Potluck Results: Your Community Center Redevelopment Exploration Team is working diligently to get through the 100+ surveys y'all submitted at the potlucks. Our hearts are warmed by the responses to the first question on our survey: What makes Cabbagetown unique? The majority of answers focused on the special relationships between neighbors here and on the unique historical character of the neighborhood.

You also offered thoughtful suggestions about what you would like to see in a revamped Community Center. You picture a place that is open and welcoming, and a place where you'd want to host your own special events. You suggested providing a place for neighbors to trade tools, musical instruments, and skills, and a place that would showcase the artists in our community. You'd like to make the Community Center more functional for our small neighborhood by providing space for fitness activities and small businesses.

Missed out? If you did not participate in a potluck but still want to share ideas, please join us on March 24th, at *Milltown Tavern* between 6p and 8p for one final opportunity to fill out a survey.

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Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

Tuesday, February 9th, 2016, 7p at Cabbagetown Community Center. Meeting conducted by Katherine Dirga. Minutes recorded by Jocelyn Chen Wise.

1. Approved January minutes

2. Valencia Hudson, City of Atlanta Liaison Not in attendance.

3. Lt. Floyd - Atlanta Police Department (Zone 6 Precinct)

Crime has mostly been around the Moreland Ave corridor, Moreland and Wylie, Memorial Drive. More issues in Glenwood Park area. Police are increasing their visibility in these corridors. Centralized investigative units addressing issues on Flat Shoals. Encourage calling police when you see issues.

There were a few car break-ins around Cabbagetown but no "clusters." A resident reports a lot of Illegally parked food trucks on Krog Street that are not using loading zones, making it dangerous for drivers. This is part of Zone 602, they are going to regularly check that area and give parking citations but encouraged calling 911 about illegally parked vehicles. Resident also suggested talking to management at *Krog Street Market* management to speak to their delivery truck dispatchers regarding the problem.

4. Financial Report

Balance ^{\$}9,222. Expenses included pizza for meeting, invitations for Christmas Crawl, Georgia State license renewal.

5. Committee and Other Reports

CI Connect

The 2016 budget meeting was adopted at the 2/8/16 meeting. Ester Peachy Pavillion concrete footer is going to be poured. Some concrete sidewalks have been repaired, working on getting more repairs done. CI Board will have 2-3 openings in May. In the process of interviewing for Chomp & Stomp Chair, can email *cabbagechat@gmail.com* or talk to Tova Baruch.

There will soon be yard signs announcing neighborhood meetings. Residents can volunteer to display yard signs on their property.

NPU (John Dirga)

Meetings are on the 3rd Thursday at Little Five Points Community Center. Police department is doing a hiring campaign for 300 officers. Watershed management is trying to increase reservoir (Bellwood Quarry), we currently have a 3 day reserve of water, aim to get to 30 days. Hearing on commercial water meter was on 2/9/16. There will be a vote for re-approval of 1[%] sales tax which watershed says will prevent water bills from otherwise dramatically increasing.

Events committee will soon be moved under Parks Department, may affect *Chomp & Stomp* application process but not clear yet. There is a large development going in near Freedom Parkway and Buddy's, was supported by Poncey Highland residents. 151 Flat Shoals in Reynoldstown was voted on and approved for rezoning (zoned MR5). Councilman Julian Bond is looking for 15 citizens to serve on an advisory board for general feedback, email him at *mbond@atlantaga.gov*.

Historic Preservation/Land Use (Matt Wise)

256 Powell. This property had been destroyed by the tornado, went to UDC in 2014 regarding two variances allowing them to rebuild home exactly as it had been. UDC said was ok to not build off-street parking as long as alley in back of home can be used as parking. Their plan is to pour a parking behind home. There is a deed restriction on the home disallowing alley from being blocked off. HP is fully supportive of this variance given that there is alley access for off-street parking. Voted and approved.

Parking and Traffic Committee (Richard Joyce)

Meetings will be last Monday of every other month (next meeting February 29th) at Community Center. Working on a survey that will go out to community about parking needs.

The reach of the committee hasn't been fully defined yet, may relate to **Beltline** traffic flow but will definitely focus on parking. Katie Butler currently serves on Imagine Memorial parking & transportation committee (Meets 1st Monday of the month), offers up her position to someone on this committee so there is greater connection.

Community Center Redevelopment (Lynne Splinter & Katie Butler) On Feb 6th, a series of potluck dinners throughout neighborhood generated 103 surveys of resident input on potential redevelopment of our Community Center. There will be an upcoming event at **Milltown Tavern** and another in the park.

In May, all feedback will be submitted to *Perkins & Will*, the 'hood's pro-bono consultant. Later, there will be a consultant working on project feasibility and planning. Cox Curry is the organization that will raise grant funds. Whitney Bolster is working with this group to identify 501(c)3's interested in being a part of the building use, making it more likely for the city to give the building to the neighborhood (CI) instead of trying to sell it to us.

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


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Where ya been? Where ya going? *A thousand spires*



In 2015, Karen Russian, a decade-long Cabbagehead discovered for herself why Prague has been called "the city of a thousand spires".

Everywhere she turned during her visit to the capital of the Czech Republic, she saw churches; literally hundreds of them. There are baroque churches, romanesque churches, gothic churches and more. And each seems more beautiful than the last. There's also Europe's oldest active synagogue.

Karen went to Prague to visit her friend, Helena. Helena spends most of her time in Atlanta but returns to her home city for a couple of months every year. She served as Karen's tour guide for much of

the visit. However, some days Karen just struck out on her own. There was so much to do and see in this charming ancient city. The days stretched into the evenings and on into the night.

Prague is nestled on the banks of the Vitava River. Overlooking the city is the magnificent Prague Castle, currently the residence and offices of the president of the country. Karen spent nearly a whole day touring this magnificent structure and the adjoining cathedral. Begun in the ninth century, Prague Castle is the largest ancient castle anywhere according to the Guiness Book of Records. It actually pre-dates the city by a few hundred years.

Another highlight was a visit to Prague's famed astronomical clock. It's a huge clock in a very tall tower and when it strikes the hour, there are figure of saints that appear and disappear at windows all around the façade. It's purported to be the oldest working public clock in the world (605 years old). Karen spent a very pleasant evening at a rooftop café where she could watch and listen to this phenomenon.

Karen discovered that the ancient city has retained its beauty and charm because it

was completely undamaged in World War II. She remarked on how friendly and helpful the people were. At times, she encountered a bit of a language barrier, but most people were willing to work through the communications problems. The Czech Republic split (amicably) with Slovakia in 1993 to become an independent democratic nation. Although Czechoslovakia was under Soviet Communist domination for nearly 40 years, there are virtually no vestiges of that repressive time.

Karen was able to visit a number of fabulous museums, wondrous theatres, opera houses and ballet venues. She also took a beautiful boat cruise on the Vitava River enabling her to see both the "Old Town" on one side of the river and the "Lesser Town" on the other.

The Charles Bridge linking the two was begun in the 14th century. Karen is not one to shy away from a bracing walk. Despite this being a city of some 1.2 million people, she was able to walk to most of the sites she wanted to see. But she tried out the public transportation system as well. She says it's an easy and inviting city in which to be a tourist.

Like most inveterate travelers, Karen is always looking toward her next adventure. At the moment, Paris is on her radar. She was there a long time ago and felt like she didn't get enough of the "City Of Light". But, just maybe, there's a bigger (or at least longer) trip in the offing. She is looking at the possibility of traveling to New Zealand later this year. Happy traveling, Karen.

American Aquarium Drinkers



Throughout its 22-year history, Wilco has taken on many labels – alt-country, dadrock, mom-rock, Americana, and others that don't do the music justice.

One undeniable and constant label, however, is damn good rock and roll band. Multiple lineups be damned, they are a band that has churned out quality (sometimes uneven) music in its time, and in these two decades, has become one of the more consistent live acts

in music. You'll never get cheated at a Wilco show, with most clocking in over two hours - that was the case with two sold out shows at *The Tabernacle* on February 10th and 11th.

Fans not familiar with the current tour practice of the band playing their incredible (and free for a time) newest record, *Star Wars*, in its entirety were possibly either enthralled with the new tracks - a mix of fuzz, frenetic drumming and saturated keyboards - or pacing back and forth to the bar, waiting for a familiar hit. Those that slept on the new songs have missed out, as it's the band's best music in years. The songwriting of Jeff Tweedy has never been sharper or more acerbic, and the musicianship is pure, especially from lead guitarist Nels Cline (a veteran avant garde player who just happened to turn 60) and drummer Glenn Kotche, who drives the band in every song, from the Ringo-like time signature on *"The Joke Explained"* to the subtle rolls on the misty album closer and highlight *"Magnetized"*.

Though the band has been playing the new material since the album release last year, you could really tell where their comfort lied in the older songs. The second half of the show stretched Wilco's history, with inspired takes on noise freak-out *"Via Chicago,"* a fever dream of a tune about murder, to the substoner bounce of *"Handshake Drugs"*, to the maybe-biographical *"The Late Greats,"* with an undoubtedly biographical *"you never hear 'em on the radio"* lyric.

The true interaction between members was most apparent on the encore, a fully-acoustic "hootenanny" set up with all crowding around a solitary microphone, bathed in four simple spotlights. Songs that were normally stacked with electronic layers ("*Misunderstood*," "A Shot in the Arm"), were stripped bare, the audience hanging on every note and word. The night closed with a faithful rendition of Bowie's "Space Oddity", undoubtedly to honor the late genius, but also a nod to the journey a man (or in this case, a band) can take in its lifetime.



You're a ghost. I'm an American...

High Spirits (1988) PG-13. Director: Neil Jordan. Performers: Peter O'Toole, Steve Guttenberg, Daryl Hannah, Liam Neeson, Beverly D'Angelo, Peter Gallagher, Jennifer Tilly, Martin Ferrero.

Peter Plunkett's (O'Toole) family castle has fallen into ruin, and he has no idea how to get out of debt. When his attempt to put off mortgage payments by inventing a postal strike fails, Plunkett finds that he has three weeks to pay or Castle Plunkett will be dismantled, flown to Malibu, and reconstructed as a theme park called Irish World.

All seems lost until Peter's mother unwittingly inspires a plot to bring the castle back to working order. Mrs. Plunkett believes in the ghosts of Castle Plunkett, insisting that she speaks to them regularly. Crazy as it may sound to Peter, the thought of supernatural inhabitants sparks the idea of faking a haunted castle experience for potential guests.

The guests include a pair of unhappy second honeymooners (Guttenberg and D'Angelo), a candidate for the priesthood (Gallagher), a ditzy single lady (Tilly), and a parapsychologist (Ferrero) with his family in tow. Upon arrival, the resident bus suffers a series of mishaps that lands everyone in the lake, soaked and already disappointed. This is just the beginning of the faulty magic tricks and barely executed illusions attempted by the castle employees over the course of the first night. A suit of armor on roller skates, a spinning bed, and a banshee on pulleys flying about outside the castle windows are just a few of the shenanigans that do little more than annoy the guests.

When the actual ghosts of Castle Plunkett can't take any more, they come out of the woodwork (well, stonework). These ghosts include the virgin bride, Mary Plunkett (Hannah), and her murderous husband, Martin Brogan (Neeson). Angry nuns, talking horses, and possessed dinner entrees cause more than a few changes in opinion about the existence of ghosts at Castle Plunkett. But will this be enough to save Peter from ruin?

As secrets are revealed and plots unwind, High Spirits showcases the wit and sarcasm of Peter O'Toole alongside the pratfalls and one-liners of the rest of the cast. This movie is truly representative of the '80s, which gives it license to be a little goofy and still be delightfully hilarious. And since the main character embodies a stereotypical (but delightfully well-played) whiskey loving Irishman, Cabbageheads may enjoy a viewing of High Spirits in preparation for St. Patty's Day.

Google Fiber Price Points

No more guessing! Google Fiber is finally providing details about how it will price its 1 Gbps service in Cabbagetown.

Google Fiber will offer its stand-alone 1 Gbps broadband service for ^{\$}70 a month. It will also give eligible Cabbageheads the option to bundle gigabit fiber and TV for between ^{\$}120 and ^{\$}130 a month.

Unique to the Atlanta rollout plan is that Google Fiber has replaced its "free" 5 Mbps offering – one that required a one-time \$300 installation fee – with a 100 Mbps tier for \$50 a month.

Google Fiber said that Atlanta and Cabbagetown customers who chose the Basic Internet 100 Mbps plan can upgrade to the Gigabit plan anytime, since the wiring and equipment will already be in place at their premises.

The one detail that's still lacking is when it will actually launch the service in Atlanta. Potential customers can access an apartment finder tool and a projected installation map to see if their apartment

is on the service provider's installation schedule. In addition, users can put their address into the website to receive updates on when the service will be coming to their neighborhood.

Gigabit broadband competition will heat up this year in Atlanta. Google Fiber is being joined by *AT&T* and *Comcast*, which will each deliver their own 1 Gbps services.

In Atlanta, the service provider revealed it is going to complement its own fiber builds by using existing network infrastructure like conduit and utility poles.

"We want to bring Google Fiber to as many residents in Metro Atlanta as possible, which is why we're building a brand new fiber network across nine cities in the area," Google Fiber said. "In addition to the construction that's already underway, we're connecting some apartment buildings in the suburbs of Atlanta using existing infrastructure so we can reach more people with gigabit speeds."



MARIA KHODORKOVSKY It's not like Grant Park is lacking in greenery and scenery, but waking up in Cabbagetown is an experience unlike any other.

We made the move two months ago, away from shiny stainless steel appliances and energy efficient windows, into a house where, if you place a marble in one corner of the bedroom, it'll be in the living room in under a minute. The place has got character.

It's also got the most beautiful birdsong

I've ever heard. Reading about the winged variety of Georgia feels a bit like stepping into a Dr. Seuss book: there are crakes and coots, limpkins and lapwings; plovers, boobies, gannets and gallinules. Not all of them are urban dwellers, but a great many can be seen perched in a tree or in a twirling, cackling cloud above the powerlines. For the armchair ornithologist in all of us, here's a quick primer on the 5 types of birds you're most likely to see around the neighborhood.

Northern Cardinal (Cardinalis cardinalis)

What to look for: A songbird with bright red plumage and red beak, the male is slightly larger than the female, who is brownishgray. They're common year-round and are probably cavorting in your backyard right now. Fun fact: This bird gets its name from the cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church, who wear brightly-colored red robes and caps.

Blue Jay (Cyanocitta cristata)

What to look for: Intensely blue wings are the hallmark of these birds, as well as long, black-and-blue tails and black bands around the eyes and breast. Fun fact: The crest atop the blue jay's head acts very much like a cat's tail. It's raised when the bird is excited or aggressive, bristles outward when the bird is frightened, and rests flat when the bird is enjoying a pleasant meal with its other jay buddies.

House Finch (Carpodacus mexicanus)

What to look for: Small and sharp-beaked, the House Finch has a red forehead and breast, brown tail, and streaked brown-andwhite belly. Fun fact: The male House Finch's coloration will vary depending on the kinds of berries it eats.

Tufted Titmouse (Baeolophus bicolor)

What to look for: This small bird is predominantly gray, with a reddish underbelly and black beak. Fun fact: 8 out of 10 young adults can't say "titmouse" without nudging the person to their right and giggling.

Song Sparrow (Melospiza melodia)

What to look for: Stout and bulky, the Song Sparrow's brown and gray streaks cover its body, tail, and head – all except its white underbelly. Fun fact: There are at least 35 known species of sparrow in North America, approximately 10 of which call the Southern states home.

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
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Still can't beat Little's Food Store
