrian guardrails exist, if we clean it up, and mural it. It'll then be OK to walk from Cabbagetown to Old Fourth Ward."

But not to fear Bailey fans: her business is alive and well and merely moving to a much larger space across the street from her husband's **Bar One** on Memorial Drive.



Artist Co-op transforms Edgewood

Startup Dashboard Co-op has changed the face of the historic east Atlanta neighborhood called Edgewood Avenue from "plain and old" to gold.

Edgewood Avenue had once been a thriving community until its residents abandoned the area. For decades following the end of segregation, the rows of neglected buildings stood empty until a contemporary art company decided in 2011 to rip down the boards that covered the vacant buildings' dusty windows.

The idea was to *"let the public see what the buildings looked like in its best dress,"* says Courtney Hammond, co-founder of Dashboard Co-

op, a startup that seeks "raw space" for artists.

At the time, Dashboard had only existed for one year and Hammond and her co-founder, Beth Malone, had no idea what kind of impact their six-hour show would do for development in the neighborhood. "Our intent back then was to show high quality artwork and have interesting platforms to show it in," Hammond tells Business Insider.



"We love when the space becomes the artwork and the artwork becomes the space." "We're pretty tenacious ... persistent ... whatever you want to call it," Hammond says. "We gave the artists a part of a building and asked them to build an immersive installation for the public that complemented the architecture of the space they were in."

Edgewood's debut art show brought in around 2,000 people one night. "We promoted the show as an 'art stroll' ... people just moved up and down the street. Afterward, some of the owners called to tell us that a few visitors had contacted them about opening up businesses. Now every one of those buildings are filled."

It only took a few shows before the founders realized that Dash-

board's productions caused a "ripple effect" in neighborhood development.

"We have loved seeing how clever, talented artists can transform a section of a city, if only for just a moment, that in time changes the whole game for the area," Hammond says.

Hammond and Malone met at Georgia State University when Hammond was studying sculpture and Malone majored in art journalism. But it wasn't until their

How well has it worked? Today, Edgewood is one of the most popular and active nightlife corridors in the city. Turning spaces into gold. Since 2010, Dashboard has hosted around 12 shows – each show costing an estimated ^{\$}33,000 to produce. Though Hammond says her talented team never spends as much as they're supposed to.

To find spaces, Hammond and Malone do a lot of wandering, talking to people, and searching through tax records.

When they were approached by a developer about Edgewood, Hammond and Malone were intrigued — they had both attended college near the area. "When I was a student, all of the windows in those buildings were boarded up," Hammond says. "I had never seen inside any of those buildings."

"There were two thriving businesses (Sound Table and Vesuvius) that were divided by one block on Edgewood Avenue. The street was very dark and pretty intimidating to walk down."

The developer wanted Dashboard to bring attention to the vacant buildings between Sound Table and Vesuvius. After contacting every building owner on the block, the team was given permission to use five buildings as platforms for seven artists. late 20s when they met in *"a smelly, smoky Atlanta bar"* to discuss platforms for installation artwork that plans for *Dashboard* were drawn up.

"We find that abandoned buildings are really interesting. We can go in and transform the entire space because it's like a clean slate. It helps to have artists who are inspired by the space ... it gives them inspiration to build off of that space. We love when the space becomes the artwork and the artwork becomes the space."

When creative people gather together, it attracts other young creative people. *"If you look at demographics, the downtown area is much younger than it was a few years ago,"* she says. *"There's this competition that's good. It isn't about making art anymore. It's about making good art."*

Hammond says that Atlanta has given Dashboard the platform that a bigger city — such as New York — never could have, because there simply isn't any free space in more crowded cities.

Although Atlanta will always be home for the *Dashboard* founders, Hammond says they hope to impact other small growing cities around the country in the near future. But as of right now, they're happy bringing the rest of the country to Atlanta.

Not to mention an absence in water restrictions.

The graphic below illustrates rainfall comparions for 2013. Notice the roughly 12" total surplus for 2013. So while rain may affect your leisure pursuits, there is a platinum lining in those gray clouds.


