Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

Tuesday June 9th, 2015 – Cabbagetown Community Center, 177 Estoria St. Minutes recorded by Julie Stephens. Meeting called to order at 7:01p by CNIA President Katherine Dirga.

- 1. Welcome and Announcements. The current CNIA representative member of the Cabbagetown Initiative (CI) board's term has expired. We need to elect a new rep. Also, the CNIA co-secretaries have resigned. We need to elect a new secretary to the CNIA board.
- 2. Sgts Smith and Boyd, APD Zone 6. No incidents in Cabbagetown. The following incidents occurred nearby:
- Robbery at *Tower Package Store* on Moreland and Memorial.
- Robbery of 2 pedestrians at 54 Walthall at 7p in Reynoldstown.
- Aggravated assault at *Buffalo China* on Moreland south of 120 angry customer threw chair. Shooting on Harold Avenue homeowner came home late (after midnight) and found two people in his house. One shot the other. Summary: Less than 5 burglaries the past month in zone 6 none in Cabbagetown. Crime in city is up overall. It is likely they will get some additional resources in Zone 6 soon be sure to stop at stop signs.
- 3. Vote to approve minutes of May meeting passed.
- **4. Treasurer's report, Julie Stephens.** CNIA's account balance at the end of May was \$10,364. Expenses were monthly hospitality and newspaper printing. Revenue came from advertising. List of transactions is available upon request after meeting.
- *5. CI Board Member Election.* Shelly Scott volunteered. Vote to elect Shelly as CNIA representative to CI passed. Congratulations Shelly!
- **6. CNIA Secretary Election.** Jocelyn Wise volunteered. Vote to elect Jocelyn as CNIA secretary passed. Congratulations Jocelyn.
- 7. Vote to establish GEM Committee as an official ad hoc committee of CNIA. GEM is the Memorial Drive Visionina committee. They would like to be recognized as an official CNIA Committee so they can speak on behalf of the neighborhood when working with other bodies such as developers and city council members. Their next committee meeting is July 7th. As a committee they would report back monthly at the CNIA meetings and get feedback from the community before making agreements or deals with other parties. The current state of the committee is that they have the visioning plan and drawings which the neighborhood voted to support last year and they would like to start sharing the plan with outside parties. Another neighbor suggested they print their mission statement in the newspaper before having a vote. Informal show of hands showed preference for waiting until next month to vote after they publish another article in the newsletter explicitly stating their mission in mission statement form. Vote was deferred.
- 8. Vote to establish Parking Committee as official ad hoc committee of CNIA. The group recommended that the parking committee follow the same protocol as the GEM committee and

decided to defer the vote until after the committee published another article in the newsletter explicitly stating their mission in mission statement form. Vote was deferred.

- 9. Committee Reports
- A. Public Safety, Mitch Watkins. Nothing to report.
- **B. CI Connect, Katherine Dirga.** The CI board is looking for Chomp committee head volunteers to run Chili Judging committee and another to run Individual Chili Cookers committee. Also, CI is getting really tired of off leash dogs and poop in park. Be on the lookout for cops issuing tickets soon.
- C. NPU, Ed Lindahl. NPU-N monthly meeting summary: Beltline patrol is extending their hours past 11p. If the legislation passes, City of Atlanta will start conducting a Public Safety Assessment similar to what is done annually for solid waste. Property owners will get an annual bill of \$26. This is to fund a budget shortfall in electronic 911. Also, the city is going to create a committee to review the special event permitting process because currently festivals keep bunching up in the same locations and they would prefer to have events better spread out across the city. Four NPUs were asked to send a representative to the discussion, including NPU-N (because of Candler Park). A neighbor asked if the NPU could do something about the Mardi Gras parade which has been occurring the past few years in Cabbagetown. Edward said that it was not an event that came before the NPU because it has not requested a permit in the past. The neighbor continued to elaborate about what a nuisance the parade was. She feels that it is noisy and disruptive and results in litter that is dangerous to her dog - primarily beads and candy. Some neighbors loosely and informally agreed to discuss these issues with the potential organizers of the next unofficial Mardi Gras parade event.
- D. Historic Preservation/Land Use, Matt Wise. Discussion about new building application at 228 Powell St. At the May CNIA meeting, neighbors voted to not support the new building design or setback variance because they were concerned about parking even though the plan included 2 additional parking spaces as required by the rules. The property currently has three parking spaces, one for each residential unit. Matt followed up with Doug Young from UDC about the interpretation of the parking space requirement, and he said that the UDC would probably interpret the rules as applying only to the new structure, and not retroactively enforcing parking requirements on the existing building.

The property owner has just submitted a new proposal to HP, but the committee has not yet had time to review it and therefore did not have a recommendation. Matt also said that the application would be deferred by the UDC until after Cabbagetown had submitted a statement.

The property owner presented her new proposal for the property anyway to solicit feedback from neighbors. *Continued on page 8*.



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
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Oldtimers: Slim Chance and the Convicts: Our Hometown Band

He's James Kelly PhD. Most folks in Cabbagetown know him as Slim Chance. If you go to festivals and listen to bands, you've probably heard Slim Chance and the Convicts. They play an eclectic mix of music with a bit of angling toward country. They are not just a country band. Far from it.

But let's talk about James Kelly. He's a

psychologist – a freelance psychologist no less. He says that in his senior year in college, the only class he really cared about was psychology.

As happens with many people, James was influenced by a teacher, Mr. Johnson, James chose to study psychology because "human beings fascinate me". He put himself through college, working to pay expenses. It took a long time, but when he finally got his doctorate, he had no student loan debt. That's pretty rare. He came to Atlanta from Nashville to do his graduate work (masters and PhD) at Georgia State.

Atlanta also attracted him because of its vibrant music scene. It's hard to tell which he loves most;

psychology or music. By day he is an independent, self-employed clinical psychologist focusing on folks with developmental disabilities. At night and on weekends, he slips into his other persona, leader of *Slim Chance and the Convicts*.

Slim's (I prefer to think of him as Slim rather than James or Jim) dad was born and grew up in Scotland. He played guitar, sang and wrote music. With a partner, he toured much of the United Kingdom performing pop music and traditional Scottish songs. Slim says they were kind of the "British Everly Brothers".

In his teen years, Slim played some guitar but then gave it up for a number of years while he focused on his studies. While he was in grad school, a good friend, Mike bought a set of drums at a yard sale for six bucks. Another friend got a bass from somewhere and the group started jamming wherever they could. They played their very first real show on June 4th, 1986 at what was then rather insensitively called the Georgia Retardation Center in Dunwoody. That institution later became known as *Brook Run*.

They played for the patients who were rarely exposed to music. Although the band members were terrified, they were a huge hit with their audience. Because of that, Slim began incorporating music into his therapy. That was the beginning for *Slim Chance and the Convicts* and Slim has never looked back. From time to time, the personnel has changed, but it's still just a bunch of guys who play

whatever they like. They've covered *Buddy Holly* and *Elvis*. They've covered *The Sex Pistols*. They do some Rocka-abilly. And on and on.

They were pretty much the "house band" at the *Austin Avenue Café* in Little Five Points for several years. It was during that time that Slim's band and a few others became known as *The Redneck Underground*.

For Slim and fellow psychologist and bass player, Dan, making music became their therapy. As Slim puts it: "He was a psychodynamic psychoanalyst and I was a Skinnerian Behaviorist which resulted in plenty of good natured fights over the years".

He's been here 23 years.

He reflected that, when he came here, Cabbagetown was far from gentrified. "There were two crack houses and seven hookers working this street." He said. "There were some pretty misguided and condescending attempts to change Cabbagetown." These days, he says, the population of our community, while quite diverse, is also very cohesive. "It's a great place to live."

You'll have the opportunity to see and listen to *Slim Chance and the Convicts* at this year's *Chomp and Stomp*. It's been a regular gig for them since the very first Chomp. After all, they are the "hometown band".

She stated that she had purchased the mixed-use multi-family building two years ago and had been living in one of the residential units ever since. She is a business consultant and would like to move her two-person office to the new structure which she is proposing on the Gaskill side of the property.

Based on feedback from last month's meeting she has decided to move the proposed building further from the property line to mitigate the headlight and privacy concerns of the adjacent neighbors and remove the need for a setback variance. Also, the updated new structure design is a bit larger than what was presented last month. The revised proposal is for a 750 square foot structure. The new application would not include any additional off-street parking and therefore would require a parking variance. To compensate, she would pursue a shared parking arrangement with one of the nearby churches.

Neighbors expressed concern about granting a parking variance in exchange for a shared parking agreement because if the shared parking disappears in the future the neighborhood ends up with an even bigger shortage of parking. Neighbors also expressed concerns that future occupants of the new building would attract more cars leaving the neighborhood more exposed to parking issues. The applicant expressed willingness to further restrict future use of the building in order to mitigate these concerns. Matt is going to work with her and share the concerns that were voiced tonight with the HP committee.

E. Parking Committee, Katherine Dirga. The committee met for the first time and decided to try to solicit advice from some more experienced people outside of the neighborhood. They are trying to track some people down now – hopefully for free.

10. City Council Update, Natalyn Archibong. The city is creating 3 committees (Community Development, Transportation and Roadway, and Planning and Permitting) for parties interested in Memorial Drive development (neighbors, developers etc) to work together to help tie the current development proposals together with the GA Tech study that was created two years ago.

They are looking for a lead and alternate representative from Cabbagetown for each committee. Katie Butler volunteered to be the lead rep for the Community Development committee. Shelly Scott volunteered to be the lead rep for the Transportation committee. John Dirga volunteered to be the lead rep for the Planning and Permitting committee. Matt Wise volunteered to be the alternate for any or all of the committees. The time of day of the meetings will be decided by each committee based on the members.

A neighbor asked Natalyn if she was able to do anything about the property at 600 Memorial Drive (previously Blessing Tires) which has been boarded up for over 5 years. Natalyn said she will look into it again.

11. The meeting was adjourned at 8:22p

and before anyone knew it, without any questions or hesitations he had scaled the slope, slayed our quandary, conquered our dilemma, and was asking for paint. Yes! Our neighbor and friend, Bertha, would get her home's crowning touch of blue on her very steep camel back peak and our volunteer project to paint her house will truly be completed.

But how, perhaps you wonder, did we get to such drama? Well, it started on the high seas – no, no, let's stop exaggerating – it started actually started on the low seas - of Key Biscayne in Miami Florida. This past winter, Greg, my husband, and I were on our sailboat contemplating our return to Cabbagetown for the summer. I had

just been looking at FaceBook and something struck me about Bertha. We had known that she wanted her house painted for a while, but we also knew she couldn't afford to have it done. I mentioned to Greg that I would like to at the very least help her with the worst of her house problems when we got back in a few months. That sounded good to him. A small project.

That next Sunday Greg was talking on the phone to his Cabbagetown painting partner, Paul Bracken. In the course of the conversation Paul brought up Bertha's house. What an interesting coincidence! She had asked Paul for a

quote to have it painted. But of course, the price was way out of her range, so Paul suggested that it could be done by a volunteer effort.

Once we returned to Cabbagetown in May, I signed-up to lead the Let's Paint Bertha's House project. I felt a little hesitant. How would people perceive this effort? I mean there are lots of people in the neighborhood who could use a coat or two of paint on their old millboards. Would anyone volunteer? Would there be money for supplies? Would all my friends hate me for not painting their houses?

I figured this project would be most successful if it was very organized, so I set about writing up a project plan of volunteer dates, things we need to buy, things we need to borrow, and people whose expertise we could tap into. I talked to Bertha about offering services and premiums in order to solicit donations for supplies and paint. Then I presented it all on the social network Nextdoor.

You may not know Bertha, I said in my post, but you probably know her yellow Coca-Cola house on Berean... Immediately volunteers started signing up for workdays and donating money. The Cabbagetown *Initiative* stepped forward to pay for all of the lumber to replace her rotten wood. Milltown Tavern offered to donate a keg for the volunteer days. David Thayer of Wonderfalls volunteered to provide hotdogs, hamburgers, and veggie burgers for the workers' lunches.

I posted on other social networks, Facebook and the CNIA Yahoo group. People gave supplies. People donated food and drinks for our workdays. Robyn from Bicycle Tours of Atlanta purchased \$150 worth

> of paint for the project. Monetary donations kept flowing in. And tons of people showed up at Bertha's each time I made a post about a new volunteer day, many she didn't even know, ready to scrape, prime, caulk, paint, and infuse new life into an historic old Cabbagetown house and home to one of our long time neighbors.

> The entire project was completed over 3 weeks with 5 volunteer paint days (Two 3 hour days and three 6 hour days), a volunteer prep day to move Bertha's Coca-Cola cooler, and extra time put in by Paul and Greg to pressure wash the house and wrap up loose ends. Over 70 people contributed to this project either by donating

money, volunteering to work, donating supplies

and/or donating food and drink for the work days. And nearly \$1000 was raised and spent on paint and other materials.

Now Bertha has a new house. But we have so much more, a sense of accomplishment, preservation of a little piece of Cabbagetown history, a feeling of community, and a few more faces we will recognize and call friends as we traverse our streets. And like Greg said, kicked back in Bertha's driveway, beer in hand, covered in paint after a long day of volunteering with friends and neighbors, "This project gives people the chance to be the people they really want to be."

The rear view mirror

Trees. Parks. Mayoral disputes. Water, and gay rights. This was all a part of our Cabbagetown history in the the month of July in years gone by. Here's a look back.

1993

Newly re-named Esther Peachy Lefevre Park (formerly Cabbagetown Park) fell victim to vandalism. Bad guys destroyed some picnic tables, damaged an electrical box, ruined a fence and dripped some sort of "goo" onto one of the kiddy slides. The Cabbagetown area saw five assaults, four burglary attempts, four disorderly conduct arrests, and seven vehicular offenses during July 1993. Also in 1993, the first CNIA by-laws and constitution were adopted.

1994

CNIA had a bank balance of \$368.07. Trees Atlanta was getting ready to plant trees on the traffic island on Boulevard (just outside of *The Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts*).

2002

Cabbagetown was working hard to limit the affects of West Nile Disease within our confines. Cabbageheads, under the direction of Mike Alexander, undertook an effort to rehabilitate Whisper Park. Zone Six reported seven thefts, three stolen vehicles, two pedestrian robberies, and a rash of business break-ins along Memorial. 185 Savannah Street sold for \$140,000 (*Zillow* lists it's current value at \$351,131). AT&T was installing fiber optic lines in Cabbagetown.

2003

Cabbagetown said goodbye to Stella Mae "The Mayor of Cabbagetown" Bryant (1923-2003). Stella knew everyone and knew how to get things done. She kept the neighborhood clean and had a way of getting the City to act fast on behalf of Cabbagetown. Leon Little jokingly disputed her "mayoral" title because he wanted it, but eventually conceded the title to Stella. Monies were being saw to conduct a Cabbagetown traffic study.

2004

Kristin Sullivan was seeking a liquor license for a new bar on Carroll Street. At the time, the working name for the bar was *Crying Eli's*. The endeavour would eventually become known as *Milltown Tavern*. *97 Estoria* fell victim to an armed robbery. Powell St., and Wylie witnessed a large fight with shots fired. 167 Powell Street sold for \$154,000 (Current value is listed as \$242,831). John Dirga was working on the second annual Chomp and Stomp. He reported that the first annual saw 120 gallons of chili consumed and 1200 tickets sold.

Reverend David DeChant was writing about and advocating for gay marriage rights and subsequent medical coverage for gay couples. Eleven years later, the nation has finally caught up to the Rev's way of thinking.

2005

Cabbagetown ballet students held a recital at the Lang Carson Auditorium. Pirouettes were beautifully performed at twenty dancers ages three to five. *Village Pizza* was presenting plans to CNIA in hopes of opening their pizzeria despite concerns over parking. 805 Kirkwood sold for \$135,000 (It recently sold for \$279,000)

2006

Sara Van Beck was writing about the historical signifigance of daffodils at Oakland Cemetery. Karen Lovell was organising a "Tour of Trees" in Cabbagetown.

2007

Gerry Weber memorialised Gerry Conroy who lived on Iswald Street for more than twenty-two years. Mr. Conroy was a long-time advocate for race equality and was remembered for his loving "bear hugs". Tim and Kristen Sullivan welcomed their new baby Elliott Patrick Sullivan, into the world. Nathan Bolster was working with *CSX* towards the establishment and beautification of the "triangle parks" on the Cabbagetown side of Krog Tunnel.

2008

Ben Sklaver initiated an effort to raise \$25,000 towards bringing clean water to 2000 people in Uganda. Ben's mission was a success, though sadly, Ben did not live to see it. We lost Ben in the war in Afghanistan in 2009. *The Wallkeepers Initiative* was first proposed in July of 2008.

2009

The Cabbagetown Artists Tribe hosted their first "Cabbagetown Art Thursday" at the Community center. Chomp & Stomp 2015 Wants You!



Hello happy 'hood. We have started the planning for the best fest in Atlanta, the 13th Annual Chomp & Stomp Chili Cook-Off and Bluegrass Festival plus the 5K Romp to be held on Saturday, November 7th.

For the past 12 years Cabbagetown has pulled off an amazing festival with 100% volunteer effort. It is what makes it special. So Thank You! This festival raises funds that maintain our parks, green

spaces, the Community Center and clever projects you can think up that benefit Cabbagetown as a neighborhood.

Because I have not figured out how to make it illegal for folks to move out of the neighborhood... yet... we have spots on the Chomp board to fill. Here are some basics: We will meet eight times between July and November. We meet one Sunday in July, August, and September and then five times in October. No demerits for missing a meeting but we request an update from you. We have a blast and personally it has been a fabulous way for me to really get to know my neighbors.

Now on to our needs:

Artist Coordinator: If you want to work with creative folks, love logistics, love art and the artists themselves this is the job for you. You will be responsible for organizing the layout of the artist (we have the spots set up, you pick where they go in those spots) and then the loading of these artists into and out of these spots. This is the challenging part I am not going to lie. We need to get 60-70 car loads of folks in and out of three streets in about an hour. We do have the former Artist Coordinator on hand to mentor so you are not on your own.

Judging Coordinator for Individual Chili Cookers: This team meets every chili cooker team, tastes all the chili, and gives out awards and money. I did this job for three years and I can sincerely say I always had a great time. Hint: If you don't like the crowds down the rows this is a great way to taste all the chili without the hassle. You also sit in a tent right next to the main stage so you have a great view of the festival and all the goings on. There is a mentor on the board so again you will not be left on your own.

Logistics Coordinator: Logistics requires the least amount of time the day of the festival but it is very important time. Between 7am and 11am we load 100 chili cookers, 70 artists, 20 vendors, and 30 restaurants into the streets of Cabbagetown. As logistics coordinator you direct volunteers that you place on corners, to yell and point and tell folks where to go. We have this down to a science. A science that is not pretty but it gets done every year and no one looses an eye.

Web Site Manager: We update the website with all the chili cooker team names, participating restaurant, sponsors, vendors,

and artist. If you are detailed, like working on the computer with WordPress have about an hour a week to devote to our website, we would love to have you.

Last but not least a Secretary: We need someone to record our meetings and track all our wonderful ideas for Chomp so we can carry them out.





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

An Historic Month

June 2015 was an historic month, not only in Cabbagetown, but for our entire nation. We sometimes think events happen at the speed of light... over night. But the movement to relegate the Confederate flag to museums is one that spans over five decades. And similarly, the journey for "justice for all" came one step closer to fruition when, in a landmark opinion, a divided

Supreme Court ruled on June 26th that states cannot ban samesex marriage. The U.S. is now the 21st country to legalize samesex marriage nationwide. Married same-sex couples will now enjoy the same legal rights and benefits as married heterosexual couples and their marriages will be recognized on official documents such as birth and death certificates.

I hate to say it, but crime statistics demonstrate that break-ins *increase when school is not in session.* That means summer vacation time and end-of-the-year holiday time, and – to a lesser extent - spring break.

The police tell me that adult criminals will recruit juveniles and train them to kick in doors and steal desired items. The adult mentor watches from a safe distance but receives the stolen goods. Because, if apprehended, juveniles are treated more leniently under the law, the adult can avoid an arrest that will stick.



Targeted items are electronics (laptops, largescreen TVs, iPads, game stations, etc), jewelry, and guns. The typical method is "smash-andgrab," with a door kicked in, goodies snatched, and the intruder gone in less than five minutes. One Grant Park theft shown on YouTube from the home security camera was timed at 22 seconds from kick-in to exit with TV. Most burglaries occur between noon and 3p, when occupants are at work. Some, like

the one on White Oak Drive, happen right after the owners leave for work. That implies the house was being watched.

Do security cameras help? They seldom deter a thief but sometimes provide clues to catch them. However, the camera would have to be of good enough quality to provide a high resolution image for identification, preferably in color.

That's an expensive camera, and it would still have to be positioned just right to catch a usable image. Unless you have deep pockets, there are more effective deterrents for your money. Preventing intrusion through doors and windows is the best idea. A monitored alarm system to limit "illegal shopping" time is second.

For doors, the three options for "hardening the target" are (1) steel burglar bar doors (with their own locks) installed outside your entry door; (2) reinforcement of jambs and door with unobtrusive steel hardware; (3) security storm doors like Larson's "Secure Elegance."

For windows, the three options are (1) steel burglar bars; (2) window pins for wood windows (or dowels for vinyl & aluminum windows); (3) clear Window Security Film with its super strong adhesive.

Artists were encouraged to collaborate and communicate with each other during planning. There are some who chose to work on the same piece together and others who are trying to intertwine their individual pieces. I like to compare it to a tattoo sleeve. It's made up of many components, but the flow of whole piece is very important, especially since we are all on the same wall. Some of the murals from last year will be painted over and some will not. There's simply not enough space to keep them all."



"My hope is that we create something the people of Atlanta will enjoy." It's that simple. We have an amazing community of creatives in our town and for the most part, we have been allowed to thrive here. This is simply our way of giving back to a great city that supports us and our passion. I'm looking forward to painting with my friends. That's what this has always been about for me." Said Ferrari.

Google Fiber is getting closer

Super fast internet has not yet arrived in Cabbagetown, but it's getting closer. Crews were spotted in Midtown digging and laying cable that will support the infrastructure needed to propel us all properly into the 21st century of connectivity.

Fabiola Charles, Google Fiber Community Impact Manager, released this statement on June 25th, "Today, we're ready to start building our **Google Fiber** network in metro Atlanta. With the design of our Google Fiber network completed, you'll see us around town digging and stringing fiber cables so that we can deliver Google Fiber's superfast Internet to the city. As we lay thousands of miles of fiber-optic cable throughout Metro Atlanta, we'll keep residents updated along the way. Construction work on other areas of the metro receiving Google Fiber, including Decatur, Sandy Springs, and Brookhaven, is expected to begin the coming months."



AT&T is also getting in on the high-speed internet game. They plan on offering service in Atlanta though no firm dates for installation have been released.

Comcast has said they plan on offering 18 million homes high speed service by the end of 2015. All this competition should be good for consumers, as an analysis of other markets witnessing such competition, have seen signifigant price drops. In Winston-Salem and Raleigh-Durham, N.C., AT&T reduced the price of service from \$120 a month to \$70 last month.

What's the big deal over fiber connectivity? Good question. In short, Fiber will offer you connectivity that is roughly 100 times faster than what you currently have.

While no firm dates for Cabbagetown installation have been released, a smart consumer can gauge marketing efforts from competing companies as a sure sign that an upgrade is pending.
