Inman Park growth

A mixed-use project that could transform the commercial heart of Inman Park is expected to break ground as early as July. Developers behind the 280 Elizabeth St. project expect the ^{\$}45 million complex will be completed in the third quarter of next year, joining a groundswell of rental, dining and retail options in the area, reports *East Atlanta Patch*.



Positioned about a block from the *Beltline's Eastside Trail*, the 3.4-acre property is bounded by Elizabeth Street, North Highland and Lake avenues and the Inman Park Village project — formerly a forlorn, post-industrial district that's been revitalized in recent years. Businesses such as *Savi Urban Market*, *Pure Taqueria* and the restaurant *Fritti* will all face the development, which project leaders say will incorporate different aesthetics to reflect the modern-meets-traditional pocket of Inman Park it will occupy.

The project will have 201 apartments and 39,000 square feet of retail space. Some 19,000 square feet of that is designated for restaurants; initial plans call for at least three new restaurants, each with leafy "green roof" features. A "water wall" feature and public green spaces are meant to lure pedestrians through a public corridor into the heart of the project, which will connect to an existing small park and pond near *IPV lofts*.

The design also includes a swimming pool and a 570-space parking deck, which has been a bone of contention with neighbors. Since the concept was first presented to the neighborhood, the development team has promised the parking deck will be internalized and all but invisible from surrounding streets. Last year, residents against the project argued the Atlanta Urban Design Commission acted beyond the scope of its powers in granting 280 Elizabeth St. some variances. A judge ruled in favor of developers earlier this year.

South City Partners and JPX Works LLC, a partnership of Atlanta-based developers, brought the first official renderings of their vision before the Inman Park Neighborhood Association for a preview this week. Several businesses that call the current structures home have been ordered to leave by July 9 — "Please, please support them through that last day," one official pleaded — though the theatre group Dad's Garage will remain throughout July, to finish out its season before heading to a temporary home in Little Five Points.

Tuesday, May 15th, 2013 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center) Minutes by Recording Secretary, Whitney Cheesbro

Meeting called to order at 7:04p by Ben Braxley.

- 1. *Valencia Hudson, City of Atlanta Liaison Public Safety,* announced that Natalyn Archibong in attendance. Natalyn Archibong spoke, she noted the budget will be discussed at an upcoming public hearing at city hall 5/15/2013. Full budget details are available on the City of Atlanta website.
- 2. *APD, Officer Shaver* addressed the community, introduced Lt McGhee to talk about home alarm systems and gave out pamphlets to reduce false alarms. False alarms are a big problem in Atlanta; there were over 59,000 false alarms last year. HP 592013 -2014 changes regulations concerning alarm monitoring services and requires the monitoring service to call the owner of the alarm to verify of the alarm and reduce the waste of municipal dollars by police and firefighter resources responding to false alarms.

Officer Shaver reminded the community about the clean car campaign, and noted that recently an uptick in the theft of catalytic converters has occurred. If you see something, call 911. Be mindful of the regulations and laws of the community. No bounce houses or alcohol are allowed in public spaces, including sidewalks and parks.

- 3. Minutes of the last meeting approved.
- 4. *Treasurers report:* Karin notes the ending balance is \$6,072, there were not many expenses paid last month. She converted the accounting software to QuickBooks.
- 5. Welcome Committee: Great Roll Call party to welcome new neighbors last month.
- 6. *CI Connect report:* Barb reports that the budget is on track. Peachy Park has the grant money to add items such as a pavilion, water fountain, and benches; there will be a vote next month. The City of Atlanta is installing the new fence along the wall will be up in two weeks.
- 7. *HP committee:* Jared reports the committee is very busy right now. The properties discussed: 652/658 Memorial Drive, 250 Powell Street, and 261 Powell Street. The UDC previously denied splitting the lot at 261 Powell St into two lots. 250 Powell St has a new contractor and amended plan to fit the HP regulations. Motion made to support the new plan conditional on UDC recommendations was unanimously approved.


Memorial Drive: after long debate, focusing primarily on the contentious parking variance request, there were five separate variances voted upon:

- 1. Certificate of appropriateness: For 29, Against 3
- 2. Parking variance: For 20, Against 22
- 3. Dumpster distance variance: For-19, Against 16
- 4. Plant trees of smaller size than regulations: For 40, Against 0
- 5. Architectural plans: For 31, Against 2

For further detail on the extent and nature of the debate, see full minutes to be posted on the CNIA website. Note that landlord protested the vote, as he felt he should have one vote per tenant, not one vote as the landlord.

- 8. **NPU U update:** John Dirga notes that Peachy Park not yet up to code and there is a temporary barrier, please stay off the grass until park is open.
- 9. Security Patrol and Neighborhood Watch Robert and Matt feel the neighborhood bylaws need updating and want to add Neighborhood Watch committee to the bylaws. They are also working on the end of year report

- 10. *Boulevard Tunnel Initiative* Saturday is the big clean up day combined with the Year of Boulevard. Please come and help! 9a meet at Randolph and Edgewood. We will go to *Noni's* afterwards to celebrate.
- 11. Cabbagetown Reunion Brad deserves recognition for making this event happen. Little's is the host and street will be closed between Shelton and Gaskill St. The 1st Saturday in June is the Cabbagetown Reunion as decreed by the governor. Event will begin around 11a, and there will be stages between Little's and the Bed & Breakfast. Event will also include morning yoga, bike polo, and corn hole. Requested \$500 from CNIA and CI for support to cover expenses such as permits and police directing traffic. Motion to approve \$500 request approved unanimously.
- 12. *CI elections* the new president is Ashley McCarthy. Whitney Cheesbro nominated and elected to serve on CI as the CNIA representative.
- 13. Neighborhood Yard Sale is June 8th, more information coming soon.
- 14. *New business:* need a new NPU-N representative. John Dirga volunteers, motion approved and unanimously approved.
- 15. *Proposed Fuqua development on Glenwood:* Per the notice in the last Cabbagetown Neighbor newsletter, approved unanimously the resolution that opposes the development as proposed as it does not comply with the Subarea 4 Master Plan for Beltline Development.
- 16. Meeting adjourned approx 9:56p.



A gigbit Beltline?

The Atlanta Beltline could soon have zippy Internet connectivity – in addition to its speedy bike trails.

The City of Atlanta is considering lighting up the 22-mile corridor with "gigabit Internet" – ultra-fast Internet access via fiber optic cable. FTTP (fiber-to-the-premise) technology delivers Internet speeds of between 10Mbps and 300 Mbps. Internet speeds via coaxial cable connection, in comparison, typically ranges between 1Mbps and 6Mbps.

Atlanta's economic developers wants to drive commerce to the Beltline and hope high-speed Internet connectivity will lure tech, digital media and health care firms. Such businesses need to transfer large files electronically and stream high definition video and audio.

"The high-speed Internet access will support greater innovation and entrepreneurs," said Eloisa Klementich, director of business development with Invest Atlanta, the city's economic development arm. "The key is at what price."

Indeed, installing high-speed fiber optic cable in built-up areas is expensive because it requires tearing up streets to lay down the cable. The Beltline, however, is undergoing major renovations and infrastructure upgrades, including the laying of pipes that will deliver electricity and other utilities. Those pipes could also carry the fiber optic cables, Klementich said.

A gigabit-enabled Beltline could help revitalize the city's Southside which has, until now, been economically underdeveloped.

High-speed Internet access would help the nearby *Ponce City Market*, a mixed use redevelopment being marketed to tech companies and the millenials who work there.

The \$200 million redevelopment of a mammoth former *Sears* building will include 274 residential units, 330,000 square feet of retail and 450,000 square feet of office space. At least two tech companies — *athenahealth* and *Cardlytics* — are planning to take large chunks of office space in Ponce City.

"We see what Google's doing, we know that AT&T is interested, we know that other cities have small (gigabit) networks," Klementich said, noting Invest Atlanta is in talks with Google and has "Georgia Tech on board."

FTTP technology is available in a few communities across the United States, most notably the Google Fiber initiative in Kansas City and Gigabit Squared project in Seattle.

FTTP provides Internet access by running fiber optic cable from an Internet Service Provider to the home or business. Fiber optic cables signals are sent via pulses of light rather than electricity. Therefore, data can be sent extremely quickly with little deterioration.


Savages - Silence Yourself.

Responsibilities include emailing previous participants to tell them it is time to sign up again, update website with participating Restaurants, provide them with load-in instructions, stand at the Entrance of Krog on the morning of the festival and point down Estoria street where they pick their own spot, and keep them supplied with chili cups.

Logistics Coordinator: Logistics requires the least amount of time the day of the festival but it is very important time. Between 8a and 11a we load 100 chili cookers, 100 artists, 30 vendors, and 30 restaurants into the streets of Cabbagetown. As logistics coodinator you direct volunteers that you place on corners, to yell and point and tell folks where to go. We have this down to a science. A science that is not pretty but it gets done every year and no one looses an eye.

Assistants to the Volunteer Coordinator: We have the best volunteer coordinator in the world in Katie Butler but she needs some co-members to pull off some shifts for the fest because as far as jobs go, we are wrangling volunteers from 6a to 7p and I would love for Katie to see some festival this year. You will get to direct folks to their already assigned posts, reassign if needed, show them how to eat free food and drink free beer, and you get to meet the best folks in Atlanta because the volunteered for us!

Web Site Manager: We update the website with all the chili cooker team names, participating restaurant, sponsors, vendors, and artist. If you are detailed, like working on the computer with WordPress and have about an hour a week to devote to our website, we would love to have you.

Last but not least a Secretary: We need someone to record our meetings and track all our wonderful ideas for Chomp so we can carry them out.

Tunes from the Tombs The bamboo forest

We reached out to our neighbor Mr. Bruce Purvis to help elaborate a story about a giant our children have invented. They call the giant "Abiyoyo". A surprising outcome of this exchange with our neighbor was that besides becoming a steward of our children's stories, HE also became a character in the park folklore!

Abiyoyo lives in the Bamboo Forest with his wife and his daughter Rosebud. Rosebud turned one year old on January 26th of this year! The Bamboo Forest is the bamboo thicket in Mr. Purvis's backyard where it meets the park's sidewalk near the Mollie Street entrance. Our children in the multi-age class constructed a mailbox for Abiyoyo's family with hopes of befriending him and helping him build positive relationships with children, neighbors, and fairies living in a fairy tree house across the park.

After receiving our letter explaining the story and our children's request for Abiyoyo's family to have the mailbox at their house, Mr. Purvis responded to our petition to install the mailbox that would glide between pulleys in and out of the Bamboo Forest. In his response, Mr. Purvis wrote:

"...I am happy that the children have come to realize that, indeed, Abiyoyo has become more friendly, and often wishes he had a means to communicate with the world around him...by the way, I believe I have heard him refer to his wife as Primrose. He calls her Prim for short.

I think the mailbox is a wonderful idea, and that it would be greatly appreciated, by Abiyoyo and his family. My concern would be the safety of the children, of course. Sometimes, uninvited visitors to the Bamboo Forest leave behind litter and trash, glass bottles and other items that might be unsafe. Abiyoyo and I try to keep the forest as clean as possible, but I am older, and often find it difficult to keep the area clean, and Abiyoyo, well, he is so big there are some spots in the forest that he just doesn't fit into. But, if the children promise never to enter the forest without a grown-up, to watch out for them, and make sure that they stay safe, I think that the mailbox would be a wonderful gift to Abiyoyo and his family.

I sometimes hear Abiyoyo talking, through the bamboo, and I have heard him express his regret for the things he has taken from Mulberry, and how he has been trying to curb his appetite for fairies. These things are very difficult for him to control, but I feel that deep inside, he would like to see a time, one day, when all of the inhabitants of the park will be welcome to his Bamboo Forest. "

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Public safety on the Beltline

The Atlanta Police Department (APD) in its strong commitment to the *Atlanta Beltline Project*, will be launching a new unit within APD, to provide Public Safety to the Atlanta Beltline, it's adjoining parks, and communities. This comes from a grant awarded to APD from the U.S. Department of Justice. The new unit will be called the APD's *Path Force Unit*, and will consist of (15-20) police officers that

will patrol the Atlanta Beltline, adjoining parks and communities.

The Patrolling methods will come in the form of foot patrols, bicycle patrol, horse patrol and specialized motorized vehicles. In addition to actively patrolling, we will also offer programs to engage and foster citizen participation through our community orientated policing model. An example of this will be to incorporate a

Trail Watch Program, similar to a Neighborhood Watch Program but tailored to the Atlanta Beltline Trail sections.

I have been working closely with the Atlanta Beltline since the start of this year in creating the new Path Force unit, and in developing programs. I regularly attend Atlanta Beltline meetings, and provide input on making sure crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) methods are being used in its design: www.ncpc.org


In addition to receiving other agency's policies, I have actually traveled to other major cities that have active urban trail systems to study how they deliver public safety and programs. I have also partnered with

the *Rails to Trails Conservancy* which is a nonprofit group dedicated in promoting trail systems. This has allowed me to incorporate a best practices approach in our delivering Public Safety to the Atlanta Beltline project.

The Path Force Unit will be located at the *Reynolds Town Lofts* located at 890 Memorial Drive directly next to the Reynoldstown Trail. We plan on launching the new unit sometime in June and will

invite all of our stakeholders and community members to a opening event. In addition we are planning a media press release for the launch, and plan on using social media and community blogs to communicate along with regularly attending community Neighborhood Planning meetings.
