The Cabbagetown Initiative CDC met at 7p on Monday, April 9th, 2012 at The Cabbagetown Community Center. In attendance were: Nathan Barnett, Lyn Deardorff, Jason Snyder, Michael McPherson, Dana Habeeb, Katherine Dirga, Mary Huysman, Alicia Forsee Thompson and Tova Baruch.

Here are the minutes:

I. Officer Reports

a. Katherine, May Elections: We need to fill 5 positions in the next few months. Lyn will talk about it at the CNIA meeting tomorrow night and will tell them to contact Katherine.

b. Michael, Finances: Discussed and passed. Taxes will be mailed out via certified mail tomorrow.

c. Mary, March Minutes: Unanimously approved.

II. New Business

a. Revised budget for planters: Jim found planters that are a little taller and cost a little more but Jim recommends them so we got an updated budget.



There were remarks from City of Atlanta Director of Sustainability Denise Quarles and Clean Cities Atlanta Executive Director Don Francis. Veterans groups and the EV Club of the South were in attendance.

The EV Club of the South Members displayed a Tesla Roadster, Nissan Leaf and Chevrolet Volt at the event. Atlanta Gas Light demonstrated a compressed natural gas (CNG) refueling station available for home rental to refuel CNG vehicles.

Toraya, who also works in City of Atlanta Mayor Kasim Reed's Office of Sustainability, has taken on a personal mission to help returning veterans find careers in the new green economy. Many of these careers in renewable energy and alternative fuel vehicles will reduce our dependence on foreign oil, a goal of

many returning veterans from the Middle East.





Car-jacking arrest

Atlanta police have made one arrest in the May 11th attempted carjacking of a Reynoldstown vehicle in the MillTown Lofts.

The victim, who was attacked in the 800 block of Wylie Street, identified the suspect, police said.

In a cruel twist, however, another group of teens stole her car Thursday afternoon. It's unclear if the two groups are connected.

The suspect in the carjacking case was arrested earlier in the week for an attempted snatch and run of another person's property in the Edgewood Retail District, said Maj. Keith Meadows, commander of Atlanta Police Department Zone 6. "This is the perfect example of citizens working with police to tackle complex crime problems," said Maj. Meadows.

Police are not naming the suspect (who was taken to the DeKalb County Jail) because he's believed to be involved in a number of other crimes.

"We have several other line-ups to show," Meadows said. "We believe he was involved in a string of robberies and snatch-theft." The other carjacker, who is seen in video surveillance footage from the MillTown Lofts cameras, remains at large.

Both attacked the woman in the MillTown Lofts at gunpoint as she was walking to her home just after she retrieved her mail. They tried to steal her car, but it wouldn't start and they fled on foot.

Atlanta numbers

The results are in on a survey of residents on their satisfaction levels with selected City of Atlanta services.

Receiving the most positive responses from the 478 residents polled was the Atlanta Fire Rescue Department with 85% positive feedback on average. The department received its highest rating on the level of courtesy of fire and emergency medical services call operators (93% positive), followed by the response times of fire and EMS personnel.

Other city service-related departments that received an average rating (between 42 and 43% positive responses) included the Department of Police; Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs; Planning and Community Development and Public Works, which received its highest positive rating for weekly garbage and recycling pickup.

The survey was conducted April 5th through April 30th. Residents were able to complete the survey online at *www.atlantaga.gov* and through survey forms disseminated at community meetings.

Receiving some of the lowest ratings were the city's code enforcement services, sidewalk maintenance, pothole repair and the cost of city water service.

The proposed 2013 budget calls for \$539.8 million in revenue, tighter spending and more police officers, which would bring the force to 2,000, which would represent the largest police force in the city's history.

Other 2013 budget highlights include:

- · Six new code compliance inspectors
- · Six additional recreation facilities managers
- · An additional \$1.1 million in funding for Invest Atlanta

The proposed 2013 budget does not include a property tax increase for the coming year.

The city's budget is scheduled to be adopted by the City Council during its Monday, June 18th meeting at 1p in the Council Chamber, Atlanta City Hall, second floor, 55 Trinity Avenue, SW

Bike Tours Atlanta

The beltline takes a giant leap forward

The section of road between Ponce de Leon Place and the Midtown Place Shopping Center (across from Ponce City Market) will be closed from June 8th through 11th and again from June 15th through June 18th. The weekend of June 22nd through 25th will be a back-up weekend should inclement weather warrant.

The Eastside Trail project, now under construction, spans more than two miles from the southeast tip of Piedmont Park to Inman Park and the Old Fourth Ward neighborhoods. It is the next major component of the Atlanta BeltLine slated to open to the public.



This project includes a 14-foot wide multi-use concrete trail for walking, running, biking and skating, as well as underground infrastructure to accommodate current and future utilities. It also includes retaining walls, landscaping and the preservation of right of way for the transit system which will be built in the future. The Eastside Trail will eventually connect 45 neighborhoods.

During the first weekend, crews will disassemble the scaffolding that has allowed workers to safely remove lead-based paint and make structural repairs to the bridge. The bridge will be lowered to its final elevation during the week of June 11-15. During the second week, the contractor will pour the concrete trail and complete touch-up repairs.

All access points to the shops at Midtown Place, the Kroger shopping center, Ponce Place and Ford Factory Lofts will be open and accessible during this road closure. The closures start at 9p on Friday and will reopen by 5a Monday. Detour signs and off dutypolice officers will be provided to direct motorists.

But it's not necessarily the best time of the year to get inked.

"The skin is very sensitive when the tattoo is still fresh," Atlantabased tattoo artist Kurt Fagerland said. "You need to keep a new tattoo out of the sun and the pool. The healing process needs it to be covered, and that's not the easiest thing to do in the summer."

The 34-year-old transplant from Long Island did a few guest artist stints in New York before moving to Atlanta, where he now works at *Memorial Tattoo* in Cabbagetown. His interest in drawing goes to his childhood. He did his first tattoo on himself when he was 16 and earned a degree in fine arts with a minor in education from New York Institute of Technology. He spent a few years as a teacher before deciding to pursue a career as a tattoo artist with an apprenticeship at Cort's Royal Ink Tattoo Studio in Patchogue, New York.

"When you're putting a picture on the body, it's three-dimensional, like a sculpture. You need to accentuate certain lines and curves that are on the body instead of going against them. Follow the contours of the body."

For others looking to get a summertime tattoo, Fagerland's advice is keep your skin cool and dry, and let a talented artist be your guide.

Hogan, 47, was born and raised in the working-class Cabbagetown neighborhood, a few miles east of downtown Atlanta. The predominantly Appalachian neighborhood was filled with wooden row houses that sheltered millworkers. Cabbagetown is a block away from the historic Oakland Cemetery.

"Omigosh!," Hogan says. "There's a marble statue of a lion stabbed with a flag and he's

the Confederate dead. Supposedly on certain battle memorial nights he roams the cemetery. I would go there every single day."

Hogan polished her craft singing harmonies with Neko Case, Jakob Dylan and others. "Being a sideman is a whole different thing," she said. "Harmony singing is 90 percent listening and 10 percent output." And now, Hogan is in the midst of band rehearsals for a tour that will

accompany her major label solo debut "I Like To Keep Myself In Pain", due on June 5th and is chock-full of bracing stories. "Dusty Groove" is flavored with sweet Southern soul and a nod to Dusty Springfield, Jon

Langford puts a pop-rock groove on "Haunted" while Robbie Fulks stretches out to channel cocktail chanteuse in writing "Whenever You're Out of My Sight (I Go Out of My Mind)."
