Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

September 11th, 2012 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center) *By John Dirga*

- 1. Meeting called to order by President Lyn Deardorff at 7:04p.
- 2. Valencia Hudson, Councilperson Archibong's Security Liaison, addressed the community. Neighbors discussed broken lights near Cabbagetown Park (Tye Street). A neighbor discussed speed bumps, and was referred to the ordinance packet. A neighbor complained of an overgrown shrub on Fulton Terrace. A vacant property on Estoria will be investigated.
- 3. Atlanta Police Department addressed the community. A neighborhood complained about a residence on Powell Street. Residents were advised to call 911 for any incidents, no matter how small (dispatch will prioritize). Crime in our zone has been very low, though some are higher profile. Two suspects were arrested in a serial car-jacking scenario. Most crimes are vehicle break-ins. The holidays are more target rich for property crimes, but not necessarily violent crimes.
- **4. Minutes** were printed in The Cabbagetown Neighbor. Approved unanimously.
- *5. Treasurer's Report:* Starting Balance, \$7281. Payments for Insurance (\$750), Printing (\$542), Food (\$67). Ending Balance, \$5911
- **6. Cabbagetown Initiative** spent \$3300 for Arborist. ~\$85k in bank (budget submitted to records)
- **7. Hospitality: Karen Russian,** presented. New neighbor meeting Friday September 28th, 7p @ Lynne Splinter's House.
- 8. New neighbors were introduced.
- *9. NPU-N:* Voted to support Romp & Stomp. Water conservation kits available at fire station. Atlanta Water will help mark storm drain marking system. Habitat for Humanity moving to Chester and Memorial. There was discussion about a building at end of Powell St possibly being used for a theater associated with Bar One.
- 10. Jared, Historic Preservation: New construction on 140 Estoria, Subarea III, Cottage & Shotgun. HP had 2 comments: using correct material for foundation, and the front window subdivisions need to match contributing structures (110 and 114 Estoria). UDC Staff report is forthcoming. Support subject to UDC not making significant changes. Possible variance include width of house. UDC measures by front façade not bump outs, and height (Contributing structure is 124 Estoria). There is a garage, and a few neighboring houses have them. Will require an easement letter for driveway/alleys. Driveway required. No HVAC/plumbing in garage. 0.3FAR ratio. Motion for letter of support, approved unanimously.
- 11. Neighborhood Watch: Matt of Estoria working on proposal, block captains, and city training. Grant opportunities are available. Need

- matching funds. Asking for \$300 from CNIA. Future fundraising ideas include picnic with APD. Motion passed unanimously.
- **12.** Three Points Parks Proposal: Drought resistant, year-round color plants, with simple landscaping. A bench and a ginkgo tree. November 10th Volunteer day. §1500 from Cl.
- *13. CNIA Website Proposal:* \$1000 for Wordpress / keeping records, minutes. Motion unanimous.
- 14. Joe Ward: Security Patrol After crime incidents in neighborhood, decided to pay for a private security patrol to work in conjunction with Neighborhood Watch. Raised \$5000 amongst 17 neighbors and a couple businesses. Private security vs off-duty cops was discussed. It could be an insurance liability. It was unclear what authority the private guard has, what crimes will be targeted, and how to define "hot spots".
- **15.** October 6th: OctoberFest at Milltown Tavern. "Walking community event"... ending at 11p.
- 16. President of Fourth Ward Neighbors addressed community. "Streets Alive" with Atlanta Bicycle Coalition, October 7th. Highland/along BeltLine. No entertainment – just closing streets.

The Cabbagetown Initiative CDC met at 7p on Monday, Sept. 10th, 2012 at The Cabbagetown Community Center. In attendance were: Lyn Deardorff, Tova Baruch, Ashley McCartney, Dana Habeeb, Lynne Splinter, Barbara Keeney and Katherine Dirga

Here are the minutes:

I. Officer + Chair Reports

a. President – Wallkeepers update

i. The "Cabbagetown" sign should be finished this week/weekend. A sketch for the other side of the tunnel entrance was presented. CI has paid \$1000 of the total \$1500 to the artists for supplies.

b. Treasurer – Financial Statement

i. Ending balance as of 09/10/2012 is \$88,016.75

c. Secretary – Adopt August minutes

i. August minutes were voted on and adopted unanimously

d. Chomp and Stomp Chair – Lynne needs to know who the Chomp and Stomp chairs are and needs to have a better idea from the applications whether they are artists, vendors, etc.

II. New Business

a. CNIA Update

i. November 10th – landscaping workday for the triangle to install new plants (Butch Teal and Amy Foster of Garden Hood will lead the work). George is working with Justin at the sand/gravel place to till the ground the week before the workday.

ii. CNIA is voting to redo the CNIA website. The cost is estimated at \$1,000. *iii.* Neighborhood Watch: A meeting was held on Aug 21st for volunteers. APD, COPS reps and 911 Dispatcher were present to aid the discussion.

The NW planning group has been formed and they have held 3 meetings. 1. Block captains have been identified. They are responsible for getting to know their neighbors in their block and gathering contact info.

- 2. The planning group is developing an online social networking/alerting system to help pass along important info regarding the neighborhood watch (they are looking into networks such as Nextdoor and Hootsuite).
- **3.** Outlining group bylaws which spells out mission statement, roles and responsibility, maps of the neighborhood, etc.
- 4. CNIA will be looking for a new Public Safety Chair.
- 5. Private safety patrol group. A neighbor has hired a private safety patrol along with support from some neighbors. He is making a proposal to CNIA to come under the NW umbrella. There is a lot of background work needed regarding this structure. Suggestion is to reach out to other neighborhoods to see how they work and what are the pros and cons.

b. New motion for \$3300 for pruning, fertilizer and crusher run. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously.

i. 5 2700: pruning for all trees in the park and near the community center *ii.* 5 300: root fertilizers for \sim 2 really big trees in the park.

iii. \$300: crusher run (small granite) around the trees. Try to get delivered for Oct 21st, which is the tunnel painting day for Chomp and Stomp.

1. Dana will contact the arborist about the material of the root fertilizer. *III.* Old Business

a. Garden damage update

i. Jim Prible fixed the window that was damaged while mowing the garden. Everything should be good. We will reach out to double check. *b.* Need bios from new CI members. Send to Katherine

Important Fun Info

- 1. Eco-friendly cups and spoons. We will continue to be environmentally responsible with the festival.
- 2. We have hooked up again with the Atlanta Bike Coalition to run a bike valet service for our bicycling patrons. The bike valet will be located at 697 Wylie Street at the Emmanuel Holy Temple.
- **3.** The Fur Bus and the Stinger will be running a free shuttle between King Memorial MARTA station and the festival site to encourage public transit use. We also have the parking lot behind King MARTA this year.
- **4.** We will keep the same layout as last year (when we added Wylie Street, Esther Peachy Lefevre Park, and Estoria) so make sure not to just plop yourself down in one spot for too long.

We'll have food vendors, artists, beer, and more on Wylie and music, baked goods, and more in EPL Park.

5. Traffic on Carroll Street will be ONE-WAY heading SOUTH the day of the festival. Anyone needing to access Carroll Street will do so by heading north up Berean Avenue, then turning left on Tennelle, and then left again on Carroll. Carroll Street will also be a no-parking zone the day of the festival as well. Don't think of it as an inconvenience; think of it as the price of success! Of course, as plans formalize, I'll keep everyone in the loop via the CNIA Yahoo groups e-mail list.

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CI Notes: Special meeting

The Cabbagetown Initiative CDC met for a special meeting at 7p on Tuesday, Sept. 25th, 2012 at The Cabbagetown Community Center. In attendance: Katherine Dirga, Barbara Harper, Alicia Forsee Thompson, Lyn Deardorff, Lynne Splinter, and Dana Habeeb

Jocelyn Chen and Matt Wise with the Neighborhood Watch (NW) presented info about a potential grant application. The NW is an official committee of CNIA, which was voted on and approved at a CNIA meeting. NW consists 7-9 people and their goals are as follows:

- 1. Emergency communication and better reporting with APD
- 2. Designation of block captains
- 3. Promote education on what the NW can do, as well as ways to make people and houses safer.

The grant is a "Neighborhood Fund" grant through the Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta. Neighborhood Fund provides small grants to resident groups who are dedicated to improving their communities. The grant purpose is to support leadership and neighborhood engagement.

The grant application is due on Oct 1st. The CNIA Neighborhood Watch would like to have this as a proposal from CNIA, but CNIA has lost their tax-exempt status. CNIA are in the process of getting

it reestablished. In the meantime they are requesting to use Cl's 501(c)(3) status for the grants and donations.

The NW is requesting the grant be applied for by CI and that the grant money be paid to CI. CI will write checks as requested by NW. (up to the total of the grant). The NW will track their funds (everything they purchase and all additional funds that they raise). They will keep records with receipts of all purchases. The NW will also be responsible for reporting to the Community Foundation as required. The NW is also requesting that donations be made to NW through CI, so that individuals can receive tax deductions.

The NW grant is requesting around \$5,000 from the Community Foundation to fund such items as: flyers and information material, NW shirts and hats for block captains, food for meetings, etc.

Motion: A motion was made to submit the Community Foundation Grant application on behalf of the CNIA's Neighborhood Watch with CI as the recipient and disperser of the funds. When the grant and contributions are received, the NW has the ability to spend up to the amount of the grant and contributions as according to the budget contained within the grant application.


The motion was unanimous approved. Meeting adjourned: 7:50p

We stayed at *The Birches*, a rustic "resort" in the sense that they offer lots of things to do such as hunting, ice fishing, moose watching, and similar Maine kind of events. The Birches front onto Moosehead Lake, the largest lake east of the Mississippi

It was a spectacular trip in every visual sense - the mist on the lake in the early morning hours, the trees reflecting across the amazingly still and clear waters, the sunsets over the waterscape and mountains in the evening, the stars across a crisp black sky at night. Cabbagetown security patrols

Cabbagetown has always dealt with an element of crime. For most of us it was the occasional broken car window or break in when we weren't home. However, after the recent increase in crime this summer, a group of Cabbagetown residents came together and founded the Cabbagetown Security Patrol (CSP).

CSP intends to provide additional police and private security patrols in Cabbagetown, helping to make our community safer and to improve the quality of life for everyone.

We are surrounded by neighborhoods who have founded similar programs (Kirkwood, Grant Park, Inman Park, Old Fourth Ward, to name a few). Now, we have our own. So far nearly 20 neighbors from Pearl St. to Carroll St. to The Stacks have signed up and contributed. This is meant to be an inclusive service for the entire neighborhood but we need more support.



In September, the private security company (Eagle Eye Security) put in 75 hours of patrol in Cabbagetown. Officer Wright cleared the parks after 11p, noted license plate numbers of suspicious vehicles, and escorted neighbors home late at night. Email info@ cabbagetownsecuritypatrol.org for detailed security reports for the month of September.

In October, Cabbagetown Security Patrol will be adding off-duty Atlanta Police Department officers. Officer Jones (who walked our beat after the Estoria kidnapping) will be putting in extra hours after his regular shift. Off-duty officers have the ability to arrest suspects and respond to emergency calls.


Here's to you, Brad, for keeping the spirit of Cabbagetown alive.



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


