Greetings fellow Cabbagetown neighbors! My name is Stacia Familo-Hopek. I purchased a loft at *The Stacks* almost a year ago and have really enjoyed getting to know the neighborhood and the community. I've been amazed at how this community comes together to support one another and have fun together. Last year I also joined the board of one of the oldest non-profit organizations in the metro Atlanta area – *The Empty Stocking Fund* (ESF).

Since 1927 ESF has provided holiday gifts and books to children living in poverty. What's unique about our organization is that parents have the opportunity to actually shop for the toys and books that will best match their child's interests versus being handed a random gift that their son or daughter may not enjoy.

Being able to select the gifts for their children gives the parents a sense of empowerment at a time when they are struggling to make ends meet. Each year we provide gifts to over 50,000 metro Atlanta children in nine counties and our donations are shrinking year-over-year which limits our ability to purchase mass quantities of toys for the families to select from at Santa's Village every December. Last year we opened Santa's Village in a vacant space just down the street on Memorial Drive. The spot was donated by Bruce Cohen, owner of Decatur-based *Vision Properties*.



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Cabbagetown: Old school

Ronnie Edwards has spent most of his 76 years in Cabbagetown, sometimes wandering as far away as Grant Park. And oh! The stories he can tell. If you name a street in Cabbagetown, chances are Ronnie has lived on it. Powell? Yep. Savannah? Check. Gaskill? That one, too. And so on.

Ronnie started working at the Fulton Bag and Cotton Mill in 1955 when he was just 17. He worked the second shift (3p to

11p) as a "winder". He would stand in one spot while thousands of yards of cloth would pass by him on rollers. His job was to

But he did! And he rode his bike. In fact, while recuperating from one operation, Ronnie had a job as a delivery boy for a grocery in Grant Park (it was where the Grant Central Pizza place is now). He was paid ^{\$}15 a week.

The bicycle has been Ronnie's primary form of transportation his whole life. You've probably seen him riding up and down the streets of Cabbagetown on his can recycling mission. As a matter of fact, he never did learn to drive.

He is very proud of his house on Gaskill street (first one on the left, east of Carroll). And he should be. His was one of the very early Habitat for Humanity houses. He and his brother, Marshall and his nephew, Mario put a lot of sweat into that house. Marshall and

inspect the cloth, mark any defects, stop the rollers, repair the defect and start it up again.

The workers got a 30 minute lunch break. They usually would walk down Carroll Street to Mrs. Martin's Café (it's now the vacant lot next to Little's) for a burger. A few months into that job, he just couldn't take it anymore. So he quit. As Ronnie put it, he didn't "stay quit" from the Mill very long.

He could always talk his way back

up to folks sitting outside at

into a job because he was such a good worker and such a good talker. All told, he was employed four different times at the Mill.

Many nights, when Ronnie and his workmates got off work, they'd slip over to one of the neighborhood bootleggers and pick up a half pint or two of rotgut. They'd slip off behind some houses and put that stuff away. It wasn't unusual for a couple of guys to get into a fistfight. But by the time they came to work the next day, all was forgotten.

Ronnie was one of the millions of kids in the United States who contracted polio during the 50's before vaccines. He was one of the lucky ones: he survived. He had to have a couple of operations on his legs and it was touch and go as to whether he'd walk again.

If you run into Ronnie, on his porch or on the street, get him to tell you a story. It doesn't take much prompting and it's a fun way to spend a few minutes.

Welcome to Parkside Elementary

If you've strolled through this month, among dogs and Frisbees, you've probably noticed a more recent phenomenon: Kids. They're everywhere. Not long ago, one might have wondered if these kids would leave Cabbagetown when they reached school age. But that's changing too.

Two years ago, C-town was redistricted to Parkside Elementary School in Grant Park. The timing was fortuitous. In and around Grant Park, momentum has been steadily building for Parkside.

As Katie Howard explains, *"the school is rich in academics, resources, and diversity, which is exactly what I want for my girls."* Parkside parents like the 21st century facility (with smart boards in every class). And they appreciate the small classes (21 on average) and robust gifted program (with two full-time teachers – a rarity).

But most of all, parents "love the community" at Parkside, says Jennifer Botz. *"I feel like teachers and staff truly love my children. My input is welcome and the teachers and administrators are accessible.*"

Rebecca Kaye agrees. "We considered homes near Mary Lin [Candler Park] and in Decatur. But we chose Grant Park in large part because of the great reputation Parkside has among educators I respect: the rigorous instructional program strong in mathematics, science and engineering and the student body that is truly diverse, racially and socioeconomically." Her family "loves working shoulder-to-shoulder with neighbors invested in Parkside. It is clearly our best choice for my kids' future success in school and in life."

Kaye's son, who attended GPCP for preschool, was reading after one semester in pre-k at Parkside. Botz' son was accepted into the gifted program and *"has always met or exceeded expectations for the CRCT."*

Since income-level strongly correlates with achievement, at a mixed-income school, overall test scores can be misleading. Yet middle-income students at Parkside do about as well on the CRCT as their peers at the well-regarded Atlanta Neighborhood Charter School. And lower-income students do better than average for APS. Parkside's "value-added" scores are also strong.

While past test scores are a trailing indicator, leading indicators include strong parent support and the recent hiring of award-winning principal, Caitlin Sims. An Emory alum, Mrs. Sims is particularly skilled at building partnerships and community buy-in. She is already drawing rave reviews for her focus on educating the "whole child."

Parkside has 20 after-school clubs, including award-winning chess and robotics teams. Important aside: the "Robo Pandas" are the top robotics team in APS. At the Super Regionals this year, their innovative designs included heat sensing-satellites that dispatch firefighters across the globe to put out forest fires and clear snow during blizzards. You can't make this stuff up. Kids can also play golf, tennis, soccer, or piano. *Continued next page*.

Parkside continued

Parkside Elementary is the type of school Cabbagetown could really embrace. It recently received a grant to build a "Learning Garden," where students get multi-disciplinary lessons while harvesting kale. And for Principal Sims, who formerly led a fine arts academy, art is integral to the school's "whole child" philosophy.

Indeed, enthusiasm for Parkside is starting to spread across I-20. As Pearl Street parent Gila Herman explains, "more and more parents in Grant Park are sending their kids to Parkside." Herman is excited about sending her daughter to Parkside in the fall. "I am confident that eventually it will be the established thing to do."
