Cabbagetown Needs You As we near the end of our term of office, many of our officers will be rotating off (we are limited to two-year consecutive terms). I'm extremely proud of what this group – along with the many

volunteers of Cabbagetown - has accomplished these past two years. Along with regular activities, here are some of the new ones:

> Established Land Use & Transportation Committee; held regular meetings throughout the year. Merged with **Historic Preservation** Committee. Prepared

updates to the Cabbagetown Landmark Guidelines submitted to the Atlanta Urban Design Commission.

 Established Hospitality Committee & formalized relationship with Roll Call Events, a twice-yearly activity to welcome new residents; formalized Christmas Crawl as a function of the Hospitality Committee.

 Established a Neighborhood Watch Steering Committee; signed up Block Captains for our streets; recognized by City of Atlanta with signage as an official NW program; established a new communication platform at Nextdoor. com focusing on fast safety tips with over 350 registrants; prepared and received grant and donations to fund future training and activities.

- · Established the Public Safety Committee with a Neighborhood Watch group as the active body.
- Mentored the newly created Boulevard Tunnel Initiative which is coordinating the clean-up, improvements and murals for the tunnel.

· Coordinated and spearheaded redesign of Three Points Triangle; held neighborhood workday to implement the design and plantings.

Supported the revived Cabbagetown Reunion

event held on the first Saturday in June, as prescribed by Georgia Proclamation.

• Established a By-Laws Committee to create a new set of by-laws, the first complete reorganization since the creation of CNIA in 1994; held two hearings and adopted at Nov, 2013 CNIA meeting.

 Completed installation of QuickBooks for financial record-keeping; provides transparency and full access with easy transition each year for Treasurer, President and other key personnel.

· Redesigned the Cabbagetown website, including a repository with public access for vital documents of the organization. Included a subscription feature so residents can access announcements, information and documents (www.Cabbagetown.com)

 Designed & Installed seven "Historic Cabbagetown" Street sign headers.

 Worked with the City to get missing street signs and directional signs installed.

Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

Tuesday, February 11th, 2014 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center). Minutes Recorded by Whitney Cheesbro.

Meeting called to order at 7:07p

1. *Public Safety - Valencia Hudson,* City of Atlanta Liaison for Natalyn Archibong. Street sweeping is going on, please try to keep cars off the street if possible. Neighbors discussed need for a one way – do not enter sign at Powell and Memorial, she will look into getting a sign.

2. APD Report - Due to the weather, Officer Shaver is not here this week.

3. Announcements – Barb and Shirley: Cabbagetown Strong In 2008, a tornado devastated our neighborhood, but the community worked together to rebuild. Now the annual event is held to remind everyone how the community came together. April 5th will see an Art, Roll and Stroll – visiting Six Feet Under, Agave, The Stacks, and Milltown. There will be an art auction and silent auction. The roll and stroll is ^{\$}35 for two beers and food. Every year they focus on a charity to help. This year the fundraiser is near and dear to Shirley at Sweet Cheats – her family lives in the Philippines and are helping others rebuild their lives. Her family has adopted three families that are now living with them. There is a group of retired air force men who will build the houses, they can build three houses for ^{\$}15k. Need volunteers. Goal is ^{\$}15k. There will also be a raffle for gift certificates of ^{\$}10 or more. There is a ^{\$}75 certificate for Rathbuns, two ^{\$}50 certificates for One Eared Stag, and an Ipad!

4. Minutes of last meeting - approved unanimously.

5. Treasurers report – Karen is out – beginning balance was ^{\$}5,788.
 Wrote checks for newspaper and received advertising deposits.
 ^{\$}6,219 is the ending balance. CNIA budget for 2014 was read by Lyn.
 Motion to adopt approved unanimously.

6. Public Safety/Neighborhood Watch – Robert and Matt – no new news, it's been fairly quiet.

7. *Hospitality* – next roll call is coming up at Amada Bolster's house. Email Karen if you know of new neighbors to invite.

8. Cl Connect – Lynne read Cl treasurers' report and presented the balance sheet and program budgets. Cl is currently undergoing a renewal of the lease agreement for the building and the parks. Lynne is trying to look into raising the funds into getting the building rebuilt and make it a green bldg. Cl wants it to be a model community center. She spoke with Jared Serwer, an architect at *Perkins and Will* and dedicated member of our HP committee about his firm donating plans to us for a design. Over the history of Cl- they have spent ⁵60k, of improvements, not including routine maintenance on the center. Neighbors were enthusiastic about the idea. Lynne wants to have an advisory committee – approved unanimously.

8. Historic Preservation – Katie. Milltown has asked for a change in hours to add breakfast. HP has approved. UDC has asked for more information regarding the parking lot. Milltown needs to have a clear listing of hours of operations for Milltown and *Profiling Solutions* and must have appropriate signage. At rear of Milltown, code requires there to be a 6ft. fence between the houses and the parking lot, but the hill

is so steep it doesn't stay up. Can't have two dumpsters, and they have to get rid of the recycling dumpster, which they are upset about. In the front lot, the landscaping area has to be a 3ft. buffer – they have a 5ft. buffer with the trees, wants an exception to leave the trees in place. They will start to open at 7:30a. Neighbor asked about the 5ft vs 3ft buffer. It is a buffer with low landscaping and evergreens. Yes they exceed the 3ft. buffer, they just want to not lose the tree. Motion to approve subject to condition – unanimously approved.

670 Memorial Drive – asking for variances that have been turned down by HP. Parking variance request is to park across the street at *BarOne*. They claim it is a modeling studio for children, we don't think crossing Memorial Dr., (a busy state highway), is appropriate for that use. UDC denied application due to multiple problems. They are up for a hearing with UDC next Wednesday and they have not spoken to HP or CNIA- that is their burden. Normal course of events without coming before the Neighborhood is to automatically send a letter to deny the application. However the letter is not binding on UDC. Lyn will be in touch with Doug Young of UDC, we want to know what the application is and will appear before the UDC next Wednesday. Neighbors that are impacted are encouraged to attend. What we specifically object to is the parking variances, the dumpster placement, and circumvention of our review process.

9. BLVD Tunnel – Angela who has been working with Ben and Nicki (they just brought their baby home!). Latest is *Living Walls* has paired an artist from NY with our walls; his name is *Momo* and does abstract large scale work. Passed around drawings so we can see what the neighborhood thinks. There is a stipulation that the neighborhood can provide input. Looking to complete in April and have a block party. Motion to approve the art – approved unanimously.

10. NPU-N just got approval for AC units for their meeting space. Crywolf.us to register your home alarm. You can get fined for false alarms. BLVD Tunnel got approval for cameras to link to APD. Watershed will give you leak detection tablets. If you have concerns about housing or business licenses, Lauren Clayton, neighborhood solicitor can help. Proactive rezoning for the beltline postponed due to snow. Plaza Theater applied for a liquor license.

11. Old business. Neighbor asked about the air quality study? We have been unable to get them to respond and follow up with the community about the project. We would all like to them to follow through and bring us the report. We agreed to pay for the censors and data and to view the website. They are on the website. Two of three censors work.

Request for nominations for officers for the March election, most of the board members must rotate positions and we need new volunteers!

Prestige plates drawings – we liked the drawings! Looks like the sign toppers on street signs. Will move forward with the car size tags to order and sell for ^{\$}15 plate, will commit to buying 100. Motion approved.

Meeting ended 8:50p.

A Platinum Center

It's time once again to renegotiate our Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Lease Agreement for the Community Center with the City of Atlanta. While we were hopeful back in 2004 that we would be able to support our own utilities by 2014, we find it would be impossible to do so with the cost of those utilities; gas, electric, and water being close to ^{\$}25,000 per year. And yes, our tenants, the *Grant Park Cooperative School*, had hoped they would be able to

support their 60% share of the utilities by 2014. However, at \$15,000 per year they would probably find themselves closer to closing their doors at the Cabbagetown Campus.

Therefore, our first and immediate goal is to negotiate with the city to maintain the utilities for at least the next couple of years and then begin to phase in one utility one year at a time. In the meantime, we are doing energy assessments on the gas and the electric. The larger issue is that the water bill is excruciatingly high coming in at around ^{\$}14,678 in 2013. This means there is a leak! On Thursday, February 20th, a licensed plumber found the leak under the concrete pad in front of the Community Center just west of the water meter. We are getting a bid for the repair and we will have the City foot the bill to correct. The electric assessment was performed on Tuesday, February 18th and we are awaiting the written report.

With all this said, we now realize that it is time to get proactive in regards to the Community Center. We know from our meeting with the Parks Department that they ultimately do not want to own the building. While they will honor another lease agreement with us, the day is going to come when they are ready to sell and tell us we can either buy the property at fair market value (fair market value is an entire article unto itself) or we will sell to someone else (*I double dog dare them*), which brings us to the following idea:

What if we were to pursue enough grant funds to buy the building and redevelop our community center and pre-school into a model community center? We're talking totally energy efficient systems including (if possible and if prudent) solar roof panels/shingles, geothermal heat, icynene insulation, cisterns for the gray water – have I left anything out? Yes, let's go for the Platinum Certification! I have spoken to a local architectural firm who believe this project could be viable.

The reason I have stepped up to write this article is that I have offered to lead an advisory committee to pull this project together. We'll dedicate this next year to getting it off the ground and thoroughly investigating the possibilities.

At our next CNIA meeting, we would love your thoughts, your input, and to vote if we actually want to pursue this concept. The meeting is Tuesday, March 11th, 7p at the Community Center. Please, please join us to put this idea into reality.





I've got something against fences, I think.

Why I'm thinking enough to levy such attention on fences is something I'd like to explain. See, I'm in India (yeah, I know) up in a hotel room, with nothing to do but think. I had thought that



India would be all excitement, but it turns out that if you're in Bangalore over by where all the programmers work, you're hanging out in the subcontinent's version of Spaghetti Junction. Not a good place to walk around and gather one's thoughts.

I'm better today than I was when I first arrived last weekend, though. When my cab pulled up to the hotel it took me a minute to see that it was there. From the street level all you could see was a wall

with a small gap in it. The cab had to pull up to a swing arm and a couple of traffic cones and wait for a security guard to pop the trunk and take a look see before entering the compound.

I spent my entire first day looking out of my window down at that street. Waiting for the elevator, I would look out another window and see packs of wild dogs roaming the brush, dirt roads and shacks. I walked along the edge of the pool downstairs looking over that fence at the outer ring road traffic, reading about addiction in society, about community decline and tyranny from within and from without.

Man, I was terrified. No part of that town could ever have been as dull as the little part I made for myself with that wall.

This was not a good state of affairs. So I talked to the folks I was working with and asked them: wow, it must be a pretty dangerous neighborhood, right? Otherwise, why have that big old fence around it and all that security?

Nope. I got laughed at a bit. The only solid danger in my area would apparently be getting ripped off by an autorickshaw driver. So that evening, I went on a walk. My shoes got dusty, but I didn't feel like I was in any danger. There wasn't anything interesting to do, either, which is another thing, but I've managed to keep myself occupied by repeatedly overpaying autorickshaws to take me to the Shiva temple.

I'm not really sure what the fences lesson here is. That I'm a scared, naive American in a foreign land? Impossible. Fences are a little silly? Maybe - if nobody's getting held up at gunpoint, maybe they are. Fences help solidify socioeconomic barriers between peoples? Fences help part frightened foreigners from their money?

I have found that India has a solution that I can apply to this dilemma: they make big cheesy statues of people, and I can sit down in front of one of them. Which is why I've been going to the Shiva temple. That, and it's the only place I know to go to outside the fence.

We met at the starting line of the Hunger Walk/Run down at Turner Field as we had done in so many years past. When I agreed to write the Cabbagetown nightlife piece, I did so knowing one certainty: March's column would write itself. Forget Margi Gras, the Equinox, and Oscar Night, March is all about *St. Patrick's day.*

With the Kane crest inked on my chest and the Irish flag on my wall, it's easy to see that I love this holiday. I own a t-shirt from nearly every Irish pub I've visited (my favorite is from Finn McCool's in Equator),

and after reviewing my collection, I've compiled my three favorite St. Patrick's day destinations in Atlanta for this years' celebration.

My first destination is where I spent last year's Paddy's Day: the annual *Kegs and Eggs* bar crawl in Virginia Highlands. From 10a to 2p on Saturday, March 15th. Remember when everyone moved to Cabbagetown in their 20's to party and then flocked in droves for the areas North and East of here with the better schools as soon as they hit their 30's and their kids were out of diapers? Well I don't. I moved here six years ago, when I was already pushing the age limit for **97 Estoria**, and just months before I became pregnant with my daughter. So for me, Cabbagetown has always been more of a close-knit, family-oriented community with two parks, walkable streets and a friend willing to watch my kid for a couple of hours on just about every block.

We bought our house on Pearl Street when our daughter was two, still not knowing what we would do about school, but knew we'd figure it out when the time came. And then, hallelujah, the great redistricting of 2012 came. A group of concerned parents and neighbors got together and lobbied to get Cabbagetown zoned for *Parkside Elementary*. For me, personally, it wasn't so much the fact of getting zoned for Parkside that was exciting, but the thought that maybe this strong community of parents and children would no longer be separated when their kids turned five.

Oddly enough, many folks in our neighborhood still don't seem to know about our local zoned elementary school, or how lucky we are to have such a great school with no waiting lists and no cost to attend. I just got back from their open house and I am so excited for the fall when my daughter will start there. We walked in to the natural light filled new state-ofthe-art building and were greeted by warm, smiling faces and a table with fresh-baked goods, Caribou Coffee and orange juice. Not quite the picture many folks seem to have when they envision Atlanta Public Schools. We then got an hour long presentation where teachers, staff, parents and students alike all gushed about how great their school was and how proud they were to be part of the Parkside family. For me, that was truly one of the more remarkable things - here is a school that seems to run so smoothly and seamlessly, yet there was such a strong feeling of family and community there. We saw an entire class of kindergartners recite perfectly their pledge to learn, respect themselves and others and achieve.

Parkside is known for their commitment to educating the whole child. They have an average enrollment of 600 students per year and an average classroom size of 21. Parkside is able to attend to the need of a wide range of students, with strong support for the gifted and talent as well as special needs children. Title One grants allow for lots of amazing extras like cutting edge technology including tablets connected to smartboards in the classrooms, a community garden program, and Spanish class starting in Kindergarten.

And enrichment doesn't stop during the school day. They also have a comprehensive after-school program as well various after-school enrichment activities including soccer, dance, tennis, karate and piano lessons. Many teachers devote their free time to various clubs including an award-winning robotics and chess team. They have always had a strong and active PTA, with many opportunities to get involved with the school.

So, if you have kids, I hope to see you there in the fall or in years to come. Tours are offered every other Wednesday and registration should begin in April. Tucked away in a brick warehouse in Cabbagetown is something you don't see much anymore: a small, family-owned factory. With around 25 employees, *Colgate Mattress* produces some of the most popular baby mattresses in the country.


"We're one on the few manufacturers left in the city," said Dennis Wolkin, national sales manager for the company. Wolkin is the third generation of his family to work at Colgate. His grandfather started the business when he moved to Atlanta after returning from World War II.

"There was a lack of quality baby mattresses and he said, I can build better ones," Wolkin said of his grandfather. One of their most highprofile fans is Martha Stewart, who bought a Colgate mattress for her grandchild, Wolkin said. She later featured a Colgate mattress on an episode of the *Martha Stewart Show* focusing on nurseries.

Wolkin said they've always maintained a good relationship with Cabbagetown, even when the neighborhood wasn't so good. He said his uncle hired a lot of local people, especially young people, to work in the factory. They provided jobs, and in turn, they were able to avoid becoming victims of the crime that plagued the area at the time, Wolkin said.

Wolkin said his family saw potential in the neighborhood as well as a couple of other logistical advantages: easy access to *MARTA* and interstate highways.


"People are concerned about chemicals in mattresses," Wolkin said. *"We give people an option."*





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Google versus Comcast

Cabbageheads rejoice! Atlanta is a candidate for *Google's* new, ultra-fast fiber optic Internet and television service, finally giving us an alternative to *Comcast*.

The service, called *Fiber*, operates at 100 times the speed typically delivered by Comcast, and at a competitive price. That makes it possible to download a feature-length movie in a few seconds. The more devices you've got running in your home, the more likely you'd be to notice a big improvement in performance with Google's 1-gigabit-per-second service.

The company's timing is either lucky or highly strategic: It comes amid hand-wringing over Comcast's bid to acquire Time Warner Cable, further collapsing the already slim number of cable Internet providers. By going public with its plans to evaluate 34 key markets nationwide as sites for Fiber, Google also creates buzz around what some onlookers have hailed as a serious challenge to existing providers like Comcast.

"Google is really out of the gate doing something different that is hard for incumbents," says Ron Hutchins, Georgia Tech's chief technology officer. Hutchins' "something different" is a radical upgrade of the fiber optic networks in the markets Google Fiber enters. Where Google believes the market conditions are right, it's willing (and able) to supplant what has been a gradual, piecemeal evolution away from traditional copper transmission lines with a build-it-today strategy.

Depending on how many cities Google chooses, the cost could well be measured in billions. To make that investment worthwhile, Google is looking for two main things: a reasonably hospitable physical environment and a city government willing to help in a big way with logistical things like detailed maps and expedited permits. The Cabbagetown Neighbor hopes the City of Atlanta steps up.

In the few markets where Fiber currently exists –Provo, Utah, and Kansas City, with Austin up next — Internet service costs ^{\$}70 a month, and Internet plus TV is priced at ^{\$}120. The up-front "construction fee" and equipment charges can run to several hundred dollars, although Google waives most of that if the customer keeps the service for a year or two.

Despite resurgence, vacancies dot Atlanta

Look around: Atlanta's building surge involves more than glass towers and mega-retail projects. Intown neighborhoods are crackling with the thwack of hammers. Which makes it all the more cringe-worthy to see vacant homes rotting away. First stop: Funky little Cabbagetown, where fewer homes appear to be on the verge of toppling over than during the Recession doldrums.

Call it gentrification (bad) or blossoming (good), one thing's certain: vacant properties aren't doing anyone any favors. *Creative Loafing* floated novel (if quixotic) ideas as part of their Atlanta wishlist for 2014: *"How about proposing a law that forces owners of abandoned homes to tear down or fix up the properties, something that could particularly help West Atlanta?"* staffers enthused. *"If they do neither, community nonprofits could take over the property and create a better use."*
