Chomp and Stomp is the largest one-day festival that Sweetwater participates in!



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




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Sarah Knight: A Cabbagetown legend

It was around noon on one of those absolutely gorgeous Fall days we are blessed with here in the South. I sat on the porch of the "happy house" on an old church pew awaiting "the legend". I think she was finishing up her lunch. In a few minutes, here she came – Sarah Knight; Miss Sarah (Say-ra) to most folks in Cabbagetown. For some strange reason, I had not met Miss Sarah in my eight years in C-town. Yet, in two minutes, I felt like we had been lifelong friends.

That's the way it is at the happy house. It's on Tye Street right across from the South end of the park. Sarah has been there since 1994 as has her daughter, Karen (it's Kay-ren), and more recently Karen's

husband, and Eli, the most gregarious 3½ year-old you'll ever meet. Sarah's older daughter, Kim, joined us as well. This is the third house on Tye Street that Miss Sarah has lived in.

Sarah has an encyclopedic memory. She remembers who did what, who owned what, who married who, who moved from which address to another address, who got in trouble and more.

She reminisced about the six or eight grocery stores and grills in (It's Kay-ren), and more recently Karen's is a big part of Sarah's and Karen's Cabbasetown Cabbasetown Cabbasetown

Miss Sarah surrounded by her two daughters, Kim, Karen and her grandson, Eli.

C-town. Perhaps the longest lasting and most memorable were her store, *Sarah's Grocery*, and *Leon Little's Grocery*. Sarah operated her store for 31 years, finally closing in 2002. Kim worked at the store starting in high school. Several times her Daddy came in the store, caught her talking on the phone and told her she was fired. She shot back, "You can't fire me because I quit." Then she ran home to her momma and said: "Daddy's gonna call and tell you he fired me, but don't believe him. I quit". The store was more than just a little neighborhood grocery. It was the place to come in and find out the latest C-town news.

Karen, on the other hand, worked at Sarah's store a total of one day. She says she just wasn't cut out for it. Kim says she was spoiled because she was the baby of the family. Karen has never lived anywhere except Tye Street. She and her husband and son share the

home with Sarah. She had two ponies growing up right here in the backyard; Trigger and Tinkerbell. And she used to do pony rides for the neighborhood kids.

Sarah's first job was at *The Boys' Club* on Carroll Street. It's now the *Carroll Street Lofts*. She ticks off the businesses and institutions that were on Carroll Street when she was young. The Boys' Club, *The Salvation Army*, a grocery store, a grill, another store, another grill, and Leon's (Little's Grocery). The grill in the building where *Carroll Street Café* is now located was special because they had a pool table. That's where all the teenage boys hung out. The building at the corner of Gaskill and Carroll housed a drug store and a mercantile store. *Rogers Supermarket* was in the place now occupied by *Agave Restaurant* (during the 40s and 50s).

Lifelong members of *Friendship Baptist Church* on Gaskill, religion is a big part of Sarah's and Karen's life. Karen says: "The Lord is

number one with this family".

At 77, Sarah is still spry and active. She cooks supper for the family four nights a week. On Wednesday, she feeds their Bible study group which might run to eight or ten people.

So what makes it the happy house? It has to do with the porch and the people. I mentioned to Sarah, Karen and Kim that other long time Cabbagetown residents told me that sometimes people walk by and don't look up to the porch or say hello. Three voices responded as one: "WE MAKE 'EM!" Take note: If any members of the family are out on the porch and you walk by,

they're going the make you speak. That includes Eli, who very well might be the first to shout out.

I've been writing these "old timer" articles for several months now. And there is one common theme: friendliness. These three women are stellar examples of what I have come to believe makes Cabbagetown special. It has always been a truly friendly community.

The longtime residents like Sarah, Karen and Kim have passed the "friendly gene" along to those of us who have come here more recently. Of course, we love their stories and their sense of history. But it's their persistent friendliness that is the glue that holds us all together.

I'm betting that the whole family will be out on that front porch along with a bunch of their friends the whole day of Chomp and Stomp. If you see them out there, be sure to holler "hey".

- Berean Avenue from Gaskill Street to Tennelle Street
- Savannah Street from Pickett Street to Tennelle Street (Note that reverse traffic will be allowed for neighbors exit).
- Mollie Street. (No parking on these streets Friday October 31st 8a - Saturday November 1st 10p.)
- Carroll Street from Gaskill to Tennelle Street
- Tennelle Street from Powell Street to Carroll Street (No parking on these streets Friday October 31st 8a Saturday November 1st 10p.)



The effort benefitted *Atlanta Community Food Bank* (ACFB). According to Polly Finch, Vice President of Aderhold Properties, this excellent example of Cabbagetown heart and generousity resulted in \$8,355.38 in cash and 2,600 cans of food.

Every \$1 donated to ACFB equates to \$9.21 worth of groceries. Don't worry, we'll do the math for you... that means \$76,953 worth of groceries is now filling the shelves of ACFB.

And they will need every morsel. The statistics on those in need in Georgia are sobering: 18.9 percent of residents and 28.1 percent of children, are food insecure, meaning they don't know where

their next meal is coming from, according to Feeding America. Furthermore, nearly 20 percent of Georgians are living in poverty, up from just under 13 percent in 2000, this according to the United States Census Bureau.

Says David Hirsch, Chairman of *ECI Group Inc*. "The cost of living in Atlanta is high and continues to grow, leading to an increasing number of people in need. During the Great Recession, many of those in the middle class suddenly found themselves in need of help. On top of that, monthly allotments for food stamps decreased by \$36 per month for a household of four in November 2013."

The Cabbagetown Neighbor applauds the effort put forth by The Stacks, Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts and all of Aderhold Properties. Just another example of why Cabbagetown is the heart of Atlanta.


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



CRSP needs you! Garden Guru

For over two years in Cabbagetown and one year in Reynoldstown, The Cabbagetown and Reynoldstown Security Patrol (CRSP) has been working to make our neighborhoods an even better places to live.

We've upgraded from private security to off-duty APD officers. We've increased patrol hours. And we've teamed up with local businesses to host fun events. Crime in both 'hoods has gone down substantially.



But CRSP now faces its biggest challenge. Our original patrol car, affectionately known as "Brussel" (pictured above) for its cabbage (or was it a brussel sprout?) logo, was generously donated by Ride-On. Sadly, it has reached the end of its road (a long one - well over 200,000 miles).

The good news: We purchased a new (used) car and it looks great. (Yes, it is possible to impose a cabbage on top of Reynoldtown's sunrise symbol).

The bad news: This was a major hit to our budget. We cannot maintain our desired coverage (70 hours/month for November and more over the holidays) unless we increase our membership substantially. This is where you come in . . .

Since we began our "support-the-new-car" pledge drive, support has been impressive. We had six new members sign-up on the first day, and several members renewed their membership. This is what our neighborhood does. When there is a chance to make our community even better, people step up.

If you are not a member, please become one. It's easy to sign up for monthly payments at *cabbagetownsecuritypatrol.org*. Only \$8.50 per month for individuals; \$17 per month for households; and \$4.25 per month for apartments/condos.

If you are a member, please ask others to become members. More members equals more coverage.

And be sure to check out the CRSP table during Chomp in the driveway of 171 Tye. Each member (new and old) receives a free beer. We're also hosting a Chomp and Stomp co-ed cornhole tournament (sign up as individuals, mixed teams randomly drawn). Sign-up before 1:30p on the day of Chomp.

Many of you know I am a "plant person" and have been since I was a small boy. I grew up on a large working farm in South Dakota and my family ran the local greenhouse. Living in urban settings I took my experience and evolved it into a more practical form which is why many of you have used me as your gardener/landscaper.

I am often asked specific questions about plants, their care and so on, so I decided to start a column so I could share tips and maybe even some secrets about plants and gardening. I may even combine living plants and a craft into a fun and unique project.

Fall is a very important time of the year because what you do in the next month will determine how well and how beautiful your gardens will look in the upcoming year. The 2012 Growth Hardiness Map shows Atlanta to be in Zone 8a (10-15 degrees) 7b- (5/10 degrees) but to play it safe I look at the zone above as well which is 7b- (5/10 degrees). That indicates we rarely ever get below 5 degrees max. (planthardiness.ars.usda.gov/PHZMWeb/#)

That is well below freezing and cold enough to freeze delicate roots. I only bring this up because the first sign of spring's arrival are those flowers that pop up out of the ground with beautiful colors and fragrances. Yes it is bulb planting season and you can very easily create a wonderful spring garden in one short afternoon that will reproduce and come back year after year.

Allium, Hyacinth, Iris, Lilies, Tulips, and Daffodils are perfect for planting now and are available at local home improvement stores as well as online. When planting bulbs, dig a hole for them that is at least three times the bulb size deep so they will be below the frost level.

For example, for a 2 inch Daffodil bulb, the planting hole should be about 6 inches deep (I plant all my bulbs at the 6 inch depth). Dig your holes and add some bone meal mix and place a bulb making sure you have the right end up. Try to have them not touch each other, if one bulb rots you don't want it to infect the rest!

Check your bulbs before buying them. Do not buy or plant bulbs that show signs of mold or are soft and squishy to the touch. I like to place all my bulbs in their planting holes and then cover them.

That's it! Just be patient and enjoy your efforts next spring. Don't forget to winterize and fertilize your yard. This is a good time for pruning most shrubs and vines.
