### Cabbagetown's musical roots

Modern day Cabbagetown contributes much to the music scene. We've been spotlighted in music videos (Bouncin' Back) from Mystikal and we are home to a rich host of artists from virtually every musical genre.

One of our earliest luminaries was a gentleman known as Fiddlin' John Carson. In 1922, at the dawn of the radio era, Fiddlin' John Carson was a Cabbagetown housepainter. He first performed on WSB radio (in exchange for some whiskey) and played "Little old Log Cabin in the Lane."

He continued weekly performances for the rest of the year and by 1923 the *Atlanta Journal* claimed that Carson was the most

popular performer on WSB. Some credit Fiddlin' John Carson with the birth of "hillbilly music" or "old-time music."

Carson recorded an additional 150 songs and is generally credited as being the first country music performer. *Okeh Records* billed him as the "King of the Mountaineer Musicians."

In 2008, our own John Dirga was quoted in Paste Magazine saying this about Fiddlin'
John "... As far as I know, and I'm seldom wrong about important stuff like song lyrics, "The Devil Went Down to Georgia" is about Johnny."

### 1. Meeting called to order by President Lyn Deardorff at 7:05p

#### 2. Valencia Hudson

- a. April 28th is tire roundup at 815 Flat Schoals
- **b.** Sidewalk on Three Points Park: George talked to the city. They will pay for concrete only, no brick. They will do brick thanks to Natalyn Archibong who is paying for it out of her budget.
- c. Living Walls project is an agreement between Living Walls and Cabbagetown. She needs contact info at CSX. Atlanta owns part of the CSX and Marta walls. She will send Lyn the map.
- 3. Atlanta Police Department-Lieutenant
- *a.* Illegal Dumping on a vacant lot reported by neighbor. The Lieutenant Is sending someone out to make report tonight.
- **b.** Concerns about car break-ins in the neighborhood. 7 larcenies in the last two weeks. This is an on-going problem in our zone (zone 6) and the city. DO NOT leave stuff in your car. 3 auto thefts and 1 residential burglary.

#### 4. Minutes were approved unanimously.

#### 5. Committee Reports

- *a.* Treasurer: Ending balance for March \$6385.97. Expenses for corporation registration, newsletter and food.
- **b.** Hospitality: Roll call coming up on april 20<sup>th</sup> at Dan and Alicia Thompson's house on Berean. Twenty new neighbors identified since last Roll Call in October 2011.
- c. Public Safety: A rape occurred on April 1st on Waddell. Be careful. Information is limited at this time. Police did a sweep of the area today. Sam Gris (Public Safety Chair) is keeping up on the Inman Park listserv and trying to gather more info. It is not unusual for an investigation of a crime of this nature to be kept under raps until more info is gathered by police.

There was an incident on the listserv regarding two dogs. It was reported by a third party as a vicious dog attack and the information was incorrect as reported. There were no serious injuries and the two owners have resolved all issues.

Regarding car break-ins, be careful. DO NOT leave stuff in your car. If you see something, say something. Spoke with graffiti task force guy. Anything outside of the tunnel is arrestable offense.

Regarding reported March 15<sup>th</sup> aggravated assault at Bar One.

A homeless person was on the property and was not supposed to be. They thought he had a gun. They kicked him out and the police found him. He did not have a gun. This was not a guest, but someone who was unwanted on the property.

- d. Lyn: Be careful what you say on forums. Get the facts.
- e. Cl: Lyn reports that there is an election in May for four board positions. See newsletter for more info.
- *f.* NPU: Brad reports that from 3p-5p there is free swimming at MLK. We have \$500 allotted for sign toppers. Passed EPL plans. *g.* HP: no cases
- h. Land Use: this committee is getting organized. We need volun-

teers. Hope to have a meeting in the next few weeks.

#### 6. Old Business

a. Wellbeing Foundation: Barb Harper and Kyle F. Bidlack: Results of the online, live auction, cash donations and golf tournament totalled \$9371. Expenses totalled only \$60 thanks to Milltown's contributions. There is an upcoming car wash at Milltown to raise additional money. The effort also donated \$886 to Ben Sklaver's Clearwater initiative. The donation was made in the name of all Cabbagetown residents in honour of Ben's memory and work. b. Bar One: Ashley read letter from Bar One in response to our letter. Lyn has been in communication with officer regarding the neighborhood complaints. We have been in contact with Grant Park leaders, NPUN and NPUW presidents regarding this issue. If you have a complaint, call 911. We are continuing to follow up. c. Three Points Park: George reports the sidewalk will be concrete base with bricks on top. Three bids on bricks-about \$2600. City will do concrete for free. Natalyn is paying for the bricks. Someone is interested in renting the front of George's property to sell fresh fish and meats. They may also serve sandwich's. The committee meets the first Wednesday of every month at 7p at George's place because it overlooks the triangle. He wants two historic markers. Historic Cabbgetown marker and a Civil War marker. He thinks we may be able to get both for \$1500. Part of the Battle of Atlanta was fought on the triangle according to a historian George has spoken with. There was discussion regarding whether the sidewalk will be curb cut by the City when they pour the concrete. Bricks will come a week after the concrete is dry.

#### 7. New Business

- a. Milltown Tavern: (Barb Harper) Milltown has had tables outside and we want to comply with the sidewalk rule of 60 inches from the curb. We have had round tables, which has intruded into the sidewalk area because customers spread out. We want to comply with the 60 inches, so we now are getting thinner picnic-style tables which will keep the customers closer to the building. It should be completed in a few weeks. There was a discussion regarding whether any outdoor seating on Carroll Street is illegal, what the specific requirements are, fire safety and whether the historic regulations allow it at all. Barb has made every effort to keep us informed. John Dirga wants in the minutes that this body has not voted on anything illegal, but rather has not asked anyone to take down the seating.
- b. Cabbagetown Reunion: (Brad Cunard and John Dirga) It will require a permit for blocking off the street between Gaskil and Shelton. There may be a band. Old neighbors would be invited.
  June 2, 2012 from 10-6. We are not trying to invite Atlanta, but old friends. Kyle F. Bidlack offered his graphic design services.
  c. Whisper Park, Bill B. Memorial: Stump will be removed as well as

### C'town Census 2010

The United States issues a census report every ten years. This report is based on information we send to the U.S. government. We thought you might find it interesting to gain some census insight into Cabbagetown. Here is some info gleaned from the 2010 report:

Total Cabbagetown population: 1,300

78% are white. 16% are African American. 2% are Asian.

96% are non-Hispanic. 4% are Hispanic or Latino.

51% (656) are male and 49% (644) are female.

93% are 18 and over. 43% of those are between 25 and 34 yrs old. 28% are between 35 and 49 yrs old.

11% are 50 and older.

There are 982 houses in Cabbagetown. 81% are occupied. 40.5% are owner-occupied. 40.5% are renter-occupied.

The Stacks and Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts have the biggest concentration of people: 488.

Powell St. and Berean North has 97 people.

Estoria and Pearl North has 76 people.

Savannah St. and Berean has 63 people.

Evidently there are 2 women living at the CSX platform and Wylie.


