By Kyle F. Bidlack. The Atlanta Police Department released the year-to-date crime data. A quick look at the numbers shows we have a lot of work to do if we are to make Cabbagetown a safer place to live and work.

Crime is up in 8 of the 11 police beats within Zone 6 (Cabbagetown falls within Zone 6, Beat 606). Cabbagetown and Reynoldstown experienced the highest year-over-year jump.

It is hard to measure what effect our Neighborhood Watch and Security Patrols has on these numbers, but logic dictates the numbers would be worse without these noble community efforts.


This writer fears that this recent descent into

darkness is more a reflection of a regional backslide in moral and family fiber, education and respect for law and society.






Crime in Inman Park






Crime in the Edgewood Neighborhood

Tuesday August 13th, 2013 – Cabbagetown Hall (Community Center) Minutes by Recording Secretary, Whitney Cheesbro

Meeting called to order at 7:01p by Lyn Deardorff.

- 1. Emergency update 800 Glenwood Development Ashley McCartney, President of Cabbagetown, updated neighbors on the 800 Glenwood Fuqua project. Zoning Review Board recommended changing zoning legislation and now will go to the Zoning Committee. Grant Park is leaded the lawsuit to appeal the permit that Fuqua has to proceed. They have started a campaign to support the legal fees smartgrowthatlanta.org to donate individually. In addition, motion made for CNIA to donate \$500 to Smart Growth Atlanta was unanimously approved.
- 2. Public Safety Liaison -Valencia Hudson reminded us that the home alarm registration is coming up September 15th, make sure you register. There is a ^{\$}150 fine if you do not register. Go to *crywolf.us./atlantaga* to register. Valencia has also requested increased wattage for street lights in higher crime areas. Neighbor asked about the garbage can that used to be on the corner at Krog? She will try to get us some trashcans. Neighbor noted Mollie St is having flooding issues at Mollie and Estoria, Valencia said she will look into it.

Robert Tubbs – introduced member of the Court Watch program. Ms. Ward, the Citizens court watch coordinator. Program created by DA Paul Howard to facilitate citizen involvement in the courts and criminal justice system. They have an annual training in the spring, but if enough people are interested, they will come to the community and hold onsite training. Next month we have invited Mr. Lamar, Assistant District Attorney to come speak to the community. Robert also met with APD Deputy Chief Finley and will follow up to improve community involvement and communication.

- 3. APD Lt. Floyd, the new evening watch commander for Zone Six, spoke. He has been going around introducing himself to our community. He started his career in Zone Six and is excited to be back. He mentioned that Court Watch is a good program and encourages participation.
- 4. Minutes of last meeting name correction, misidentified Steve Seachrist (Cabbagetown sidewalk improvement study) as Steve Butler. Motion to approve as corrected, approved unanimously.
- *5. Treasurers report Karin Kane,* we started with \$5,337 and the ending balance is \$5,796.
- **6. Hospitality Karen Russian** announced the next "meet and greet" for new residents will be Sept 20th. 7p at Peter and Tova's on Tye Street.
- 7. CI Connect Barb Keeney for Lynne gave the treasurer's report. They have \$128,069 in checking and savings of 35k. Making plans for Chomp and Stomp to raise money for their main responsibility of taking care of the parks and community center. October 12th having a Cabbagetown clean up day! Chomp update meeting Sunday at 4:30p. If you want to volunteer come and participate. Volunteer application will be on

Nextdoor soon. Last year *Homegrown* provided food and drink for 300 kolks in the volunteer village.

Mollie St ends at Cabbagetown Park on the back side. At the end of the street there is a lot for sale. We had thought the parcel had been acquired and has some park assets like boulders and we have been maintaining the space. Motion proposed to explore purchase of the lot unanimously approved.

8. Historic Preservation - Steve Seachrist filling in for Jared. First item is for new house at 171 Savannah. House meets all regulations and requests no variances. Motion to support with advisory letter to the UDC approved unanimously.

HP is also drafting revisions to regulations. Have a draft of the residential, commercial to come. Residential - changes to make the process easier and create uniformity and clarify areas that have been contradictory. Commercial - the objective is that Memorial Dr. is light industrial that has some large parcels of land that overlay the Beltline. Seek to merge the two and prevent an 800 Glenwood type development. Hope to have a preview by the next meeting.

- 9. NPU N John Dirga said they had a great meeting discussing 800 Glenwood. Also, police to enforce leash laws in parks and soon water bills will be able to be paid online. Public Works finally recognized the gridlock on Krog and DeKalb so they are looking into making some changes. Also, we will need a TAD representative for the neighborhood.
- 10. Boulevard Tunnel Initiative Ben Braxley for Nicki, fundraising is live BLVDTNL.com and Channel 2 News did a story. The City has started to install railings and now every section has a railing. The City will be coming back through to paint the railings. There are plans for a pubcrawl from Milltown to Church sometime in Sept. and they will also incorporate a project with the Cabbagetown Cleanup Day in October. BTI is in the top 4 for Creative Loafing's \$2,500 grant matched by Home Depot. Send CL staff an email to support.

11. Old business - none

12. New business – Milltown is 8 years old as of 8/23, thanks to the customers! They will have an appreciation day with a scavenger hunt to involve many local businesses and homes. From 5p to 8p tickets for free beer or well drinks, Fat Tire free pint, and special guest bartenders.

Movie nights with *Sweet Cheats* showing a documentary next, "Riding with the King", celebrating Elvis. *Slim and the Convicts* might play. Movie starts at dusk, with a 30 minute animated short for the kiddies. Will continue movie nights through November or till it is too cold to continue.

The Lot at 719 Mollie Street.

If you've ever taken a stroll down Cabbagetown Park's pathway from the Community Center or Playground down to our wonderful Amphitheater, you may have noticed the empty lot at 719 Mollie Street; Although, there's a good chance that

you might not have noticed that it is private property as it looks to be very much part of the Park.

Recently, the property owner put the lot on the market. Our neighbors on Mollie Street recently attended both the Cabbagetown Initiative Community Development Corporation (CICDC) and the Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association (CNIA) meetings to encourage the neighborhood to explore all options to try and acquire the property and subsequently add it to Cabbagetown Park.

The Mollie Street gang made a good case and both groups endorsed the endeavor as the parcel is a perfect fit and great expansion of our green space.

The neighborhood has explored the possibility of acquiring the property in the past. Board members of

CICDC discussed options and approached the city for help and guidance. After meeting with several different groups of people and departments, it became clear that the fastest way to secure the land would be to purchase it. If all goes well, the next step after purchasing would be donating the land to the city in order for it to officially become part of Cabbagetown Park. CICDC will put applications in for grants that have been successfully received in the past to help with the acquisition.





The asking price for the lot is \$125,000.00. Even with grant money the neighborhood will have to raise a substantial figure and it will take everyone's help.

A Facebook page has been set up called Cabbagetown HOPE, which stands for Help Our Park Expand and we ask everyone to "Like" it. The page will be the sounding board for our fundraising events and status up dates.

We challenge everyone to come up with ideas for events to raise money for the lot. Remember—the more fun an event is the better the chances it has to raise money. We have plenty of resources at our disposal—the Community Center, the Park, and plenty of local businesses to partner with so get creative!

Also, don't forget that CICDC is a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation so any direct donations are tax deductible. (Not all contributions to non-profits are tax deductible).

Did you say "a digital smokestack"?



Wonderfully Edible (Folk) Art

Wisteria owner and executive chef Jason Hill has opened a breakfast and lunch spot called *Folk Art.* Located at 465 North Highland Avenue, in a space that's been empty for nearly ten years. Folk Art focuses on "artful food for simple folk."

Hill says he originally wanted to open a meat-and-3 restaurant, but the space wasn't big enough for a buffet. Instead, he settled on nostalgic breakfast and lunch place with some meat-and-3 options.

The rather large menu is full of "fun" waffles and pancakes, Hill says, with flavors like chocolate s'mores, bread pudding, cinnamon sticky bun, pumpkin spice, and banana nut. Patrons can order eggs any style, tofu or smoked trout hash, biscuits, and benedicts.

Folk Art serves fresh juices and Lakehouse Coffee. And in addition to

traditional Bloody Mary's, apple bitter mimosas, and cocktails like Mr. Sunshine (gin, orange juice, lemon juice, and ginger syrup); What's Up Doc (vodka, carrot juice, apple cider, and fresh ginger); and Vermont Sour Maple (whiskey, maple syrup, orange juice, and lemon).

For lunch, options include a crabmeat salad, rib eye steak sandwich, smoked salmon on rosemary focaccia with almond cream cheese, pork belly hot dog, and traditional muffaletta.

The restaurant is casual; meals cost \$10 to \$12; and reservations are not accepted. However, Hill says customers should expect the same level of service they get at *Wisteria*.



BoccaLupo is a culinary hit!

This is the food of a cook with confidence to burn. Many of Chef Bruce Logues' previous gems once again delight. Kerchief-thin slices of prosciutto, adorning piadina (a crackery flatbread) with creamy ricotta and pineapple mostarda, remain an ideal first nibble. Cucumber brodo, a refreshing forest-green pool surrounding a pile of neatly chopped tuna crudo and a generous dollop of mashed avocado, quells the summer heat brilliantly. The chewy black spaghetti with sausage and shrimp still delivers its tangle of textures and punchy spices. Ribbon-like tagliatelle, golden from egg yolks, cradles the season's latest gifts (in mid-spring it was ramps and wild mushrooms). Logue also sends out some rookie dishes that equally impress. He takes inspiration for bruschetta from banh mi, the Vietnamese sandwich; his piquant combination of slow-roasted pork, earthy chicken liver, and pickled cauliflower, celery, and carrots ricochets off the taste buds in all the right ways. And don't miss the skewer of grilled octopus and mortadella (bologna's pedigreed grandfather), a pyrotechnic display of conception and execution where both are cooked to an uncanny consistency of melting firmness, then poised over shell beans and

spinach united by the elusive, nutty scent of Marsala. Yet he can pull off simple comfort just as skillfully. Strano pasta, a spiral shape that resembles a fiddlehead fern, wallows in a light Parmesan cream sauce punctuated by cubes of mortadella and roasted broccoli. Tube-shaped garganelli, gently al dente, mingles with field peas in a pleasantly coarse white ragu of ground chicken sparked with white pepper. I'd gladly eat either of them once a week, and I'd finish with the quivering huckleberry panna cotta, an occasional dessert special that should be on the permanent menu. The pastas cost between \$13 and \$19, and the bartenders shake and stir elegant cocktails: I'm partial to the Tourist, which includes Knickerbocker gin, an herbal Italian aperitif called Aperol, and prosecco. And here's hoping Logue sneaks in a luxury splurge now and then. But his aim to serve affordable, soul-satisfying food is on-point, and the community has already responded: Make reservations early (especially for a spot on the patio) and expect diverse, animated crowds every night of the week. After a year spent looking for his own kitchen, Logue settled into the right home to showcase his singular talents. boccalupoatl.com



Zoning change for SE Atlanta retail site

The Atlanta Zoning Review Board voted Thursday to approve legislation that will change the zoning classification for the site of a hotly-contested retail development near the Glenwood Park and Grant Park neighborhoods.



A demolition permit has already been obtained for the 19-acre site on Glenwood Avenue, which connects to the *Atlanta Belt-line*. Fuqua Development, an Atlanta company, has unveiled plans for the site which include space for a large-scale retailer.

Community members are concerned the developer might have secured *Wal-Mart* as a future tenant.


The approved legislation changes the areas zoning classification from heavy industrial to high-density residential with some commercial, which supporters said is closer to the intended plans for Beltline development. It will likely only apply to future developments, and will not change current plans for the retail center.

More than 600 Southeast Atlanta residents attended the hearing at City Hall in support of zoning change.

"This decision is a victory for us and for our neighborhood," said Chris Kazakos, a Grant Park resident. "We've won the battle, but the war is far from over."

Area neighborhoods will continue to gain support in the event of future litigation, Kazakos said.

Atlanta City Council member Carla Smith introduced the legislation.
