Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association: General Meeting

Tuesday September 10th, 2013 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center). Minutes by Recording Secretary, Whitney Cheesbro

Meeting began at 7:04p

1. Public Safety Liaison -Valencia Hudson asked if there are potholes or street lights that need replacing. Neighbor inquired about trash service and the regular picking up tree limbs. Valencia said to email her and she will make sure it gets picked up. Asked for a follow up regarding new garbage bins at the Krog tunnel? Will double check on the status, no word yet. Valencia asked if anyone had any water bill questions. Lots of people felt the bill has doubled – send it to her and she will make sure it gets to the right person.

2. APD - **Officer Shaver** stated he is seeing much better numbers for crime in Cabbagetown and Reynoldstown. Trust your instincts, be aware. Snatch thefts and robberies usually occur when a valuable is visible.

3. Minutes of last meeting – amended to state that CI Connect motion was to explore every option for the future of the lot. unanimously approved. Minutes corrected and approved.

4. Treasurers report – Karin Kane August began with \$5,796.08. Wrote checks to the printers, pizza for the last meeting and a donation to *Smartgrowth Atlanta* and received various ad revenue deposits. We have an ending balance of \$5,356.96. Thanks to Luis and **97 Estoria** for the food tonight!

5. Hospitality – Karen Russian announced the next roll call is September 20th at 7p at Tova and Peters on Tye St.

6. Cl Connect – Lynne Splinter gave the treasurers report; currently have ^{\$}142k in the bank and ^{\$}76k in general funds. Chomp and Stomp update have brought in ^{\$}9,272 and spent ^{\$}11,900. The Romp has brought in ^{\$}11k so far. There will be a neighborhood clean up Oct 12th meeting at EPL. There will be water and snacks for volunteers. Cl has identified several projects to tackle. CSX is donating 13k for expenses related to the wall. Cl will have a tree company trim the area. They will take out the low limbs and wall keepers committee will have a few projects. Lyn Deardorff notes Cl also will plant fig vines where there are not murals or tile to cut down on graffiti, maintenance, and add natural beauty.

7. *HP* will start rotating members of the committee to present. Ron Fisher is presenting – no new cases in front of the HP. They are continuing to update the regulations. Big questions – after what happened on Glenwood they are looking into how that affects Cabbagetown regulations and do we need to ask for any rezoning now. 8. APD (Part Deux) Lt. Floyd stopped in to hear if we have any concerns. Over the past 28 days there have been some issues on Memorial Drive. He wants us to know they are committed to improving the quality of life here and having a partnership with the community.

9. NPU-N - John Dirga representative meetings are the third Thursdays at L5P Community Center. Talked about laws for paws, must have your animal on a leash. Reynoldstown politely requested we send trash pickup over there after the Chomp and Stomp because they are impacted by the event. City has passed an ordinance that you can't ride your ATV on the streets.

10. *Public Safety – Lyn* announce that Matt had a prior commitment but wants us to know he has been working on getting the signs in place and getting us certified.

11. BTI – Ben announced the railings are up and painted.
Definitely an improvement – and now they are being considered as a Living Walls project for 2014 which would bring full funding.
City is supposed to deal with weeds and pressure washing soon, hopefully before the Thursday 19th and the tunnel crawl from 5:30p at Milltown Tavern. There are plans for the street to be resurfaced and bike sharrows added in 2014.

12. Cabbagetown HOPE (Help Our Park Expand) is hosting an event at *Milltown* on September 21st to raise money for a lot at the end of Mollie St. Swing by! There will be a corn hole tournament with prizes and trophies, they will be showing the Braves game on TV, a Cabbagetown trivia showcase, and the *Atlanta Decatur Dart Association* will host a dead eye dart tournament. September is the month of Cabbagetown HOPE and any patron can leave a donation on their tab.

The lot we are trying to purchase has been maintained as part of the park for years. Have a Facebook page set up to let people know the neighborhood is interested in the lot. Neighbor asked if it was an error that the city did not acquire that land? *Invest Atlanta*; the city's investment arm is looking into the issue. Parcel is in the original park design because on the plat it showed as city of Atlanta parcel. A title search is being performed to figure out the details. Putting the message out that we want it and are actively raising money. Facebook page is *Cabbagetown HOPE*, please like and friend it!

13. New business – Karin announced that a neighbor is in the hospital and we will be thinking of them.

Monster Dash!

The fifth annual Monster Dash is one of the area's most fun and healthy family events. Participants are encouraged to put on costumes and bring the whole family. This year's activities include a family 5K, a 1 mile fun run, and a Little Goblins Run. The start and finish lines for the 5K course and 1 mile events are positioned near the Grant Park parking lot at Boulevard and Confederate.

Day-of-registration begins at 7:30a, or pre-register online at *GPCP*. *org/MonsterDash* by October 23rd. This year's 5K run/walk and 1 miler start at 8:30a and the Little Goblins Run around 9:30a. Preregistered fees are ^{\$}25 for the 5K and ^{\$}20 for the 1 Mile, whereas event day registration will be ^{\$}30 (5K) and ^{\$}25 (1M). Running groups of 10 or more can contact *MonsterDash2013@gmail.com* for group registration and discounts. A special ^{\$}5 discount is being offered to college students. As usual, the Little Goblins Run is free.

The Baroness of Berean

The role of the person who stands before you is to comfort. When a pain is inflicted, the healing begins after someone else touches and dotes over the injury, wraps and cares for the wound. I want to comfort you all. I want to make it less painful for us all. I wish to make it easier for us. I see we are all collectively unable to process our loss. This is a devastating blow. Cabbagetown survived fires and tornados, but I feel cheated now. Fires and tornadoes – those things happen – but right now I feel the breath knocked out of me with how unaware I was that we might be reflecting on this tragedy. Those other things are just occurrences. Heck, after the tornado there was property damage. There were roofs gone and trees in houses, but I didn't feel loss. I felt community. And we should count our blessings. But right now, I just feel plain anger. I feel we have been robbed of our treasure.

I realize that this is not a good state of mind. It makes comforting difficult, but perhaps it comforts those of you that are angry too. I believe it okay to be angry. Whatever reason we no longer have Judy Staples is not a good reason. We reflect today for a bad reason. Today is not an occurrence, it is a tragedy. And we deserve to be angry.

I wasn't Judy's closest friend, but for fifteen years we were both members of this village together. We became friends. We shared many bottles and smokes. I spent a lot of time during two years at the *"You Are Here"* house when a close friend of mine was a tenant there. I don't think that spot on Berean St. is necessarily the geographic middle of Cabbagetown, but

it is close probably. There is something extremely hypnotic and metaphysical about those words "You Are Here." I have never walked by and not read those words on that house. To me they have always meant that I am not just here at that address, but here in Cabbagetown. I have always imagined those words on that house as our unofficial welcome and warning sign to Cabbagetown. On one level they say, "Hi. Welcome. You are here." On those maps at the theme parks and the airports where it says "You Are Here" and there is a dot or an arrow it serves two purposes though, right? One is to locate the reader, and the other is to show the reader how to get out. On that house on Berean, it doesn't offer you anything else at first - just a locator; "You Are Here. Here You Are." But there is an unstated implication as well, to me anyway, that says, "You are here, in Cabbagetown. This is our thing. You have entered our village. Make sure you belong." Her house across the street defined those words. Her membership in our village was crucial. She was as tenured a Cabbagehead as one could be. Judy was unquestionably the founder of the current movement here. She was a pioneer into this village. She opened the door for the artists to move in, for the musicians, for the gays, for the creative and colorful, for the freaks, for whatever I am, and for whatever all of you are. Very few here can say they have been here longer than Judy Staples, and if they can say that, they will also tell you it was better since she came to it. And she was smack dab in the middle. She was our destination. She was our lighthouse to cool. She drew us into this magical neighborhood where people have keys to each other's houses so they can walk the dog if someone's running late. This village, where people eat each other's dishes at pot luck dinners, where children were conceived

at Christmas Crawls. These streets where houses are so crammed together you hear your neighbor's both fighting and loving each other. This dormitory called Cabbagetown. This fraternity. Judy Staples started what became one of the trendyist things to do in Atlanta – move to Cabbagetown, and she did it when it was way more jungle-like, when it was more dangerous and adventurous to be here. She had great courage. She was a scrapper. She went in swinging with her machete at that jungle and helped shape what it is now. We all owe her thanks for this. This is the grooviest commune in the city, not just because of people like Judy Staples, but because of Judy Staples.

And a Founding Father and Elder Statesmen, Dave Thayer, called me just Friday and told me the horrible news with its bad reasons. Last night I officiated a

wedding and during the rehearsal Friday I see his name on the phone calling, and I think, "Oh, my neighbor!" because that's how our village operates, we usually only have good news to spread, and I think at that moment foolishly that bad news doesn't exist. I dart away from the practice procession and here my good friend has to tell me this awful news and it pains me to hear it and it pains him to say it and right away he starts tending to my wound and wrapping and caring for my pain like an actual father. Then we have to get off the phone so he can go share this same shitty news to more of our family, to the rest of the village. And I put my phone away and I feel like I have seen a ghost as I go back and stand before this bride and groom. And when I

got home we went to Pete and Tova's to welcome the new residents at the party. The new people don't have any idea how freaked out and scared all of us are and how epic the situation. The bitter surrealism of welcoming new folks and losing Judy. And yesterday another Founding Mother and lighthouse, Lynn Splinter, asks if I could do this today and I say I would, and then she asks how I'm doing and right away she is doting on my injury and pain, like an actual mother. And here I am and I see how emotional it is for this neighborhood right now, for her family and friends. This tiny woman in the middle of Cabbagetown has made this! Look how many lives were saddened by her loss. This really isn't normal. People and neighborhoods don't have this, generally. This is what is great about what she made here for us. It is a testament to how loved she was. She made a legacy right here. And You Are Here because of her. She will be missed by an incredible amount of people. May we all be so lucky.

Goodbye Judy. I'm mad you were taken from us. The planet suffers today, even though nothing can erase the kindness and happiness you left here. Thank you, Judy. I hate how trite it is when people say it at these times, but I can with clear conscience declare that I know you would want us to have a party. People here have no doubt you would want us to party right now. Some could tell us what you'd want us to listen to while we do, and some could tell of what you would want us to drink. We will do that in time, but right now we are still reeling from your absence. You Are not Here. And it will never be the same. I'd take another tornado any day. Goodbye.



^{\$}18m for Atlanta Beltline

The City of Atlanta will receive an ^{\$}18 million TIGER V grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation for the development of a 2.5-mile portion of the Atlanta BeltLine in the southwest corridor, announced Mayor Reed on Monday.

"The Atlanta BeltLine is one of the most transformative projects ever undertaken in our city's history," said Mayor Reed. "I sincerely appreciate President Barack Obama and U.S. Secretary of Transportation Anthony Foxx for supporting vital surface transportation projects that will improve mobility and the quality of life for residents in cities across the nation such as Atlanta. This \$18 million grant is a tremendous step forward in my administration's goal to make the vision of the Atlanta BeltLine a reality much sooner." The TIGER V grant to be awarded to the City of Atlanta will fund the development of 2.5 miles of the Atlanta BeltLine corridor – a former freight rail line that has not been in use for nearly 30 years. The project includes the construction of shared use trails, trailheads and access points, and the preservation of the future streetcar transit corridor. It will run from Allene Avenue north to Lawton Street, where it will transition to the existing West End Trail for a few blocks, then return to the rail corridor near Ralph Abernathy Boulevard and run north to Lena Street and Washington Park, where it will terminate at the existing Westside Trail, a PATH Foundation trail.

One battle victory in a long war

Residents and neighborhood associations from Cabbagetown, Glenwood Park, Grant Park, Chosewood Park, Ormewood Park, Reynoldstown, and others united to fight the Fuqua plan, rallied by Councilmember Smith's legislation.

Despite threats of a legal challenge, the Atlanta City Council voted on September 3rd, to approve legislation proposed by Councilmember Carla Smith to rezone property on Glenwood Avenue along the *Atlanta BeltLine* from light industrial to multifamily residential to stop a Fuqua Development project. Fuqua has proposed a single-level, 155,000 square foot retail space, rumored to be a *Walmart*, on the 20-acre property. with the slogan, "Save Our BeltLine." Smith said there is still work to be done, since the Zoning Board of Appeals will hear an appeal to Fuqua Development's already-granted special administrative permit (SPA) to develop the big box retail store in the BeltLine overlay zone, which calls for mixed-used and residential development. Fuqua proposed neither in their SPA. The Zoning Board of Appeals meeting is set for October 10th at noon at City Hall.

Liz Hill, a former Walmart employee who lives a half-mile from the Glenwood property, said the fight was not about Walmart but using the property in an appropriate way that won't impact the surrounding neighborhoods.

Two votes were required to pass the legislation on the property located at 800 and 860 Glenwood Avenue. The first passed 12-2 with Councilmembers Ivory Lee Young and Joyce Sheperd voting against the rezoning, while the second vote was 11 to 3, with Young and Sheperd being joined by Felecia Moore in dissent.

Before the votes were taken, there were two attempts to convene an executive session, which would have been closed to the public, to discuss

the rezoning issue in private because of legal implications. The majority of the council voted against an executive session, but seemed reluctant to speak at any length on the issue in case the developer and property owner file suit, which attorney's threatened to do on Aug. 8 when the Atlanta Zoning Review Board (ZRB) took up the issue. The ZRB's recommendation for approval of Smith's legislation was voided last week by the city's Zoning Committee citing an improper vote.

Councilmember Moore said she believed the rezoning issue should have gone back to the ZRB so that the city was following proper procedure and "crossing all its t's and dotting all it's i's" in case of a legal challenge. "I have to vote against this rezoning change, although I think the plan proposed by the developer is awful. I hope there is still a chance for the community and the developer to sit down and come up with a softer site plan."

After the votes, Councilmember Smith met with several dozen residents who had turned out wearing blue shirts and buttons

ing communities was huge, especially with the lack of road infrastructure. *"There are plenty of other areas around town who would love a Walmart or big box development,"* the resident said. *"Why don't they go there instead of trying to force it onto a piece of unsuitable property?"*

Colleen Kiernan, the director of the Georgia Chapter of the Sierra Club, was pleased by today's vote. *"The Sierra Club is a proponent of the Atlanta BeltLine, so we also have an interest in seeing the correct kind of development happen along the trails. One giant store with a big parking lot is not part of the BeltLine vision."*

Councilwoman Smith encouraged the residents to "stay positive" as the process continues.

Smart Growth Atlanta, an umbrella organization made up of neighborhood associations in the area, is already collecting money at its website, *smartgrowthatlanta.org*, for a potential legal challenge.

Glenwood Park resident Brandon Tidwell said he wanted to see development in the area, but a big box retailer was not the answer. "Look at the mix of brownstones, retails and restaurants in Glenwood Park. It's been successful, so why can't Fuqua come up with something similar and not go with a big box retailer? I think there is still an opportunity for the community to sit down with Fuqua and propose something else for the site."

Another resident who wished to remain anonymous said the potential adverse affects on Glenwood Park and surround-

See and Do

Carroll Street is home to most local hangouts, including *Carroll Street Cafe*, a bohemian brunch spot that turns into a tapas bar at dinner. The retro *Little's Food Store*, which opened as a grocery in 1929, offers burgers and onion rings along with tofu sandwiches. A few blocks east, *Sweet Cheats* sells cupcakes in decadent flavors like strawberry cheesecake. Burn off the sugar rush at *Cabbagetown Park*, a greenspace and playground on a former schoolyard. And *Agave Restaurant* is a must!

Living Here

Brightly painted bungalows and shotgun homes may be tiny, but their front porches, decorative trim, and white picket fences are big on period charm. For a more industrial feel, lofts at *The Stacks* – the former *Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills* – feature exposed brick, tall windows, and polished cement floors. Onebedrooms start in the ^{\$}140s.


